GENERAL.

Out-turn of the Year.

1. The gross estimates for public services for the financial year 1934-35, as shown by the summary on page xliii, amounted to £33,802,813, and the gross expenditure to £28,285,506 17s. 2d. Appropriations in aid were estimated at £1,623,659 and the amount realized was £1,754,401 0s. 1d., but on some votes the estimated receipts were not realized and the actual amount applied in aid of expenditure was £1,599,064 19s. 7d., the balance falling to be surrendered.

Subject to approval by the Oireachtas of the excess vote referred to in paragraph 3, the amount to be surrendered is £5,648,048 2s. 11d., which is arrived at as follows:—

The large amount to be surrendered, representing over 16 per cent. of the gross estimate, is mainly due to an over-estimate of the requirements of the vote for Local Loans, vote No. 8. The amount provided in this vote was £4,200,000, but the charge in the account amounts to only £400,000, leaving £3,800,000 to be surrendered.

Surrender of Balances on 1933-34 Votes.

2. The balances to be surrendered out of votes for the public services for 1933-34 amounted to £1,878,214 13s. 6d. I hereby certify that these balances have been duly surrendered to the Exchequer. The sanction of the Oireachtas has not yet been obtained for the excess expenditure referred to in paragraphs 4 and 33 of my last report.

Expenditure requiring an Excess Vote.

3. Expenditure amounting to £546 17s. 5d. over and above the gross provision made by the Oireachtas has been incurred on vote No. 26, Law Charges, and will require an excess vote. The surplus receipts under appropriations in aid of £963 3s. 0d. will cover this excess.

Stock and Store Accounts.

4. The stock and store accounts of the departments have been examined. The results are satisfactory with some exceptions which are referred to in the paragraphs relating to the votes of the departments concerned.

VOTE 6.—OFFICE OF THE REVENUE COMMISSIONERS.

Revenue Account.

5. A test examination of the Revenue Account has been carried out with satisfactory results.

Remissions.

6. I have been furnished with a schedule of the several cases involving a loss of £50 and upwards in which claims for duty or interest receivable under the Revenue Acts were remitted during the year ended 31st March, 1935, without statutory authority, from motives of compassion or equity arising out of particular circumstances in individual cases. The reasons given for remission appear to be satisfactory. The total amount shown as remitted during the year is £12,340 5s. 7d. as compared with £3,954 11s. 1d. in the preceding year. Of the total, £9,355 16s. 8d. has been remitted in respect of Income Tax. £1,571 4s. 2d. related to 9 cases in which the assessed parties died insolvent, or were destitute and recovery was impossible; £1,273 10s. 11d. related to 4 cases in which the assessed parties were bankrupt and tax was given up on the Official Assignee's certificate of No Profits; £6,246 16s. 7d. to 11 cases in which assessments were raised, but subsequent evidence revealed no net liability to tax, and £264 5s. 0d. to a case in which a compromise settlement was

effected with a person who had left the country. The remissions also include Estate and Succession duties and interest on such duties amounting in all to £1,849 15s. 10d., Customs duties £91 14s. 9d., and Excise duties £1.042 18s. 4d.

The above figures do not include duty passed as irrecoverable

for various reasons.

VOTE 7.—OLD AGE PENSIONS.

7. In paragraph 8 of my report on the accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1933, I referred to the large number of appeals which was then awaiting decision. I have been informed that the number of appeals outstanding has now been reduced to normal.

VOTE 10.—OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Non-Voted Service—River Shannon Navigation.

8. In paragraph 8 of my last report I drew attention to the fall in revenue on the Shannon Navigation and the consequent reduction of the balance on the account. It will be seen from the statement appended to the appropriation account that expenditure during the year was £2,020 in excess of the receipts, leaving a debit balance on the account at 31st March, 1935, of £1,205 6s. 9d., which, it would appear, was met out of general balances on the Public Works votes.

I have inquired as to the authority under which the deficit

on the account was provided for in this manner.

VOTE 11.—PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

Sale of a Gárda Síochána Barracks.

9. A note appended to the appropriation account refers to the sale of a hut and site for the sum of £131. The site was originally purchased in 1925, and the sum of £1,791 17s. 4d.. including £80 for the purchase of site, was expended on this building during the period of occupation from September, 1925, to April, 1932.

Subhead B.—New Works.

Expenditure on Leased Premises.

10. I observed that the sum of £554 3s. 4d. was expended on building and improvement works in connection with premises held on a lease of five years from January, 1934. In view of the short term lease, and the heavy outlay, I have inquired whether the prior sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained for this expenditure.

Grants for building National Schools.

11. Grants amounting to £543 4s. 11d. were made during the year in respect of fees paid to Architects and Quantity Surveyors for preparing a National School building scheme which was subsequently abandoned. I have asked that the sanction of the Department of Finance be obtained for these payments.

Stores and Furniture.

12. Under the present system of accounting for receipts and issues of furniture and stores it is not possible to ascertain the value of stores and furniture on hands. I am informed that arrangements have been made to introduce a new system of store accounting which will enable this information to be furnished.

It was observed that considerable stocks of furniture and stores surplus to requirements were held, but I understand that it is proposed to dispose of such surplus stocks by auction in the near future.

Subhead J.3.—Barrow Drainage.

13. The expenditure of £6,876 13s. 3d. in the year brings the total expenditure on the Barrow Drainage Scheme, including cost of preliminary investigations, to £509,631 10s. 8d. Of the net expenditure chargeable to the cost of the Scheme under the Barrow Drainage Acts, 1927 and 1933, £253,729 3s. 9d. has been borne on voted moneys, and £253,700 was provided out of Local Loans Advances.

As the Scheme was practically completed during the year, machinery, no longer required on the Barrow, valued at £5,128, and stores to the value of £5,251 5s. 7d. were transferred to other arterial drainage schemes. The sum of £351 12s. 5d. was realized by the sale of surplus plant, tools, etc.

VOTE 14.—PROPERTY LOSSES COMPENSATION.

Subhead A.—Compensation for Pre-Truce Losses.

14. I observed that attached to an award of £5,500 for compensation for premises destroyed by fire in February, 1921, there was a condition that the sum of £1,800 should be expended on reinstatement of the buildings. A sum of £1,000 was expended on the reconstruction. The rebuilding condition attached to the unexpended balance of £800 was waived and a sum of £400 charged to this subhead was unconditionally paid in final settlement to the present owners, who bought the premises after they were rebuilt.

Subhead B.—Compensation for Post-Truce Losses.

15. In the course of my audit I observed that a sum of £150 was paid on foot of two Reports made under section 15 of the Damage to Property (Compensation) Act, 1923, in favour of a trader for shop goods damaged and stolen in the months following the Truce, under circumstances which did not admit of payment of compensation, as the claims were not apparently within the provisions of the Act.

VOTE 16.—SUPERANNUATION AND RETIRED ALLOWANCES.

16. The charge to subhead B. includes a sum of £173 9s. 1d., being a gratuity awarded on marriage to a female officer whose services had been terminated on political grounds and who was reinstated in 1933. The award was made in anticipation of a proposed Superannuation and Pensions Bill and is subject to review on the enactment of that measure.

VOTE 22.—STATIONERY AND PRINTING.

Government Publications Sales Office.

17. The Minister for Finance has, under section 5 of the Exchequer and Audit Departments Act, 1921, directed the preparation of a trading and profit and loss account and balance sheet for the Government Publications Sales Office. The accounts for the period 15th September, 1930, to 31st March, 1933, are in course of examination. Accounts for the two years ended 31st March, 1935, have not yet been received.

VOTE 26.—LAW CHARGES.

Excess of Expenditure over Grant.

18. The account shows an excess of expenditure over the gross Estimate of £546 17s. 5d. and a surplus of receipts under appropriations in aid of £963 3s. 0d. An excess vote will, therefore, be required to authorize the application of surplus receipts to meet the excess expenditure.

The excess was due to the charge to a losses subhead of sums totalling £1,006 16s. 1d. misappropriated by an official. It appears that the defalcations were facilitated by the non-observance of departmental regulations relating to the receipt and control of official moneys.

I have inquired whether the total deficiency has yet been finally ascertained and also whether the gross loss has been, or will be, reduced by recoveries.

VOTE 29.—ELECTRICAL BATTERY DEVELOPMENT.

Advances in respect of Electrical Battery Research and Development.

19. The total sum advanced up to 31st March, 1935, for Electrical Battery Research and Development was £71,913, in addition to which a grant of £1,800 was made from the Relief Schemes votes for the years 1932-33 and 1933-34. I understand that the terms and conditions of repayment of the advances have not yet been determined.

VOTE 34.—PRISONS.

20. The statement of the manufacturing and farm account appended to the appropriation account has been examined, and local test examinations of the conversion books and other records dealing with manufacturing operations have been carried out with satisfactory results.

VOTE 38.—CIRCUIT COURT.

Subhead B.—Travelling Expenses.

21. Included in the charge to this subhead are payments totalling approximately £500 made to certain Court Messengers in respect of travelling and subsistence expenses incurred in the execution of Court Orders and Land Commission Warrants. The vouchers indicated that the journeys were performed by rail and cycle, and numerous absences from headquarters overnight were included. I have ascertained that the claims were prepared on a hypothetical basis, the journeys having in fact been performed by a motor car owned by one of the Court Messengers, and that subsistence allowance was paid which was not warranted by the actual periods of absence from headquarters. I understand that a report on this matter will be submitted to the Department of Finance.

VOTE 41.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

Subhead U.—Acquisition of Land (Allotments) (Amendment) Act, 1934.

22. Section 4 of the above Act provides for the recoupment to local authorities, out of moneys provided by the Oireachtas, of losses sustained by them by reason of letting allotments to unemployed persons or to certain associations at reduced or nominal rents. The expenditure and receipts by the local authorities in connection with the provision of these allotments are verified by Local Government Auditors.

I observed that in some cases in which recoupment was made in the year under review, the auditor's certificate did not cover any receipts by the local authorities concerned in respect of rents. As full recoupment of the audited expenditure was made and as it appears that under the Act rents, reduced or nominal, must be taken into account, I have addressed an inquiry to the Accounting Officer in the matter.

Motor Tax Account.

23. A test examination has been applied to the Motor Tax Account with generally satisfactory results. The certificates and reports of the Local Government Auditors who examine the Motor Tax transactions of the local authorities were scrutinized, in so far as they were available, but in some cases the audit had not been completed at the date of the test examination.

The gross proceeds of the Motor Vehicle, etc., duties in 1934-35, including £6,067 19s. 1d., attributable to fines, amounted to £959,276 6s. 0d. A statement of the gross and net receipts of the Motor Tax Account, and of the payments thereout to the Exchequer, appears on page 13 of the Finance Accounts, 1934-35.

Four cases of deficiencies of revenue arising from misappropriations, etc., have been reported to the Department of Finance.

The total amount of the deficiencies, as certified by the Local Government Auditors, was £1,171 16s. 7d., of which £1,053 0s. 7d has been recovered. Application has been made to the Department of Finance for authority to write-off the balance, £118 16s. 0d.

VOTE 46.—PRIMARY EDUCATION.

Subhead A.1.—Training Colleges under Private Management.

24. Persons admitted to Training Colleges who do not complete their course of training or who, having completed their training, do not serve as National Teachers for the period of time stipulated in their agreements, are required to repay the cost of their training. Liability to repay also attaches to students of Preparatory Colleges (subhead A.3.) and to Pupil Teachers (subhead A.4.) where such students do not complete their courses and proceed to Training Colleges. I have been in communication with the Accounting Officer on certain cases in which liability appeared to have arisen but recovery had not been effected, and agreement has now been reached between the Department of Education and the Department of Finance on the procedure to be followed generally in this connection. I have asked for particulars of the cases which fall to be dealt with under this agreement.

A claim for refund of £75 was made against the guardian of a student who was dismissed from training in 1930. The guardian

has since died, and I have inquired whether any steps have been taken towards the recovery of the amount from the estate.

Subhead A.3.—Preparatory Colleges.

25. The boarding cost per head for the school year 1934-35 ranged from 6s. $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. per week to 7s. $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per week, showing increases in the majority of cases.

Accounts have been furnished showing the receipts and expenditure in connection with the farms and gardens for the school year 1934-35, an excess of expenditure over receipts being disclosed in each case.

The average fee paid by the students for the school year 1934-35 was £10 1s. 3d.

Nine students were admitted to the special Preliminary Course for Fior-Ghaeltacht students conducted during the academic year 1934-35, and the net expenditure on outfits, travelling expenses, and school fees in the financial years 1934-35 and 1935-36 was £619 7s. 10d. Seven of the students secured admission to Preparatory Colleges and one obtained a secondary scholarship.

Subhead C.1.—National Schools.

26. In my reports for the years 1932-33 and 1933-34 I referred to payments made to a teacher who had been convicted by the Tribunal established under Article 2A of the Constitution. The teacher in question was granted a free pardon by the Executive Council on the 11th December, 1934, and, accordingly, the disqualification imposed by section 31 of the Article is annulled as from that date. It appears that the payments made to the teacher in respect of the period of his disqualification can be regularised only by legislation and steps towards the preparation of a Bill to deal with the matter have been taken. The amount charged against the vote in respect of service given prior to the 11th December, 1934, is £320 3s. 0d.

At the meeting of the Committee of Public Accounts held on the 29th May, 1935, reference was made to the case of a teacher referred to in my report last year whose salary had been adjusted following interruption of service owing to political causes. The formal sanction of the Minister for Finance has not yet been furnished in this case.

In my report last year I stated that in view of the statistics of attendance at a certain school I had inquired why salary was continued to a junior assistant mistress whose retention was dependent upon the maintenance of an average attendance of thirty boys. Owing to the method by which effect was given to the Rules governing the retention of teachers in cases of insufficient average, overpayments amounting to £67 3s. 6d.

were made in this case and, as stated in the note appended to the appropriation account, it was decided, with Department of Finance sanction, not to press for recovery. Other unascertained overpayments will also have arisen from time to time in similar circumstances, but the Rules have now been amended to extend the period during which assistant teachers may be recognised notwithstanding the insufficiency of the average attendance.

I observed that a second assistant teacher was appointed to a school in January, 1935, the required average attendance (95) having been secured in each of the two preceding quarters. It appeared that pupils who had left the school were re-admitted in September, 1934, with the express purpose of raising the average to the required point, and as it would appear that their enrolment was not primarily for the purpose of their education, I consider that their attendances should not be reckoned for the purpose of the appointment of a teacher. I have, therefore, deemed it desirable to draw attention to the matter.

Overpayments amounting to £96 7s. 3d. were made to a principal teacher, in the period 1st January, 1931, to 30th June, 1933, owing to falsification of the school records. The amount overpaid has been recovered and the teacher has been declared ineligible for recognition in any capacity in a National School.

Overpayments amounting to £14 ls. ld. were made in the year 1924 consequent upon the falsification of school records by a principal teacher. The sums overpaid have now been recovered, and £50 was withheld from the salary payable to the teacher concerned.

Overpayments amounting to £134 5s. 11d. were made to a junior assistant mistress in the years 1932 and 1933 owing to the fact that, consequent upon the irregular transfer of pupils from a neighbouring school in the quarter ended 30th June, 1932, salary was continued for a period of one year beyond the period warranted by the regular averages. I understand that this case is still under consideration by the Department of Finance.

I observed that pupils were transferred from a certain school, at different dates between December, 1926, and February, 1928, to two other neighbouring schools, and it appeared that the attendances made by the pupils so transferred operated, in the case of one school, to retain a second assistant teacher, and, in the case of the other school, to secure payment of salary on the full scale to a junior assistant mistress. I have inquired whether the transfers in question were regular, having regard to the provisions of section 6 (4) of the School Attendance Act, 1926, and whether the attendances were proper to be included in the computation of the averages. Further transfers of pupils to one of these schools were made in 1933, apparently

with a view to maintaining the average necessary for the retention of a junior assistant mistress, and I have inquired as to the action taken in this connection, and the amount of any overpayments which may have resulted.

Subhead C.7.—Equipment Grants, etc.

27. The charge to this subhead includes sums of £153 16s. 6d. and £213 18s. 0d. for 32 sets and 47 sets, respectively, of indoor equipment for rural science classes, which were taken into stock in September and October, 1934. The revised programme of primary instruction which was issued in September, 1934, provides that this subject shall be optional in all schools, and I have inquired as to the basis on which sets of equipment are now issued.

Subhead D.—Superannuation, etc., of Teachers.

28. It was provided by the National School Teachers' Pension Fund (Winding-up) Order, 1934, Statutory Rules and Orders, 1934, No. 43, made under section 10 of the Ministers and Secretaries Act, 1924 (No. 16 of 1924) that the Pension Fund established under the National School Teachers (Ireland) Act, 1879, should be wound up as on and from the 1st April, 1934. The Order further provided that the Capital and Income of the Fund should be disposed of for the benefit of the Exchequer in such manner as the Minister for Finance might appoint, the securities held in the Fund to be disposed of for capital purposes. Payments in respect of pensions, and other sums, formerly chargeable on or payable out of the Fund are payable out of moneys provided by the Oireachtas from 1st April, 1934.

Paragraph 6 of the National School Teachers' Superannuation Scheme, 1934, Statutory Rules and Orders, 1934, No. 23, provides for the continuance of the provisions of the National School Teachers (Ireland) Act, 1879, in so far as these relate to the payment and collection of premiums due in respect of salary for service given before 1st April, 1934, and these premiums are repayable to the teacher, or his legal personal representative, in certain circumstances. The Department of Finance has decided that amounts coming in course of payment after 31st March, 1934, in respect of periods up to that date, should be paid less the appropriate pension deduction, which remains unissued from the Exchequer. A sum of approximately £30,000, being the equivalent of the total of the pension deductions made in the year ended 31st March, 1935, is accordingly included in the saving under subhead C.1.

Sums of £52,767 7s. 6d., being the interest on the securities mentioned in Part I of the Schedule to the Winding-up Order,

and £26,598, being the amount referred to at Part II of the Schedule, have, with the sanction of the Minister for Finance, been credited to appropriations in aid, and are available for surrender to the Exchequer together with the sum of £30,000 already referred to.

VOTE 48.—TECHNICAL INSTRUCTION.

29. The charge to subhead D. includes £18 Is. 11d., being a grant paid to an industrial concern in respect of the training of apprentices. It appeared that the grant represented a proportion of the wages paid to a forewoman in respect of the time devoted by her to the supervision of learners who formed part of the ordinary organization of the factory. I have asked that the covering sanction of the Department of Finance may be obtained for the payment.

VOTE 52.—AGRICULTURE.

Subhead M.5.—Improvement of the Creamery Industry.

30. Including the expenditure of £62,701 14s. 6d. in the current year, the total vote expenditure to date from moneys provided for the improvement of the creamery industry amounts to £1,007,419 2s. 3d. Receipts to 31st March, 1935, total £142,384 11s. 5d., and, as appears from Account No. XXVI of the Finance Accounts for the year, the Capital value of the assets held for the Exchequer on that date was £531,000. Provision of £112,000 was made from the vote for the year 1932-33 to cover trading losses incurred by the Dairy Disposal Co., Ltd., and amounts totalling £195,454 have been sanctioned by the Department of Finance for subsidies to cover losses incurred on the realization of creameries. I have asked for further information in order finally to reconcile the Exchequer asset with the net vote expenditure.

A sum of £300 was paid with the sanction of the Minister for Finance to a Bank as a contribution towards the balance due by the guarantors of a co-operative society which had gone into liquidation and whose premises had been purchased by the

Dairy Disposal Co., Ltd.

Subhead O.9.—Agricultural Produce (Cereals) Acts, 1933 and 1934.

31. Payments of bounty amounting in all to £103,950 17s. 11d. in respect of the second, third and fourth Sale (Wheat) Seasons accrued due and were paid during the year, the rates of bounty being:—

for the season ended 15th April, 1934—8s. 6d. per barrel.
,, ,, 31st July, 1934—8s. 5d. per barrel.
,, ,, 15th Dec., 1934—6s. 4d. per barrel.

The scheme of credit for seed wheat to which reference was

made in paragraph 37 of my last report was continued during the year, and the amount charged to the subhead in respect of advances to seed merchants was £10,334 5s. 11d.

Subhead O.10.—Agricultural Products (Regulation of Export) Act, 1933 (No. 26 of 1933).

32. The charge to this subhead includes payments, totalling £5,839 15s. 7d., made to bacon curers on foot of guarantees against loss arising from the cold storage of bacon during the winter months. The scheme provided for refunds of storage, freight, and re-handling charges, and for allowances in respect of shrinkage. The total quantity stored under guarantees was 25,000 cwts. approximately.

Subhead O.13.—Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep Act, 1934.

33. The charge to this subhead includes £173,480 18s. 5d., being expenditure incurred in respect of beef distributed to recipients of unemployment assistance and of outdoor relief or home assistance, in accordance with the provisions of the Act. It was not found practicable to make contracts under Part IX of the Act for the free supply of beef to recipients in any area and, accordingly, the country was divided into four "appointed" areas by Orders made by the Minister under section 45 of the Act. By the same Orders the price to be paid for beef supplied was fixed at fivepence per pound. I have asked for information on certain points arising out of my examination of the payments.

Section 46 (3) of the Act provides, inter alia, that every beef voucher shall state "the contractor or registered proprietor from whom and the place at which beef can be so obtained," but the vouchers were prepared in the form prescribed by the Beef Voucher Regulations, 1934, S.R.O. 1934, No. 351, which authorized the presentation of vouchers to any registered proprietor of victualling premises, and the names were entered by the victuallers themselves.

The amounts credited to appropriations in aid include £54,288 19s. 2d., being levies collected under the Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep (Registration and Levy) Regulations, 1934, S.R.O. 1934, No. 324, on cattle and sheep slaughtered in registered slaughtering premises, for human consumption in Saorstát Éireann. The total amount of levy payable for the period to 31st March, 1935, was £98,185 11s. 0d., of which amount £6,587 0s. 11d. was still outstanding at 31st December, 1935.

The charge to the subhead also includes £13,279 16s. 11d. in respect of cattle shipped to Belgium for sale, and receipts from sales amounting to £7,760 0s. 1d. are credited to appropriations

in aid. I understand that the gross cost of consignments shipped to 31st March, 1935, was £19,429 3s. 3d., and that the total

receipts will amount to £17,375 5s. 6d.

Expenditure amounting to £38,961 18s. 6d. was also incurred in respect of cattle shipped to Germany under a trade agreement with the German Government, and receipts from sales, amounting to £30,515 14s. 0d., are credited to appropriations in aid. I understand that the gross cost of the consignments shipped to 31st March, 1935, was £43,960 11s. 5d., and that the receipts will amount to £48,504 5s. 6d.

It is provided by section 39 of the Act that accounts in respect of every business carried on by the Minister for Agriculture, under Part VIII. of the Act, shall be kept in such form as shall be approved by the Minister for Finance, and shall be submitted for audit at the end of every accounting year for such business. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding the preparation of these accounts.

Expenditure amounting to £1,172 13s. 8d. was incurred in connection with an experiment in the use of Kerry cattle for meat-canning purposes. The cattle purchased under the Scheme were sold to a meat-canning firm for £801 10s. 10d. Statistical details relating to the experiment were supplied by the firm

during the various stages of production.

Newmarket Dairy Company, Ltd., Deposit Account.

34. Pursuant to the agreement reached with the German Government, referred to in the previous paragraph, arrangements were made by which the Department, acting as agent for the Newmarket Dairy Company, Ltd., exported eggs to Germany, and an account of receipts and payments in connection with the trading to 31st March, 1935, is appended to the appropriation account. The eggs were purchased from funds placed at the disposal of the Department by the Company, the Company being indemnified against loss. Any profit arising from the trading will be credited to the Exchequer.

Sixteen shipments were made in the period to 31st March, 1935, and, as appears from the account, the cash receipts and payments to that date were £58,995 14s. 10d. and £44,396 4s. 9d., respectively. I understand that the total cost of these shipments was £73,414 9s. 0d. and the amount realized on sale was £73,697

19s. 9d.

Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Act, 1932.

Butter Fund.

35. The account of the Butter Fund, furnished under section 44 of the Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Act, 1932, and which is appended to the appropriation account, has been examined with satisfactory results.

It will be seen that while the creamery butter account and the factory butter account disclose deficiencies of £1,370 4s. 9d. and £11,628 1s. 1d., respectively, the miscellaneous butter account shows a surplus of £14,626 8s. 4d., and that the excess of receipts over expenditure in the general account of the Fund is therefore £1,628 2s. 6d.

In paragraph 40 of my last report I mentioned that it had been found impracticable to collect levy, under section 14 of the Act, on farm butter acquired by non-registered butter traders, and that to avoid discrimination against registered factory owners, the rate of levy on non-creamery butter was reduced from 18s. 8d. to 3d. per cwt. on and from 1st September, 1933. It was subsequently found possible, however, to make the necessary administrative arrangements, and on and from 2nd July, 1934, levy on this class of butter was increased from the nominal rate of 3d. per cwt. to 18s. 8d. per cwt., and the rate of bounty was fixed at 32s. 8d. per cwt.

The temporary advances made to the Butter Fund from subhead 0.8. of the vote for Agriculture, amounting to £100,000, were repaid during the year.

VOTE 53.—FISHERIES.

Subheads G.3. and G.4.—Advances for Boats and Gear and for General Development.

36. Advances made to the Sea Fisheries Association between October, 1931, the date of the first advance, and 31st March, 1935, amount to £54,173 12s. 6d. Of this sum £54,000 was advanced for boats and gear, and the remainder for general development. The Department of Finance has approved of the arrangement whereby such advances should be deemed to be repayable, with interest at the rate of $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, over a period of 20 years from the dates of the advances, in equal half-yearly instalments. The Association is to remit to the Department of Agriculture the amounts collected each half year from the members in respect of hire purchase transactions, such remittances to be set against the half-yearly instalments due by the Association and brought to credit as appropriations in aid.

The first repayment was made by the Sea Fisheries Association in September, 1934, and represented the sums collected to 31st March, 1934. As stated in the explanatory note appended to the account, the amounts collected were re-issued to members by the Sea Fisheries Association and the charge to subhead G.3. includes an advance to enable the Association to make repayment to the Department.

At 31st March, 1935, the arrears of instalments due amounted to £3,344 12s. 4d. I noticed that the arrangements made do not appear to provide for charging interest on instalments of the annuities in arrear.

Fishery and Industrial Loans.

37. Under the Fisheries (Revision of Loans) Act, 1931, the Minister for Agriculture has, with the consent of the Minister for Finance, made conditional remissions, amounting in the aggregate to £5,341 18s. 1d., and has written off as irrecoverable amounts aggregating £217 19s. 1d. In addition, a sum of £3,693 10s. 6d. was written off in accordance with the terms of the supplementary estimate, leaving, at 31st March, 1935, £47,209 10s. 10d. as arrears of Fishery and Industrial Loans due but unpaid.

VOTE 54.—GAELTACHT SERVICES.

Subhead E.1.—Salaries, Wages and Allowances.

38. During the year of audit the Department decided to dispose of one of its Industrial Centres. I observed that notice terminating the services of the manageress was not given for some months after work at the centre had ceased. In view of the nature of the duties performed I am of opinion that payment of full remuneration to the manageress, after production had ceased, was not justified.

$Subhead \ F.3.--Kelp \ Development.$

39. In my last two reports I referred to the payment of rent for storage of kelp. The charge against the vote continued during the year, £132 13s. 11d. having been paid for storage in London and £687 9s. 9d. for storage in Galway. I am informed that the total stocks of kelp on hands at 31st March, 1935, were, approximately, 6,100 tons, but that contracts had since been completed for the disposal of the whole of these stocks.

I observed that a considerable sum is due by a kelp buyer in respect of kelp operated from the 1932 crop. The firm in question has, however, claimed on various grounds a large amount by way of set off. In reply to my inquiry as to the present position the Accounting Officer stated that negotiations with the firm were in progress.

Subhead F.5.—Purchase of Carrageen outside Saorstát Éireann.

40. As the supply of carrageen available to the Department was insufficient to enable it to meet its commitments, covering sanction was given by the Department of Finance for the purchase

of French carrageen, the cost to be charged to a special subhead. I observed from an examination of the vouchers that the substitution of French carrageen for Irish carrageen resulted in a loss to the Department of £62 2s. 9d.

Subhead J.1.—Housing Grants.

41. Under the Housing (Gaeltacht) Acts, 1929 and 1934, grants may be made for the erection of new, or the improvement of existing, dwelling houses, poultry houses and piggeries in the Gaeltacht. In addition, the Minister may certify for the issue of loans by the Commissioners of Public Works in amplification of grants made in accordance with the above Acts. Pursuant to section 2 of the Housing (Gaeltacht) (Amendment) Act, 1934, the aggregate amount of the grants and loans which may be made is not to exceed the sum of £650,000.

At the 31st March, 1935, the position regarding such grants and loans was as follows:—

Rural Industries.

42. Since the date of my last report the Minister for Finance has, pursuant to section 5 of the Exchequer and Audit Departments Act, 1921, approved of the form of accounts and balance sheet for Rural Industries. These accounts, the first of which will be in respect of the year ending 31st March, 1936, will, in due course, be submitted for audit and subsequently presented to the Oireachtas.

The Minister for Finance has likewise approved of a statement of account in respect of the loans issued in connection with the Department's industrial activities, and of trading accounts and balance sheets for the kelp and carrageen development schemes.

Industrial Loans.

43. I have been furnished with a statement concerning the Industrial Loans from which it appears that advances made during the year ended 31st March, 1935, amounted to £125 1s. 6d. Of this, £66 7s. 6d. relates to cash advances charged to subhead H., while £58 14s. 0d. represents the value of looms, machines, etc., issued on loan repayment terms.

In addition, looms valued at £861 10s. 1d. were issued to workers on hire purchase agreements. Exclusive of the amounts due on these hire purchase agreements the arrears due at 31st March, 1935, amounted to £9,513 6s. 6d. as compared with £9,277 19s. 4d. on 31st March, 1934.

VOTE 56.—LAND COMMISSION.

Repayable Exchequer Advance.

44. In previous reports I referred to an advance of £200,000 to the Land Commission made in March, 1925, of which only £70,000 had been repaid. The balance of £130,000 is still outstanding, no repayment having been effected in 1934-35.

Land Act, 1933.

Sales for Cash.

45. I observed in the course of my audit that the Land Commission, having sold for cash, to tenants, holdings on estates purchased by the (late) Congested Districts Board and, to allottees, parcels of untenanted land, principally bog plots, has accepted 45 or 50 per cent. of the nominal purchase money. The Land Act of 1933 provides for the reduction by 50 or 55 per cent., as the case may be, of annuities payable by purchasers in respect of advances and for corresponding reductions in the redemption price of such annuities. The Act does not appear to contemplate the reduction of the purchase consideration when the sale is effected for cash, but the sanction of the Department of Finance was, however, obtained.

Subhead I.—Improvement of Estates.

46. The powers conferred on the Land Commission by the Land Purchase Acts to expend moneys for the improvement of lands are restricted by sub-section 3 of section 22 of the Land Act, 1927, which provides that no such expenditure shall be incurred by way of free grant in respect of the improvement of lands which have been vested, save with the approval of the Minister for Finance. I observed, however, that a free grant for the purpose of rebuilding "an existing house on an old holding" had been given in a case where the holding in question had been vested, and in another case that the expenditure incurred in the erection of a bridge appeared to benefit, mainly, vested holdings. As the sanction of the Minister for Finance was not sought for these charges to the subhead, I have addressed an inquiry to the Accounting Officer on the matter.

Where improvement works are carried out by the Land Commission, the wages of the workers employed are paid by Paymasters who are remunerated by way of a commission on the amount disbursed, together with a percentage payment for travelling expenses. Having regard to the increasing expenditure on wages from this subhead, I have asked whether the question of revising the scale of remuneration and the percentage payment for travelling expenses has been considered.

The charge to this subhead includes a payment of £617 12s. 10d. to a County Board of Health, being a contribution of one-fifth of the cost of a sewerage scheme. Notwithstanding that the Land Commission is the landlord of the greater portion of the town where the scheme was carried out, I am of opinion that, in view of the nature of this expenditure and of the terms of section 22 (3) of the Land Act, 1927, the prior authority of the Department of Finance should have been obtained. accordingly, requested the Accounting Officer to seek covering sanction for this expenditure. I also observed a payment of £700 as a contribution towards the cost of a drainage scheme carried out by the Office of Public Works and a payment of £10 to an Association for the destruction of vermin. Having regard to the nature of these charges, I have asked that the covering sanction of the Department of Finance for these payments may be obtained.

Subhead Z.—Assistance to Migrants from the Gaeltacht.

47. The expenditure under this subhead was incurred in connection with the Improvement Scheme under which certain lands in Co. Meath, available for the relief of congestion, were reserved for allottees from the Gaeltacht. To assist the migrants, the first of whom did not arrive until April, 1935, a portion of each holding was sown with wheat, oats, potatoes and barley, and an initial supply of turf and provisions was provided.

In addition, expenditure was incurred from subhead I.— Improvement of Estates, etc., in providing the necessary roads, drains and water supply, the erection of dwelling houses and out-offices and for free grants for stock and implements, and from subhead I.3. of vote 52, Agriculture, for the services of an Assistant Agricultural Overseer who was appointed to give the migrants practical instruction in the development of their new holdings.

VOTE 57.—INDUSTRY AND COMMERCE.

Subhead L.—Peat Fuel Development.

48. The charge to subhead L.4. includes payments to the Irish Agricultural Organization Society amounting to £2,993 11s. 11d., and to the Turf Development Board, Ltd., amounting

to £7,933 10s. 8d. The balance of the expenditure related mainly to purchase of sacks, £11,817 0s. 10d., advertising, £705 16s. 6d., and to fees for the registration of Turf Co-operative Societies, £89.

With the approval of the Department of Finance the organization and supervision of Turf Co-operative Societies was entrusted to the Irish Agricultural Organization Society. Repayment was made to the Society in respect of vouched expenditure for salaries and travelling expenses of organizers, postage, telegrams, etc., with an addition of 10 per cent. for overhead charges. As from 1st April, 1935, the supervision, etc., of the Turf Societies was taken over by the Turf Development Board, Ltd.

The Turf Development Board, Ltd., was incorporated in July, 1934, to undertake, *inter alia*, the marketing and publicity work in connection with Peat Development. The arrangements approved by the Department of Finance provided that, subject to certain conditions, the Company would be wholly subsidised from State funds as regards its staff, office and other administrative expenses.

Imprests were issued to the Board by the Department during the period 1st August, 1934, to 31st March, 1935. After departmental examination of the Board's books and vouchers relating to that period a sum of £7,933 10s. 8d. was ascertained as the figure proper to be charged against subhead L.4. An audit of the vouchers referred to has also been carried out by my officers with satisfactory results. The balance of the imprests issued has been refunded to the Department by the Board.

Included in the expenditure allowed were certain payments for engineers' supplies and office furniture and equipment. I understand it is proposed to recover the cost of these items from the Board.

Certain technical equipment purchased from subhead L.3. at a cost of £191 11s. 6d. was placed at the disposal of the Turf Development Board, Ltd., with the condition that it will remain the property of the State until such payment as may be arranged has been made by the Company.

It was decided, with the approval of the Department of Finance, to place the stock of sacks on hands, purchased from the vote in 1933-34 and 1934-35, including sacks hired to distributors under the arrangement referred to in my last report, at the disposal of the Turf Development Board, Ltd., on the following conditions:—

that the sacks be now valued at £16,000, and while remaining the property of the Department of Industry and Commerce, be made available for use by the Board; that a levy of 1s. 2d. a ton on each ton of turf sold should be made by the Board with the object of recovering for the Exchequer the entire cost of the sacks within a period of about 3 years, and

that the Board should pay interest at the rate of 4 per cent.

per annum on outstanding amounts until the full charge
plus interest has been recovered.

The credit to subhead O.—appropriations in aid, includes £1,000 paid by the Turf Development Board in 1934-35 in respect of the sacks taken over.

Subhead M.—Industrial Research Council.

49. The expenditure charged to M.4.—Special Investigations, amounted to £587 7s. 9d. and related mainly to investigations undertaken by University Colleges in connection with clay deposits, peat waxes, seaweed, etc. The payments made were covered by Department of Finance sanction.

In connection with payments to University Colleges for plant and equipment the Department has been asked as to the steps taken to ensure that the ownership of such plant, etc., is vested

in the State.

Subhead N.—Production of Industrial Alcohol.

50. The amount provided under this subhead was £102,000 and was required to defray the cost of erection and equipment of five distilleries and one refinery, and for working capital and the cost of supervision and management. The amount expended to 31st March, 1935, was, however, £9,841 10s. 5d. only, owing, as stated in the note appended to the appropriation account, to the erection of the factories not having been started within the financial year, as the localities had not been decided on.

Under the Industrial Alcohol Act, 1934, the Department of Industry and Commerce entered into an agreement with a Dutch Company, with the approval of the Department of Finance, by which the Company supervises the establishment and equipment of the distilleries and rectifying plant, and the operation of the industry for a period of approximately 5 years. The agreement provides for payments to the Company for its services and also for royalties; for limits to the cost of production; for payment of liquidated damages by the Company in the event of these limits being exceeded, and for arbitration in the case of disputes.

The agreement also provided for the appointment of a Managing Director, on the nomination of the Company, by the Minister for Industry and Commerce. The salary of the Managing Director is paid directly from the vote.

Payments amounting to £7,845 11s. 3d. were made to the Company under the agreement during the year. The charge to subhead N. also includes payments in respect of salaries (including salary of Managing Director), travelling, telephones, postage, etc.

With regard to officers of the Department seconded for duty in the Managing Director's Office, the Department of Finance directed that the salaries and bonus of the officers concerned should be charged to subhead A. of the vote and recouped, plus a sum in respect of pension liability, from the subhead for Production of Industrial Alcohol. The amounts recouped are credited to appropriations in aid (salaries) and exchequer extra receipts (pension liability).

Subhead P.—Compensation for damages by "Leonardo Da Vinci" Aircraft.

51. The Department of Finance sanctioned payment of compensation, within a total maximum of £100, in respect of claims for property damaged or for the provision of materials or hospitality arising from the forced landing of this aeroplane in Co. Clare on 15th May, 1934. Claims amounting to £32 10s. 0d. were paid in the year under review.

Other expenditure connected with the forced landing is referred to in a note appended to the appropriation account of vote 65.—

Army.

Subhead Q.—Chicago World's Fair, 1933.

52. With the exception of expenditure amounting to \$40, the Department of Finance has given covering sanction for the payments included in the 1933-34 account and referred to in last year's report, which were either unvouched or related to items of an unusual character.

The Department of Finance also sanctioned the recoupment to the Department of External Affairs of certain other payments which were inadequately vouched or for which no vouchers were submitted, and under this authority a sum of £539 1s. 7d. has been charged in the present account to this special subhead. This figure represents the amount claimed by the Department of External Affairs less the \$40 referred to above.

Official Handbook of Saorstát Éireann.

53. Receipts in respect of sales and royalties during the year amounted to £14 5s. 8d. and £3 1s. 6d., respectively.

On the recommendation of the Stationery Office and with Department of Finance sanction all the copies of the Handbook remaining on hands (7,700 approximately) were sold for a sum of £150, and this sum was duly received and credited to exchequer extra receipts.

As the expenditure on the Handbook amounted to £3,517 12s. 5d. and the receipts in respect of advertisements, sales and royalties totalled £1,901 4s. 3d., the excess of expenditure over receipts at 31st March, 1935, was £1,616 8s. 2d.

Fees under the Mines and Minerals Act, 1931.

54. Sums amounting to £56 10s. 9d. due to the Department in respect of dead rent were waived under the authority of the Department of Finance.

VOTE 58.—RAILWAYS.

Payments and Receipts under Section 63 of the Railways Act, 1924.

55. The amount charged to subhead A. represents the final payment to the Great Southern Railways Company under section 63 (1) of the Railways Act, 1924. Included in the credits to subhead D.—appropriations in aid, are the final repayments, amounting to £19,898, by certain County Councils under section 63 (2), and also the final payment of £6,804 out of the Local Taxation Account under section 63 (7) of the same Act.

Subhead C.—Payments in respect of Steamer Services.

56. A draft agreement between the Minister for Industry and Commerce, the Minister for Agriculture and the Galway Bay Steamboat Co., Ltd., provided, *inter alia*, for the payment to the Company of a fixed subsidy at the rate of £300 per annum from 1st January, 1933, to 31st December, 1939, and from year to year thereafter, in consideration of the Company undertaking to maintain a regular steamer service between Galway and the Aran Islands. Included in the charge to this subhead are payments to the Company, with Department of Finance sanction, amounting to £600 in respect of the subsidy for the years 1933 and 1934. The draft agreement has not yet been completed.

Subhead CC.—Payment to the Londonderry and Lough Swilly Railway Company in respect of the Letterkenny and Burtonport, Buncrana and Carndonagh and Letterkenny Railways.

57. Provision of £2,000 was made in a supplementary estimate for a contribution to the above Company towards the loss on working the railways referred to during the year 1934. The amount paid, with Department of Finance sanction, was £1,717, being one-half of the net loss on the working of the undertaking during 1934, as ascertained by investigation of the Company's accounts and vouchers by the Department of Industry and Commerce.

The approval of the Department of Finance for making provision for the above contribution and also for a contribution not exceeding £1,500 towards expenditure on railway fixed charges, and on compensation to disemployed railway workers, in each of the years 1935, 1936 and 1937, was given on the understanding that the Government of Northern Ireland will make a grant of £5,000 to the Railway Company payable in three equal instalments in each of the three years referred to. Provision for the contribution of £1,500, referred to above, in respect of the year 1935, is made in the estimate for the vote for Transport Services for 1935-36.

Subhead CCC.—Losses.

- 58. Provision for the amount charged to this subhead representing, as stated in the note appended to the appropriation account,
 - (1) moieties and percentages payable by the Londonderry and Lough Swilly Railway Company in connection with the working of the Carndonagh, Burtonport and Letterkenny lines (£52,497 0s. 8d.), and
 - (2) advances made in respect of losses in working during the years 1924-1934 (£54,191)

was made in the supplementary estimate passed by Dáil Éireann on 7th March, 1935. The supplementary estimate also provided for the crediting of a corresponding amount to subhead D.—appropriations in aid.

Subhead D.—Appropriations in Aid.

59. Section 15 (1) of the Cork Tramways (Employees' Compensation) Act, 1933, provides for the repayment by the Electricity Supply Board and the Cork Corporation, by means of terminable annuities, of all moneys expended by the Minister for Industry and Commerce under the Act. As stated in my last report the total expenditure was £39,605 9s. 8d., and under the section referred to the Minister for Industry and Commerce, after consultation with the Minister for Finance, has fixed the amount of the annuities to be paid by each of the Bodies mentioned at £1,589 0s. 6d. The annuities are to be paid in each year from 1934 to 1953, and the receipt of £3,178 1s. 0d. in the present account relates to the sums due for 1934.

VOTE 61.—UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE AND UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE.

Subhead A.—Salaries, Wages, and Allowances.

60. A supplementary estimate was taken to provide for expenditure in connection with the issue, by Branch Managers and

officers in Employment Exchanges, of beef vouchers under the Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep Act, 1934. The extra remuneration paid to Branch Managers for this service, as approved by the Department of Finance, was at the rate of $\frac{3}{4}$ d. for each beef voucher issued.

Subhead J.—Unemployment Assistance.

61. This subhead, which appears for the first time, provides for payments to persons who are qualified to receive assistance under the Unemployment Assistance Act, 1933.

At the date of my report, my examination of these payments had not been completed, but so far as it had been carried out, the results were satisfactory.

Subhead K.—Appropriations in Aid.

62. Under section 25 of the Unemployment Assistance Act, 1933, a sum of £250,000 is to be transferred to the Minister for Industry and Commerce out of the Unemployment Fund in every financial year commencing after 31st March, 1934. This sum was duly transferred in the year under review and credited to appropriations in aid with Department of Finance approval.

It is provided by section 26 of the Unemployment Assistance Act, 1933, that in every financial year commencing after 31st March, 1934, County Borough and Urban Area Councils shall pay to the Minister for Industry and Commerce certain sums based on the rateable value at the beginning of the immediately preceding financial year of such County Boroughs or Urban Areas.

Certificates as to the rateable annual valuations, under the Valuation Acts, of the local bodies concerned, effective from 1st April, 1933, were received by the Department from the Commissioner of Valuation, but the payments received from the local authorities differed in all cases from those due on the basis of the valuations as certified by the Commissioner. I understand that legal advice is being sought on the points involved.

The amount received from the local bodies during the year was £151,005 4s. 6d. and this sum has been credited, with Department of Finance sanction, to appropriations in aid.

Unvouched Payments.

63. As stated in the notes appended to the appropriation account, the Department of Finance has authorized the charge of unvouched payments amounting to £2 17s. 4d. and £351 2s. 9d. to subheads C. and J. respectively. The payments represented poundage on postal orders, and Unemployment Assistance paid

at an Employment Exchange on 15th November, 1934, on which date all the records, with the exception of certain account books, were destroyed by fire.

I am satisfied that the amounts in question are properly chargeable against the vote.

VOTE 63.—POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS.

Losses by Default, etc.

64. The losses borne on the vote for the year ended 31st March, 1935, amounted to £830 2s. 10d., of which £714 7s. 10d. was charged to subhead H.2. and £115 15s. 0d. to subhead O.6. A classified schedule of the losses is appended to each of these subheads. Particulars are given also of ten cases in which cash shortages or misappropriations amounting in all to £2,020 19s. 7d. were discovered; the sums in question were made good and no charge to public funds was necessary.

In paragraph 38 of my report on the accounts for 1931-32 I referred to certain cases of misappropriation of public moneys in which evidence of fraud existed, but prosecution had been waived for various reasons. On the understanding that in future no departure will take place from the procedure generally approved, the Department of Finance has now given its covering sanction to the action taken by the Department of Posts and Telegraphs in the cases under notice.

Claims abandoned.

65. As shown in a note to the account claims amounting to £71 16s. 6d. in respect of damage to Post Office vehicles were abandoned during the year either as irrecoverable or as the result of compromise settlements with the Insurance Companies concerned. I have been informed that the question of negotiation of formal agreements with Insurance Companies under which claims would be settled on a mutual forbearance or halving basis is still under consideration.

Provision of Telegraphists for Railway Work.

66. In paragraph 36 of my report on the accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1930, I referred to the agreements with the railway company under which telegraphists were provided by the Department at certain stations. I have been informed that it has not yet been found possible to arrange a more equitable agreement with the company, but that negotiations are still in progress.

Superannuation Payments.

67. Sums paid in respect of the pensions of officers who were not included in the staffs transferred to the Irish Provisional Government under the terms of Article 7 (1) (b) of the Provisional Government (Transfer of Functions) Order, 1922, continue to be charged to a suspense account pending completion of the reciprocal arrangements contemplated by section 7 (2) of the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922. The total amount so charged up to 31st March, 1935, was £2,255 12s. ld.

In paragraph 37 of my report on the accounts for 1931-32 I referred to the case of a Clerical Officer who transferred from the British Service to the Saorstát Post Office and for whom no Civil Service Certificate was issued by the Saorstát Civil Service Commissioners. This officer has since been retired on the ground of ill-health and under authority of the Department of Finance a pension has been awarded to him. Payments under the award are charged to suspense pending the passing of the required legislation. The pension so charged amounted to £53 6s. 1d. at 31st March, 1935.

Stores.

68. A test examination of the store accounts was carried out with satisfactory results.

In paragraph 46 of my report on the accounts for 1932-33 I referred to the change in the method of financing expenditure in connection with the purchase of stores for other Government Departments. The new procedure outlined therein has been in operation throughout the year under review. Only the cost price of the articles supplied is repaid to the Department of Posts and Telegraphs, no charge being included to cover cost of inspection, warehousing, etc.

In addition to the engineering stores shown in Appendix II as valued at £105,923 on 31st March, 1935, engineering stores to the value of £948 were held on behalf of other Government Departments. Stores other than engineering stores held at that date were valued at £71,989, included in this amount being a sum of £28,304 in respect of such stores held for other Government Departments.

Revenue.

69. A test examination of the accounts of Postal, Telegraph and Telephone services was carried out with satisfactory results.

Some doubt has existed as to the position concerning rentals in respect of telephones installed in certain lighthouses. It has now been decided by the Minister for Finance that the incidence of the rentals should be determined on the basis of user of each installation: the rentals to be charged against the Commissioners of Irish Lights in certain cases, and against the Department of Industry and Commerce (Marine Service vote) in others.

Post Office Savings Bank Accounts.

70. The accounts of the Post Office Savings Bank for the year ended 31st December, 1934, were submitted to a test examination with satisfactory results. No charge has yet been included in the accounts to provide for the pensions of staff wholly employed on Savings Bank work.

Post Office Factory.

71. A test examination was applied to the accounts of the Post Office Factory with satisfactory results. The expenditure on manufacturing jobs, including work in progress on 31st March, 1935, amounted to £14,268; the expenditure on repair works (other than repairs to mechanical transport) amounted to £12,113; and the expenditure on mechanical transport repairs to £2,622.

I observed that certain manufacturing work was undertaken during the year to meet requirements of the Department of Defence, although Department of Finance authority had not been obtained to include the various items in the schedule of articles which the Factory is authorized to manufacture.

VOTE 64.—WIRELESS BROADCASTING.

72. In paragraph 67 of my last report I stated that the arrangements for the cataloguing, filing and custody of the stocks of music and gramophone records were still unsatisfactory. The cataloguing of the music has since been completed, but the work of classifying and registering the gramophone records has not yet been finished.

VOTE 65.—ARMY.

Subhead A.—Pay of Officers, Cadets, N.C.Os. and Men.

73. I referred in my report on the accounts for the year 1932-3 to the delay in applying the new rates of additional pay for soldier tradesmen incorporated in Defence Force regulation 36/1931. This regulation has not yet been put in force, but I understand that the whole question of additional pay has again been reviewed and that revised regulations will be put into operation at an early date.

Subhead B.—Marriage Allowance.

74. Under the terms of Defence Force regulation 15/1932 reduced rates of marriage allowance are payable in respect of soldiers whose re-engagement was approved subsequent to 2nd March, 1932. It appears that owing to lack of co-ordination between certain sections of the Department marriage allowance at the higher rates was issued in respect of a number of soldiers for various periods after the date on which this regulation became applicable to them. The total amount overpaid was £359 12s. 9d., of which £198 18s. 0d. was borne on the Army votes for the Arrangements have been made for years 1932-3 and 1933-4. the gradual recovery of this sum by fortnightly deductions from the marriage allowance payable in respect of the soldiers concerned, and a system of check has been instituted which is deemed to be an adequate safeguard against the recurrence of overpayments of this kind.

Subhead C.—Pay of civilians attached to Units.

75. Included in the expenditure charged to this subhead is the salary of a civilian instructor who was appointed as from 7th January, 1935, to give instruction in mechanical engineering in a school for boy mechanics at the headquarters of the Air Corps. As it appears that the school has not yet been established, and that boy mechanics have not so far been recruited for the Air Corps, I have communicated with the Accounting Officer regarding this charge.

Subheads—H.—Transport of Troops. I.—Conveyance of Stores, etc.

76. The charges paid to the Railway Companies in respect of the transport of troops and conveyance of stores have been the subject of comment by the Public Accounts Committee in its reports on the accounts of previous years. I understand that new arrangements have been come to with the Railway Companies under which more favourable terms have been granted to the Department. Though the agreements have not yet been finally completed the new rates were operative during the year under review, and are reflected in the expenditure charged to these subheads.

Subheads—J.—Mechanical Transport. L.—Petrol and Oils,

77. It is provided in Army regulations that the cost of transport of members of the Volunteer Force when reporting for initial training, re-entry into Army service, annual training, over-night camps, and test mobilizations shall be borne on public funds, and in the Army vote for the year under review a sum

of £150 is provided for this service under subhead Y.2.—Army I have noticed, however, that considerable charges have fallen on the above subheads in respect of the use of Army mechanical transport on this service, including the cost of sixteen lorries purchased specifically to meet the requirements of the Volunteer Force. No provision has been made for the transport of reservists under those subheads, and the employment of Army mechanical transport would appear to be contrary to Defence Force regulation 61/1929, which defines the duties and services on which its use is authorized.

Mileage allowance in respect of the use of their private motor cars is payable to certain officers whose duties entail frequent travelling within their areas. From the information available it appeared to me that some of the journeys, for which this allowance was paid, were not made on any of the duties assigned to those officers under the relevant regulation.

Subhead K.—Provisions and Allowances in lieu.

78. Cost statements have been furnished to me showing the cost of production of bread at the Curragh Bakery, and of meat at the Dublin and Curragh abattoirs. The unit costs show a slight change from those of the previous year, and are as follows :-

Subhead O.—General Stores.

79. In the course of my audit of the accounts of the technical stores and equipment on charge to the Air Corps, I noted that various matters pertaining to the disposal of stores were brought to a conclusion without due regard to the necessity for obtaining approval before final action was taken. They include the withdrawal from service of airframes and engines which were becoming obsolete, the condemnation of new and unused stocks as surplus to requirements, the conversion of engines to provide spare parts, and the replacement of otherwise serviceable stocks by newer material. Stock-taking has not been carried out for a considerable time, though complete stock-taking within definitely prescribed periods would seem to be necessary to the efficiency of the accounting system. It seems also that considerable delay has occurred in bringing to notice losses resulting from damage to and destruction of aircraft. Due partly to the absence of

regulations laying down the procedure to be followed in dealing with matters of this kind, adequate financial control does not appear to have been exercised. I am informed in reply to my inquiries that suitable regulations are now being prepared, and that a complete stock-taking of all stores on charge to the Air Corps has been undertaken. The results of this stock-taking are not yet available.

Subhead P.—Warlike Stores.

80. Under the terms of an agreement for the purchase of two tanks, sums amounting to £6,952 6s. 8d., being two-thirds of the purchase price, were paid in May, 1934, and were charged to this subhead. It was stipulated that the tanks should be delivered not later than 1st February, 1935, but this clause of the agreement was not observed. I am informed, however, that one of the tanks was delivered in November, 1935, and it is hoped that the other will be delivered in May, 1936. In view of the time which has elapsed since the payments referred to were made I have deemed it desirable to draw attention to this transaction.

Subhead X.—Incidental Expenses.

81. In the course of my audit I noticed that officers in charge of areas, who are issued with imprests, provide the Secretaries of Sluagh Committees with funds out of those imprests to defray incidental expenses, and these expenses are included in the charge to this subhead. It appears from the form of certificate furnished to support the charges that some of them are not admissible in so far as they were not incurred in the conduct of recruiting and enlistment in accordance with the relevant regulation. It seems also that the authority of the Department of Finance was not obtained for the issue of imprests out of public moneys to the Secretaries of Committees.

Consequent on the passing of the Damage to Property (Amendment) Act, 1933, the Department of Defence undertook the settlement of claims in respect of loss or damage attributed to the "official" action of Free State forces. *Ex-gratia* payments amounting to £1,439 were made in a number of such cases, and are included in the expenditure accounted for under this

subhead.

Subhead Y.2.—Army Reserve.

82. In connection with the organization of the Volunteer Force arrangements were made with civilian medical practitioners for the medical examination of recruits. This service does not appear to have been specifically provided for, but the fees paid during the year, amounting to £1,144 ls. 0d., have been charged to this subhead with the sanction of the Department of Finance.

Subhead Z.—Appropriations in Aid.

83. In the course of audit of the receipts brought to credit of this subhead, I noticed that a military display was organized in connection with a Publicity Association's Gala week, and included among other items displays by the Army gymnastic team, and performances by an Army band. Some military stores were also lent for the occasion. As there seemed to be no authority for the support rendered to the Association in this instance, I have requested that the matter be referred to the Department of Finance for its covering sanction.

Stores.

84. The system of control of and accounting for Barrack Services stores in the Curragh area was the subject of discussion before the Public Accounts Committee when the accounts for the year 1929-30 were being considered. It appears that the unified account system then introduced did not work as satisfactorily as was expected, and the system was reverted to whereby the Curragh is divided into a number of areas, each in charge of a barrack accountant, who is responsible for the safe custody of all stores in his area. The prior sanction of the Department of Finance was not obtained for this change, but I understand that its approval has now been sought.

I had occasion to refer in previous reports to the fact that complete stock-taking is not regularly carried out at some of the large central stores. This work has not been done for a considerable time in some cases, and appropriate certificates to the effect that issues have been made in accordance with regulations and that the book records of stocks have been verified have not been furnished by the officers responsible for the safe custody of these stores. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer on this subject.

Statement of Losses.

85. Losses written off during the year are detailed in a statement appended to the account. The total is made up of:

The latter figure includes £1,093 0s. 8d., in respect of damage caused by fires, £1,571 1s. 9d. in respect of damage to aeroplanes, and £370 12s. 4d. in respect of rents of certain lands at the Curragh which it was found impossible to recover and which were the subject of comment in previous reports.

VOTE 66.—ARMY PENSIONS.

86. The investigation of applications for pensions under the Army Pensions Acts, 1923 to 1932, was continued during the year under review by the Military Service Registration Board and the Army Pensions Board, and awards were made in about 240 cases.

Gratuities amounting to £750 were paid under the Army Pensions Act, 1932, to a number of persons who in the opinion of the law officers did not come within the provisions of that Act, and I have inquired whether it is proposed to write off the amount involved.

Persons whose applications were refused under the Act of 1923 were debarred from again applying under the Act of 1932 by section 14 of the latter Act. It appears, however, that the departmental procedure for dealing with "refusals" under the Act of 1923 was defective, as the law officers have expressed the opinion in a particular case that a refusal was not duly arrived at under this procedure, and, consequently, the applicant concerned was not debarred by section 14 of the Act of 1932 from again applying. In view of this opinion I have inquired of the Accounting Officer whether he is satisfied that the procedure followed in dealing with "refusals" under the Acts of 1927 and 1932 conforms to the requirements of those Acts.

The Military Service Pensions Act, 1934, which amended and extended the Military Service Pensions Acts, 1924 to 1930, came into operation during the year. Under the terms of this Act a Referee was appointed with an Advisory Committee of four members to investigate all applications for the grant of Military Service certificates, and to report to the Minister in the prescribed form on all such applications. The grant of service certificates is based on those reports, and the pensions payable are calculated on the service and rank of the applicants as certified therein. During the year of account payment of pension was made in twelve cases only.

VOTE 67.—EXTERNAL AFFAIRS.

Exchequer Extra Receipts—Fees for Passports, Visas and Consular Services.

87. Certain fees collected by the Department are not covered by the Commissioners for Oaths (Diplomatic and Consular) Fees Regulations, 1934, made under section 3 (1) of the Commissioners for Oaths (Diplomatic and Consular) Act, 1931. I am informed that it is intended to introduce legislation to regularize the collection of the fees referred to.

I am in communication with the Accounting Officer concerning certain other matters relating to these receipts which came under notice in the course of audit.

88. The departmental arrangements for the control of expenditure on export bounties and subsidies in 1933-34 continued in the year under review. The Departments reponsible for the various headings of expenditure were:

The rates of subsidy paid on exports to places outside Great Britain and Northern Ireland were generally lower than those payable on creamery butter exported to the United Kingdom.

During the latter half of the financial year an official scheme for the purchase of butter and its sale on the home, British, and continental markets was operated by the Dairy Disposal Company. As in the previous year, the Company was indemnified

against loss.

The butter purchased amounted to 32,168 cwts., at a cost of £221,569 10s. 1d. $26,726\frac{3}{4}$ cwts., costing £184,545 5s. 1d., were exported to Belgium, Germany, and the United Kingdom, and the balance of 5,441\frac{1}{4} cwts. was sold on the home market. subsidy paid on the quantity exported represented the sum necessary, with the bounty paid from the Butter Fund and the Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund (£63,921 15s. 5d.), to bring the net receipts (£96,212 2s. 5d.) up to the purchase price. The amount was £24,411 7s. 3d., of which £18,879 10s. 0d., is charged in this account.

The amount due to the Company after payment of bounty and subsidy is £1,805 6s. 11d., and relates mainly to Bank Interest on Overdraft (£1,731 0s. 9d.), Commission on Sales (£730 9s. 1d.), and Bad Debts (£77), less profit on Home Sales (£770 17s. 10d.).

Subsidy at the maximum approved rate of 27s. per cwt. was paid on non-creamery butter exported to the United Kingdom during the year. On other exports the rate in force was 14s. 6d. per cwt.

The rates of subsidy on other milk products were fixed in such a manner that the receipts to the producers of these commodities were approximately equivalent, on a milk basis, to the receipts that would have been obtained if the milk had been utilized for the production of creamery butter.

Trial Consignments, etc.

96. The expenditure under this heading includes £16,320 2s. 8d., being the total charges relating to 12 consignments of eggs to Spain during the year; £292 10s. 0d. paid to exporters of cattle to Morocco and representing (a) contributions towards the freight charges incurred and (b) an ex-gratia grant of 5s. per head in compensation for the reduction of the rate of bounty from 35s. to 30s. per head on 1st April, 1934; and £28 3s. 5d. in discharge of outstanding liabilities in connection with consignments forwarded in 1933-34.

Of the receipts, £2,663 17s. 5d. relates to consignments forwarded in 1933-34 and £16,373 14s. 10d. to receipts in respect of the consignments of eggs to Spain in the year under review. The sum of £16,373 14s. 10d., with the addition of a further amount of £1 14s. 10d., received and brought to account in the year 1935-36, represents the total receipts on foot of the consignments of eggs referred to.

In my report last year I referred to certain cases in which claims under policies of insurance against loss or damage to consignments in transit remained outstanding. One case was settled on the Insurance Company concerned paying an additional £50. This amount has been received and is brought to account in the year 1935-36. I am informed that it is hoped to reach a settlement at an early date in the remaining outstanding case.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—The saving is due mainly to (a) the fact that the provision (£16,200) for increased staff in connection with the Unemployment Assistance Act was not utilized, (b) a saving of approximately £3,500 in the cost of living Bonus and (c) posts unfilled for the whole or part of the year, and vacancies through deaths, resignations, dismissals, etc.
- B.—The provision (£3,500) to meet the anticipated additional travelling arising out of the Unemployment Assistance Act was not utilized. The balance of the saving is due to a reduction in the amount of travelling.
- C.—In anticipation of a re-scheming of Stations the number of removals was less than normal.
- D.—Stamp sales at the Stock Exchange were less than anticipated.
- E.—The saving is due to a decrease in the amount paid to Banks, Stockbrokers, etc., for work performed under Section 6 of the Finance Act, 1924.
- F.—The expenditure on carriage of stores, etc., was less than anticipated.
- G.—The issue of the Gaelic Athletic Association Jubilee Year Stamp necessitated an expenditure of approximately £147, for which provision had not been made. Sanction for this expenditure was given by Department of Finance letter S. 41/2/34, dated 14th May, 1934.
- H .- A casual variation.
- I.—Uniform clothing was supplied to eight new entrants in excess of the number provided for in the Estimate.
- J.—The excess is due to unforeseen expenditure on the purchase of two carrier-tricycles and to increased boat hireage.
- JJ.—Provision was made in the Estimate for the purchase of motor-cycles for frontier patrol purposes. It was, however, subsequently decided that motor cars should be purchased instead. (Department of Finance letters S. 47/4/33, dated 19th and 26th September, 1934).

- K.—The saving arose through the cost of repairs to Revenue instruments being less than anticipated.
- L .- The excess is due to heavy expenditure on legal costs.
- M.—Approximately £31 of the excess is due to unforeseen expenditure in the vacuum cleaning of rooms and removal of files consequent on the reorganization of Headquarters Offices. A payment of £9 2s. ld. was made to an Officer of Customs and Excise in respect of medical and other expenses arising from an accident while on duty. (Department of Finance letter E. 3/11/34, dated 7th September, 1934).
- N.—The saving is mainly due to the fact that the emergency provision made for additional offices in connection with the Unemployment Assistance Act was not utilized.
- O .- Statement of losses charged to the Subhead :-
 - £5 10s. 6d.—The amount required to meet a deficiency in the accounts of a former Collector of Income Tax. (Department of Finance letter S. 47/5/32, dated 11th May, 1932); £3 8s. 7d.—Income Tax not brought to account by a former Collector of Income Tax. (Department of Finance letter S. 47/5/29, dated 15th October, 1934). It was not possible in either case to recover the amount involved from the responsible party. The remaining 14s. 3d. comprised minor cash discrepancies not involving fraud or culpable negligence. (Department of Finance letter S. 47/7/34, dated 30th June, 1934).

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—The saving of 1·45 per cent, under this Subhead accrued through the average number of pensioners being slightly less during the year than had originally been anticipated when framing the Estimate.
- B.—The expenditure under this Subhead includes an amount of £81 ls. 8d. by way of ex-gratia payment in respect of a disputed clerkship. (Department of Finance letter S. 88/4/32, dated 15th December, 1934). Expenses in connection with the hire, etc., of rooms for meetings of Committees were less than anticipated.

- D.—To this Subhead are charged payments made in error, or owing to the fact that notice of revocation or reduction of pension by a Pension Committee or the Central Pension Authority did not reach the Pension Officer in time to permit the stoppage of payment. In some cases the extreme poverty of the recipients rendered recovery impracticable; in others there was satisfactory evidence that the orders had been cashed in good faith. Where the payments were due to errors on the part of a public servant suitable disciplinary notice was taken of the occurrence, and in all cases the authority of the Department of Finance was obtained before the amounts were written off as irrecoverable (Department of Finance letters S. 88/2/30, dated 15th November, 1934, 25th April, 1935, and 30th August, 1935).
- E.—Payments made under the authority of the Department of Finance in cases where the provisions of Section 5 (b) of the Old Age Pensions Act, 1911, precluded statutory payment (Department of Finance letters S. 88/2/30, dated 15th November, 1934, 31st December, 1934, 25th April, 1935, and 30th August, 1935).
- C.—The realizations under this Subhead depend upon the actual amounts recovered in cash during the year under Section 9 (2) of the Old Age Pensions Act, 1908. Receipts fluctuate considerably from year to year.

A sum of £39 4s. 0d. received as conscience money by the Department of Finance and lodged by that Department to the Exchequer as Miscellaneous Revenue was subsequently found to be proper to the Old Age Pensions Vote, but was not then available for transfer. (Department of Finance letter F. 95/1/35, dated 7th October, 1935).

The sum of £184 7s. 2d. was charged to Subhead C. during the year in part restoration of the damage done by fire at Knockaclarig National School, County Cork. The total cost of restoration is £831 4s. 8d.

Expenditure on part restoration was incurred within the year in the Land Commission, £26 11s. 7d., and in the Department of Agriculture, £41 13s. 7d. Subhead C.

On the surrender of the lease of the Gárda Síochána Barracks at Manor Street, Dublin, a sum of £65 was paid in respect of dilapidations. Subhead C. (Department of Finance letter S. 14/23/27 of 24th October, 1934).

Following the dismantling of buildings taken over at Rocky Island, Cork, salvaged materials of an estimated value of £170 were appropriated for works of general maintenance. Subhead C.

A sum of £1 was paid to the owner of an animal which was drowned during the progress of restoration works at Portacloy Bridge. Subhead C. (Department of Finance letter S. 102/5/32 of 22nd May, 1934).

In respect of a genuine error in his original tender for the supply of presses, a contractor received an ex gratia payment of £22 10s. 0d., one-half of which was borne on the Vote for the Army (No. 65). Subhead D. (Department of Finance letter S. 102/18/34 of 31st October, 1934).

A sum of £120, of which £73 6s. 8d. was borne on the Vote for the Army (No. 65), was paid to a contractor in settlement of claims for supplies in the years 1922-1924, in respect of which he was unable to produce complete vouchers. Subhead D. (Department of Finance letter S. 102/12/34 of 23rd August, 1934).

To provide more suitable accommodation for the Ardara Lace Class, a contract was made for a new tenancy in alternative premises. The alternative premises were not, however, used for the intended purpose in consequence of a later decision to close down the Class. A sum of £24 was paid to the landlord of the alternative premises in discharge of his claims. Subhead E. (Department of Finance letters S. 2/31/34 of 26th September, and 28th November, 1934).

Coal and firewood to the value of £71, surplus to the requirements of the Department of Defence at Castlebar were taken over from that Department. Subhead F. See Vote for the Army, No. 65.

With the authority of the Minister for Finance pursuant to Section 21 (2) of the Bourn-Vincent Memorial Park Act, 1932, a Chinese Lacquer Screen, valued at £1,000, was transferred to the National Museum (Department of Finance letter S. 43/6/32 of 11th April, 1934).

Sums amounting to £148 13s, 3d, were paid during the year in respect of Employees' Contributions for National Health Insurance and Unemployment Insurance in respect of thirty employees who had not previously been regarded as so insurable.

Subhead L.—In eight cases of lettings of surplus properties arrears of rent amounting to £206 2s. 6d. were written off as irrecoverable, and a claim for 7s. 9d. against a former tenant in respect of an advance to pay an Insurance premium was waived (Department of Finance letters S. 22/15/35 of 19th March, 1935, and S. 102/2/31 of 26th October, 1935).

During the year the Irish Tourist Association was provided with accommodation free of rent in the offices of the High Commissioner, London (Department of Finance letter S. 2/9/31 of 20th February, 1935).

On the resumption of possession of premises at Clonmel Military Barracks, which had been let on lease, a claim of £44 for accrued rent was waived (Department of Finance letter S. 55/27/30 of 10th May, 1935). See also Subhead EE.2.

An original tenderer for grazing at the Royal Hospital, Kilmainham, having failed to complete his contract, the grazing was subsequently let to another tenderer at £1 less. A claim against the original tenderer for this sum was abandoned (Department of Finance letter S. 55/7/34 of 26th June, 1935).

A site bought at Keshcarrigan, County Leitrim, in the year 1930-31 for £50 was sold during the year for £17 (Department of Finance letter S. 14/81/26 of 24th June, 1932).

A hut at Scartaglin, Co. Kerry, no longer required for the Gárda Síochána, was sold with the site for £131 (Department of Finance letter S. 14/58/25 of 11th October, 1934).

During the year a sum of £20 was recovered on an insurance policy in respect of damage done by fire at Kilmacud Training School of Domestic Economy in October, 1932. A similar sum was subsequently recovered on a Malicious Injury Claim on foot of the damage in question, and paid over to the Insurance Company.

A Court Messenger in Limerick was prosecuted for retaining sums collected by him on foot of decrees, amounting to £14 0s. 10d. The amount was made good and the defaulter dismissed.

A Court Messenger in Galway irregularly collected £1 10s. 0d., which he expended on motor hire. He subsequently refunded the amount and was dismissed, but was not prosecuted.

A Court Messenger in Galway was prosecuted for embezzlement of £162 8s. 11d. Subsequent investigation revealed that the exact amount embezzled was £157 2s. 0d. It was not possible to complete the investigation within the financial year, and the authority of the Minister for Finance has been requested to open a losses subhead in the Appropriation Account for 1935-36. The defaulter was dismissed.

A Court Messenger in Wexford was prosecuted for embezzlement of £18 12s. 2d. Subsequent investigation revealed that the total defalcations amounted to £110 5s. 10d., of which £40 2s. 2d. has been recovered. Sentence has been deferred to give the defaulter (who has been dismissed) the opportunity of paying the balance.

Another Court Messenger in Wexford was charged with the embezzlement of £7 10s. 0d. This amount was repaid and the defaulter dismissed.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—The saving is due to vacancies being filled by officers on lower salaries than those held by the officers replaced, to delay in filling the vacancies, and to the rate of Bonus payable being less than that estimated for.
- B.—The saving is partly due to the interruption of inspection by the secondment of the Inspector as Commissioner in place of Laoighis County Council, and partly due to the fact that for nearly $2\frac{1}{2}$ months there were no subsistence or travelling expenses paid while the inspection of the Dublin Districts was in progress. - A.—The saving was effected in allowances paid to Trade Scholars in the School Session 1934-35, when, instead of the ordinary Courses, a special arrangement was made for a Trade Scholarship Course for apprentices from the factories of Cómhlucht Siúicre Éireann, Teo., under which the Company paid allowances and travelling expenses to these apprentices which for an ordinary course would have been paid by the Department.

Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer ... 16,000 29,231 14 10 EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

A.—Saving mainly due to vacancies and changes in staff and to lower cost of living Bonus than that provided for in the Estimates.

B.—Additional travelling expenses incurred in connection with the Spring inspections of fat cattle for export licences were responsible for the excess on this provision.

C.—The development of the Department's work during the year necessitated additional outlay on the carriage of parcels, office incidentals and papers and periodicals.

D.—Various new schemes came into operation during the year causing increased expenditure on telegrams and local and trunk telephone calls. Unforeseen expenditure on telegrams in connection with the 1933-34 scheme of loans for the purchase of heifers added considerably to the outlay. New telephone installations had to be provided in the branch offices acquired for the extra staff employed on new schemes.

- E.1.—The incidental expenditure of the Seed Propagation Division exceeded the estimate as it was found necessary to incur more expenditure on the cultivation and distribution of pedigree seed oats than was contemplated when the estimate was framed.
- E.2—A suitable Veterinary Surgeon was not available during the year for work in connection with the Poultry Diseases Act, 1934.
- E.4.—The Tobacco and Sugar Beet Expert travelled more than usual this year owing to the establishment of three new Sugar Beet Factories and to the coming into operation of the Tobacco Act, 1934.
- F.1.—Fewer animals were purchased than expected and expenditure on feeding stuffs, etc., was lower than estimated.
- F.2.—The principal savings accrued on capitation grants, owing to the full number of students' places not being filled throughout the year; on teachers' salaries, owing to vacancies; and on the provision for equipment, because less was required than expected.
- F.3.—The sums provided for pharmacy, clinique and miscellaneous were exceeded owing to increases in the number of animals under treatment and in the number of blood samples received for testing. The excess expenditure was modified by savings on other items of the Subhead.
- F.5.—The grants paid were based on actual expenditure, which was not as great as estimated.
- F.7.—Provision in respect of investigations into virus diseases of the potato was made for only one quarter of the year. Department of Finance authorised an additional grant of £250 for this purpose in respect of the remainder of the year. The balance of the excess on this Subhead was due to certain payments in respect of salary for 1933-34 being recouped during this year. (Department of Finance minutes S. 90/1/34, dated 23rd June, 1934, and S. 60/22/35, dated 27th April, 1935).
- G.2.—A saving of £1,038 on Salaries, Wages and Allowances and on travelling expenses was mainly due to vacancies and changes in the staff of Inspectors. It was not found necessary to utilise the full provision for the purchase of Dairy Bulls (Saving £567).
- G.3.—The principal savings were due to the difficulty of making a contemplated purchase of a high-class shorthorn bull, to a shortage of colts suitable for purchase and resale, and to the provision for free nominations of mares not being fully availed of by farmers. The savings on the Subhead were modified by additional expenditure under the heading of loss on the purchase and resale of stallions.
- H.—The full provision available for lime subsidy grants was not earned. (Saving £2,271).

 Casual savings on the normal grants to Committees of Agriculture amounted to £377.
- I.—Vacancies on the staff of Overseers and lower cost of living Bonus account for a saving of £1,210 on Salaries, Wages, etc., and on travelling expenses. The reduced demand for bulls caused a saving of £1,729. Savings also arose out of a vacancy at a Veterinary Dispensary, the failure of farmers to avail of the full number of premiums available for bulls, the moderate demand for fencing facilities, and the inability of some poultry station holders to earn full premiums. Expenditure on the purchase of seeds, etc., for demonstration plots was £524 more than expected.
- I.I.—The cost of the bulls located in this area did not absorb the full amount available.
- I.3.—Saving due to scheme coming into operation later than expected.
- K.1.—A trophy value £200 was purchased with the approval of Department of Finance for presentation to the Royal Dublin Society for competition at the International Jumping Championship Contests (Department of Finance minutes S. 90/24/34, dated 7th May, 1934, and S. 16/42/35, dated 21st November, 1935).

- K.2.—The final instalment of this grant for the year 1934-35 did not come in course of payment during the year.
- K.3.—The £800 provided was a maximum grant.
- L.—The grant of increased rates of overtime and Sunday duty pay to the workers at the Gardens caused excess expenditure. Savings on other items of the Subhead modified the excess.
- M.1.—The full amount of advertising and publicity estimated for was not required. A post of Superintendent Poultry Instructress was not filled and her salary and travelling expenses were saved. Small savings accrued on a number of the displays of Saorstát Agricultural products in Great Britain.
- M.2.—The non-receipt of reports in a few cases and the withholding of payment for a few others received late account for the saving.
- M.3.—Some accounts for expenditure incurred in connection with the printing of the *Journal* did not come in course of payment during the year.
- M.4.—Fewer loans were advanced under the schemes of loans than was anticipated.

A loan of £80 was advanced with the approval of Department of Finance from this Subhead for the erection of a glasshouse for growing tomatoes to a borrower in the Gaeltacht who resided outside the congested districts. The other loans advanced under this scheme were made from the provision for such loans under Subhead I.

M.5.—The erection of creameries progressed less rapidly than anticipated. Arrangements for the purchase of a creamery for which provision was made could not be completed during the year.

The amount charged against Subheads other than Subhead M.5. during

the year in respect of the Salaries and cost of living Bonus of staff on loan to

the Dairy Disposal Company, Ltd., was £2,411 18s. 7d.

- M.6.—The estimate was framed to cover only the cost of completing the 1933-34 season's sales of heifers. A further series of sales was arranged with the approval of Department of Finance for 1934-35 season. (Department of Finance minutes E. 61/10/32 of 23rd February, 1935, and S. 60/41/35, dated 21st November, 1935).
- M.7.—It was not necessary to purchase oats from the guaranteed merchants under this scheme.
- M.10.—The provision was based on an estimated gross tonnage of 8,500 tons of sugar beet but the actual produce was 8,166 tons gross.
- N.1.—Savings were mainly due to the lighter incidence of swine fever, and to the fact that it was unnecessary to employ temporary assistance for inspection of shipments of live stock to the extent anticipated.
- N.3.—Extra inspections necessitated by the Horse Breeding Act, 1934, were responsible for the excess expenditure.
- N.4.—The Temporary Live Stock Inspectors and Assistants completed their work in less time than was expected. No new tattooing instruments were needed. The Consultative Council held only one meeting. The fees and travelling expenses of Referees were lower than anticipated, as appeals were received from a smaller number of areas and involved less travelling.

An ex-gratia grant of £10 was paid to the owner of a bull by way of compensation in respect of loss sustained by him because of its rejection in error as

unsuitable.

O.1.—Extra expenditure was incurred on additional Temporary Assistance, but this was offset by savings on other items. Travelling expenses were saved owing to the Inspectors being concentrated at the ports, and casual labour at the ports cost less as a result of earlier deliveries being made by shippers. Free accommodation was obtained for egg-packing classes. A reduction in the number of cases of eggs forfeited caused a saving on freight, etc. Special experiments were restricted owing to pressure of other work,

- O.2.—The saving was principally due to vacancies in the Inspection staff during part of the year.
- O.3.—The excess expenditure was due to the grant of increased motor vehicle allowances to some of the Inspectors and to increased demands for inspection of larger areas of crops grown from certified seed. The excess was modified by savings of £216 on other items of the Subhead.
- O.5.—Excess due to the increased expenditure on travelling incurred by the Inspector in connection with prosecutions.
- O.7.—A vacancy for a whole-time Veterinary Examiner on the Department's staff was not filled. The non-appointment by a local authority of a Veterinary Inspector for whom provision had been made, and the operation of the Local Services (Temporary Economies) Act, 1934, contributed to the saving. The Temporary Marketing Inspectors travelled less than was expected. Inspectors did not need renewals of overall coats, etc., to the extent anticipated.
- O.8.—It was not necessary for the Consultative Council to meet as often as anticipated.
- O.9.—The rate of bounty payable on home-grown millable wheat in respect of the wheat (Sale) Season ended 15th December, 1934, was lower than expected. Owing to irregularities in Sale Certificates in some cases, bounty did not come in course of payment during the year. The provision for advances to Seed Merchants was as near to actual requirements as could be estimated.
- O.10.—The guarantee to Bacon Curers against loss in respect of the cold storage of bacon cost £11,660 less than the estimate. The quantity of bacon actually cold stored and the average loss incurred by Bacon Curers were less than anticipated. The Consultative Councils held fewer meetings than had been provided for.
- O.11.—The campaign of extermination succeeded in a shorter time than was expected, and it was found possible early in the year to reduce the scale of operations.
- O.12.—Claims for grants did not come in as rapidly as was expected, and the amount actually paid out during the year was lew, possibly because the planting season is so close to the end of the financial year and the local bodies could not send in their accounts in the time available.
- O.13.—The appointment of Inspectors under the Act could not be arranged as early as was anticipated. The provision for a loan towards the cost of erecting a meat meal factory could not be utilised in 1934-35 and was re-voted in 1935-36. The scheme for the elimination of old and uneconomic cows did not come into operation until 1935-36. Factory expenses were limited to the cost of an experiment in meat canning. It was difficult to forecast the actual expenditure on the purchase of beef for distribution to recipients of unemployment assistance, etc. Expenditure on the purchase of cattle for export was £7,231 more than the provision for that purpose, but there was a corresponding increase in the Appropriations in Aid.
- O.14.—The travelling expenses of the valuer were less than expected.

The receipts from sales of pure line seeds, etc. (Subhead E.1.) were underestimated,

The numbers and quantities of Live Stock and Produce available for disposal vary, and receipts from sales are difficult to estimate accurately. (Subhead F.1.).

The estimate of receipts of the Veterinary College (Subhead F.3.) did not make sufficient provision for the steady increase in Receipts during the last few years.

Reduced expenditure on the purchase of Dairy Bulls for leasing and re-sale affected the receipts. (Subhead G.2.).

Receipts under Subhead G.3. from leasing fees for bulls did not decline as much as was expected.

Sales of seeds and manures for demonstration plots increased, but the demand for fencing facilities was moderate (Subhead I.).

The quantities of Saorstát agricultural products exhibited at Exhibitions and Fairs in Great Britain were less than expected and receipts from sales were consequently lower. (Subhead M.1.).

The additional receipts on account of loans advanced to Co-operative Creameries

were principally due to repayments of arrears.

The extra receipts from licences, etc., under the Horse Breeding Acts (Subhead N.3.) were due to the greatly increased number of applications for licences.

Exports of eggs were lower than expected and the estimate of receipts from export

fees was not fully realized (Subhead O.1.).

Exports of butter exceeded anticipations, and the export fees received were consequently greater (Subhead O.2.).

The export trade in potatoes was not as great as was expected, and a reduction in

receipts from inspection fees resulted (Subhead O.3.).

The receipts under the Agricultural Produce (Fresh Meat) Act (Subhead O.7) were increased by the increase in killings of bacon pigs and sheep and by receipt within this year of fees due from a previous year.

The total of the sums deducted from wheat bounty during the year in repayment of advances made to merchants under the Seed Wheat Credit Scheme was short of the estimate mainly owing to a number of bounty claims not coming in course of payment during the year (Subhead O.9).

Registration fees under Subhead O.13. realized more than was expected.

Receipts from levy under the Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep Act (Subhead O.13) were considerably below the estimate as it was not found practicable to proceed with the collec-

tion as rapidly as was anticipated.

Receipts from the sale of cattle exported towards the end of the year were received earlier than was expected, and more cattle were exported than was contemplated when the estimate was framed (Subhead O.13.).

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—A vacancy for an Assistant Inspector was not filled. The remainder of the saving was mainly due to changes in the staff during the year and to the cost of living Bonus being less than estimated.
- B.—Travelling by the Inspectorial Staff in connection with the holding of Inquiries, etc., during the year was not as extensive as expected.
- C.—The saving was mainly on advertising, for which reduced provision is now made.

 Papers and periodicals were not required to the extent anticipated.
- D.—The cost of the telephone service was greater than expected, but the extra cost was offset by savings on the cost of telegrams.
- E.1.—The necessity for shellfish investigations did not arise to the extent anticipated.

 Small savings were also effected on the purchase of scientific apparatus and fees for collection of statistics.
- E.2.—It was not deemed necessary to send a delegate on this occasion to the annual meeting of the International Council for the Study of the Sea.
- E.3.—The annual overhaul of the "S.S. Muirchu" was not as expensive this year as was anticipated.
- E.4.—Some fishery store buildings were not disposed of as early as was expected and caretaking expenses consequently exceeded the estimate.
- E.5.—This Subhead was re-opened for the discharge of liabilities which remained outstanding when the Meevagh Boatyard was transferred to the Sea Fisheries Association at the close of last financial year. (Department of Finance minutes S. 27/9/33, dated 16th March and 29th March, 1935).
- EE.—A sum corresponding to the amount charged under this Subhead appears as a receipt under Subhead H.—Appropriations in Aid. It represents a balance written off as a loss in respect of a loan advanced to the Galway Bay Steam Boat Company in 1911-12 by the (late) Congested Districts Board.
- F.1.—The provision for payments to Local Authorities under Section 13 of the Fisheries Act, 1925, proved insufficient to meet the statutory claims from the various local authorities. The additional expenditure, viz., £298 12s. 3d., was partly offset by savings on other items of this Subhead.
- F.2.—Expenditure in connection with Brown Trout Hatchery Experiments and Minor Stations was less than was expected. One instalment of the subsidy payable in respect of a Hatchery did not come in course of payment during the year.
- F.3.—Unforeseen works of maintenance which had to be undertaken during the year explain the excess expenditure incurred under this Subhead.
- F.4.—The full quantity of apparatus provided for was not required during the year.
- G.2.—Some of the schemes of the Sea Fisheries Association did not develop to the extent necessary to utilise the full provision.
- G.4.—It was not found advisable this year to proceed with the scheme for the erection of a purification plant for mussels.

Sales to the Sea Fisheries Association account for the increased receipts from sales of boats.

Tenants were found more readily than was expected and receipts from lettings of sporting rights were consequently greater than was estimated.

Changes in the staff on loan to the Sea Fisheries Association account for the reduction in the amount recouped to the Vote by the Association in respect of their salaries,

Appropriations in Aid were increased by the amount received from the Sea Fisheries Association in respect of the contents of Meevagh Boatyard. The Association paid this amount out of advances made from Subhead G.3.

NOTES.

Sums amounting to £5,559 17s, 2d. in respect of outstanding fishery loans were written off with the consent of the Minister for Finance (Minute S. 28/2/31, dated 31st July, 1935) under the Fisheries (Revision of Loans) Act, 1931.

The total arrears outstanding in respect of Fishery and Industrial loans on 31st March, 1935, was £47,209 10s. 10d.

Amounts totalling £2,345 4s. 3d. collected prior to 31st March, 1934, by the Sea Fisheries Association from members in respect of boats and gear were utilised to finance further similar transactions. To enable the Association to make repayment to the Department a corresponding sum was advanced from Subhead G.3. The amount is included in the repayments credited to Appropriations in Aid.

A claim of £50 balance of rent due in respect of the tenancy of a Sporting Lodge and Fisheries was waived with the approval of the Minister for Finance. (Minute S. 27/8/34 dated 31st August, 1934).

EXTRA REMUNERATION (exceeding £30).

One officer received an allowance of £125 from Vote 57 for acting as Railway Inspecting Officer.

One officer was on loan (part-time) to the Inland Fisheries Commission but continued to perform his duties in the Fisheries Branch of the Department without extra cost to this Vote.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—Saving of £3,078 due mainly to vacancies for Secretary (£340), one Higher Executive and two Junior Executive Officers (£1,330), and five Technical and Outdoor Officers (£712), also to replacements of senior officers by junior officers, and to the Bonus being calculated at a higher rate than was subsequently found to be necessary.
- B.—Saving of £1,192 due to limitation of activities consequent on vacancies in the Indoor and Outdoor staffs modified by charges approximating to £171 in respect of travelling in connection with kelp development which if performed by officers specially recruited for that purpose would have fallen as a charge to Subhead F.2.—Travelling (Marine Products Industries).
- C.—Saving due to over-estimation consequent on the difficulty of segregating previous years' comparable expenditure between the Vote for Fisheries and the Vote for Gaeltacht Services.
- D.—Casual excess due to increased expenditure on telephones modified by a small saving on telegrams.
- E.1.—Saving of £565 caused mainly by unfilled vacancies for ten Industrial employees as well as a small saving in the provision made for cost of living Bonus.
- E.2.—Saving due to a temporary suspension of the policy of bringing Manageresses to the Gaeltacht Industries Depôt for instruction and to some extent also to the limitation of activities referred to in the note to Subhead B.
- E.3.—Casual excess.
- E.4.—Saving due to initiation of a policy of largely restricting production to actual orders from customers.
- E.5 and E.6.—The partial suspension of advertising pending preparation of a revised publicity plan resulted in the saving shown under each of these Subheads.
- E.7.—The initiation of the policy referred to at E.4. above explains the saving under this Subhead.
- F.1.—Saving due as to £307 to the temporary utilisation of the staff of other sections of the Department and consequent restriction of recruitment of temporary staff, and as to £30 to economy effected by the carrying out of analytical tests centrally at the State Laboratory rather than locally as heretofore.
- F.2.—As a result of the arrangements referred to in the note to the foregoing Subhead (F.1.) the travelling expenses of the staff of other sections utilised fell as a charge to Subhead B.
- F.3.—The saving of £438 was due to less kelp being available for purchase than was anticipated, modified by the incidence of transport and other charges resulting from the sale of stocks in hand from previous years' purchases.
- F.4.—Saving due to less carrageen being available for purchase by the Department than was anticipated.
- F.5.—Excess due to cause referred to in the explanation to the previous Subhead (F.4.) and also to the need for purchasing supplies to complete contracts entered into before shortage could have been foreseen.
 - .1.—The saving of £1,026 was due to vacancies for Manager and subordinate staff (£850), also to staff changes and to the Bonus provision being to a small extent in excess of requirements.
- G.2.—A change of policy regarding the sale of carrageen in the British market made it unnecessary for the Manager to undertake the travelling which was provided for under this Subhead,

- C.—Certain scientific apparatus provided for was not purchased.
- D.—Excess due to additional extensions and calls consequent on increases in staff.

- H.1(a).—This Subhead was opened to meet extra expenditure due to the fall in value of the £. Department of Finance minute S. 71/20/34.
- H.2.—The delegation consisted of six persons instead of three as originally provided for.
- H.3.—Excess due to fluctuations in the rate of exchange.
- I.—The subsidy ceased on 28th February, 1935. Less coal was imported under the subsidy arrangement than was anticipated.
- J.—Protracted negotiations caused delay in starting operations and the preliminary borings needed to be continued for a longer period than was anticipated.

- K.2.—Anticipated sittings at provincial centres were not required.

- L.3.—Scientific apparatus was found necessary which had not been provided for. Sanctioned by Department of Finance letter S. 99/27/34, dated 3rd July, 1934.
- L.4.—See notes to L.1. and L.2. The consequent excess on L.4. is modified by savings due to the expenditure on publicity being less than was anticipated.
- L.5.—Following on the establishment of the Turf Development Board, Ltd., in August, 1934, it was found possible to dispose by sale towards the end of 1934 of larger quantities than anticipated of the 1933 season's crop, thereby avoiding the necessity for these advances.
- M.1.—The salary of the Secretary was borne on the Vote for the State Laboratory.
- M. 2., M. 3., M. 4. and M. 5.—The initial consideration by the Council of its programme occupied a longer period than was anticipated and its activities during the year were consequently more restricted than was contemplated when the estimate was prepared.
- N.—The localities not having been decided on, it was not possible for the erection of the factories to be started within the financial year.
- N.N.—The account for space at the Exhibition did not come in course of payment until June, 1934. Department of Finance authority S. 99/5/33, dated 8th November, 1934.

- P.—Compensation in respect of damage to property incidental to the landing of the Italian aeroplane "Leonardo Da Vinci" at Clooneyogan, Co. Clare. Further payments are included in the Account for 1935-36. Department of Finance authority F. 200/41/34, dated 24th December, 1934.
- Q.—Vouchers for these items are not available, and it was not possible to complete the examination of these charges for inclusion in the Account for the prior year. The amount includes a sum equivalent to \$45.90 for gramophone records in connection with the Exhibition which were presented as gifts, in acknowledgment of valuable assistance rendered to the Consul at Chicago who was in charge of the exhibit. - A.—Excess due to the employment of additional temporary staff consequent on the work involved in dealing with applications for Qualification Certificates in connection with Unemployment Assistance being greater than was anticipated, modified by a saving due to the rate of Bonus being less than estimated.
