### REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER AND AUDITOR-GENERAL.

#### GENERAL.

### Out-turn of the Year.

1. The gross estimates for public services for the financial year 1946-47, as shown by the summary on page xlvii., amounted to £58,388,508, and the gross expenditure to £55,321,230 4s. 4d. Appropriations in aid were estimated at £2,880,508 and the amount realized was £2,997,228 4s. 5d., but on some votes the estimated receipts were not realized and the actual amount applied in aid of expenditure was £2,850,320 1s. 7d., the balance falling to be surrendered.

The total amount to be surrendered is £3,183,998 0s. 1d.,

which is arrived at as follows:-

In no case has the provision made by Dáil Éireann been exceeded, nor is an excess vote necessary.

#### Stock and Store Accounts.

2. The stock and store accounts of the Departments have been examined. The results are satisfactory, with some exceptions which are referred to in the paragraphs relating to the votes of the Departments concerned. Surrender of Balances on 1945-46 Votes.

3. The balances to be surrendered out of votes for the public services for 1945-46 amounted to £3,404,574 8s. 4d. I hereby certify that these balances have been duly surrendered to the Exchequer.

# Foreign Exchange Account.

4. The Foreign Exchange Account established under the provisions of section 49 of the Finance Act, 1941, has been examined for the year ended 31st March, 1947. I certify that, in my opinion, the operations and transactions coming within the purview of such examination have been conducted and effected in accordance with the statutory provisions.

# VOTE 6.—OFFICE OF THE REVENUE COMMISSIONERS.

# Revenue Account.

5. A test examination of the Revenue Account has been carried out with satisfactory results.

# Extra Statutory Repayments of Customs and Excise Duties.

6. Extra statutory repayments of Customs duties and of Excise duties amounting to £1,906 11s. 2d. and £789 1s. 6d., respectively, were made during the year.

### Remissions.

7. I have been furnished with a schedule of the several cases involving a loss of £50 and upwards in which claims for duty under the Revenue Acts were remitted during the year ended 31st March, 1947, without statutory authority, from motives of compassion or equity arising out of particular circumstances in individual cases. The reasons given for remission appear to be satisfactory. The total amount shown in the schedule is £4,797 5s. 10d., as compared with £6,709 0s. 10d. in the previous year. Of the total, £3,594 9s. 10d. has been remitted in respect of Income Tax. £337 Is. 7d. related to two cases in which the assessed parties died insolvent and recovery was impossible, and £3,257 8s. 3d. related to eight cases in which assessments were raised but subsequent evidence revealed no real liability. The remissions also include sums in respect of Customs and Excise duties amounting to £1,202 16s. 0d.

The above figures do not include amounts passed as irrecoverable for various reasons.

# VOTE 9.—OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS.

# Insurance of Workmen.

8. As stated in a note to the account, sums amounting to £15,611 6s. 10d. expended in this and prior years on compensation, etc., in respect of claims arising out of accident risks which had been covered by policies of insurance with the Irish Employers' Mutual Insurance Association, Limited, which is in liquidation, remain charged to suspense. In addition, a sum of £6,017 4s. 0d., being portion of the premium paid for the year 1938-39, also remains charged to a suspense accountpending settlement of the Commissioners' claim against the Liquidator. Sums amounting to £1,908 18s. 0d. which would otherwise have been payable to the Association under the policies have been retained by the Commissioners as a set-off against their claim. I have recently been informed that a Court Order has been granted to the Liquidator for payment of £5 each by contributories who had not already paid, and also that delay is being experienced in getting underwriters to agree on a sum to be offered in settlement of the claim against them.

### Linen Hall.

9. The statement relating to non-voted services which is appended to the account included, in previous years, the receipts and payments in connection with the property known as Linen Hall, Dublin, which became vested in the Commissioners for Public Works by the Linen and Yarn Halls (Dublin) Act, 1878. The receipts from the property arise from lettings of portions which are surplus to government requirements, and the payments are mainly in respect of head rent. In previous years only the deficiencies arising from the administration of the property were provided for in a subhead of the vote for Public Works and Buildings. As the use of the Linen Hall for the purposes of the linen, yarn or cotton trades has long since ceased, and its position is similar to that of any other property administered by the Commissioners, it was decided, with the approval of the Minister for Finance, to discontinue the former method of accounting and to charge the entire expenditure to the vote for Public Works and Buildings and credit the gross receipts as appropriations in aid of that vote.

# VOTE 10.—PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

# Subhead C .- Maintenance and Supplies.

10. Certain maintenance work on public buildings in Dublin and district was, prior to the Emergency, carried out under

contracts placed on the basis of competitive tenders. During the Emergency, however, it was not possible for various reasons to secure effective competition, and the work has been carried out under a contract which has been extended from time to time. In view of the increase in the expenditure under this contract, I recently inquired whether consideration had been given to the question of reverting to the system of competitive tender. I was informed that there was as yet no prospect of effective competition owing to scarcity of materials and rising costs, but that in order to retain a measure of control over increases in the rates it has been the practice since 1942 to negotiate ex tensions of this contract at intervals of four months.

Expenditure amounting to £203 8s. 0d., of which £151 17s. 7d. is charged in this account, was incurred on the repair of a wall on the seaward side of a right-of-way to a former coastguard station. This property had been taken over from the British Admiralty in 1922, and was held on a lease for a term of 99 years from 1899. As it was surplus to Government requirements, the property was leased by the Commissioners of Public Works in 1938 for the remainder of the term. Later, when the question of responsibility for the maintenance of the boundary wall arose, the Commissioners informed both lessee and head landlord that the State had no responsibility, but no agreement could be reached. A detailed search of the documents of title was then made and a deed of assignment was brought to light under which the Admiralty was required to keep in repair the wall in question. The Commissioners were not aware of the existence of this document, and, in the circumstances they had no alternative to carrying out the necessary work of repair.

# Subhead K.—Appropriations in Aid.

11. Statements showing the results of tillage operations at the Phoenix Park and the Bourn Vincent Memorial Park have been furnished to me. The cereal and root crops grown in the Phoenix Park during the 1946 season were sold and the proceeds, amounting to £622 10s. 9d., have been credited to this subhead. The greater portion of the produce of the Bourn Vincent Memorial Park, estimated at £2,800, was retained for feeding and seeding purposes, the amount credited to this subhead in respect of sales being £188 11s. 5d.

### Rents Receivable.

12. Arrears of rents due to the Commissioners on 31st March, 1947, amounted to £4,097 19s. 11d., as compared with £4,154 on 31st March, 1946. From statements furnished to me with the appropriation account it appears that of these arrears sums

amounting to £3,285 have been recovered subsequent to 31st March, 1947, and £175 was considered bad or doubtful.

# VOTE 15.—COMMISSIONS AND SPECIAL INQUIRIES.

13. As noted in the account, sums totalling £307, approximately, were charged in the accounts of this vote for the years 1934-35, 1935-36 and 1936-37 in respect of transcription and editorial fees incurred by the Irish Manuscripts Commission in connection with a work, the publication of which the Commission subsequently decided to abandon on account of editorial complexities. The expenditure on printing and type rent amounted to £461 8s. 10d., as noted in the account of the vote for Stationery and Printing (No. 21).

### VOTE 29.—AGRICULTURE.

# Subhead E.2.—Veterinary Research.

14. The estimates for the year under review included provision of £27,000 for the acquisition of lands for a new veterinary research institute, and for salaries, wages, allowances and general expenses in connection with its establishment and maintenance. The expenditure totalled £27,245 10s. 9d., comprising £22,000 for the purchase, in November, 1946, of certain farm lands at Brownsbarn, Clondalkin, County Dublin, and £5,245 10s. 9d. for wages and general expenses. The latter figure included the purchase, at a valuation of £1,797, of existing fodder crops and manure on the farm, together with sums totalling £2,339 7s. 3d. expended on the acquisition of live stock, implements and tools. Receipts in the period ended 31st March, 1947, which are included in the appropriations in aid, amounted to £848 1s. 0d., and accrued mainly from the sale of live stock.

# Subhead E.3.—Subscriptions, etc., to International and other Research Organisations.

15. Following approval by the Government, in August, 1946, of the submission of an application for membership of the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations and of the sending of a delegation headed by the Minister for Agriculture to a conference of the Organisation at Copenhagen, the Organisation admitted this country as a member and fixed the subscription to be paid for the year ended 30th June, 1947, at 53,000 United States dollars. Expenditure amounting to £13,695 13s. 9d. is included in the charge to this subhead, comprising £13,184 1s. 7d. in respect of the subscription and £511 12s. 2d. for the travelling and other expenses of the delegation to the Copenhagen conference.

### Subhead G.3.—Fertilisers Subsidies.

16. As in previous years, the subsidy payable to manufacturers of artificial fertilisers was assessed by reference to accounts which were certified by the auditors of the concerns. The accounts for the 1944-45 fertiliser season showed that, after allowing the approved profit of 10s. per ton there remained a surplus of £39,512 4s. 8d., and this amount was remitted by the manufacturers to the Department in June, 1946, and credited to a suspense account. The rate of profit for the 1945-46 season was fixed at 8s. per ton, and on this basis the accounts for that season disclosed a deficit of £57,907 14s 7d., which was made good to the manufacturers, the net loss in respect of the two seasons, £18,395 9s. 11a., being charged to this subhead.

The balance of the expenditure charged to the subhead relates to a payment of £12,025 13s. 6d. made to Mianraí, Teoranta, representing subsidy at the rate of 2s. 7d. per unit of sulphur in respect of 2,588 tons of Avoca pyrites, containing 93,102 units of sulphur, supplied to the manufacturers of artificial

fertilisers in the year ended 31st March, 1946.

# Subhead H.—Grants to County Committees of Agriculture.

17. The charge to this subhead comprises normal grant amounting to £128,094 10s. 0d., special temporary grant totalling £2,000, and payments amounting to £59,133 8s. 10d. for the purpose of supplementing committees' expenditure on the pro-

vision of lime for agricultural purposes.

The normal grant of £128,094 10s. 0d. includes a sum of £73,131, approximately equivalent to the proceeds of the agricultural rate of 2d. in the £ levied under the Agriculture Act, 1931, and extra grants, amounting to £54,963 10s. 0d., equivalent to the amount of the income of committees from rates in excess of the statutory minimum 2d. rate.

# Subhead H.H.—Payments to County Committees of Agriculture.

18. In connection with the emergency scheme for the saving of the 1946 harvest, arrangements were made, in co-operation with the Department of Industry and Commerce, for the distribution of free rations of tea and sugar to voluntary harvest workers. Permits for the purchase of supplies were issued to the Secretaries of County Committees of Agriculture and the preparation and distribution of the rations was in general carried out by the local branches of the Irish Red Cross Society. The

cost of the tea and sugar was defrayed in the first instance from the County Committees' funds and the sum of £856 15s. 2d. charged to this subhead relates to the recoupment to participating Committees of the amounts expended by them.

### Subhead J.—National Stud.

19. As stated in paragraph 20 of my previous report, legislation providing for the establishment of a State Stud farm at Tully, County Kildare, was embodied in the National Stud Act, 1945, which became law on 4th August, 1945, and provided for the setting up of a company to take leases or licences of the farm and to carry on the business of stud farming. Greighe Náisiúnta na hÉireann, Teoranta (The Irish National Stua Company, Limited), was incorporated in April, 1946, and the 31st August, 1946, was, by Order of the Minister for Finance (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 289 of 1946), appointed as the transfer date for the purposes of the Act and on that date the use and occupation of the farm was granted to the company under licence from the Minister for Agriculture. Until the farm was taken over by the company, ordinary farming operations were continued on the property and the expenditure charged to the subhead, amounting to £9,341 9s. 0d., relates. therefore, to the disbursements in connection with these operations during the period 1st April to 31st August, 1946, the principal items being £1,811 19s. 1d. for wages and allowances, and £6,673 4s. 6d. for the purchase of live stock. in the period, which are brought to account as appropriations in aid, amounted to £4,633 9s. 10d., including £4,499 8s. 3d. from the sale of live stock.

### Subhead M.5.—Improvement of the Creamery Industry.

20. As will be seen from the account, no expenditure was

incurred under this subhead during the year.

In my report on the appropriation accounts for the year 1944-45, I mentioned that the Dairy Disposal Company, Limited, repaid £56,000 on foot of an advance of £112,000 made in March, 1933, to cover trading losses incurred up to 31st December, 1931. Further sums amounting to £28,000 were repaid by the company during the year under review, making a total refund of £84,000 in respect of the advance referred to. Including other receipts in connection with the disposal of creamery properties totalling £4,323 7s. 7d., the sums paid over by the company, which are brought to account as exchequer extra receipts, amounted to £32,323 7s. 7d. The total vote expenditure to 31st March, 1947, from moneys provided for the improvement of the creamery industry amounted to £1,197,847 5s. 6d.,

and receipts were £349,495 8s. 7d., leaving a net charge on public funds of £848,351 16s. 11d.

### Subhead M.10.—Potato Reserve Scheme.

21. It was again considered advisable to make arrangements to cope with a possible shortage of ware potatoes in Dublin and other urban areas and the Minister for Finance accordingly sanctioned the acquisition of a reserve of 1,000 tons of the 1945 crop, and authorized the cost to be charged to this subhead and receipts from the disposal of the reserve to be brought to account as appropriations in aid. Purchases of 675 tons, costing £7,339 14s. 9d., were made from merchants in County Donegal and County Mayo, but the supply of ware potatoes available in the country proving to be in excess of home requirements it was decided to include the reserve with other exports which were being made to the Continent by individual merchants through the British Ministry of Food, and sums totalling £7,171 17s. 6d. were received from the Ministry for the 675 tons so exported.

### Subhead O.10.—Emergency Powers (Tillage Orders),

22. The Orders relating to compulsory tillage in the seasons up to and including 1946 were made by the Government under the Emergency Powers Acts, while the Order covering the 1947 season, described as the Tillage Order, 1946, was made under the Supplies and Services (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1946. The Orders required the occupiers of arable lands to cultivate a specified proportion of their holdings, and the Minister for Agriculture was empowered to enter on and take possession of those holdings whose occupiers failed to comply with the provisions of the Orders, and to cultivate such holdings or make The charge to this subhead comprises conacre or other lettings. £64.871 16s. 0d. for salaries, wages and allowances, £17,310 7s. 5d. for travelling and miscellaneous expenses, and £1,951 2s. 8d. representing the cost of seeds, manures and fencing materials, together with the cost of the erection of fencing and of other operations incidental to the cultivation of entered holdings and the harvesting of crops grown thereon.

The Tillage Orders also regulated the disposal of sums realized from the sale of crops and from lettings. The receipts may be applied in or towards (a) defraying expenses incurred by the Minister for Agriculture in discharge of the powers conferred on him by the Orders, (b) paying debts due to a State authority by the occupiers of entered holdings, or (c) paying rates due

to a local authority by such occupiers. The total receipts in connection with this service to 31st March, 1947, amounted to £20,540 13s. 7d., of which £16,418 0s. 6d. was applied towards defraying expenses, including £1,962 18s. 6d. brought to account as appropriations in aid during the year under review. The sums disbursed to 31st March, 1947, totalled £3,289 10s. 5d. comprising £2,807 2s. 7d. to State and local authorities and £482 7s. 10d. to the occupiers of the holdings concerned.

The Committee of Public Accounts, in its report on the appropriation accounts for 1945-46, noted that the operation of the compulsory Tillage Order for the 1945 season resulted in a net loss and that it was not possible for the Department ultimately to make a profit in connection with the enforcement of the Orders relating to compulsory tillage as surpluses in individual cases, after meeting the Minister's expenses and the claims of other State departments and of local authorities are paid over to the occupiers of entered holdings. The Committee expressed the hope that in these circumstances every effort would be made to keep losses at a minimum. I understand that in the case of holdings where the expenses exceeded the receipts, the total of the deficits for the seasons 1941 to 1946, inclusive, amounted, at the close of the 1946 season, to £7,669 11s. 4d.

### Subhead P.—Appropriations in Aid.

## Levy on the slaughter of cattle and sheep.

23. As stated in previous reports, the provisions of the Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep Acts relating to the collection of levy in respect of cattle and sheep slaughtered for human consumption ceased to be in force as from 1st August, 1936. The amount received in the year under review in respect of levy due but uncollected at the date mentioned was £539 14s. 11d., and the amount of levy outstanding at 31st March, 1947, was £2,445 17s. 1d. As noted in the account, sums totalling £526 14s. 8d. were written off with the sanction of the Minister for Finance.

# Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer.

24. As will be seen from the account, fees amounting to £327 were received in respect of licences granted under Emergency Powers Orders. These comprised £40, being £10 for each licence issued under the Emergency Powers (No. 254) Order, 1943 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 37 of 1943), which related to the licensing of persons engaged in the business of producing, pro-

cessing and selling specified classes of agricultural seeds, and £287 representing £1 for each licence issued under the Emergency Powers (Export of Dead Poultry and Rabbits) Order, 1945 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 141 of 1945). The Orders referred to were made under the Emergency Powers Acts and were continued in force by the Supplies and Services (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1946.

### VOTE 30.—AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE SUBSIDIES.

Subsidies, Allowances, etc., for Dairy Produce.

25. Allowances on the production of creamery butter were payable at such rates as enabled the price of milk supplied to creameries to be maintained at 101d. per gallon for the period 1st April to 30th November, 1946, and at 1s. per gallon for the period 1st December, 1946, to 31st March, 1947, expenditure under this heading totalling £795,053 13s. 7d. Sums amounting to £5,550 13s. 9d. were also disbursed in respect of allowances payable to butter factory proprietors and non-manufacturing exporters on non-creamery butter acquired by them from producers during the year 1946-47. In addition to expenditure of £825,000 from the vote for Agricultural Produce Subsidies and £78,166 6s. 0d. from the Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund in the year 1945-46 on allowances in respect of creamery butter produced and non-creamery butter acquired during that year, payments amounting to £39,371 Os. 3d. and £8,428 Os. 4d. were also made from this vote and from the Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund, respectively, during the year under review, bringing the total cost of these allowances for the year 1945-46 to £950,965 6s. 7d., as against £902,041 11s. 2d. for the year Deficiencies in trading accounts, arising mainly from expenditure in connection with the cold storage of butter for winter consumption, were made good from this vote to the Butter Marketing Committee, the payments involved totalling £42,936 7s. 4d., being a balance of £12,936 7s. 4d. in respect of the year ended 31st March, 1946, and £30,000, on account. for the year ended 31st March, 1947. The remainder of the expenditure charged to the vote, £42,036 14s. 5d., relates to payments made to creameries in connection with the Department's schemes for the cold storage of creamery butter for winter requirements.

Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Acts, 1935 to 1941, and Emergency Powers (No. 270) Order, 1943.

Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund.

26. The income of the Fund, which amounted to £14,056

14s. 0d. as compared with £15,401 10s. 10d. in the previous year, accrued solely from levies, mainly at nominal rates, on

home sales of creamery butter.

As stated in previous reports, commencing in the year 1943-44 the Fund was utilized to supplement the subsidies and allowances paid from the vote for Agricultural Produce Subsidies. Owing, however, to diminished income the extent to which this was done in the year under review was limited to the amount of £10,398 12s. 1d. The sum referred to comprised the item of £8,428 0s. 4d. mentioned in paragraph 25, representing disbursements to creameries in respect of allowances payable on butter produced in 1945-46, together with payments totalling £1,970 11s. 9d. made to creameries in connection with the Department's scheme for the cold storage of butter for winter requirements in 1945-46. Issues amounting to £6,224, made to the Butter Marketing Committee to meet administrative expenses, account for the remainder of the expenditure charged to the Fund.

### VOTE 31.—FISHERIES.

Subhead F.1.—Grants to Boards of Conservators and Local Authorities, etc.

27. In my last report I referred to a case in which a Board of Conservators was recouped a sum of £308 9s. 7d., being the costs in legal proceedings in connection with a conviction in the District Court for the unlawful possession of salmon illegally captured; the conviction referred to was quashed in the High Court on the ground, inter alia, that it had not been recorded in proper form, and an appeal to the Supreme Court was dismissed. In the course of evidence the Committee of Public Accounts was informed that the Department of Finance was in communication with the Department of Justice with a view to ensuring that convictions should be properly recorded in the future.

Recoupment was made in the year under review to another Board of Conservators of costs incurred in almost similar circumstances. The Board secured a conviction in the District Court for a like offence, the conviction being subsequently confirmed in the Circuit Court. A conditional order of certiorari to quash the order of the District Justice on the ground, interalia, that the conviction had not been recorded in proper form, was then obtained from the High Court, but on this occasion the application to make the conditional order absolute was disallowed and the order discharged by the High Court; the defendant, however, appealed to the Supreme Court, where the

decision of the High Court was reversed and the conviction quashed. The Minister for Finance sanctioned recoupment of the costs incurred by the Board of Conservators and the amount involved, £237 17s. 1d., is included in the expenditure under this subhead.

### Subhead G.2.—Advances for Boats and Gear.

28. No advances were made to the Sea Fisheries Association during the year under review. The total of advances for boats and gear to 31st March, 1947, amounted to £138,750. The half-yearly instalments of the annuities set up to repay these advances falling due to 31st March, 1947, amounted to £116,392 17s. 7d., while the sums collected by the Sea Fisheries Association from borrowers and transferred to the Department in payment of the annuity instalments amounted to £105,955 17s. 5d., including £4,872 5s. 7d. repaid in the year under review and credited to appropriations in aid. The repayments were, therefore, in arrear on 31st March, 1947, to the extent of £10,437 0s. 2d., as compared with £3,906 12s. 7d. in arrear on 31st March, 1946.

### Fishery Loans.

29. Repayments of fishery loans, which are accounted for as appropriations in aid, amounted to £3 2s. 0d., and the balance outstanding on these loans at 31st March, 1947, was £20,385 13s. 3d., including arrears of £20,348 2s. 11d. There were no remissions during the year under the Fisheries (Revision of Loans) Act, 1931.

# VOTE 33.—GÁRDA SÍOCHÁNA.

## Suspense Account: Local Security Force.

30. In paragraph 34 of my last report I mentioned that Emergency Powers (No. 61) Order, 1940 (Revocation of Part III) Order, 1945 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 258 of 1945), provides that the unexpended balances of the Local Security Force district funds should be disposed of in such manner as the Minister for Justice directs, and that pending a direction, the amounts involved had been credited to a suspense account. I understand that a final decision on the disposal of these moneys, which amounted to £8,468 2s. 5d. on 31st March, 1947, has not yet been taken.

### VOTE 34.—PRISONS.

31. The statement of the manufacturing and farm accounts appended to the appropriation account has been examined, and local test examinations of the conversion books and other records dealing with manufacturing operations have been carried out with satisfactory results.

### VOTE 36.—CIRCUIT COURT.

Subhead A.—Salaries, Wages and Allowances.

32. A sum is provided under this subhead to recoup Court stenographers the expenses incurred in the employment of assistants when it is not possible for the stenographers to complete in time transcripts of evidence in connection with Central Criminal Court Appeals, payment being made on the production of vouched claims. Owing to the discovery of irregularities in a claim submitted by a Court stenographer in 1945, a detailed departmental investigation of the claims which had been made by him since his appointment was undertaken, as a result of which it was disclosed that payments on irregular claims, amounting to £612 13s. 9d., were made to him and were included in the accounts for 1945-46 and previous years. I have inquired how it is proposed to adjust this amount. The officer concerned was suspended and later dismissed the service.

# VOTE 41.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC HEALTH.

# Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer.

33. In connection with the sale of equipment which had been provided for emergency cooked food centres, to which reference was made in paragraph 38 of my last report, a further sum of £1,484 12s. 5d. was received during the year under review and the balance of the equipment on hands valued at £95 17s. 0d. was taken over without repayment by the Department of Posts and Telegraphs. The expenditure on the provision of this equipment, which was charged to subhead L.3. of the vote in previous years, amounted to £6,741 13s. 1d., and the total amount realized from the sale and hire of equipment and utensils was £3,051 2s. 4d.

#### Motor Tax Account.

34. A test examination has been applied to the Motor Tax

Account with generally satisfactory results. The certificates and reports of the Local Government Auditors who examine the motor tax transactions of local authorities were scrutinised, in so far as they were available, but in ten cases this audit had not

been completed at the date of my test examination.

The gross proceeds of Motor Vehicles, etc., duties in 1946-47, including £22,552 8s. 7d. attributable to fines collected by the Department of Justice, amounted to £1,467,696 13s. 7d., as compared with a total of £982,602 16s. 7d. in the previous year. Fees amounting to £4,587 15s. 6d. received on behalf of the Commissioner of the Gárda Síochána under the Road Traffic Act (Parts VI and VII) (Fees) Regulations, 1937 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 92 of 1937) are also included in the receipts.

### VOTE 46.—PRIMARY EDUCATION.

### Subhead A.3.—Preparatory Colleges, etc.

35. The average boarding cost per head for the school year 1946-47 ranged from 12s. 11d. to 15s. 6d. per week, showing increases in five and a decrease in one of the colleges as compared with the previous year.

The average fee paid by the students for the same school year was £14 15s. 10d. as compared with £14 8s. 0d. for the previous year.

Accounts have been furnished to me showing the receipts and expenditure for the school year 1946-47 in connection with the farms and gardens attached to the six colleges. Three of these accounts show a surplus of receipts over expenditure while the other three accounts, including that of a college which had been taken over by the Department of Defence and was not handed back until September, 1946, show an excess of expenditure over receipts.

# Subhead C.1.—Salaries, etc., of Teachers.

36. Since 1st April, 1941, reformatory and industrial schools have been recognised as national schools in respect of literary instruction in the primary school programme, and the salaries of the literary teachers engaged in these schools, less a fixed amount payable by the managers, have been charged to the vote. It was decided, with the approval of the Department of Finance, to charge to the vote as from the 1st April, 1946, the full salaries of these teachers and also the grants in respect of heating, cleaning, etc., payable in the case of ordinary national schools.

The scales of salary of national teachers and the grants to schools paid on a capitation basis were increased with effect as from the 31st October, 1946, when the strike of teachers in the Dublin area which began on 20th March, 1946, came to an end. It was decided, with the approval of the Minister for Finance, to pay to teachers of national schools in Dublin who had rendered service during the period of the strike special allowances of £20 to principals and £10 to assistants, and also to pay allowances based on similar rates to those capitation schools where any member of the staff was on strike. The total payments amounted to £4,840 11s. Od., of which £4,806 10s. Od. is charged in the account under review.

I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding the departmental audit of teachers' salaries, etc.

# Subhead C.8.—Bonus to Parents or Guardians of certain Pupils in the Gaeltacht and Breac-Ghaeltacht.

37. A supplementary estimate was taken in the year under review to provide for increased payments under this head. Hitherto bonus at the rate of £2 per pupil was payable in respect of certain pupils of national schools between the ages of 6 and 14 years in whose homes the language of the household is Irish. Commencing with the school year 1945-46 this bonus was increased to £5 per pupil, the upper age limit was raised to 16 years and the scheme was extended to pupils of secondary and technical schools on the same conditions as are applicable to pupils of national schools. Payments in respect of pupils in national schools in the year under review amounted to £34,107, while the payments in respect of pupils in secondary and technical schools amounted to £300 and £255 respectively.

# Subhead D.—Superannuation, etc., of Teachers.

38. In my last report I referred to the concession granted to certain women teachers to allow them to continue in the service for a year beyond the prescribed age limit of 60 years. In view of the further improvement in the employment position of national teachers, it was decided, with the approval of the Minister for Finance, to allow women teachers reaching 60 years after 31st December, 1944, or having less than 35 years' service at that date, and whose service is efficient, to continue in the service up to 62 years of age or the completion of 37 years' service, and in cases of special hardship for a further period. The number of women teachers who retired on pension, otherwise than through disablement or inefficiency, in the year ended 31st March, 1947, was 28 as compared with 72 in the previous year and 116 in the year ended 31st March, 1945.

### VOTE 49.—SCIENCE AND ART.

Subhead B.5.—Preparation of revised edition of "Handbuch des Alt Irischen."

39. Token provision was made under this subhead for the expenses of printing and publication of the revised edition in English of the late Professor R. Thurneysen's work "Handbuch des alt Irischen" prepared for publication by the author with the assistance of an officer of the Department. On the death of the author in 1940 the task of editing the revised edition was undertaken by the Dublin Institute for Advanced Studies. It was later decided that publication should be entrusted to the Institute and, with the approval of the Minister for Finance, all rights and commitments in the work were transferred to the Institute by deed dated 29th April, 1947. The expenditure incurred on this work, which is charged in the accounts of previous years, amounted to £1,605 10s. 6d.

# Subhead B.12.—Centenary Commemoration of Thomas Davis and the Young Ireland Movement.

40. The charge to this subhead includes a sum of £1,205 being the cost of a number of paintings which were acquired in connection with the centenary of Thomas Davis and the Young Ireland Movement. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding the arrangements made for the care and custody of these paintings and also of the busts referred to in the following paragraph.

## Subhead B.13.—Purchase of Works of Art.

41. A token sum of £5 was provided under this subhead to enable works of art which are not considered appropriate for purchase by the National Gallery to be acquired for the national collection, and a committee was appointed by the Minister for Education with the approval of the Government to advise on proposals for such purchases. The charge of £1,200 is in respect of five portrait busts the purchase of which had been recommended by the committee.

# Subhead B.15.—Special Purchase of Manuscript of Irish Interest.

42. This subhead was opened with the sanction of the Department of Finance to bring to account portion of the cost of purchase

of a Giraldus Cambrensis manuscript for the National Library. As stated in a note to the account, the cost of the manuscript was £1,760 of which £181 2s. 1d. was met by the application of the unexpended balance of the grant-in-aid for Purchase of Books, etc., the balance being charged to this subhead.

### Duais-Chiste an Uachtaráin de h-Íde.

43. In the year under review a sum of £300 was donated to the Minister for Education by An Dochtúir Dubhglas De h-Íde, the annual income from which is to be used for the purpose of encouraging the development of Irish historical painting, including portraiture, by the award of a medal for the best work of the kind produced in each year. By direction of the Minister for Finance an account of this fund has been appended to the appropriation account for Science and Art. It is proposed that expenditure on the preparation of the design and dies for the medal, and the cost of printing and advertising in connection with the competition in any year, should be borne on the Science and Art vote, leaving the total income from the capital investment available for the provision of the annual award.

# VOTE 50.—REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Subhead F.—Building and Equipment Grants.

44. In view of the deterioration of the existing buildings, it was decided that financial aid should be afforded to managers of reformatory and industrial schools to enable them to undertake works of rebuilding and repair. With the approval of the Ministers for Finance and Local Government, a scheme for the payment of grants for this purpose, and for the provision of equipment for vocational training, was brought into operation as from 1st October, 1946. The scheme provides for an increase of 6d. per week in the rate of the weekly maintenance contribution made by local authorities, for a corresponding reduction in the State maintenance contribution charged to subheads A. and B. of the vote, and for the payment of building and equipment grants at the rate of 1s. per week per detainee in respect of which the charge to subhead F. amounts to £4,028 5s. 10d.

Provision was made in a supplementary estimate for the payment of special grants towards the cost of the establishment of a new industrial school for boys and the rebuilding of an

industrial school for girls which had been destroyed by fire. In the case of the boys' school it has been agreed, with the approval of the Minister for Finance, to pay one-half of the cost of its establishment subject to a maximum state contribution of £40,000 of which £9,950 16s. 0d. was paid in the year under review. The charge to this subhead also includes a grant of £7,500 paid in relief of the debt incurred in the rebuilding of the girls' school.

### VOTE 52.—LANDS.

### Subhead I.—Improvement of Estates, etc.

45. The total expenditure borne on the vote for Lands in connection with the scheme whereby certain lands in Co. Meath, available for the relief of congestion, are reserved for allottees from the Gaeltacht, from its inception in 1934-35 to 31st March, 1947, amounts to £103,568 6s. 5d., including £26 1s. 3d. in the year under review. In addition, expenditure amounting to £2,050 9s. 10d., which was subsequently recouped to the Land Commission by the Office of Public Works, was incurred in the erection of a schoolhouse. As it appeared that a number of the original allottees had vacated or been ejected from their holdings, I have inquired regarding stock and equipment supplied by the Land Commission which were not recovered from the allottees concerned, and also regarding the expenditure incurred in re-stocking, etc., the holdings before they were reallotted.

Under the scheme for the provision of holdings in certain counties in Leinster for migrants from districts where there is acute congestion, the expenditure, apart from the cost of general improvements (roads, drains, fences, etc.), borne on the vote for Lands during the year amounts to £1,725 7s. 4d. The expenditure on this scheme from its inception in 1937-38 to 31st March, 1947, amounts to £113,718 11s. 4d. made up as follows:—

Until the scheme is completed it is not possible to apportion the expenditure on general improvements in respect of migrants' holdings on the estates.

A sawmill, situated on an estate acquired by the Land Commission, has been utilised since 1941 for the production, from timber on the estate, of gates, gate posts and other requirements for improvement works. The expenditure involved in these operations was charged in the first instance to a suspense account. The assessed value of the articles produced up to 31st March, 1946, and used on improvement works, amounted to. £1,051 3s. 5d. which was charged to the vote for 1945-46, and a similar charge to the vote for the year under review amounted to £451 14s. 9d., these sums being credited to the suspense account. The balance on the latter account on 31st March, 1947, was £63 7s. 10d. In arriving at the cost of production of the articles it is not clear that the full value of the timber used has been taken into account. I have inquired regarding the method of accounting, the system of control over the timber felled and converted, and the disposal of the manufactured articles.

### Repayable Exchequer Advance.

46. Reference has been made in previous reports to an advance of £200,000 made from the vote in March, 1925, to enable payments in lieu of rent to be made to landlords as required by the Land Act, 1923. Of this advance £85,000 has been repaid and under the provisions of section 15 of the Land Act, 1933, arrears of payments in lieu of rent due by tenant purchasers amounting to £41,160 8s. 3d. have been funded and £72,484 3s. 6d. remitted. In addition, sums amounting to £26 15s. 0d. were written off as irrecoverable under the authority of the Department of Finance. The outstanding balance due to the Exchequer at 31st March, 1947, as shown in the statement appended to the account, was, therefore, £1,328 13s. 3d.

### VOTE 54.—GAELTACHT SERVICES.

Subhead H.3.—Grants under the Housing (Gaeltacht) Acts, 1929 to 1939.

47. Under the Housing (Gaeltacht) Acts, 1929 to 1939, the aggregate amount of grants and loans which may be made is not to exceed £750,000.

#### Industrial Loans.

48. I have been furnished with a schedule concerning the industrial loans from which it appears that there were no advances made during the year ended 31st March, 1947. Arrears, including interest accrued, due at that date amounted to £10,637 18s. 11d. as compared with £10,515 4s. 5d. on 31st March, 1946. Included in the arrears is a sum of £10,582 19s. 11d. due by a company which ceased to exist in 1925. As stated in previous reports, the realization of such security as is held by the State was the subject of negotiations, but owing to certain legal difficulties realization cannot be effected.

### VOTE 55.—INDUSTRY AND COMMERCE.

Subhead L.—Food Subsidies.

49. The expenditure charged to this subhead, totalling £2,702,830 12s. 3d., was made up as follows:—

The flour subsidy, paid to Grain Importers (Éire), Limited, was the amount required to control the price of flour and to regulate the milling industry's earnings, which were limited to a percentage of an agreed figure representing capital employed, together with the cost of any additional capital employed in excess of the agreed figure. As in previous years, Grain Importers (Éire), Limited, imported wheat for allocation to the flour millers and from September, 1946, flour imported by the company was also

allocated. The payments made to the company in the year under review comprised £2,440,844 2s. 6d. in respect of losses incurred in connection with the allocation of imported wheat and flour during the period 24th February, 1946 to 22nd February, 1947, and £74,232 in recoupment of adjusting payments made by the company following examination of the millers' accounts by officers of the Department, being a balance of £5,007 due to the milling industry for the cereal years 1942-43 and 1943-44, and £69,225 due for the cereal year 1944-45.

Subsidy on wheaten meal was paid at varying rates representing the difference between the cost of production, together with a profit of 2s. per sack, and the controlled selling price. The subsidy was ordinarily paid on the total quantity of meal manufactured and sold by individual millers, but proportionate reductions were made in cases where wheat was milled in excess of specified quotas. The payments to wheaten meal millers totalled £35,218 10s. 3d., but the charge to the vote was reduced to £33,636 13s. 5d. by the receipt from Grain Importers (Éire), Limited, of £1,581 16s. 10d., being the net profit on imported wheat allocated to certain wheaten meal millers by the company.

Subsidy at the rate of ½d. per 4 lb. loaf was payable in respect of batch bread baked and sold up to and including 26th January, 1946, by all bakers licensed under the Emergency Powers (Bakers) Order, 1941 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 453 of 1941). In July, 1946, the Government authorized an increase of ¼d. per 4 lb. loaf in the rate of subsidy payable to certain Dublin bakers, with effect from 27th January, 1946, and the expenditure charged to this subhead includes payments at the new rate to the bakers concerned. The rate of ½d. per 4 lb. loaf continued to be paid to other bakers in Dublin and throughout the country.

A payment of £6,500 on account was made to Tea Importers (Éire), Limited, in recoupment of trading losses incurred during the year ended 31st March, 1946, together with estimated losses incurred after that date. Including £200,000 advanced in previous years, the total of advances made to the company to 31st March, 1947, amounted to £206,500.

Token provision was included in a supplementary estimate for the remission of penalties incurred by flour millers under the Emergency Powers (Cereals) Acts, 1933 to 1939, in certain circumstances, but no charge to the subhead was involved. I understand that the penalties remitted related to the cereal years 1944-45 and 1945-46 and amounted to £25,160 ls. ld.

## Subhead M.—Fuel Subsidy.

50. The arrangement with Fuel Importers (Éire), Limited, under which losses incurred by the company in the marketing of turf and timber fuel were borne by the company and issues were made from voted moneys in recoupment thereof, continued in operation throughout the year, and the vote provision was again utilized in full. The total payments to the company, including £1,258,000 advanced in the year under review, amounted at 31st March, 1947, to £4,701,000.

# Subhead N.—Miscellaneous Turf Production Schemes.

51. The estimate for this service indicated that the provision was for the recoupment of losses incurred by local authorities since 1941 on the sale of turf otherwise than to Fuel Importers (Éire), Limited, government departments or local institutions. With the sanction of the Minister for Finance, payments were made in respect of these losses on the basis of claims certified by the Department of Local Government and Public Health, subject to any necessary adjustments when the audit of the relevant accounts of the local authorities concerned had been completed. Recoupments in the year under review amounted to £110,133 7s. 7d. and related mainly to provisional payments made under the approved arrangement.

A payment of £14 19s. 6d. made to a County Council, representing, as stated in a note to the account, a remanet of the expenditure on turf carbonisation experiments borne on subhead H. of the vote for Supplies 1944-45, accounts for the balance of the charge to the subhead. Sums received from certain County Councils in connection with the experiments referred to, amounting to £216 11s. 1d., are included in the exchequer

extra receipts.

## Minerals, Development.

Subhead P.1.—Advances to Mianraí Teoranta.

Subhead P.3.—Compensation for Mineral Rights Acquired.

52. The charge of £54,500 to subhead P.1. represents advances made during the year to Mianraí, Teoranta, under section 10 of the Minerals Exploration and Development Company Act, 1941, as amended by section 16 of the Minerals Company Act, 1945.

In exercise of the powers conferred by sections 11 (2) and 12 (3) of the Minerals Exploration and Development Company Act, 1941, and section 8 (2) of the Minerals Company Act, 1945,

the Minister for Industry and Commerce has with the consent of the Minister for Finance agreed to the postponement to 1st July, 1947, of the payment by the company of interest on advances and of the repayment of instalments of advances which fell due on 1st July, 1946, and 1st January, 1947. In accordance with sections 11 (3) and 12 (4) of the Minerals Exploration and Development Company Act, 1941, and section 8 (2) of the Minerals Company Act, 1945, the company became liable for interest on the deferred payments and the Minister for Finance directed that this interest should also be paid on 1st July, 1947.

Payments of compensation in respect of mineral rights acquired by the State, charged to subhead P.3., amounted during the year to £208 13s. 10d., and these payments, together with similar payments made in the year 1945-46 amounting to £4,554 17s. 0d., are treated as advances to the company. Including these amounts the total of advances to the company up to 31st March, 1947, was £367,083 6s. 2d.

Industrial Research Council—Subheads Q.1. to Q.6. and Institute for Industrial Research and Standards—Subheads U.1. to U.3.

53. The Industrial Research Council, which was appointed by the Minister for Industry and Commerce on 20th March, 1934, was dissolved as on and from 3rd October, 1946. By section 4 of the Industrial Research and Standards Act, 1946 (No. 25 of 1946) the Institute for Industrial Research and Standards was established and financial provision therefor was included in a supplementary estimate. In accordance with the provisions of the estimate a sum of £5,542 charged to subhead U.3. was paid to the Department by the Institute for Industrial Research and Standards in respect of equipment and publications transferred from the Industrial Research Council, and this amount has been brought to credit as an appropriation in aid.

Operations of the Turf Development Board, Limited, and of Bord na Móna.

### Subheads R.1. to R.5.

54. Under the terms of the Turf Development Act, 1946, and of an Order made thereunder (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 212 of 1946) the Turf Development Board, Limited, was dissolved and Bord na Móna established on 21st June, 1946.

Issues during the year, made from Grants-in-Aid with the consent of the Minister for Finance, comprised £349,000 for the production of turf for use in non-turf areas (subhead R.1.), £15,200 for administrative expenses (subhead R.2.), £3,500 to meet expenditure on publicity (subhead R.3.) and £6,000 for experiment and research (subhead R.5.). Of these amounts, issues made to the Turf Development Board, Limited, prior to 21st June, 1946, were £170,000 under subhead R.1., and £7,000 under subhead R.2., the balances being issued to Bord na Móna. Receipts amounting to £223,326 18s. 9d. in respect of sales of turf produced under the turf camps scheme were remitted to the Department and are included in the exchequer extra receipts. I have asked for information concerning State property held by Bord na Móna in its capacity as an agent of the Government for the operation of the scheme.

As indicated in the account, the provision made under subhead R.4. for the preliminary development of certain bogs was not required, advances for this purpose being made from the Central Fund under section 53 of the Turf Development Act, 1946. Section 52 of the Act provides for the payment out of voted moneys of grants to Bord na Móna in respect of expenditure on experimental and research work during the year 1946-47 and in each of the nine subsequent financial years, and limits the total amount of such grants to £120,000. As stated above, issues under this head in the period ended 31st March, 1947,

amounted to £6,000 (subhead R.5.).

Payments amounting to £164,383 were made by the Turf Development Board, Limited, and by Bord na Móna in respect of advances made for the development of certain bogs and are also included in the exchequer extra receipts. In addition, under section 64 (1) of the Turf Development Act, 1946, the liability of Bord na Móna in respect of repayable advances made for the development of Clonsast bog was reduced by £31,058 15s. 2d., representing so much of the State debt as equalled the certified deficit on the accounts of the Turf Development Board, Limited, as at 21st June, 1946.

### Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer.

55. In my last report I referred to the transfer from the Emergency Scientific Research Bureau to the Turf Development Board, Limited, of plant for the production of turf charcoal, to the decision to close down the plant, and to the receipt from the Board of £3,583 14s. 3d. in connection with the disposal of buildings and plant, and sales of charcoal. A further sum of £573 was received from Bord na Móna, representing, I am informed, a final payment in respect of the sale of the assets of the turf charcoal plant, and is included in the receipts.

As will be seen from the account, licence and other fees payable under section 8 of the Emergency Powers Act, 1939, amounted to £6,483 0s. 9d. The principal items were Duplicate Ration Books £2,013 10s. 9d., Fabrics (Import Licences) £2,001 0s. 3d., and Textiles (Manufacturers' Licences and Permits) £1,040 10s. 0d. The obligation to pay prescribed fees was in general imposed by Orders made under the Emergency Powers Act, 1939, prior to the expiration of that Act on 2nd September, 1946, on and after which date such Orders as were then operative were continued in force under the terms of the Supplies and Services (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1946.

# VOTE 56.—TRANSPORT AND METEOROLOGICAL SERVICES.

### Civil Airports.

56. Expenditure incurred during the year on constructional works at Dublin, Shannon (Rineanna) and Shannon (Foynes) Airports amounted to £124,655 5s. 3d. (subhead B.5.), £289,438 4s. 5d. (subhead B.6.), and £35,614 17s. 7d. (subhead B.7.), respectively, bringing the total expenditure as at 31st March, 1947, to £491,838 11s. 4d., for Dublin Airport, £1,159,122 17s. 9d. for Shannon Airport (Rineanna), and £153,974 2s. 7d. for Shannon Airport (Foynes), exclusive of expenditure on the acquisition of land.

## Subhead B.5.—Constructional Works including Furnishing of Buildings—Dublin Airport.

57. A contract placed for the construction of hard-surfaced runways at a cost of £302,356 included provision for the labour element at a rate higher than that actually paid by the contractor for part of the time. I have asked whether in these circumstances any adjustment of the amount paid to the contractor falls to be made.

Subhead B.6.—Constructional Works including Furnishing of Buildings—Shannon Airport (Rineanna).

58. In paragraph 53 of my last report I referred to certain contracts placed on a cost plus profit basis. While certain work was again undertaken on this basis in the year under review, contracts in a fixed sum were placed for most of the major works. One of the contracts placed on the cost plus profit basis was for increased customs and catering accommodation in the temporary terminal building. The operating companies having represented that the proposed customs accommodation would be inadequate, work was stopped after it had been some time in progress. After revision of the plans building operations were resumed. I have asked whether any of the expenditure incurred prior to the alteration of the plans has proved to be fruitless.

With a view to the early completion of two fixed sum contracts of a total value of £130,359, labour was employed directly by the Department on the initial stages pending the commencement of work by the contractors, it having been agreed that the cost of such labour at the rates quoted in the tenders would be deducted from the amounts payable to the respective contractors. In connection with another fixed sum contract, the lowest tender received amounted to £41,951, but by the deletion of certain items, including top-soiling and grass surfacing for which a sum of £1,810 had been quoted but which the Department considered could be carried out more economically by the employment of direct labour, the amount of the contract was reduced to £36,425. I have inquired as to the amount expended on direct labour in these cases.

### Subhead B.7.—Constructional Works including Furnishing of Buildings at Shannon Airport (Foynes).

59. As a temporary expedient, bedrooms in the hostel built at Foynes were furnished during the year for overnight accommodation of passengers pending provision of such accommodation at Rineanna, the approximate cost being £3,600. would appear that it was anticipated that this amount, together with the running costs involved, would be recovered by way of rents receivable from the operating companies. I have asked for information as to the extent to which the accommodation was availed of by the companies, the amount of rent received, and the present position regarding the occupancy or disposal of the hostel, the expenditure on which amounted to approximately £53,000 on 31st March, 1947.

### Subhead B.15.—Catering Service—Shannon Airport.

60. Under this subhead £2,000 was provided to meet the deficit on the catering service for passengers and airport staff but, as stated in the account, no payment was made in the year under review pending clarification of the position regarding the treatment of certain items in the catering account. I have asked for further information on this matter.

### Subhead C.—Subsidy in respect of Air Services.

61. The charge to this subhead represents payments to Aer Rianta, Teoranta, under the Subsidy (Aer Rianta, Teoranta) Order, 1946 (Statutory Rules and Orders No. 146 of 1946) and the Subsidy (Aer Rianta, Teoranta) (No. 1) Order, 1947 (Statutory Rules and Orders No. 101 of 1947) to meet the estimated losses of the company and of the subsidiary company, Aer Lingus, Teoranta, on the operation of air services during the year ended 31st March, 1947. The actual losses of Aer Rianta, Teoranta, and of the subsidiary company, for the purpose of the Orders mentioned had not been determined by the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Industry and Commerce at the date of my report.

### Subhead D.-Management of Dublin Airport.

62. Under an agreement between the Minister for Industry and Commerce and Aer Rianta, Teoranta, Dublin Airport is managed by the company. The agreement provides that the profits arising in any year will be paid to the Exchequer, but that should the management costs exceed the revenue the loss as determined by the Minister in agreement with the Minister for Finance will be made good to the company. At the date of my report the amount of the loss for the year ended 31st March, 1947, had not been so determined, and the charge to the subhead, £19,220 0s. 5d., is the loss as shown in the accounts submitted by the company to the Minister.

## Subhead G.—Appropriations in Aid.

# Receipts in respect of Landing and Accommodation Fees at Airports.

63. The receipts during the year in respect of landing and accommodation fees amounted to £37,335 17s. 2d. as against an estimate of £37,500. I have inquired regarding fees outstanding on 31st March, 1947, and also regarding the assessment and collection of fees at the various airports.

Permanent records of lands, buildings, etc.

64. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer concerning the present position as regards the compilation of the register of lands and buildings under the control of the Department to which I referred in paragraph 60 of my last report.

### VOTE 57.—CHILDREN'S ALLOWANCES.

Subhead C.—Children's Allowances.

65. Section 5 (1) of the Children's Allowances (Amendment) Act, 1946, provides that a person with whom, on a date which is for him a qualifying date, three or more children who are on that date qualified children normally reside, shall be qualified for a children's allowance in respect of these children, and section 5 (2) provides that the Minister may prescribe rules for determining with whom a qualified child shall be regarded as normally residing. Under the Children's Allowances (Normal Residence) Rules, 1946, made by the Minister on the 17th April, 1946, a qualified child whose father is alive and who is resident elsewhere than with a parent or stepparent shall be regarded as normally residing with his father, and with no other person, if his father is entitled to his custody, whether solely or jointly with any other person.

Several cases were observed in which claims from relatives of children living with them and away from their parents were admitted although the fathers of these children were alive and no evidence had been produced to show that they were not entitled to the custody of the children. These claims had been rejected by the deciding officers as not complying with the normal residence rule referred to above, but were admitted on

appeal to the referee.

In two other cases in which persons other than the parents claimed children's allowances, the parents had entered into agreements entrusting the custody of the children to the claimants. The question whether a deciding officer was bound to accept such agreements as conclusive evidence that the parents were not entitled to the custody of the children was referred to the Law Officer, who advised that the person with whom a child should be regarded as normally residing for the purposes of section 5 (1) of the Children's Allowances (Amendment) Act, 1946, falls to be decided by a deciding officer, or on a reference, by one or more referees, and that the decision must be come to in accordance with the Children's Allowances (Normal Residence) Rules, 1946. One of the cases in question was decided against the claimant and the decision was upheld by the referee. In the other case, which fell to be decided subsequently, the

claim was disallowed by the deciding officer but was admitted on appeal to the referee.

I have asked whether any further action is contemplated

in the various cases mentioned.

### VOTE 59.—UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE AND UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE.

Subhead L.—Appropriations in Aid.

Receipts from County Borough and Urban Area Councils under section 26 of the Unemployment Assistance Act, 1933, as amended by the Unemployment Assistance (Amendment) Acts, 1938 and 1940.

66. The position as set out in paragraph 62 of my last report remains unchanged. The Department is still seeking to collect contributions in accordance with the legal opinion that where the rateable value of Electricity Supply Board hereditaments is greater than the amount on which, under the Electricity (Supply) (Amendment) Act, 1930, the rates payable are calculated, the higher figure was correctly included in the certificates furnished by the Commissioner of Valuation in accordance with section 5 (1) of the Act of 1940. Two local authorities, however, continue to base their payments on the lower figure, the total amount withheld up to 31st March, 1947, being over £5,100.

### VOTE 61.—POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS.

Subhead E.1.—Conveyance of Mails by Rail.

67. Reference was made in paragraph 54 of my report on the accounts for the year 1944-45 to a revision of the payment to Córas Iompair Éireann for the conveyance of letter mails by rail. The revised annual payment of £120,000 was to be subject to review in the event of any further material change in the services rendered to the Department, and in view of the restoration of passenger trains to five days per week from 6th July, 1945, and to all week days from 15th August, 1945, the company asked for an increase in the annual payment. Following negotiations it was agreed to increase the annual payment to the company to £126,000 per annum as from 6th July, 1945, the increased payment to remain in force to 31st December, 1946. Agreement was also reached on the payments to be made from 1st January, 1947, providing for the payment of varying amounts until 31st August, 1947, and for an annual payment of £104,719 as from 1st September, 1947, to continue until the services rendered shall vary materially.

# Subhead E.2.—Conveyance of Mails by Road.

68. In paragraph 63 of my last report I referred to a revision of the terms of the contract between the Department and Córas Iompair Éireann for the performance of Dublin City mail services. The revision provided, inter alia, for an increase of 45 per cent. on the basic rates payable under the contract in respect of the calendar years 1945 and 1946. As the result of further negotiations agreement was reached on the terms under which the company would operate for a period of five years from 1st January, 1947. The additional annual cost of implementing the agreement is estimated at £4,500.

## Subhead H.2.—Losses by Default, Accident, etc.

69. The losses borne on the vote for the year ended 31st March, 1947, amounted to £3,396 9s. 1d. A classified schedule of these losses is set out at page 223. At page 225 particulars are given of 26 cases in which cash shortages or misappropriations amounting to £643 6s. 71d. were discovered; the sums in question were made good and no charge to public funds was necessary.

#### Stores.

70. A test examination of the store accounts was carried

out with generally satisfactory results.

The normal working arrangements for the purchase of stores continued to be affected by the supply position. Difficulty was experienced in obtaining competitive tenders and in order to meet urgent requirements contracts were still, in a number of cases, either allocated without competition or divided between contractors on the basis of output and additional or extended contracts were placed with existing contractors. In some instances reductions in quoted prices were obtained after negotiation.

In 1944, the Department of Defence informed other Departments, including the Department of Posts and Telegraphs, that a quantity of cable, which was surplus to military needs, was available if required. Up to 1946, when the Department of Defence finally disposed of the remaining stocks to a commercial firm at £12 per ton, the Department of Posts and Telegraphs had accepted only small quantities of the cable as it considered that cable more suitable to its requirements could be acquired at a reasonable price. In 1946, however, owing to the increasing difficulty of obtaining supplies, it decided to avail of the surplus stocks of cable with the Department of Defence to meet prospective new works the inquiries for which originated only about that time. It then learned that the stocks had been disposed of and immediately took steps to re-purchase, which was effected at a price of £30 10s. per ton, the charge to the vote in respect of the transaction being £2,318.

In addition to the engineering stores shown in Appendix II as valued at £371,845 on the 31st March, 1947, engineering stores to the value of £13 were held on behalf of other Government Departments. Stores other than engineering stores held at that date were valued at £208,411, included in this amount being a sum of £32,501 in respect of stores held for other Government Departments.

#### Revenue.

71. A test examination of the accounts of the Postal, Telegraph and Telephone services was carried out with satisfactory results.

Sums due for telephone services amounting in all to £80 12s. 10d. were written off during the year as irrecoverable.

# Post Office Savings Bank Accounts.

72. The accounts of the Post Office Savings Bank for the year ended 31st December, 1946, were submitted to a test examination with satisfactory results. As in the previous year, the figure shown in the accounts in respect of the total interest credited to depositors has, for various reasons, been estimated but any necessary adjustment will be made in a subsequent year.

# Post Office Factory.

73. A test examination was applied to the accounts of the

Post Office Factory with satisfactory results.

Including works in progress on 31st March, 1947, the expenditure on manufacturing jobs during the year amounted to £30,556, expenditure on repair work (other than repairs to mechanical transport) amounted to £17,315, and expenditure on mechanical transport repairs to £3,361.

#### VOTE 63.—ARMY.

Subhead E.—Pay of Officers of Medical Service, etc.

74. By Defence Force Regulation dated 1st December, 1938, revised rates of pay for medical and dental officers appointed

subsequent to that date were introduced, the new rates being considerably lower than those in force previously. The regulation purported to apply also to officers appointed prior to that date and to provide that the pay of such officers as on 1st December, 1938, should remain unaltered until on promotion the reduced rates of pay for the higher rank would be more favourable to them.

The pay of an officer who was commissioned prior to 1st December, 1938, and who was promoted in 1940, remained unaltered on promotion as the revised rate for his new rank was less than the rate at which he was paid prior to promotion. The officer resigned in 1943 and subsequently claimed that the regulation of 1938 could not be held to apply to him and that he was entitled to receive the pre-1938 rate of pay appropriate to the higher rank held by him. Proceedings were instituted against the Ministers for Finance and Defence and by judgment of the High Court, confirmed on appeal to the Supreme Court, it was held that, on the wording of the regulation, it could not apply to officers appointed prior to 1st December, 1938, and that as it failed to withdraw, in clear and unambiguous language, entitlement to the pre-1938 rates of pay, the applicant was entitled to succeed.

The regulations governing pay and allowances provide that amounts not claimed within twelve months from the date on which they become due for payment shall be deemed to be forfeited unless the Minister otherwise determines, and in the case referred to, the claim having been made on the 11th October, 1943, the Supreme Court awarded arrears of pay to the officer with effect from 11th October, 1942. It was subsequently decided that arrears should be allowed in full to all medical and dental officers appointed prior to 1st December, 1938, and promoted after that date. The amount charged to the vote in the year under review consequent upon this decision is £23,204 12s. 11d.

### Subhead K.—Provisions and Allowances in lieu.

75. Statements have been furnished to me showing the cost of production of bread at the Curragh Bakery, and of meat at the Dublin and Curragh Abattoirs. The unit costs are as follows:

 The average price of cattle purchased for the Dublin and Curragh areas was £39 18s. 0d. and £37 16s. 0d. per head, respectively, as compared with £38 13s. 10d. and £37 6s. 11d. in the previous year, while the average production of beef per head was 681 lbs. and 646 lbs., respectively, as compared with 725 lbs. and 674 lbs.

### Subhead M.—Clothing and Equipment.

76. The sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained in March, 1946, for the purchase of 5,500 civilian suits at an estimated cost of £15,400, the requirements being calculated by reference to the number of men due to be released from service in the ensuing months, and orders were issued accordingly. Approximately 8,500 civilian suits were held in stores in October, 1947, and it appears that the accumulation of these surplus stocks was due partly to the fact that the demand for suits was greatly reduced in the later stages of demobilization, the men opting for the cash allowance in lieu, and partly to a miscalculation of the stock position in March, 1946. I have inquired regarding the circumstances in which the stock position was not correctly ascertained prior to the issue of the orders for 5,500 suits, and also regarding the disposal of the surplus stocks held.

Defence Force Regulations issued in August, 1945, provided that temporary officers to whom uniform and equipment had been issued should, on being granted permanent commissions, retain any articles of kit in their possession and should, in addition, receive a cash allowance of £45 towards the cost of providing the full scale kit prescribed by regulations, in lieu of the initial grant of £60 provided for officers who had not previously held temporary rank. Issues of uniform to temporary officers were, in general, suspended from June, 1945, in view of pending demobilization, and as appointments to permanent commissioned rank were not made until November, 1946, it was considered that the articles in the possession of the officers concerned no longer represented the value of £15 assessed when the cash allowance of £45 was fixed. The sanction of the Department of Finance was accordingly obtained for the issue of articles of uniform to the value of £15 to temporary officers who were being appointed to permanent commissioned rank. I have asked for information regarding the basis on which the value of the articles issued was assessed. Whilst issues of clothing to temporary officers were, in general, suspended in 1945, certain issues were made in 1946 as replacement of unserviceable articles became unavoidable. As it appeared that the sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained on the ground that the issues of uniform were suspended from June, 1945, I have also inquired whether any action was taken in relation to the unexpired value of the replacement issues made in 1946, either by surrender of the articles in the officers' possession or by adjustment of the cash allowances.

Articles of uniform which had been made to the individual measurements of certain temporary officers remained unissued as the officers for whom they had been purchased had been released from service, and the authority of the Department of Finance was sought for the sale of the items in question to regular officers at reduced prices. Information has been sought regarding the present position in this matter.

#### Subhead O.—General Stores.

77. A contract was placed in April, 1944, for the supply at a cost of £2,321 10s. 0a. f.o.b. English port of equipment for testing marine engines. Proposals for the cancellation of the contract were made to the contractor in December, 1945, as the plant was no longer required owing to a change in policy regarding the use of motor torpedo boats. As the plant had then been completed to the special requirements of the Department of Defence the contractor was unable to agree to cancellation and delivery was made in June, 1946. I have inquired whether any action has been taken with a view to its disposal.

#### Subhead P.—Warlike Stores.

78. The original provision under this subhead was £16,235 and this was increased by a supplementary estimate to £31,135. The expenditure amounted to £73,165 10s. 2d. and I have teen informed that the excess was due to the fact that it was not possible to forecast with any degree of accuracy the extent to which stores and accounts would be received, and that the number of accounts received towards the end of the financial year was greater than was anticipated.

Reference was made in paragraph 79 of the report on the appropriation accounts for the year 1939-40 to advance payments of approximately £44,000 which had been made to two Continental firms on contracts for the supply of certain stores and had been charged to a suspense account pending clarification of the delivery position. As stated in paragraph 70 of the report for the year 1943-44 a sum of £22,337 17s. 8d. refunded by one of the firms was applied towards clearance of the suspense account. The account has now been finally closed by the refund, during the year under review, of the sum of £21,678 by the second firm.

Advance payments amounting to £12,779 17s. 6d. made under contracts and charged against votes for previous years, in respect of stores which have not been delivered, were recovered in the year under review and have been brought to account as appropriations in aid.

# Subhead P.1.—Protection of Civil Population against Air and Gas Attack.

79. The Government decided in November, 1945, that accumulated reserves of medical stores should be maintained as a matter of post-war policy and that the stocks held by the State and by local authorities should be distributed amongst hospitals throughout the country to be used by these hospitals subject to replacement. All State-owned perishable stocks which were held in central stores or were located at certain hospitals have now been re-distributed amongst hospitals generally with the exception of items to the value of £400 3s. 10d. which had deteriorated and the disposal of which is under consideration. I was informed that as the allocations to the various hospitals were based on the hospitals' potential consumption it was not found possible to include in the re-distribution scheme the stocks held by local authorities which had been purchased with the aid of grants under the Air-raid Precautions Act, 1939, and that it was, therefore, decided that these stocks should be disposed of by the local authorities concerned. The appropriate percentage of the amounts realized will be applied in relief of the grants payable under the Act in future years. Arrangements for the re-distribution of non-perishable stores have not yet been made.

#### Subhead P.2.—Marine Service.

80. The charge to this subhead includes the sum of £207,000 in respect of the purchase of three corvettes with appropriate stores. The agreed purchase price was £210,000, the sum of £3,000 being withheld pending check of the stores supplied. I have asked for certain information regarding these stores, and also regarding liability for expenditure incurred on repairs and renovations, as the contract provided for the delivery of the vessels free of all defects affecting seaworthiness.

At the beginning of the Emergency certain fishery patrol vessels in the possession of the Department of Agriculture were taken over for defence purposes and certain sea fisheries protection duties formerly carried out by that Department were undertaken by the Department of Defence. It has now been decided that these duties shall continue permanently to be

carried out by the latter Department.

# Subhead S .- Barrack Maintenance and Minor Works.

81. The sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained for a total expenditure of £3,222 on alterations and renovations at a military barracks, the sum of £2,453 representing the cost of

portion of the work undertaken by the Corps of Engineers, and the balance of £769 the amount of the lowest tender received for that portion of the work which it was proposed to put to contract. The tenders were received in August, 1945, but it appears that no decision as to acceptance was taken. Tenders were again invited in January, 1947, when the lowest price quoted for the work was £989 8s. 11d., subject to a price variation clause. The sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained for the excess expenditure involved and the contract was placed in September, 1947. I have inquired regarding the circumstances in which the original tender was not accepted.

# Subhead U.—Compensation.

82. Payment of £1,900 together with £95 for architects' fees and £10 10s. for legal costs was made in settlement of a claim for compensation for damage caused to certain premises whilst in military occupation and I have asked for certain information concerning details of the claim.

# Subhead X.—Incidental Expenses.

83. Expenditure amounting to £3,929 7s. 2d. was incurred during the year on advertisements, etc., in connection with a publicity scheme relating to recruiting and further expenditure was incurred in the financial year 1947-48. In according sanction for the proposals the Department of Finance stipulated that tenders should be invited from advertising and publicity agents generally and as it appeared that tenders were not sought I have asked for an explanation.

# Subhead Y.3.—Army Reserve—An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil (Grants-in-Aid).

84. A considerable number of persons who had enlisted in An Fórsa during the year 1946 were under the minimum age prescribed by the relevant Defence Force Regulations and some of these persons were subsequently discharged as having been improperly enlisted. I have inquired regarding the steps taken by attesting officers to ensure that the requirements of the regulations are complied with, and also regarding the grants-in-aid paid in respect of persons improperly enlisted.

The regulations provide that members of An Fórsa who fail, without reasonable excuse, to complete the prescribed minimum training in any year shall be posted to a non-effective list, and that grants-in-aid shall not be payable in respect of persons so posted. Claims were submitted in the year under review in respect of a number of persons who, due to lack of facilities or other causes, had not completed the required training but had

not been posted as non-effective and payment of grants in these cases, which was withheld in the first instance, has been made in the financial year 1947-48, following the receipt of advice from the Law Officer on the matter. I understand that the issue of instructions on the question of eligibility of members for retention on the effective strength is under consideration.

# Subhead D.D.1.—Local Defence Force, 1941 to 1946.

85. Local Defence Force Regulations provided that on the resignation or discharge of a member all articles of clothing and equipment on issue to him should be returned to stores, and that such clothing as was regarded as serviceable should be available for re-issue. Under Emergency Powers (No. 61) Order, 1940, (Amendment and Revocation) Order, 1946, (Statutory Rules and Orders No. 28 of 1946) all persons who were members of the Force on the 31st March, 1946, were discharged as on and from that date, and the Order conferred power on any member of the Defence Forces, or of the Gárda Síochána, to recover any articles of clothing or equipment which had not been surrendered. The power so conferred was removed, as from the 2nd September, 1946, on the revocation of the Order by the Emergency Powers (No. 387) Order, 1946 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 263 of 1946), and accordingly the surrender of outstanding articles could no longer be enforced. The sanction of the Department of Finance had been obtained for the retention by all former members of the Force of greatcoats, groundsheets and boots on issue to them and authority has been sought to write-off the amount of the loss, estimated at £1,059 11s. 0d., arising from the non-surrender of other articles of clothing. In reply to an inquiry regarding the basis on which the estimated amount of the loss had been calculated I was informed that as the clothing in question had not been surrendered there was no method by which its serviceability could be determined. Owing to the length of time that the articles had been on issue, and to the fact that such clothing as had been surrendered was found to be almost entirely unserviceable, the deficient articles were assessed as being of rag value only. I understand that the position regarding deficiencies of equipment is under consideration.

# Subhead Z.—Appropriations in Aid.

86. Surplus stores to the approximate value of £229,000 were shipped to Europe for relief purposes during the year ended 31st March, 1947, and payment of approximately £198,000 was received from the vote for Alleviation of Distress, the balance

being received in the financial year 1947-48. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding the basis on which the value of certain of the stores was assessed.

# Suspense Account.

87. Payments amounting to £384 18s. 6d. in respect of pay, etc., of Reservists have been charged to a suspense account pending investigation of certain irregularities.

# Stocktaking.

88. Reference was made in paragraph 74 of my last report to arrangements which had been sanctioned for partial stock-taking in cases in which officers in charge of stores were being released from service. I have been informed that a complete stocktaking has now been concluded and that reports regarding ascertained discrepancies are in course of preparation.

# Statement of Losses.

89. Losses written off during the year are detailed in a statement appended to the account. The total is made up of :—

The corresponding figures of losses in the previous year were £276 18s. 4d., and £12,757 18s. 3d.

The amounts written off include items of £1 ls. 3d. and £41,536 4s. 3d., respectively, in respect of losses arising from the fire which occurred in December, 1943, at the Air-raid Precautions Stores Depôt to which reference was made in previous reports.

The deficiency of £17,138 9s. 5d. noted in head 8 of the Statement of Losses includes £6,691 13s. 4d. representing the loss on the re-sale at 17s. 6d. each of 5,500 small size greatcoats which had been purchased for the Local Defence Force at an average price of £2 1s. 10d. each and which were surplus to requirements. 4,500 of the greatcoats were made available for the relief of distress in Europe, the sum of £3 937 10s. 0d. being recovered from the vote for Alleviation of Distress, and the balance was sold to a charitable organization.

In accordance with the request of the Public Accounts Com-

mittee for information regarding losses during the period of the Emergency a statement has been furnished to me showing the total losses written-off in the years 1939-40 to 1946-47 inclusive. The figures are as follows:—

These figures include losses attributable to the period prior to the Emergency and further losses which occurred during the Emergency will fall to be written-off in future years.

#### VOTE 64.—ARMY PENSIONS.

Subhead E.—Wound and Disability Pensions and Gratuities, etc.

90. A final pension of £52 10s. 0d. per annum was awarded in 1939, with effect from 1st April, 1932, to an applicant under section 10 of the Army Pensions Act, 1932. The amount of £761 5s. 0d. paid in respect of the period 1st April, 1932, to 30th September, 1946, was refunded by the pensioner and payment of the pension was terminated with effect from 1st October, 1946, at the pensioner's request. The sum of £730 12s. 6d., being the amount of the refund proper to previous financial years, has been brought to account as an extra receipt payable to the Exchequer.

# Subhead I.—Military Service Pensions.

91. A pension of £10 2s. 9d. per annum, with effect from 1st October, 1934, was awarded under the Military Service Pensions Act, 1934, to a person in respect of whom a favourable report was furnished by the Referee in November, 1945. It appears that subsequent to the submission of the report evidence became available which created doubt as to the bona fides of the applicant, but the power to request the Referee to review his report in the light of the additional evidence had been removed by section 5 of the Military Service Pensions (Amendment) Act, 1945. The matter was referred to the Law Officer who advised that the Minister must issue a service certificate in accordance with the report, and the award of pension followed accordingly. Section 19 of the Military Service Pensions Act, 1934, provides, inter alia, that if a person with a view to obtaining a pension

makes false representations he shall be guilty of an offence under the section and that on conviction any pension granted by reason of such representations shall be forfeited, and I have inquired whether the question of taking any action under that section was considered.

A pension of £73 15s. 0d. per annum which had been granted under the Military Service Pensions Act, 1934, was revoked by the Minister in May, 1945, following the Referee's finding, on review, that the pensioner was not a person to whom the Act applied. It appeared that certain other awards were regarded as being affected by this case and that the question of referring these awards back to the Referee for review had been under consideration, and I have asked for information on the matter.

#### Subhead J.—Defence Forces (Pensions) Schemes, 1937 and 1940.

92. Article 32 of the Defence Forces (Pensions) Scheme, 1937, provides for the payment of gratuities to members of the Army Nursing Service whose services are terminated in certain circumstances and provision is also made for the award of gratuities to members who resign on marriage. Gratuities were paid to nursing sisters who had resigned for causes other than marriage and as it was not clear that these cases came within the scope of the scheme I have communicated with the Accounting Officer on the matter.

Short-service gratuities were paid in a number of cases to Government employees who served with the Defence Forces during the Emergency and whose period of Army service might be reckonable for the purpose of civil superannuation or gratuity. Article 24 (2) of the scheme provides that any period of service which is so reckonable shall not be regarded as qualifying service for the purpose of awards under the scheme and I have inquired regarding the adjustment of any overpayments involved.

Subhead O.—Special Allowances to Persons who served in Easter Week, and to Persons awarded Medals.

93. Section 7 of the Army Pensions Act, 1943, as amended by section 14 of the Army Pensions Act, 1946, provides for the grant of special allowances to certain persons who were members of an organization to which Part II of the Army Pensions Act, 1932, applies. The amount of the special allowance which may be granted is governed by the yearly means of the applicant, the Act providing that the amount of such yearly means shall be ascertained in accordance with the joint directions of the Ministers for Defence and Finance, and, for the purposes of this provision,

joint directions made by the two Ministers under Part VII of the Army Pensions Act, 1937, have, with certain modifications, been adopted. These directions provide that, with certain exceptions, the yearly value of any benefit or privilege enjoyed by a claimant shall be taken into account in assessing the amount of the yearly means. Cases were noted in which particular items of income had not been included in the assessments but I understand that proposals for the amendment of the joint directions are under consideration by the two Ministers.

A special allowance may be granted only to persons who are incapable of self-support by reason of age or permanent infirmity of body or mind. In view of the nature of the medical evidence furnished in the case of a person to whom a special allowance of £64 10s. 0d. per annum was awarded with effect from 27th February, 1946, I have addressed an inquiry to the Accounting

Officer on the matter.

# VOTE 67.—EMPLOYMENT AND EMERGENCY SCHEMES.

94. Provision was made under subhead F. (Urban Employment Schemes), subhead G. (Rural Employment Schemes) and subhead J. (Reconditioning or Repair of Public Roads subject to Heavy Turf Transport) for grants towards expenditure by local authorities on schemes for the provision of employment. The grants were paid in instalments, during the progress of the various works, by the Department of Local Government acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. Accounts of the expenditure were examined by Local Government Auditors whose certificates have been furnished to me in support of the charge to the vote.

The expenditure charged to subhead H. (Minor Employment Schemes) and subhead I. (Development Works in Bogs used by Landholders and other Private Producers) related to schemes administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office. The schemes were, in general, carried out on its behalf by county engineers who received imprests from the vote which were sub-

sequently accounted for in detail.

The schemes for which provision is made under subheads K. (Farm Improvements Scheme), L. (Seed Distribution Scheme) and M. (Lime Distribution Scheme) are administered by the Department of Agriculture acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. The charge to subhead K. includes grants to rated occupiers of holdings for improvement works on their farms, together with administrative expenses in connection therewith and with the schemes for the distribution of seed and lime, direct expenditure on which is charged to subheads L. and

M., respectively. Provision was made for the payment, subject to certain conditions, of grants equivalent to one-half of the approved estimated cost of the labour required for improvement works carried out, the maximum grant payable to any one applicant under any seasonal scheme being £100 and the minimum grant £5, except in Congested Districts where the minimum grant was £1. The grants paid amounted to £260,690 8s. 4d., made up as follows:—

The administrative expenses referred to above, amounting to £79,788 10s. 9d., account for the remainder of the charge to subhead K.

The scheme for which provision was made under subhead N. (Rural Improvements Scheme) was administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office mainly through the agency of county engineers. Grants were made towards the cost of works, for the joint benefit of groups of two or more farmers, consisting of accommodation roads to houses, farms and bogs, small drainage works (excluding field drains), roads which connect two county roads, and the erection or reconstruction of small bridges. Only works which were estimated to cost not less than £40 were considered. In most cases State grants of 75 per cent. of the estimated cost, excluding county engineers' fees, were approved, the balance being contributed by the beneficiaries. Cash contributions were usually collected, but contributions in kind either of materials or labour were also considered; in addition, the contributors or members of their families could be employed on the works, thus recouping themselves at least a portion of their cash contributions. The expenditure during the year on approved works amounted to £97,539 13s. 9d., against which has been, credited £19,950 2s. 3d. in respect of the cash contributions, the balance amounting to £77,589 11s. 6d. being charged to the vote.

The charge to subhead O. (Miscellaneous Schemes) relates to expenditure on works of an emergency character or for the relief of unemployment and distress. These schemes were administered either by the Special Employment Schemes Office or by other Departments acting on its behalf.

#### VOTE 72.—ALLEVIATION OF DISTRESS.

95. The expenditure incurred on the purchase of relief supplies of foodstuffs, live stock and other commodities, including freight and other miscellaneous charges, totalled £1,718,451 0s. 5d. Of this amount, £1,414,826 13s. 6d. was expended by the Department of Industry and Commerce on sugar, bacon, canned meat, dried and condensed milk, baby foods, cheese, surplus army and air-raid precautions stores, surplus textile materials, raw wool and knitting yarn, and £303,624 6s. 11d. was disbursed by the Department of Agriculture on cattle, beef and hides. greater part of the expenditure related to relief supplies shipped to the Joint Relief Commission of the International Red Cross and to its successor, the International Centre for Relief to Civilian Populations, for distribution in central, eastern and southeastern Europe, but supplies were also sent direct to France, Italy, Poland and the American Zone of Germany, and through the agency of the British Ministry of Food to Austria, Hungary and the British Zone of Germany. A quantity of bacon was also supplied to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration for distribution in Poland, Austria and the Ukraine. Payments amounting to £91,644 5s. 7d. were made to the Italian Government and to the Joint Relief Commission of the International Red Cross in respect of transport charges and other expenses incurred by them in connection with the distribution of relief supplies, and the remainder of the expenditure charged to the vote, £5,418 18s. 5d., represents recoupment to the Irish Red Cross Society of the balance of the expenditure by the Society on the purchase and shipment of relief supplies for Europe, in respect of which a payment of £38,000 was made in the year 1945-46.

As will be seen from the account, the exchequer extra receipts include £215,826 8s. 1d. received from the Government of Belgium in respect of goods supplied. The amount lodged in Brussels was the equivalent of £216,087 3s. 10d., representing the expenditure on the purchase and despatch of the goods referred to, but the subsequent transfer to this country involved a loss on exchange of £152 16s. 5d., and bank commission

amounted to £107 19s 4d.

The expenditure incurred by the Department of Industry and Commerce included sums amounting to £35,104 15s. 2d. disbursed on the purchase of approximately 160 tons of bacon which was subsequently sold on the home market. I inquired

regarding the circumstances in which these payments were charged to the vote for Alleviation of Distress and was informed that it was not until after the close of the financial year that it was decided that, owing to the supply position at home, the bacon referred to should not be exported, but that, as it was purchased within the year of account with a view to export to Europe under the scheme for the alleviation of distress, its cost was charged against the vote for that service

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—The saving is due to the number of pensioners and the average weekly rate of pension being less than was anticipated.
- B.—The excess is due to payments of arrears of salary in respect of previous years which accrued as a result of changes in certain Clerkships and to the fact that expenses in connection with Committee meetings were somewhat heavier than had been anticipated.
- D.—To this subhead are charged payments made in error, or owing to the fact that notice of revocation or reduction of pension by a Pension Committee or the Central Pension Authority did not reach the Pension Officer in time to permit the stoppage of payment. In some cases the extreme poverty of the recipients rendered recovery impracticable; in others there was satisfactory evidence to show that the orders had been cashed in good faith. In all cases the authority of the Department of Finance was obtained before the amounts were written off as irrecoverable (Department of Finance letters S. 88/2/43).

- E.—Grants made on grounds of equity in cases where, owing to causes beyond the pensioners' control, grant of pension was delayed or payment of pension was impracticable within the statutory period laid down by Section 5 (b) of the Old Age Pensions Act, 1911 (Department of Finance letters S. 88/2/45 and S.88/2/43).
- C.—The realizations under this subhead depend upon the actual amounts recovered in cash during the year under Section 9 (2) of the Old Age Pensions Act, 1908. Receipts fluctuate considerably from year to year.

#### NOTES.

(1) In addition to the cash recoveries under Subhead C. further recoveries amounting to £1,487 7s. 0d. were effected under Section 7 (3) of the Old Age Pensions Act, 1911, by withholding payment of pension orders. In two cases not reported in time for inclusion in the Appropriation Account for the year ended 31st March, 1946, sums amounting to £9 16s. 0d. were recovered in that year by withholding payment of pension orders.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—Saving due to retirements, resignations, etc., during the year and to changes in the personnel of staff. The saving was modified by the appointment of additional staff towards the end of the financial year and by increased overtime.
- D.—Expenditure on telegrams and telephones cannot be accurately estimated.
- E.2.—The post of Research Officer was vacant. Additional expenditure on farm requisites for Brownsbarn Farm modified the saving.
- E.3.—Payment of the annual contribution to the International Institute of Agriculture was not made as the Institute was in the process of dissolution. The saving was modified by additional expenditure on other items of the subhead.
- E.4.—Trials and experiments were more extensive than was contemplated when the estimate was framed.
- F.1.—Purchases of live stock, feeding stuffs and farm requisites generally for Johnstown Castle Agricultural College Farm were on a smaller scale than anticipated. General expenses at Athenry Agricultural Station, Clonakilty Agricultural Station and Chantilly Stud Farm exceeded the provision.
- F.2.—Saving due to changes in the teaching staffs and to vacancies in students' places.
- F.4.—One scholarship was vacant for part of the year. Travelling expenses of scholars and examination expenses were less than expected.
- F.8.—Excess due to the grant of Emergency bonus to the trainees at the Botanic Gardens.
- G.1.—The demand for dairy bulls did not reach expectations and the dairy bull bonus scheme was not availed of to the extent anticipated. Additional expenditure on grants to Cow Testing Associations and allowances to Supervisors resulted from an increase in the number of cows entered for test under the Cow Testing Scheme.
- G.2.—The number of thoroughbred stallions and colts obtainable was less than expected. Stock bulls, pigs and rams could not be imported owing to foot and mouth disease in Great Britain.

- G.3.—Freight charges on imports of raw materials and the manufacturing costs of artificial fertilisers were lower than anticipated and the subsidy needed was less than estimated. A reduction in the profit allowed on all fertilisers manufactured and sold in the 1945-46 season effected a further saving. Subsidy on Avoca pyrites amounted to more than expected.
- H.—The Lime Subsidy Scheme could not be availed of to the full extent provided for. For various reasons farmers were unable to take up the full supplies allocated. Normal Grants and Special Temporary Grants totalled more than estimated.
- I.1.—The principal savings were £626 on salaries due to retirements; £909 on Live Stock Schemes mainly because the demand for boars did not reach expectations and the full number of rams required was not obtainable; £178 on the provision for the erection and stocking of poultry stations owing to scarcity of equipment, and £228 on demonstration plots as some claims for seeds supplied did not come in course of payment until after the close of the year. Additional expenditure was incurred on travelling and incidentals.
- I.2.—Two bulls and two rams allowed for in the estimate were not placed. Expenditure on demonstration plots was affected by unfavourable weather conditions.
- I.3.—Casual excess.
- K.1.—Material for the Educational Exhibit cost less than anticipated. The provision made for a grant to the Irish Dairy Shorthorn Breeders' Society was not needed.
- K.2.—Casual saving.
- L.—Saving mainly due to the fact that work in connection with the arboretum at Kilmacurra could not be proceeded with.
- M.1.—The post of Veterinary Hygiene Officer was vacant for the greater part of the year.

  One meeting of the Agricultural Produce (Poultry and Rabbits) Consultative
  Council and two meetings of the Sub-Committee, for which provision was made,
  were not held. An account for advertising in connection with Food Production
  Propaganda did not come in course of payment until after the close of the year.
- M.3.—Expenditure in connection with the Department's Journal was lower than expected and accounts in respect of the printing of a volume of the Register of Pure-bred Dairy Cattle and bound volumes of leaflets did not come in course of payment.
- M.4.—The demand for loans for the purchase of stallions and bulls was not as high as anticipated. No applications were received for loans for the erection of poultry houses, corn mills and silos, or for advances for the improvement of flax scutch mills. There was little demand for loans for the purchase of poultry equipment owing to the scarcity of materials.
- M.6.—No claim was made by the Agricultural Credit Corporation in respect of administrative expenses.
- M.7.—The Agricultural Production Consultative Council did not meet during the year. The expenditure incurred under this subhead was in respect of a meeting held towards the end of the year 1945-46.
- M.9.—The saving was mainly on salaries and travelling expenses and was due to absences on sick leave during the year, and to vacancies for portion of the year following resignations.
- M.10.—The quantity of potatoes purchased was smaller than was anticipated when the estimate was framed.
- N.1.—Five vacancies for Ship Inspectors at the smaller ports remained unfilled and temporary assistance was not required to the extent anticipated. The saving was modified by additional expenditure on travelling and on the replacement of worn-out uniforms.
- N.2.—The number of animals slaughtered under the Bovine Tuberculosis Order was lower than expected.

- N.3.—A saving on salaries resulted from the resignation of the Veterinary Inspector and his replacement by an officer at a lower point in the scale. Travelling was not so extensive as anticipated. No meeting of the Consultative Council was held during the year.
- N.4.—Excess mainly due to additional travelling caused by an increase in the number of applications for licences for bulls.
- O.1.—The inspectorial staff found it necessary to travel more than expected. The excess was modified by savings on other items.
- O.2.—Savings on salaries and travelling expenses were due to vacancies on the inspectorial staff. Laboratory equipment could not be procured and casual labour at ports, cold stores and railway stations was not required to the extent anticipated. No meeting of the Dairy Produce Consultative Council was held during the year and the number of apprentices for training in cheesemaking was less than expected.
- O.3.—Casual excess.
- O.4.—A saving on the provision for salaries of whole-time Veterinary Examiners due to vacancies for the whole or part of the year was modified by the necessity for employing part-time Veterinary Examiners to a greater extent than anticipated. One post of Temporary Lay Inspector was vacant for the whole year and two for part of the year. The volume of travelling required was less than expected.
- O:5.—The scheme for the assembly of stocks of spring seed wheat was discontinued this year and the provision made for the payment of subsidy on imported high-class spring seed wheat could not be utilised. The saving was modified by additional expenditure on salaries and travelling due to the appointment of temporary Cereals Inspectors in connection with barley inspections.
- O.6.—The number of unemployed allotment holders was lower than anticipated and the services of Allotment Instructors were not required to the full extent for which provision was made.
- O.7.—Savings were mostly on salaries due to a vacancy on the inspectorial staff for part of the year and on travelling expenses owing to a decrease in the acreage under flax.
- O.9.—Expenditure in connection with the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts was restricted owing to rationing.
- O.10.—The number of holdings on which it was found necessary to enter was lower than anticipated. Additional expenditure on wages due to the necessity for retaining the services of Temporary Tillage Supervisors for a longer period than estimated modified the saving.
- Q.—The increases in remuneration for which this subhead provided could not be paid in certain cases until after the close of the year.

1. Receipts from seed testing fees and sales of pure line seed, etc., increased more than expected.

2. Surplus mainly due to receipts from sales of live stock at Brownsbarn Farm which

were not allowed for in the estimate.

3. Receipts from sales of live stock and produce at the Department's farms are difficult to forecast as they depend upon the numbers and quantities available for disposal and the prices obtainable.

4. Receipts from students' fees vary according to the number of students at the College and amounted to less than anticipated. The deficiency was partly offset by increased

receipts from fees for agglutination, etc., tests.
5. and 6. The estimates of receipts from sales of bulls, colts, etc., were not fully realised as the anticipated purchases of live stock could not be made during the year.

17. Receipts from licences, etc., increased more than was anticipated.

- 18. Surplus mainly due to registered wholesalers acquiring a greater quantity of eggs than was expected.
  - 21. (a) (1) Exporters' permit fees for the months of November and December, 1946, and January, 1947, could not be collected until after the close of the financial year.
    - (2) Receipts from licences, etc., did not decrease to the extent anticipated. (3) Exports of canned meat exceeded expectations and receipts from inspec-

tion fees were correspondingly higher.

(b) Efforts to collect outstanding levy were more successful than expected. 23. The number of holdings which had to be entered on and cultivated was lower than anticipated.

24. Miscellaneous receipts are variable.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- B.—The volume of travelling found necessary was greater than expected.
- C.—Excess due to unforeseen expenditure in connection with arrangements for the export of salmon.
- D.—The estimate was as close as was practicable.
- E.1.—One post of collector of fishery statistics remained unfilled during the year.

- E.2.—Provision was made for the attendance of one delegate at the annual meeting at Stockholm of the International Council for the Study of the Sea but two delegates attended. The additional cost of air travel contributed to the excess.
- E.3.—The issue of pay to officers and ratings of the fishery cruisers "Muirchu" and "Fort Rannoch" for the period between the termination of army service and the effective dates of their discharge from the public service caused the excess on this subhead.
- F.1.—The amount required to meet the statutory claims of local authorities under Section 13 of the Fisheries Act, 1925, was less than expected. Expenditure out of the provision for the improvement of fish passes was affected by adverse weather conditions and scarcity of materials. Payments to Boards of Conservators under the Fisheries (Tidal Waters) Acts, 1934 and 1939, were less than estimated. The saving on the subhead was modified by the payment of a special grant to a Board of Conservators.
- F.2.—Work on the rehabilitation of Glenties Fish Hatchery was curtailed by adverse weather conditions, and there was a small saving on the provision for Lismore Hatchery. The postponement of contemplated activities at Lough, Owel Hatchery owing to difficulty in obtaining equipment also caused a saving.
- F.4.—Scientific equipment needed could not be procured.
- F.5.—A claim for compensation under Section 67 of the Fisheries Act, 1939, was settled at a lower figure than estimated. No inquiry into the affairs of Boards of Conservators was found necessary during the year and the provision made was not needed.
- G.2. and G.3.—Advances from these subheads were not required by the Sea Fisheries Association as the continuation of emergency conditions hampered development schemes and supplies of marine engines and fishing gear were virtually impossible to procure.

A.—Saving due to delay in filling vacancies offset to some extent by the increase caused by the consolidation of salaries and bonus on a higher cost of living index figure.

- A .- Saving due to staff vacancies.
- B.—Excess mainly due to the Provisional International Civil Aviation Organisation
  Conferences at Montreal and Paris having lasted longer than was anticipated
  with consequent increased subsistence expenses of delegates.
- C.1.—Excess mainly due to expenditure incurred on the insurance of certain exhibits stored in the U.S.A. since the close of the New York World Fair and carriage on their return to this country for both of which provision had not been made (Department of Finance minute S. 200/7/37).
- C.2.—Excess mainly due to the expenses of the Garda Siochana on the distribution and collection of census forms being greater than was anticipated.
- D.—Excess due to increased telephone services in the offices of the Department.
- E.—Closer estimation was not practicable.
- F. and G.—These estimates are necessarily of a conjectural nature.
- H.—The claims from the Vocational Education Committees for fees due did not come in course of payment within the year of this Account.
- J.2.—Saving due to the number of delegates travelling to the Montreal Conference being less than was anticipated. In addition the expenses claims of four of the delegates were under examination at the close of this Account.

- K.—Excess due to claims outstanding from the prior year coming in course of payment in this financial year.
- L.—Composed of savings on flour subsidy (approximately £65,000), batch bread subsidy (approximately £38,500) and tea subsidy (approximately £2,000), modified by excess subsidy payments on wheatenmeal (approximately £9,000). Closer estimation was impracticable in regard to flour owing to difficulties in ascertaining the wheat supply position, whilst the savings on batch bread and tea subsidies were due, as regards the former to certain accounts being under examination at the close of this Account, and as regards the latter to the provisions for tea subsidy not being required. The excess on the wheatenmeal subsidy was due to an increase in the quantity on which subsidy was payable as compared with previous years.
- N.—It was not possible to make the anticipated progress with the examination of the Local Authorities' turf accounts on which payments from the subhead are based.
- O.—Closer estimation was not practicable.
- P.2.—No prospecting was undertaken in the course of the year.
- P.3.—Certain compensation claims for which provision was made did not mature for payment within the year.
- P.4.—Owing to the delay in obtaining equipment, work on the exploration of gypsum deposits could not be started as early as was anticipated. In addition drilling for phosphorite in Clare cost less than was estimated.
- Q.1. Q.2. Q.3. Q.4. Q.5. and Q.6.—The Industrial Research Council ceased to function during the financial year.
- R.1.—The saving is mainly attributable to reduced production during the year owing to unfavourable weather conditions at the commencement of the season.
- R.4.—The provision was not required owing to the enactment on 1st June, 1946, of the Turf Development Bill; the money required being advanced under Section 53 of the Turf Development Act, 1946.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.1.—The provision made to meet liability for an overhaul of the Galway Bay Steamboat Company's vessel "Dun Aengus," which operates the Galway-Aran service, was slightly in excess of the amount required.
- A.2.—The full provision was not required as the barges were sold during the year.
- A.3.—The saving is mainly attributable to the facts that preliminary work in connection with the construction and improvement of harbours had not reached the stage at which grants could be made and that, due to the lack of equipment, dredging operations at certain harbours could not be carried out.
- B.1.—Saving due to staff vacancies.
- B.2.—A number of claims did not mature for payment before the close of the financial year.
- B.3.—Saving mainly due to the abandonment of the acquisition of lands for the proposed village site at Firgrove and to legal difficulties in the matter of acquisition of lands at Rineanna.
- B.4.—Excess due to increased rates levied by the Dublin and Clare County Councils.
- B.5.—Expenditure on the construction of runways was less than was anticipated owing to the progress of the work being retarded by severe weather. In addition it was not possible to commence certain constructional work during the year.
- B.6.—Saving attributable to the fact that the provision for constructional works in connection with the Permanent Terminal Building and the proposed settlement at Firgrove was not utilised.
- B.7.—The payments made in respect of engineering equipment obtained through the British Air Ministry and in the U.S.A. during the years 1943 to 1945, were considerably more than was anticipated.

### B.8.—Casual variation.

- B.9.—The excess is attributable to the carrying out at Shannon Airport of additional maintenance works necessitated by increased traffic at the Airport, and to payment of labourers' wages in excess of the rates for which provision was made.
- B.10—Expenditure on engineering maintenance was less than anticipated as due to the decrease in the volume of seaplane traffic at this Airport, certain equipment no longer required for operational purposes was taken into store.

- B.11.—The provision for lighting at the Temporary Terminal Building was based on the anticipated payment of twelve months accounts, but during the year electricity accounts for fourteen months matured for payment.
- B.12.—The provision made for expenditure under this subhead was based on the anticipation that the use of Foynes as a seaplane base would be availed of to a greater extent than proved to be the case.
- B.13.—Excess due partly to the increase of flying activities at Shannon Airport and partly to the fact that accounts for five quarters came in course of payment during the year.
- B.14.—Saving due to an account remaining under examination at the close of the year of this Account.
- B.15.—The loss incurred was much smaller than had been provided for in the estimate, and no payment was made pending clarification of the position regarding the treatment of certain items in the catering account.
- B.16.—Expenditure on the purchase of uniforms was less than was anticipated.
- B.17.—The loss on the sale of transformers, disposed of on the abandonment of proposed dredging operations at Shannon Airport (Rineanna), was less than was anticipated.
- C.—The amount required in respect of depreciation of aircraft was less than anticipated.
- D.—The provision for loss on the operation of the Airport was not required in full due to the fact that expenditure on salaries and wages was less than was anticipated.
- E.1.—Saving due to delay in recruitment of Junior Meteorological Assistants and Meteorological Officer Cadets.
- E.2.—The provision made to meet expenditure by the Director of the Meteorological Services in respect of attendance at International Conferences proved inadequate.
- E.3.—The provision for the payment of grants to officers of the Meteorological Services at Shannon Airport for the purchase of uniforms was not utilised.
- E.4.—Expenditure on telephones and telegrams was less than was anticipated due to continued delay in establishing additional weather reporting stations.
- E.5.—A considerable portion of the equipment provided for was unobtainable due to shortage of supplies.

- A.—Saving was due to vacancies in staff and to the fact that the provision for additional staff was not used, offset by the increase consequent on the consolidation of salaries.

- C.—The expenditure on uniforms and miscellaneous items was less than anticipated and no medals for gallantry at sea were awarded.
- D.—No formal inquiries were held.
- F.—Following the cessation of hostilities the quantity of wreck dealt with by Receivers was considerably less than was anticipated. The costs incurred were less than the relevant receipts under Subhead L (Appropriations in Aid).
- G.—There were no cases in which the costs of repatriation fell to be borne.
- H.—No acquisitions were made.
- I.1. and I.2.—No ships were lost during the year as a result of belligerent action. The expenditure under Subhead I.1. relates to outstanding items from previous years.
- I.3.—The excess is attributable to the award to an injured seaman of a pension with retrospective effect from the year 1941.
- I.4.—The expenditure was incurred in the treatment and maintenance in hospital of the injured seaman referred to under Subhead I.3. above and was less than was anticipated.
- I.5.—The excess arose from delay in the submission of a claim for repayment of an allowance paid abroad on behalf of this Department.
- J.—Certain claims for grants were held over pending the outcome of inquiries.
- K.1.—The excess was caused by an increase in the rate of payments made to members of volunteer crews for attendance at exercises offset to some extent by savings due to staff vacancies over portion of the year.
- K.2.—The posts of Superintendents remained unfilled for part of the year with a consequent saving of the travelling expenses involved.
- K.3.—The excess was caused by the fact that on the withdrawal of the military look-out posts the Department of Defence ceased to share the cost of these telephones.

- K.4.—Unforeseen expenditure on the advertising of vacant posts and abnormal expenditure on telegrams in connection with drifting mines caused this excess.
- K.5.—The sum represents the cost of private telephone calls made on an official telephone by a member of the Coast Life Saving Service, which proved irrecoverable after the member's retirement and subsequent death (Department of Finance minute S.53/7/46).

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

A.1.—The saving was due to vacancies unfilled for portion of the year (£1,485) and to changes in personnel (£1,300); offset by increased expenditure due to alterations in establishment (£945).

The salary of the Chief Medical Officer is charged to this subhead. This Officer performs certain duties also for other Government Departments, including the Civil Service Commission. The value of these services is estimated to be one-half of his salary.

- A.2.—The saving was due to anticipated salary scale increases which did not materialize.
- A.3.—The saving was due to anticipated salary scale increases which did not materialize (£10,000) and to the difficulty in estimating expenditure owing to changes in personnel and in salary and wage rates.
- A.4.—The saving was due to the amount chargeable to telephone capital funds in respect of the value of stores handled being greater than anticipated (£3,760) and to certain works not having been carried out in the Post Office Factory in the year (£1,030).
- AA.—The excess was due to the number of money orders and postal orders issued for payment abroad being greater than anticipated.
- B.—The excess was due to the restoration of certain travelling post office services and to increased cost of casual conveyances.
- BB .- A casual variation.
- C.—The excess was due to increased charges for electricity, gas and water (£2,940); offset by expenditure on rates being less than anticipated.
- D.—The saving was due to anticipated expenditure on certain sites not having materialized.
- E.1.—A casual variation.
- E.2.—The excess was due to increased payments to Mail Car contractors to meet enhanced operating costs and to the introduction of new road services.

- E.3.—The saving was mainly due to curtailment of services during inclement weather.
- E.4.—The saving was mainly due to anticipated increased frequency of the Cross-Channel packet services not having materialized.
- E.5.—The saving was due to anticipated claims not materializing for payment within the year.
- F.—The excess was due to increased telegraphic traffic.
- G.1.—The saving was due to inability to obtain motor vehicles (£9,915) and bicycles (£6,820) and to a reduction in private bicycle allowances (£550); offset by increased purchases of mail bags (£7,800) and of teleprinter paper for airport services (£3,960). The expenditure includes an ex-gratia payment of £14 1s. 3d. in respect of increased prices of goods supplied (Department of Finance letter S. 9/3/40).
- G.2.—The saving was due to difficulty in obtaining materials required (£1,000) and to the earlier repayment of made-up garments issued to other Government Departments (£2,160). The expenditure includes ex-gratia payments amounting to £77 0s. 8d. in respect of increased prices of goods supplied (Department of Finance letter S. 9/13/39).
- G.3.—The saving was due to delay in delivery of, and inability to obtain, supplies (£4,895); offset by increased prices of stamped stationery (£350).
- H.1.—The excess was mainly due to fees payable to counsel being greater than anticipated.
- H.2.—Expenditure under this subhead cannot be accurately estimated. A classified schedule of losses is shown on page 223. The loss to public funds is reduced by £9 15s. 3d. on account of unpaid wages, etc., due to dismissed, etc., officers.
- H.3.—A casual variation. Expenditure under this subhead includes costs, witnesses' expenses, etc., in workmen's compensation, etc., cases (£58 7s. 0d.) (Department of Finance letters P. 7/50/46, P. 7/53/45, P. 7/7/42 and P. 7/47/45); medical and hospital expenses, etc., incurred in connection with accidents on duty, etc., (£51 2s. 7d.) (Department of Finance letters E. 109/3/43, E. 109/41/41, P. 7/19/44, P. 7/2/46, P. 7/19/46, E. 100/4/42, E. 104/16/37 and E. 104/6/39); cost of brochures for sets of postage stamps for display at Irish Legation Offices abroad, etc. (£125) (Department of Finance letter S. 41/18/32); cost of mounting sixteen sets of postage stamps for presentation purposes (£1) (Department of Finance letter S. 41/18/32). In addition, an ex-gratia payment of £9 9s. 0d. (Department of Finance letter S. 48/2/46) was made to a member of the public in respect of legal costs incurred in connection with an accident involving an official motor vehicle, and an amount of £2 4s. 0d. was paid in respect of a window accidentally broken by an officer on telegraph delivery duty.
- I.1.—The saving was due to credits in respect of telephone capital works being greater than was anticipated.
- I.2.—The excess was due to increased expenditure on travelling necessitated by an expanded programme of works and by storm repair works.
- K .- A casual variation.
- L.1.—This subhead provides for this Government's share of the cost of repairs to Anglo-Irish submarine cables, the extent of which cannot be accurately foreseen.
- L.2. and L.3.—Casual variations.
- L.4.—The excess was mainly due to expenditure on electric light and power being greater than anticipated.
- L.5.—The excess was due to increased expenditure on advertising for wayleaves. Expenditure under this subhead includes ex-gratia payments of £40 (Department of Finance letter S. 48/2/46) and £7 made to members of the public in settlement of all claims for injuries, etc., resulting from accidents involving official motor vehicles.

- N.1.—The saving was mainly due to additional allowances and death, etc., gratuities being less than anticipated.
- N.2.—A casual variation.
- N.3.—The saving was due to the cost-of-living figure for certain retired officials being less than anticipated.
- Q.1.—The saving was due to less labour being required for a restricted programme of construction works.
- Q.2.—The saving was due to difficulty in obtaining equipment.
- Q.3.—The excess was mainly due to unforeseen expenditure incurred by officers travelling to International Conferences.

The total number of money orders and postal orders issued during the year was 6,511,000 amounting to a sum of £10,130,000. The total number of parcels dealt with was approximately 9,712,000. The total cash, etc., remittances dealt with by Postmasters, etc., during the year was £39,474,000. The total number of Savings Bank deposits and withdrawals during the year was 1,616,000, and the total amount involved was approximately £16,413,000.

The following cases of loss involved no charge on public funds as the amounts were made good in each instance:—

- A.—Due to unavoidable delays in filling vacancies caused by resignations.
- B.—The amount of travelling was less than anticipated.
- C.—The provision made for advertisements was not required.
- D. and E.—Casual variations.
- F.—Savings were mainly due to unavoidable delays in the commencement of schemes, to abnormal weather which retarded the progress of the works, and to unforeseen delays and difficulties in the acquisition of sites for certain works.

- M.—Lack of transport and suitable fuel restricted operations.

- O.—The subhead is intended to provide for works of an urgent character which in most cases cannot be foreseen when the estimate is being framed.
