ACCOUNTS OF THE PUBLIC SERVICES, 1947-48.

REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER AND AUDITOR-GENERAL.

GENERAL.

Out-turn of the Year.

1. The gross estimates for public services for the financial year 1947–48, as shown by the summary on page xli., amounted to £66,976,796, and the gross expenditure to £61,810,869 5s. 8d. Appropriations in aid were estimated at £2,792,394, and the amount realized was £2,892,603 16s. 2d., but on some votes the estimated receipts were not realized and the actual amount applied in aid of expenditure was £2,776,591 0s. 3d., the balance falling to be surrendered.

The total amount to be surrendered is £5,268,658 12s. 0d.,

which is arrived at as follows:-

Excluding £2,522 1s. 6d. for which an excess vote will be required (see paragraph 2 below), the expenditure was £61,808,347 4s. 2d., falling short of the estimate of £66,976,796 by £5,168,448 15s. 10d.; the latter figure is reduced by deficiencies of appropriations in aid on certain votes amounting to £15,802 19s. 9d., leaving a net saving of

Excess Vote.

2. Expenditure amounting to £2,522 ls. 6d. over and above the provision made by the Oireachtas has been incurred on vote No. 53, Forestry, and will require an excess vote (see also paragraph 48 of this report).

Stock and Store Accounts.

3. The stock and store accounts of the Departments have been examined. The results are satisfactory, with some exceptions which are referred to in the paragraphs relating to the votes of the Departments concerned.

Surrender of Balances on 1946-47 Votes.

4. The balances to be surrendered out of votes for the public services for 1946–47 amounted to £3,183,998 0s. 1d. I hereby certify that these balances have been duly surrendered to the Exchequer.

Foreign Exchange Account.

5. The Foreign Exchange Account established under the provisions of section 49 of the Finance Act, 1941, has been examined for the year ended 31st March, 1948. I certify that, in my opinion, the operations and transactions coming within the purview of such examination have been conducted and effected in accordance with the statutory provisions.

VOTE 6.—OFFICE OF THE REVENUE COMMISSIONERS.

Revenue Account.

6. A test examination of the Revenue Account has been carried out with satisfactory results.

Extra-statutory Repayments of Customs and Excise Duties.

7. Extra-statutory repayments of Customs duties and of Excise duties amounting to £4,208 14s. 5d. and £1,151 18s. 4d., respectively, were made during the year.

Remissions.

8. I have been furnished with a schedule of the several cases involving a loss of £50 and upwards in which claims for duty under the Revenue Acts were remitted during the year ended 31st March, 1948, without statutory authority, from motives of compassion or equity arising out of particular circumstances in individual cases. The reasons given for remission appear to be satisfactory. The total amount shown in the schedule is £1,991 7s. 6d., as compared with £4,797 5s. 10d. in the previous year. Of the total, £1,354 15s. 4d. has been remitted in respect of Income Tax. £831 16s. 4d. related to eight cases in which the assessed parties died insolvent and recovery was impossible, and £522 19s. 0d. related to three cases in which assessments were raised but subsequent evidence revealed no real liability. The remissions also include sums in respect of interest on Estate, Legacy and Succession duties amounting to £636 12s. 2d.

The above figures do not include amounts passed as irrecoverable for various reasons and amounts written off under composition settlements.

VOTE 7.—OLD AGE PENSIONS.

Subhead C.—Grants towards the provision of Additional Cash Allowances.

9. As stated in the account, the charge to this subhead includes a sum of £3,438 0s. 3d., being the proportion estimated to be proper to this vote of certain payments on foot of allowances paid in prior years by public assistance authorities. The allowances had been paid to certain Old Age Pensioners, Blind Pensioners, and recipients of National Health disablement benefit, and exact apportionment of the expenditure between the two votes concerned—vote 7, Old Age Pensions and vote 44, National Health Insurance—would have involved considerable With the concurrence of the Department of Finance the amount appropriate to each of these votes was estimated, and in the circumstances I have admitted the charges.

VOTE 9.—OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Insurance of Workmen.

10. As stated in a note to the account, sums amounting to £15,611 6s. 10d. expended in prior years on compensation, etc., in respect of claims arising out of accident risks which had been covered by policies of insurance with the Irish Employers' Mutual Insurance Association, Limited, now in liquidation, and also a sum of £6,017 4s. 0d., being portion of the premium paid for the year 1938-39, remain charged to a suspense account pending settlement of the Commissioners' claim against the Liquidator. Sums amounting to £1,908 18s. 0d. which would otherwise have been payable to the Association under the policies have been retained by the Comm ssioners as a set-off against their claim. A Court Order was granted in July, 1947, to the Liquidator for payment of £5 each by contributories who had not already paid. In reply to a recent inquiry I have been informed that following on the Court Order a form of Notice for service on the contributories has been settled by Counsel and will shortly be issued, and also that the sum to be offered by the underwriters in settlement of the claim against them is still undecided.

VOTE 10.—PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

Subhead A.—Purchase of Sites and Buildings.

11. The charge to this subhead includes £24,675, being the purchase price of a property in County Dublin which was acquired in connection with proposals for the extension of the

Broadcasting Service, but I understand that it is not proposed to proceed at present with the scheme. The lands are subject to an annual rent of £103 2s. 0d. and a tithe rent charge of £1 12s. 0d. Receipts from grazing rents during the year amounting to £93 5s. 7d. have been credited to subhead K.—Appropriations in Aid.

Subhead B.—New Works, Alterations and Additions.

No. 186.—Urgent and Unforeseen Works.

12. Owing to the scarcity during the winter of 1946-47 of solid fuels suitable for consumption in the central heating installations of Government establishments, approval was obtained for the conversion of plants to oil burning at an estimated expenditure of £45,000. The Commissioners of Public Works had been advised that at ruling prices oil was more economical than solid fuels. and that its use would also possess certain technical advantages. Oil burning equipment was installed in four buildings and contracts were entered into in connection with thirty-two others. but owing to delay in the delivery of equipment by the contractors the change over to oil burning had not been completed by December, 1947, when a shortage of certain classes of fuel oil was reported. It was then ascertained that supplies were likely to be scarce for several years, and it was decided not to proceed further with the work of conversion. As shown in the account, expenditure amounting to £11,054 18s. 6d. was incurred during the year on building work, the supply and installation of oil burning equipment, and the provision and erection of oil storage tanks. In addition, storage tanks valued at £1,137 14s. 0d., which were surplus to the requirements of the Department of Defence, were taken over. penditure will arise in respect of commitments which did not mature for payment during the year. It is understood that arrangements have been made to cancel as far as possible further deliveries of equipment from contractors.

Two barges valued at £500, which formed part of dredging plant acquired by the Commissioners, were lost owing to rough weather while being towed from Dundalk to Dublin. As it was not found possible to secure insurance cover for the hazards of the voyage, and no blame was attached to the persons in charge of the vessels, the Department of Finance sanctioned the write-off

of the value of the barges.

Subhead F.-Fuel, Light, Water, Cleaning, etc.

13. A contract was placed in August, 1947, for the supply of 550 tons of turf at 34s. per ton (plus 11d. per ton for ricking) to a preparatory college. The agreement with the contractor stipulated that the weight of each load should be guaranteed

and that test weights might be taken. The contractor disputed one of these test weights, and refused to make further deliveries, having delivered only eight loads. In order to maintain the heating of the college an immediate purchase of $36\frac{1}{2}$ tons of turf was made at a cost of £80, and a second contract was placed in November, 1947, for the supply of turf at a price of 55s. per ton, including ricking. As noted in the account, the additional expenditure falling on public funds through the failure of the original contractor to complete his contract amounted to £495 12s. 6d.

Subhead K.—Appropriations in Aid.

14. A statement showing the results of tillage operations at the Bourn Vincent Memorial Park during the year has been furnished to me. The greater portion of the produce of the Park, valued at £2,747, was retained for feeding and seeding purposes, the amount credited to this subhead in respect of sales being £195 8s. 3d. No other tillage operations were undertaken by the Commissioners during the year.

Rents Receivable.

15. Arrears of rents due to the Commissioners on 31st March, 1948, amounted to £2,595 0s. 8d. as compared with £4,097 19s. 11d. on 31st March, 1947. From statements furnished to me with the appropriation account it appears that of these arrears sums amounting to £1,962 0s. 8d. have been recovered subsequent to 31st March, 1948, and £147 was considered bad or doubtful.

Haulbowline Dockyard.

16. Provision was made in the estimate for the expenses of Haulbowline Dockyard which in former years were provided for in a separate vote. The administration of the Dockyard was transferred to the Department of Defence from 1st July, 1947, and expenditure and receipts arising since that date have been included in the account of the vote for Defence (No. 63). The value of materials and plant transferred was assessed at £100,000.

VOTE 11.—EMPLOYMENT AND EMERGENCY SCHEMES.

17. Provision was made under subhead F. (Urban Employment Schemes), subhead G. (Rural Employment Schemes) and subhead J. (Reconditioning or Repair of Public Roads subject to Heavy Turf Transport) for grants towards expenditure by local authorities on schemes for the provision of employment. The grants were paid in instalments, during the progress of the various works, by the Department of Local Government acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. Accounts

of the expenditure were examined by Local Government Auditors whose certificates have been furnished to me in support of the

charge to the vote.

The expenditure charged to subhead H. (Minor Employment Schemes) and subhead I. (Development Works in Bogs used by Landholders and other Private Producers) related to schemes administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office. The schemes were in general carried out on its behalf by county engineers who received imprests from the vote which were sub-

sequently accounted for in detail.

The schemes for which provision is made under subheads K. (Farm Improvements Scheme), L. (Seed Distribution Scheme) and M. (Lime Distribution Scheme) are administered by the Department of Agriculture acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. The charge to subhead K. includes grants to rated occupiers of holdings for improvement works on their farms, together with administrative expenses in connection therewith and with the schemes for the distribution of seed and lime, direct expenditure on which is charged to subheads L. and M., respectively. Provision was made for the payment, subject to certain conditions, of grants equivalent to one-half of the approved estimated cost of the labour required for improvement works carried out, the maximum grant payable to any one applicant under any seasonal scheme being £100 and the minimum grant £5, except in Congested Districts where the minimum grant was £1. The grants paid amounted to £252,004 6s. 7d., made up as follows:-

The administrative expenses referred to above, amounting to £95,650 15s. 8d., account for the remainder of the charge to subhead K.

The scheme for which provision was made under subhead N. (Rural Improvements Scheme) was administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office mainly through the agency of

county engineers. Grants were made towards the cost of works for the joint benefit of groups of two or more farmers, consisting of accommodation roads to houses, farms and bogs, small drainage works (excluding field drains), roads which connect two county roads, and the erection or reconstruction of small bridges. Only works which were estimated to cost not less than £40 were considered. In most cases State grants of 75 per cent. of the estimated cost, excluding county engineers' fees, were approved, the balance being contributed by the beneficiaries. Contributions in cash were usually collected, but contributions in kind either of materials or labour were also considered; in addition the contributors or members of their families could be employed on the works, thus recouping themselves at least a portion of their cash contributions. The expenditure during the year on approved works amounted to £150,668 7s. 8d. against which has been credited £33,147 0s. 11d. in respect of the cash contributions. the balance amounting to £117,521 6s. 9d. being charged to the vote.

The charge to subhead O. (Miscellaneous Schemes) relates to expenditure on works of an emergency character or for the relief of unemployment and distress. These schemes were administered either by the Special Employment Schemes Office or by other Departments acting on its behalf.

VOTE 16.—SUPERANNUATION AND RETIRED ALLOWANCES.

18. In paragraph 15 of my report on the accounts for the year 1945-46 I stated that a number of ex-Civil Servants, who were in receipt of compensation allowances under Article 10 of the Treaty of 6th December, 1921, were re-employed in situations in Public Departments in circumstances which would have required the abatement of their compensation allowances but for the fact that prior to the commencement of their reemployment the operation of the Civil Service (Transferred Officers) Compensation Act, 1929, had been suspended by Emergency Powers (No. 30) Order, 1940, (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 176 of 1940). This Order has been revoked by Emergency Powers (No. 30) Order, 1940 (Revocation) Order 1947, (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 414 of 1947) and the Civil Service (Transferred Officers) Compensation Act, 1929, accordingly, again operative. The cases of the ex-Civil Servants in question have been re-examined in the light of the provisions of section 16 of the Act and abatement of the compensation allowances has been effected where warranted.

The compensation allowances payable to a number of exmembers of the Dublin Metropolitan Police who retired under Article 10 of the Treaty of 6th December, 1921, and who were subsequently re-employed in situations as defined by Article 17 (1) of the Dublin Metropolitan Police Pensions Order, 1922, were

suspended or abated for various periods between 1924 and 1945. The Attorney General advised that the suspension or abatement of these allowances could not be supported, and accordingly sums amounting to £2,897 2s. 2d. have been repaid to the ex-members concerned in the financial years 1946–47 and 1947–48.

VOTE 29.—AGRICULTURE.

Subhead G.3.—Fertilisers Subsidies.

19. As in previous years, the subsidy payable to manufacturers of artificial fertilisers was assessed by reference to accounts which were certified by the auditors of the concerns. For the 1946–47 fertiliser season, a profit at the rate of 6s. per ton of fertilisers manufactured and sold was approved, as compared with 10s. per ton and 8s. per ton for the seasons 1944–45 and 1945–46, respectively. The accounts for the 1946–47 season showed that a subsidy of £17,770 2s. 7d. was required to bring the profit earned up to the figure authorized, and this amount was accordingly paid to the manufacturers and is included in the charge to this subhead.

The balance of the expenditure relates to payments on account, totalling £1,287 10s. 0d., made to two concerns in respect of

superphosphate imported from Holland.

G.4.—Improvement of Poultry and Egg Production.

20. A sum of £300 was included in a supplementary estimate for the training of personnel in connection with the Department's scheme for the reorganisation and expansion of the egg and poultry industry. Expenditure to 31st March, 1948, amounted to £96 8s. 6d., representing allowances at the rate of £3 per week paid to nineteen trainees to cover the cost of their living expenses while under training at selected commercial hatcheries.

Subhead H.—Grants to County Committees of Agriculture.

21. The charge to this subhead comprises normal grant amounting to £135,632 10s. 0d., special temporary grant totalling £3,095, and payments amounting to £43,652 10s. 5d. for the purpose of supplementing committees' expenditure on the pro-

vision of lime for agricultural purposes.

The normal grant of £135,632 10s. 0d. includes a sum of £73,142, approximately equivalent to the proceeds of the agricultural rate of 2d. in the £ levied under the Agriculture Act, 1931, and extra grants, amounting to £62,490 10s. 0d., equivalent to the amount of the income of committees from rates in excess of the statutory minimum 2d. rate.

Subhead I.4.—Scheme to encourage the commercial production of glasshouse crops in Gaeltacht areas.

22. Provision was included in a supplementary estimate for this new service, the main item being a sum of £30,495 for the cost of erection of propagating houses, packing sheds, growers' glasshouses, etc. Contracts amounting to £101,145 8s. 0d. were placed for the erection in each of the Counties Donegal and Galway of a central building and 100 glasshouses, and instalments on foot of these contracts, totalling £45,685, were paid in the year under review. The expenditure charged to the subhead also includes a sum of £1,255 for architects' fees, and the balance, £828 16s. 10d., relates to remuneration and travelling expenses of staff, and general expenses.

Subhead M.M.5.—Special temporary scheme of loans for the purchase of cattle and sheep.

23. A special scheme of loans was devised to assist farmers who suffered serious and abnormal losses of cattle and sheep as a result of severe weather conditions in the early months of the year 1947. The loans, which were advanced by the Agricultural Credit Corporation, Limited, on the recommendation of the Department of Agriculture, are free of interest and are repayable in four instalments spread over a period of four years, the first instalment falling due eighteen months after the date of issue of the loan. To meet the cost of administering the scheme, provision was made for the payment to the Corporation of sums calculated at the rate of 2 per cent. per annum on the amount of loans outstanding from time to time.

As will be seen from the account, payments to the Agricultural Credit Corporation, Limited, totalled £303,519 15s. 11d., being £302,466 14s. 6d., for advances for the issue of loans, and £1,053 1s. 5d. for administrative expenses. Repayments of loans amounting to £331 are included in the appropriations

in aid.

Subhead M.6.—Improvement of the Creamery Industry.

24. As will be seen from the account, no expenditure was

incurred under this subhead during the year.

In my last report I mentioned that the Dairy Disposal Company, Limited, had repaid £84,000 on foot of an advance of £112,000 made in March, 1933, to cover trading losses incurred up to 31st December, 1931. A further sum of £7,000 was repaid during the year under review, making a total refund of £91,000 in respect of the advance referred to. Including other receipts in connection with the disposal of creamery properties totalling £3,535, the sums paid over by the company, which are brought to account as exchequer extra receipts, amounted to £10,535.

The total vote expenditure to 31st March, 1948, from moneys provided for the improvement of the creamery industry amounted to £1,197,847 5s. 6d., and receipts were £360,030 8s. 7d., leaving a net charge on public funds of £837,816 16s. 11d.

Subhead M.10.—Potato Reserve Scheme.

25. With a view to safeguarding supplies of potatoes as a substitute food in the event of a shortage of flour and bread, the Minister for Finance sanctioned the acquisition of a reserve of 5,000 tons of the 1946 crop. Approximately 3,402 tons of potatoes were purchased, of which 389 tons were made available to wholesalers in Dublin and Cork to meet a temporary shortage at the end of May, 1947, 2,922 tons were sold to the British Ministry of Food, and 91 tons, originally consigned to the Ministry, were transferred to the alcohol factory in County Donegal. Expenditure in the year under review amounted to £38,351 19s. 0d. and receipts from sales, which are brought to account as appropriations in aid, totalled £33,832 19s. 5d.

Having regard to the wheat supply position, to the fact that the yield from the 1947 potato crop was considerably below average, and to the possibility of a shortage of oatmeal, arrangements were also made, with Department of Finance approval, for the accumulation of a ware potato reserve in 1948. Expenditure in this connection to 31st March, 1948, amounting to £780 1s. 6d., is charged to this subhead, and the appropriations in aid include £480 8s. 0d. in respect of receipts from sales.

Subhead M.11.—Farm Buildings Scheme.

26. A sum of £750 was provided, in a supplementary estimate, for expenses on the preparation of plans, specifications, etc., for a scheme of grants to farmers for the construction and improvement of farm buildings, but the only expenditure incurred was £182 8s. 7d. on travelling and subsistence allowances, and £21 paid to the City of Dublin Vocational Education Committee for a course of instruction given to certain officers of the Department to enable them to supervise the execution of works under the scheme.

Subhead O.5.—Agricultural Produce (Cereals) Acts, 1933 to 1939, and Emergency Powers (Cereals) Orders, etc.

27. Each grower who sold wheat of the 1943 harvest to an authorised purchaser received a docket which was to be retained until such time as notification was given by public announcement that it should be sent to the Department of Agriculture to be exchanged for a credit voucher for the purchase of artificial fertilisers, the value of the voucher being computed on the

basis of 2s. 6d. per barrel of wheat sold. Following an announcement in July, 1947, dockets received from growers were exchanged for credit vouchers entitling the holders to obtain, from any supplier of fertilisers, artificial fertilisers to the prescribed value or an equivalent reduction in the price of purchases of a greater value. Arrangements having been made for the fertiliser suppliers to submit monthly claims for recoupment accompanied by the relevant credit vouchers, sums totalling £110,000 7s. 0d. were paid to them in the period ended 31st March, 1948, and are included in the expenditure charged to this subhead.

The expenditure also includes a payment to a firm of seed growers of £3,108 11s. 11d., representing the subsidy required to enable 575 tons of high class seed wheat imported from Sweden

to be sold at prices not exceeding 96s. per barrel.

Subhead O.10.—Emergency Powers (Tillage) Orders.

28. The Orders relating to compulsory tillage, made by the Government under the Emergency Powers Acts and the Supplies and Services (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1946, required the occupiers of arable lands to cultivate a specified proportion of their holdings, and the Minister for Agriculture was empowered to enter on and take possession of those holdings whose occupiers failed to comply with the provisions of the Orders, and to cultivate such holdings or make conacre or other lettings. The charge to this subhead comprises £84,593 18s. 1d. for salaries, wages and allowances, £22,485 1s. 10d. for travelling and miscellaneous expenses, and £9,560 18s. 1d. representing the cost of seeds, manures, implements and fencing materials, together with the cost of the erection of fencing and of other operations incidental to the cultivation of entered holdings and the harvesting of crops grown thereon.

The Tillage Orders also regulated the disposal of sums realized from the sale of crops and from lettings. The receipts may be applied in or towards (a) defraying expenses incurred by the Minister for Agriculture in the exercise of the powers conferred on him by the Orders, (b) paying debts due to a State authority by the occupiers of entered holdings, or (c) paying rates due to a local authority by such occupiers. The total receipts in connection with this service to 31st March, 1948, amounted to £26,044 15s. 9d., of which £21,627 10s. 10d. was applied towards defraying expenses, including £5,209 10s. 4d. brought to account as appropriations in aid during the year under review. The sums disbursed to 31st March, 1948, totalled £3,818 10s. 1d., comprising £2,928 6s. 4d. to State and local authorities and

£890 3s. 9d. to the occupiers of the holdings concerned.

In my last report I mentioned that the Committee of Public Accounts, in its report on the appropriation accounts for

1945–46, noted that it was not possible for the Department ultimately to make a profit in connection with the enforcement of the Orders relating to compulsory tillage and expressed the hope that every effort would be made to keep losses at a minimum. I understand that in the case of holdings where the expenses exceeded the receipts, the total of the deficits amounted at 31st March, 1948, to £12,327 10s. 8d., as compared with £7,669 11s. 4d. at 31st March, 1947.

Subhead P.—Appropriations in Aid.

Levy on the slaughter of cattle and sheep.

29. As stated in previous reports, the provisions of the Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep Acts relating to the collection of levy in respect of cattle and sheep slaughtered for human consumption ceased to be in force as from 1st August, 1936. The amount received in the year under review in respect of levy due but uncollected at the date mentioned was £387 6s. 1d., and the amount of levy outstanding at 31st March, 1948, was £2,058 11s. 0d.

Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer.

30. As will be seen from the account, fees amounting to £310 were received in respect of licences granted under Emergency Powers Orders. These comprised £40, being £10 for each licence issued under the Emergency Powers (No. 254) Order, 1943 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 37 of 1943), which related to the licensing of persons engaged in the business of producing, processing and selling specified classes of agricultural seeds, and £270, representing £1 for each licence issued under the Emergency Powers (Export of Dead Poultry and Rabbits) Order, 1945 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 141 of 1945). The Orders referred to were made under the Emergency Powers Acts and were continued in force by the Supplies and Services (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1946.

VOTE 30.—AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE SUBSIDIES.

Subsidies, Allowances, etc., for Dairy Produce.

31. In previous reports I mentioned that allowances on the production of creamery butter were payable at such rates as enabled the price of milk supplied to creameries to be maintained at 10½d. per gallon for the period 1st April to 30th November, and at 1s. per gallon for the period 1st December to 31st March. In April, 1947, the Government decided

that the price of milk delivered to creameries should be 1s. 2d. per gallon from 1st May to 31st October, and 1s. 4d. per gallon from 1st November to 30th April, and that the additional cost involved should be met by increasing the retail price of creamery butter from 2s. 4d. to 2s. 8d. per lb., and by increasing the existing subsidy. The retail price was accordingly advanced on 17th April, 1947, and the sums disbursed in allowances on creamery butter produced on and after 1st April, 1947, amounted to £1,877,318 6s. 4d. in the year under review. The charge to the vote also includes payments totalling £81,140 5s. 3d. made to the proprietors of registered butter factories in respect of non-creamery butter acquired by them and sold to the Butter Marketing Committee for household use. In addition to expenditure of £800,604 7s. 4d. in the year 1946-47 on allowances in respect of creamery butter produced and non-creamery butter acquired in that year, payments amounting to £33,073 9s. 5d. were also made during the year under review, bringing the total cost of these allowances for the year 1946-47 to £833,677 16s. 9d., as compared with £950,965 6s. 7d. for the year 1945-46. The remainder of the expenditure charged to the vote, £73,459 16s. 2d., comprises a payment of £30,000, on account, made to the Butter Marketing Committee in respect of a deficiency in the Committee's trading account for the year ended 31st March, 1948, and sums totalling £43,459 16s. 2d. paid to creameries in connection with the Department's schemes for the cold storage of creamery butter for winter requirements.

Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Acts, 1935 to 1941, and Emergency Powers (No. 270) Order, 1943.

Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund.

32. The income of the Fund, which amounted to £49,582 6s. 2d. as compared with £14,056 14s. 0d. in the previous year, accrued mainly from levy on stocks of butter in hand at the commencement of business on 17th April, 1947, when the retail price of creamery butter was increased from 2s. 4d. to 2s. 8d. per lb., but levy was also payable on raw cheese in stock on 24th June, 1947, or manufactured on or after that date.

The payments out of the Fund were made solely to the Butter Marketing Committee and comprised issues amounting to £6,431 to meet administrative expenses and a sum of £8,563 11s. 7d. in recoupment of the balance of a deficiency of £38,563 11s. 7d. in the Committee's trading account for the year ended 31st March, 1947, due mainly to expenditure on the cold storage of butter for winter consumption, and in respect of which a payment of £30,000, on account, was made from the vote for Agricultural Produce Subsidies in the year 1946–47.

VOTE 31.—FISHERIES.

Subhead G.2.—Advances for Boats and Gear.

33. Including the advances of £16,750 charged in this account, the total advances for boats and gear to 31st March, 1948, amounted to £155,500. The half-yearly instalments of the annuities set up to repay these advances falling due to 31st March, 1948, amounted to £128,027 13s. 0d., while the sums collected by the Sea Fisheries Association from borrowers and transferred to the Department in payment of the annuity instalments amounted to £117,608 17s. 2d., including £11,652 19s. 9d. repaid in the year under review and credited to appropriations in aid. The repayments were, therefore, in arrear on 31st March, 1948, to the extent of £10,418 15s. 10d., as compared with £10,437 0s. 2d. in arrear on 31st March, 1947.

Subhead G.3.—Advances for General Development.

34. Sums amounting to £9,900 were advanced during the year under review to the Sea Fisheries Association for general development purposes. These advances are repayable by the Association over a period of twenty years by half-yearly instalments covering principal and interest, but no instalments fell due for repayment during the year.

Fishery Loans.

35. Repayments of fishery loans, which are accounted for as appropriations in aid, amounted to £157, and the balance outstanding on these loans at 31st March, 1948, was £20,304 10s. 5d., including arrears of £20,266 16s. 0d. There were no remissions during the year under the Fisheries (Revision of Loans) Act, 1931.

VOTE 34.—PRISONS.

36. The statement of the manufacturing and farm accounts appended to the appropriation account has been examined, and local test examinations of the conversion books and other records dealing with manufacturing operations have been carried out with satisfactory results.

VOTE 41.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

- Subhead I.1.—Contributions towards loan charges under the Housing (Financial and Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1932.
- 37. As will be seen from the account, the expenditure under this subhead amounted to £596,951 17s. 3d. Provisional grants towards the cost of housing schemes totalling £408,359 were

also made to fourteen local authorities, on a basis approved by the Department of Finance, out of moneys provided from the Transition Development Fund established by sub-section (1) of section 30 of the Finance Act, 1946.

Motor Tax Account.

38. A test examination has been applied to the Motor Tax Account with generally satisfactory results. The certificates and reports of the Local Government Auditors who examine the motor tax transactions of local authorities were scrutinised, in so far as they were available, but in eight cases this audit had not been completed at the date of my test examination.

The gross proceeds of Motor Vehicles, etc., duties in 1947-48, including £26,240 3s. 11d. attributable to fines collected by the Department of Justice, amounted to £2,004,197 12s. 2d., as compared with £1,467,696 13s. 7d. in the previous year. Fees amounting to £5,267 8s. 6d. received on behalf of the Commissioner of the Gárda Síochána under the Road Traffic Act (Parts VI and VII) (Fees) Regulations, 1937 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 92 of 1937) are also included in the receipts.

VOTE 44.—NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

Subhead E.—Grants towards the provision of Additional Cash Allowances.

39. As stated in the account, the charge to this subhead includes a sum of £239 0s. 9d., being the proportion estimated to be proper to this vote of certain final payments on foot of allowances paid in prior years by public assistance authorities. In paragraph 9 of this report I have stated the circumstances in which I have admitted the charge.

Subhead F.—Substitutive Allowances.

40. Owing to the suspension of payment of benefits under the National Health Insurance Acts during the period 17th January, 1948, to 7th March, 1948, by Cumann an Arachais Náisiúnta ar Shláinte the Social Welfare (Substitutive Allowances) Order, 1948, (Statutory Instrument No. 8 of 1948) was made by the Government on the 17th January, 1948. Under the provisions of this Order public assistance authorities were empowered to make payments to persons entitled to sickness or disablement benefit and to persons entitled to cash supplements. The Order also authorised the payment to each public assistance authority, out of moneys provided by the Oireachtas, of the amount certified by the Minister for Social Welfare as having been

expended by that authority. Sums amounting to £53,415 0s. 3d. paid provisionally to public assistance authorities on statements submitted by county managers have been charged to the vote with the consent of the Minister for Finance, and any necessary adjustments will be made when the amounts expended have been certified by the Minister for Social Welfare.

VOTE 46.—PRIMARY EDUCATION.

Subhead A.3.—Preparatory Colleges, etc.

41. The average boarding cost per head in the school year 1947-48 ranged from 13s. 4d. to 18s. 10d. per week, showing an increase in each college as compared with the previous year. The average fee paid by the students for the same school year was £15 9s. 6d. as compared with £14 15s. 10d. for the

previous year.

Accounts have been furnished to me showing the receipts and expenditure for the school year 1947-48 in connection with the farms and gardens attached to the colleges. In four of the six accounts the receipts exceeded the expenditure whilst the other two accounts disclosed deficits. With reference to the views expressed by the Committee of Public Accounts in paragraph 8 of its report on the accounts for the year 1945-46 on the question of the control of farming operations, arrangements have now been made for periodical inspection of the farms by officers of the Department of Agriculture and their reports are available to me.

Subhead C.1.—Salaries, etc., of Teachers.

42. A school was closed on 8th July, 1946, by direction of the Commissioners of Public Works as the building had become dangerous. Alternative accommodation was not available and the erection of a new school was not completed until 22nd November, 1948. With the approval of the Department of Finance, payment of salary was continued to the two teachers employed in the school but their services were not availed of until February, 1948, when arrangements were made for them to augment the staffs of two neighbouring schools attended by the majority of the pupils of the closed school. The salaries and allowances paid to these teachers in respect of the period from 8th July, 1946, to 31st January, 1948, were approximately £1,163.

Subhead D.—Superannuation, etc., of Teachers.

43. The prescribed age limits for retirement of teachers is 65 years in the case of a man or 60 years in the case of a woman unless permission has been granted to continue in the service,

In previous reports reference was made to the concession granted to certain women teachers to allow them to continue beyond the prescribed age limit. With the consent of the Minister for Finance the concession was further extended to allow women teachers who reach 60 years after 31st December, 1944, or who had less than 35 years' service at that date, and whose service is efficient, to continue in the service up to 63 years of age or the completion of 38 years' service and, in cases of special hardship, for a further period.

It was also agreed, with the consent of the Minister for Finance, that teachers who reached 65 years during the period 1st October, 1946, to 30th September, 1947, might continue to serve up to 31st December, 1947, in order that they would have the benefit of the new salary scales which were payable as from

31st October, 1946.

The number of teachers who retired on pension otherwise than through disablement or inefficiency in the year ended 31st March, 1948, was 80 men and 77 women as compared with 34 men and 28 women in the year ended 31st March, 1947.

VOTE 48.—TECHNICAL INSTRUCTION.

Subhead A.—Scholarships.

44. Scholarships to students of Coláiste Muire le Tíos are subject to a means test, the amount payable for any school year being calculated by reference to a scale approved by the Department of Finance. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding the amounts awarded in certain cases.

VOTE 49.—SCIENCE AND ART.

Subhead A.6.—Purchase of Books, etc. (Grant-in-Aid).

45. An additional provision of £20,000 for this grant-in-aid was made by supplementary estimate to defray the cost of acquisition of an important collection of Irish historical records. After the purchase price had been paid and the records lodged in the National Library it was found that difficulties existed in connection with the legal transfer of the title in the property, and I have inquired as to the present position.

Subhead B.10.—Production of Films on behalf of Government Departments.

46. In order to make available to schools and other educational and cultural bodies a selection of films with commentaries

in Irish, an agreement was entered into between the Minister for Education and a film producing organisation whereby the latter undertook to replace in a number of selected film shorts the original sound tracks in English by sound tracks in Irish, and to rent these films to the Minister for a period of two years. A sum of £890 paid under the agreement is charged to this sub-The rented films were transferred to the National Film Institute of Ireland for use in their film library. I have inquired regarding the arrangements made with the Institute and the extent to which the films have been used.

VOTE 52.—LANDS.

Subhead I.—Improvement of Estates, etc.

47. In connection with the scheme whereby certain lands in Co. Meath, available for the relief of congestion, are reserved for allottees from the Gaeltacht, sums amounting to £26 5s. 4d. expended in providing necessary improvements are charged to this subhead. The total expenditure borne on the vote for Lands in connection with the scheme from its inception in 1934-35 to 31st March, 1948, amounts to £103,594 11s. 9d. In addition, expenditure amounting to £2,050 9s. 10d., which was subsequently recouped to the Land Commission by the Office of Public Works, was incurred in the erection of a school-

Under the scheme for the provision of holdings in certain counties in Leinster for migrants from districts where there is acute congestion the expenditure, apart from the cost of general improvements (roads, drains, fences, etc.), borne on the vote during the year amounts to £237 5s. 0d. The expenditure on general improvements in respect of migrants' holdings from the inception of the scheme to 31st March, 1948, has recently been assessed at £26,722 11s. 1d. Including this figure the total charges to the vote in respect of the scheme since 1937-38 amounts to £140,678 7s. 5d. made up as follows:

VOTE 53.—FORESTRY.

Excess of Expenditure over Grant.

48. The gross expenditure on this vote has exceeded the estimate by £2,089 19s. 6d.; in addition there is a deficiency of appropriations in aid realized of £432 2s. 0d. The total deficit, therefore, amounts to £2,522 1s. 6d. for which an excess vote will be required. The excess is explained by the Accounting Officer as due to expenditure on materials for fencing. Such materials had been in short supply, but large deliveries were unexpectedly received towards the close of the financial year.

VOTE 54.—GAELTACHT SERVICES.

Subhead H.3.—Grants under the Housing (Gaeltacht) Acts, 1929 to 1939.

49. Under the Housing (Gaeltacht) Acts, 1929 to 1939, the aggregate amount of grants and loans which may be made is not to exceed £750,000.

At 31st March, 1948, the position regarding such grants and loans was as follows:—

(i) Total amount of grants sanctioned 481,459

Total amount of actual payments 467,006

(ii) Total amount of loans sanctioned 178,197

Total amount of loans for which certificates have been issued to the Commissioners of Public Works 173,916

Industrial Loans.

50. I have been furnished with a schedule concerning the industrial loans from which it appears that there were no advances made during the year ended 31st March, 1948. Arrears, including interest accrued, due at that date amounted to £10,862 17s. 7d. as compared with £10,637 18s. 11d. on 31st March, 1947. The arrears include a sum of £10,807 18s. 7d. due by a company which ceased to exist in 1925. As stated in previous reports, the realization of such security as is held by the State was the subject of negotiations, but owing to certain legal difficulties realization cannot be effected.

VOTE 55.—INDUSTRY AND COMMERCE.

Subhead C.1.—Incidental Expenses.

51. The charge to this subhead includes sums amounting to £124 18s. 3d., being the expenses of providing and distributing milk in Galway City when supplies ceased owing to a one-day strike by the vendors in October, 1947. Receipts from sales of milk amounting to £55 4s. 5d. have been credited to appropriations in aid.

Subhead L.—Food Subsidies.

52. The expenditure charged to this subhead, totalling £8,644,659 19s. 3d., was made up as follows:—

The flour subsidy, paid to Grain Importers (Éire), Limited, was the amount required to control the price of flour and to regulate the earnings of the milling industry which were limited to a percentage of an agreed figure representing capital employed, together with the cost of providing any additional capital in excess of the agreed figure. The payments comprised £6,418,701 12s. 0d. in respect of losses incurred in connection with the allocation of imported wheat and flour during the period 23rd February, 1947, to 21st February, 1948; £26,223 8s. 11d. for remuneration of importer-distributors for wheat handled on behalf of the company in the calendar year 1945; £227,754 in respect of adjusting payments for the cereal year 1945-46 made by the company to the millers following examination of the millers' accounts by officers of the Department of Industry and Commerce; and a payment of £500,000 on account of subsidy for the cereal year 1946-47.

The subsidy on wheaten meal for the cereal year 1946-47 was paid at varying rates representing the difference between the average cost of production together with a profit of 2s. 6d. per sack, and the controlled selling price.

Subsidy at the rate of ½d. per 4 lb. loaf was payable in respect of batch bread baked and sold up to and including 26th January, 1946, by all bakers licensed under the Emergency Powers (Bakers) Order, 1941 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 453 of 1941). An

increase of 4d. per 4 lb. loaf in the subsidy rate was authorized by the Government to be paid to certain Dublin bakers with effect from the 27th January, 1946. This increase was extended in the year under review to other Dublin bakers with effect as from the 27th January, 1946, and to bakers in other areas according as they established their claim for relief. In January, 1947, it was decided that additional subsidy should be granted to the Dublin bakers to the full extent of their increased expenditure on wages arising out of awards by the Labour Court, and similar relief was later granted to bakers in other areas in The payment respect of wage increases granted by the Court. of subsidy was discontinued from 1st November, 1947, consequent on a reduction in the price of flour. Subsequently, however, it was decided that subsidy should be paid in respect of wage increases granted up to 1st November, 1947, other than those covered by awards of the Labour Court, and also that from this date the price of flour supplied to bakers should be further reduced by 2s. 6d. per sack.

Following a decision of the Government to reduce the price of tea as from 1st November, 1947, the Minister for Finance authorized the payment to Tea Importers (Éire), Limited, of a subsidy equal to the difference between the cost price of tea plus overhead expenses and the selling price. The audited accounts of Tea Importers (Éire), Limited, for the year ended 31st March, 1948, showed a net loss of £738,293 against which was credited a balance of £1,120 from the previous year and the £700,000 paid in respect of the subsidy in the year under review, leaving a balance of £37,173 due to the company.

Subsidy at the rate of 2d. per lb. was payable with effect from 1st November, 1947, on sugar sold for domestic consumption and not for manufacturing purposes, following the Government's decision to effect a reduction in the price of sugar. The amount of £434,987 ls. 7d. charged to this subhead was paid to Colucht Siúicre Éireann, Teoranta, in respect of this subsidy on the basis of statements certified by the auditors of the company.

Owing to increased costs of imported materials for the production of margarine the Government decided that production costs should be subsidised to enable the retail price of the commodity to be maintained at 1s. 8d. per lb. Accordingly, subsidy was fixed at the rate of 3d. per lb. on margarine sold by manufacturers for domestic consumption in the period 1st January to 31st March, 1948. The amount of £30,708 5s. 6d. charged to the subhead represents the subsidy due for the period 1st January to 29th February, 1948, as certified by the auditors of the manufacturers concerned and verified by officers of the Department of Industry and Commerce.

Subhead M.—Fuel Subsidy.

53. The arrangements with Fuel Importers (Éire), Limited, under which losses incurred by the company in the marketing of turf and timber fuel were borne by the company and issues were made from voted moneys in recoupment thereof, continued in operation, and the total payments to the company, including £1,075,000 issued in the year under review, amounted at 31st March, 1948, to £5,776,000.

Subhead N.—Miscellaneous Turf Production Schemes.

54. The sum of £3,333 10s. 2d., which is charged to this subhead, was paid to local authorities in recoupment of losses incurred since 1941 on the sale of turf otherwise than to Fuel Importers (Éire), Limited, government departments or local institutions. Including £110,133 7s. 7d. paid in the previous year, the total amount recouped up to 31st March, 1948, was £113,466 17s. 9d.

Minerals Development.

Subhead P.1.—Advances to Mianrai, Teoranta.

Subhead P.3.—Compensation for Mineral Rights Acquired.

55. The charge of £33,976 5s. 0d. to subhead P.1. represents advances of £31,000 made to Mianraí, Teoranta, under section 10 of the Minerals Exploration and Development Act, 1941, as amended by section 16 of the Minerals Company Act, 1945, and advances of £2,976 5s. 0d. under section 3 (1) of the Minerals Company Act, 1947. A payment of £117 6s. 4d. for compensation in respect of mineral rights acquired by the State is charged to subhead P.3. and treated as an advance to the company, as were similar payments charged in the accounts of previous years amounting to £4,763 10s. 10d. Including these amounts the total advances to the company up to 31st March, 1948, were £401,176 17s. 6d.

Section 2 (2) of the Minerals Company Act, 1947, provides that the Minister for Finance shall as soon as may be after the 30th September, 1947, issue a certificate in writing certifying (a) the sum which in his opinion represents the value of the assets of the company as on the 30th September, 1947, and (b) the sum due to the Minister for Industry and Commerce on the 30th September, 1947, on foot of advances under the Slievardagh Coalfield Development Act, 1941, and the Minerals Exploration

and Development Company Act, 1941, as amended by the Minerals Company Act, 1945, and the interest thereon. Section 2 (3) of the Minerals Company Act, 1947, further provides that on the date of the issue of the certificate the company shall stand released from the liability to pay to the Minister for Industry and Commerce so much of the certified liabilities as is equal to the difference between the certified value of the assets and the certified liabilities. Pursuant to section 2 (2) of the Act, the Minister for Finance certified on 15th October, 1948, that £66,554 7s. 6d. represented the value of the assets of Mianraí, Teoranta, as on the 30th September, 1947, and that the sum due on that date by the company to the Minister for Industry and Commerce on foot of advances and the interest thereon was £446,418 10s. 6d. The company, therefore, by virtue of section 2 (3) of the Act stands released from the liability to pay to the Minister for Industry and Commerce £379,864 3s. 0d.

Operations of Bord na Móna.

Subheads Q.1. to Q.5.

56. The issues made from the Grants-in-Aid during the year comprised £328,425 for the production of turf for use in non-turf areas (Subhead Q.1.), £9,959 for cost of administration (Subhead Q.2.), £3,500 for general development (Subhead Q.3.), £49,300 for experiment and research (Subhead Q.4.), and £450,000 in respect of the cost of the turf production scheme hitherto undertaken by county councils (Subhead Q.5.).

Section 52 of the Turf Development Act, 1946, provides for the payment out of voted moneys during 1946-47, and in each of the nine subsequent financial years, of grants towards expenses incurred by Bord na Móna on experimental and research work, subject to a limitation of £120,000. The issues under this head, including the £49,300 charged to Subhead Q.4. in the year under review, totalled £55,300 at 31st March, 1948.

Receipts amounting to £189,687 0s. 7d. in respect of sales of turf produced under the turf camps scheme are included in the exchequer extra receipts. I understand that the scheme terminated on the 31st March, 1948, and that arrangements are being made to dispose of the property held by Bord na Móna on behalf of the Department.

Sums amounting to £37,382 8s. 3d. were received from Bord na Móna, and are included in the exchequer extra receipts, in repayment of advances made for the development of certain bogs. At 31st March, 1948, the amounts outstanding, including

interest, for advances made from voted moneys for the development of bogs were :—

Licence, etc., Fees.

57. As will be seen from the account, licence and other fees payable under section 11 of the Supplies and Services (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1946, amounting to £8,129 19s. 1d. were credited as exchequer extra receipts. The principal items were Fabrics (Import Licences) £3,866 17s. 7d., and Duplicate Ration Books £2,296 7s. 8d.

VOTE 56.—AVIATION AND METEOROLOGICAL SERVICES.

Subhead A.5.—Acquisition of Land, Buildings, etc.

Subhead A.6.—Rent and Rates on Land, etc.

58. With a view to the establishment of a village settlement in the vicinity of Shannon Airport approximately 243 acres were acquired by a vesting order made under the provisions of Emergency Powers (No. 315) Order, 1944 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 74 of 1944). It was decided, however, to abandon the scheme before any formal offer of compensation was made to the owners, a payment of £97 5s. 4d. made in 1946-47 for a building, which was acquired by agreement, being the only expenditure incurred up to 31st March, 1948, on the acquisition of these lands. Rates and land annuities paid up to 31st March, 1948, amounted to £644 3s. 5d. of which £278 18s. 6d. is charged in the account under review. I understand that the Department of Finance has sanctioned the re-conveyance of the lands to the former owners, subject to certain conditions, and that negotiations to this end are proceeding.

Subhead A.7.—Constructional Works including furnishing of Buildings—Shannon Airport.

 $Subhead~A.8.-Constructional~Works~including~furnishing~of\\Buildings-Dublin~Airport.$

59. Expenditure during the year on constructional works including furnishing of buildings at Dublin, Shannon (Rineanna)

and Shannon (Foynes) Airports amounted to £235,722 18s. 0d., £261,417 3s. 5d. and £8,806 10s. 6d., respectively, bringing the total expenditure, as at 31st March, 1948, to £727,561 9s. 4d. for Dublin Airport, £1,420,540 1s. 2d. for Shannon Airport (Rineanna) and £162,780 13s. 1d. for Shannon Airport (Foynes), exclusive of expenditure on the acquisition of land. Contracts for major works at these airports in the year under review were in most cases placed in fixed sums but some were again entered into on a cost plus profit basis, and in one case the Department arranged with a contractor already working on the site to carry out certain work which was regarded as urgent at the rates and prices applicable to his original contract, while in another case works to an estimated value of £60,000 were entrusted to a contractor as extras on an existing contract as it was considered that competition was unlikely to result in a saving to public funds.

In connection with the construction of additional accommodation at a terminal building, I observed that the lowest tender received was £45,540 18s. 0d. but that, owing to unavoidable delay in completing the contract documents, arrangements were made with the contractor to carry out the initial stages of the work on a cost plus profit basis, the amount paid being approximately £13,000. The value of this work measured at the rates quoted in the contractor's bill of quantities amounted to £7,446 0s. 3d., and the original tender for £45,540 18s. 0d. was reduced by this sum, and a contract placed for the balance of the work at £38,094 17s. 9d. I have inquired regarding the discrepancy between the actual cost of the work carried out on a cost plus profit basis and the value as reflected in the contractor's bill of quantities.

Subhead B.—Management of Dublin Airport.

60. A sum of £24,000 was provided under this subhead to meet an anticipated loss on the operation of Dublin Airport by Aer Rianta, Teoranta, for the year ended 31st March, 1948. As the audited accounts for that period showed a profit on management of £10,787 15s. 3d. it was not found necessary to use any part of the provision. The agreement between the Minister for Industry and Commerce and Aer Rianta, Teoranta, provides inter alia that the profits arising in any year will be paid to the Exchequer or otherwise disposed of as directed by the Minister in agreement with the Minister for Finance, and I understand that the profit of £10,787 15s. 3d. will be brought to account as exchequer extra receipts.

Subhead C.—Subsidy in respect of Air Services.

61. The amount charged to this subhead was paid to Aer Rianta, Teoranta, under the Subsidy (Aer Rianta, Teoranta)

(No. 2) Order, 1947 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 145 of 1947) and the Subsidy (Aer Rianta, Teoranta) (No. 1) Order, 1948 (Statutory Instrument No. 86 of 1948) to meet losses of the company and of the subsidiary companies, Aer Lingus, Teoranta, and Aerlinte Éireann, Teoranta, on the operation of air services during the year ended 31st March, 1948. The aggregate amount of subsidy the Minister for Finance may authorise to be paid to the company is limited to £750,000 by section 19 of the Air Navigation and Transport Act, 1946. Including the sum of £458,650 charged in this account, the total subsidy paid to the company now amounts to £750,000, and it is stated in a note to this subhead that the full payments due to Aer Rianta, Teoranta, could not be made pending the enactment of legislation to extend the subsidy limit contained in the Air Navigation and Transport Acts.

Subhead F.—Appropriations in Aid.

62. As shown in the account, receipts during the year in respect of landing fees, etc., at airports amounted to £114,276 8s. 9d. I have asked to be furnished with certain documents in connection with the audit of these receipts and with information regarding the amount of the fees outstanding at 31st March, 1948.

This subhead includes a sum of £8,000 received from the catering controller, Shannon Airport, in respect of the letting of rooms in the passenger hostels, Rineanna. I have asked for information regarding these receipts, and the arrangements made with the catering controller for the management of the hostels.

Shannon Airport Catering Service.

63. The agreement between the Minister for Industry and Commerce and the catering controller provided that signed copies of the inventory of furniture and equipment supplied by the Minister to the catering service would be exchanged between the Minister and the catering controller. It appears that it was not found possible to compile a complete inventory at the time the supplies were issued, but an agreed list of items was, however, prepared from the results of stock-takings carried out in 1948 and a copy has been furnished to me. Furniture was also supplied to Foynes hostel which was opened in the year 1946-47 to provide accommodation for passengers. I am informed that an inventory of this furniture was not compiled at the time of issue, but a copy of a schedule of items retained

xxix.

in the hostel when it was vacated in December, 1947, has been made available to me. I understand that the building has been offered for sale fully furnished.

In view of the absence of original inventories of the furniture and equipment supplied to the catering service at Rineanna and Foynes and to the Foynes hostel, it is not clear whether all the items issued can be accounted for. I have deemed it desirable, therefore, to refer to the matter.

I observed that a sum of £5,000 received in July, 1946, in respect of catering profit is still charged to a suspense account and I have inquired regarding its disposal.

VOTE 59.—UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE AND UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE.

Subhead H.—Appropriations in Aid.

Contributions from County Borough and Urban Area Councils under section 26 of the Unemployment Assistance Act, 1933, as amended by the Unemployment Assistance (Amendment) Acts, 1938 and 1940.

64. In paragraph 66 of my last report I stated that the Department was seeking to collect contributions in accordance with the legal opinion that where the rateable value of Electricity Supply Board hereditaments is greater than the amount on which, under the Electricity (Supply) (Amendment) Act, 1930, the rates payable are calculated, the higher figure was correctly included in the certificates furnished by the Commissioner of Valuation in accordance with section 5 (1) of the Act of 1940. Two local authorities still continue to base their payments on the lower figure, the total amount withheld up to 31st March, 1948, exceeding £5,550.

VOTE 61.—POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS.

Subhead H.2.—Losses by Default, Accident, etc.

65. The losses borne on the vote for the year ended 31st March, 1948, amounted to £5,493 19s. 6d. A classified schedule of these losses is set out at page 220. At page 223 particulars are given of 33 cases in which cash shortages or misappropriations amounting to £854 14s. $6\frac{1}{2}$ d. were discovered; the sums in question were made good and no charge to public funds was necessary.

Subhead T.—Appropriations in Aid.

66. Among the receipts estimated for under this subhead was a sum of £14,680 for staffing of wireless stations. As stated in the account, the amount has not been realized.

Stores.

67. A test examination of the store accounts was carried

out with generally satisfactory results.

In previous reports reference was made to the difficulties arising out of the supply position which involved departure from the normal procedure for the purchase of stores, and in the year under review it was still found necessary in certain cases to divide contracts between contractors on the basis of output and in other cases to place contracts after limited competition.

As shown in Appendix II, the value of engineering stores held on the 31st March, 1948, was £584,497. Stores other than engineering stores held at that date were valued at £265,872, included in this amount being a sum of £62,407 in respect of

stores held for other Government Departments.

Revenue.

68. A test examination of the accounts of the Postal, Telegraph and Telephone services was carried out with satisfactory results.

Sums due for telephone services amounting in all to £50 4s. 8d. were written off during the year as irrecoverable.

Post Office Savings Bank Accounts.

69. The accounts of the Post Office Savings Bank for the year ended 31st December, 1947, were submitted to a test examination with satisfactory results. As in the two previous years, the figure shown in the accounts in respect of the total interest credited to depositors has for various reasons been estimated but any necessary adjustment will be made in a subsequent year. The interest accrued during the year on securities standing to the credit of the Post Office Savings Bank Fund amounted to £1,390,253 2s. 6d. Of this sum, £765,409 12s. 7d. was paid and credited to depositors in respect of interest, management expenses amounted to £107,030 13s. 9d. and £51,781 5s. 8d. was set aside towards provision against deprecia-

tion in the value of securities, leaving a balance of £466,031 10s. 6d. which is shown as disposable for the benefit of the Exchequer in accordance with section 19 (1) of the Finance Act, 1930.

Post Office Factory.

70. A test examination was applied to the accounts of the

Post Office Factory with satisfactory results.

Including works in progress on 31st March, 1948, the expenditure on manufacturing jobs during the year amounted to £38,506, expenditure on repair work (other than repairs to mechanical transport) amounted to £22,336, and expenditure on mechanical transport repairs to £5,949.

VOTE 63.—DEFENCE.

Subhead C .- Pay of Civilians attached to Units.

Subhead S .- Barrack Maintenance and Minor Works.

71. The sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained in 1945 for expenditure of £30,900, being £20,070 for materials and £10,830 for civilian labour, in connection with the erection of a hutted camp by the Corps of Engineers. The expenditure incurred was considerably in excess of the amount sanctioned and I understand that the Department of Finance was made aware of the position in August, 1947, and that formal covering sanction has now been sought. I am informed that it is not at present proposed to carry through the original scheme, but that further expenditure is necessary to complete certain works which it would be undesirable to leave in an unfinished state, or which are essential to the continued partial occupation of the camp.

Subhead J.—Mechanical Transport.

72. As noted in the account, additional expenditure amounting to £6,133 9s. 6d. was incurred in providing Army transport for the conveyance of civilian passengers in Dublin during the transport strike in 1947. I have asked whether any expenditure arose from traffic accidents during the operation of the service.

Subhead K.—Provisions and Allowances in lieu.

73. Statements have been furnished to me showing the cost of production of bread at the Curragh Bakery, and of meat at the Dublin and Curragh Abattoirs. The unit costs are as follows:—

The average price of cattle purchased for the Dublin and Curragh areas was £47 11s. 1d. and £45 18s. 2d. per head, respectively, as compared with £39 18s. 0d. and £37 16s. 0d. in the previous year, while the average production of beef per head was 641 lbs. and 618 lbs., respectively, as compared with 681 lbs. and 646 lbs.

Subhead M.—Clothing and Equipment.

74. Temporary officers serving during the Emergency were required by Regulations to surrender certain articles of clothing and equipment on the termination of their service. A number of officers who were temporarily released from service from time to time were permitted to retain such articles pending recall. Some of these officers who were not recalled retained the surrenderable items and I have inquired regarding the resulting loss.

Subhead P.1.—Air-raid Precautions.

75. In connection with the winding-up of air-raid precautions schemes, arrangements were made for the disposal of certain State-owned equipment issued to local authorities, and amounts received on the sale of such equipment are credited as appropriations in aid. Proposals for the adjustment of discrepancies in the store accounts have been submitted to the Department of Finance and the matter will come under review in the course of audit of the accounts for the year 1948–49.

The Fire Brigades Act, 1940, imposed on local authorities responsibility for making reasonable provision for the protection

of persons and property against fires occurring in their districts. Fire-fighting equipment additional to normal peace-time requirements was issued on loan during the Emergency to certain local authorities for air-raid precautions purposes, and the Government decided in November, 1945, that this equipment should be distributed throughout the country for use for normal peace-time purposes, subject to the condition that it might be recalled and re-distributed for air-raid precautions purposes. I have asked for information regarding the scheme of distribution and the arrangements made for periodic inspection of the equipment, which remains State property.

Subhead P.2.—Naval Service.

76. Reference was made in paragraph 80 of my last report to stores delivered under the contract for the purchase of corvettes and to the liability for expenditure incurred on repairs and renovations of the vessels. I have inquired regarding the present position in this matter.

One of the vessels was out of commission from July, 1947, to April, 1948, owing to the collapse of a furnace and I am informed that the cost of carrying out the necessary repairs has not yet been ascertained and that the question of responsibility for the damage is under consideration.

Subhead R.—Fuel, Light and Water in kind and Fuel Oils.

77. Owing to the necessity for ensuring that a reasonable ration of turf would be available for domestic consumers during the winter of 1947–48, and to the prospective fuel supply position, the Minister for Industry and Commerce was unable to agree to Army needs being met from the supplies available for domestic users in the non-turf areas. Accordingly, it was necessary to make special arrangements for the production of turf for the use of the Defence Forces and agents were appointed for that purpose. Deliveries under the agreements with the agents were completed in December, 1948, and amounted approximately to 26,000 tons. In reply to my inquiries regarding the average cost per ton of turf delivered to the various military posts I was informed that as final payments had not been made the total expenditure involved could not yet be stated.

I have asked that the covering sanction of the Department of Finance be obtained for certain payments made to an agent as they appeared to be in excess of the amounts payable under the terms of the agency agreement.

Subhead S.2.—Construction Corps.

78. Reference was made in my reports on the accounts for the years 1942-43 and 1944-45 to arrangements under which personnel of the Construction Corps were employed on a development scheme undertaken by the Irish Tourist Board at a seaside resort. The Corps was withdrawn in October, 1946, the value of the labour content of the work completed in the period March, 1943, to October, 1946, being assessed at £3,750 4s. 1d., and this amount has been received from the Irish Tourist Huts were erected at an approximate cost of £7,700 to accommodate the personnel engaged on the scheme and proposals for their sale were under consideration when the Corps was withdrawn. I understand that it was finally decided not to proceed with the sale and that the huts have been dismantled and stored pending re-erection for the use of An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil. Expenditure amounting to £276 2s. 0d. was incurred on the employment of a caretaker during the period November, 1946, to October, 1948, and a claim by the Irish Tourist Board in respect of the occupation of the site by the Department of Defence during the same period is under consideration.

Subhead U.—Compensation.

79. A payment of £4,900 was made in settlement of a claim for compensation in respect of damage arising from the military occupation of certain premises and I have asked for further information regarding details of the claim.

The sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained for expenditure not exceeding £275, being the amount of the lowest tender for certain work of site clearance. There was considerable delay in placing the contract with the result that the cost of the work was increased to £370 16s. 2d. because of higher charges for labour. As it was not found possible to fix responsibility for the delay with any degree of certainty the sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained for the charge of the increased amount to the vote.

Subhead Y.2.—The Reserve.

80. Premises for the use of An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil were purchased, with the approval of the Department of Finance, for the sum of £4,500, a consideration being that the surrounding grounds would be available for training and camping purposes. Investigation of title disclosed that the original lease contained a covenant against the use of the premises for military purposes

and whilst the landlord's consent to some modification of the restrictions was obtained it appeared that the grounds would not be available for all the purposes contemplated. In reply to my inquiries I was informed that the purchase had been completed as the premises were required primarily for use as a Battalion Headquarters for which their location rendered them specially suitable, that the intended use of the grounds for training and camping purposes was a secondary consideration, and that the matter is being re-submitted to the Department of Finance.

The Department of Finance sanctioned the purchase of 31,382 coats and 30,376 caps for An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil for the year ended 31st March, 1948, and contracts were placed accordingly. A further contract for the supply of 5,000 coats was placed during the year and I have inquired whether the sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained. Acceptance of full deliveries under these contracts would have resulted in the provision of stocks of caps almost sufficient to provide for probable requirements to 31st March, 1950, and of stocks of coats in excess of estimated requirements to that date, and I understand that it has been arranged to accept deliveries subject to the cancellation of orders for coats in excess of the estimated demand to 31st March, 1950. I have asked for information regarding the circumstances in which the requirements for the year 1947–48 had been overestimated.

A number of cases was noted in which articles of clothing issued to members of An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil were replaced after relatively short periods and it was not clear that the original issues had become unserviceable through fair wear and tear in the public service. I understand that difficulty was experienced in controlling issues of clothing owing to the fact that regulations had not been promulgated, and I have inquired regarding the present position, and the recovery of articles of clothing and equipment in the possession of discharged and non-effective members of An Fórsa.

I have asked for information concerning the regulations governing the medical treatment of members of An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil.

Use of Military Aerodromes by Civilian Aircraft.

81. Landing facilities have been provided from time to time for civilian aircraft at military aerodromes as emergency alternatives to Dublin Airport. I inquired regarding the collection of charges for these facilities and was informed that collection had been deferred pending agreement with the Department of Finance on the basis of assessment of the charges,

Occupation of Married Quarters.

82. Regulations provide that a soldier who is in occupation of married quarters shall vacate quarters within a stated period after his discharge or transfer to the Reserve, and also that a charge shall be made for each day during which quarters are overheld. A number of cases of overholding has arisen in recent years and I have asked for information on the matter.

Suspense Account.

83. Reference was made in paragraph 87 of my last report to payments amounting to £384 18s. 6d. in respect of pay, etc., of reservists which had been charged to a suspense account pending investigation of certain irregularities. Further payments amounting to £666 9s. 6d. were similarly charged during the year under review, the total amount debited to suspense account at 31st March, 1948, being £1,051 8s. 0d.

Statement of Losses.

84. Losses written off during the year are detailed in a statement appended to the account. The total is made up of :—

The corresponding figures of losses in the previous year were

£129 9s. 6d. and £67,104 16s. 10d.

The deficiency of £71,114 14s. 5d. noted at item 6 of the Statement of Losses includes £57,972 11s. 2d., being the value of self-igniting grenades which, with Department of Finance approval, were destroyed.

VOTE 64.—ARMY PENSIONS.

Subhead G.—Military Service Pensions.

85. Subsection (5) of section 8 of the Military Service Pensions Act, 1934, provided that where a report had been made by the Referee on an application for a service certificate the Minister might, in certain circumstances, request the Referee to review such report. The power conferred by the subsection

was withdrawn, as from the 1st January, 1946, by section 5 of the Military Service Pensions (Amendment) Act, 1945, except in respect of any report in reference to which the Minister had received an application or request for the exercise of the power before that date. Awards of pension were made during the year following the receipt of revised reports from the Referee, and as in some cases no evidence was available to me of the date of receipt of the applications for review, I communicated with the Accounting Officer in the matter and was informed that the applications in question had been received prior to the 1st January, 1946, but that as they had been referred to the Referee with the supporting evidence, and had been retained by him, they were not therefore available for inspection.

Subhead H.—Defence Forces (Pensions) Schemes, 1937 to 1947.

86. Cases have arisen in which pensions under the Military Service Pensions Act, 1924, based on service to 30th September, 1923, as certified under the Act, were awarded to persons to whom pensions under the Defence Forces (Pensions) Schemes, based on qualifying service commencing on dates prior to 30th September, 1923, were also awarded. The same periods of time have therefore been reckoned for the purposes of both pensions.

VOTE 65.—EXTERNAL AFFAIRS.

Subhead A.7.—Repayable Advances to certain Irish Nationals who are Pensioners of Foreign Authorities.

87. The accounts of this vote for the years 1944–45 to 1947–48 include charges in respect of advances made to certain Irish nationals, resident within the State, who were formerly employees of the Shanghai Municipal Council and were unable to obtain payment of their pensions owing to the war in the Far East. The payment of the advances was in each case subject to an undertaking by the pensioner to repay the sums advanced as soon as the Shanghai Municipal Council resumed payment of the pensions, and I have asked for information on the present position in this matter.

VOTE 67.—MISCELLANEOUS SOCIAL WELFARE SERVICES.

Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer.

88. A sum of £84 13s. 0d. which had been overpaid to a public assistance authority was refunded and brought to account

under this heading. The overpayment arose through a misconception of the conditions under which public assistance authorities would be recouped to an extent not exceeding 50 per cent. of expenditure on the supply of footwear to necessitous persons not otherwise in receipt of home assistance. Footwear had been issued to certain people in this category and the expenditure incurred had been included in the claim for recoupment although no contributions had been obtained from the recipients as provided for in the approved scheme. matter came to light each public assistance authority was communicated with and refunds were obtained where necessary. In addition to the £84 13s. 0d. referred to above, sums amounting to £549 2s. 8d. in respect of similar overpayments were received from four public assistance authorities by the Department of Local Government and are brought to account as exchequer extra receipts under the vote for that Department.

VOTE 72.—ALLEVIATION OF DISTRESS.

89. The original estimate for this service provided £1,500,000 for the alleviation of distress in Europe due to war, and indicated that this sum was required for the provision of supplies of foodstuffs, livestock and other commodities and for expenses incidental to their purchase and shipment. A supplementary estimate taken later in the year provided for the payment of grants to international and other organisations in respect of relief activities.

The expenditure incurred on the purchase of relief supplies of foodstuffs and other commodities, including freight and other miscellaneous charges, totalled £173,424 10s. 5d. Of this amount the Department of Industry and Commerce expended £90,047 18s. 7d. on canned meat and surplus army and air-raid precautions stores, the Department of Agriculture £83,332 7s. 10d., mainly on beef and hides, and other Departments £44 4s. 0d. on incidental expenses. The greater part of the expenditure related to supplies sent to Czechoslovakia, Italy, and the National Catholic Welfare Conference, Bremen. Payments amounting to £45,802 18s. 5d. were made to or on behalf of the Joint Relief Commission of the International Red Cross and its successor, the International Centre for the Relief of Civilian Populations, for transport charges and other expenses incurred by them on the distribution of supplies. A sum of £3,312 19s. 1d. was also paid to the Irish Red Cross Society in recoupment of expenditure on the purchase and shipment of supplies. The remainder of the expenditure charged to the vote, £9,750, represents a contribution to the Inter-Governmental Committee on Refugees.

In paragraph 95 of my last report I referred to expenditure of £35,104 15s. 2d. on the purchase of a quantity of bacon which was subsequently sold on the home market. A net sum of £31,834 15s. 11d. was realized on the sale of the bacon and is brought to account as an exchequer extra receipt.

- E.—To this Subhead are charged payments made in error, or owing to the fact that notice of revocation or reduction of pension by a Pension Committee or the Central Pension Authority did not reach the Pension Officer in time to permit the stoppage of payment. In some cases the extreme poverty of the recipients rendered recovery impracticable; in others there was satisfactory evidence to show that the orders had been cashed in good faith. In all cases the authority of the Department of Finance was obtained before the amounts were written off as irrecoverable (Department of Finance minutes S. 88/2/43).
- F.—Grants made on grounds of equity in cases where, owing to causes beyond the pensioners' control, grant of pension was delayed or payment of pension was impracticable within the statutory period laid down by Section 5 (b) of the Old Age Pensions Act, 1911 (Department of Finance minutes S. 88/2/47 and S. 88/2/43).
- D.—The realizations under this Subhead depend upon the actual amounts recovered in cash during the year under Section 9 (2) of the Old Age Pensions Act, 1908. Receipts fluctuate considerably from year to year.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—Due to unavoidable delays in filling vacancies.
- B.—The amount of travelling was less than expected due to vacancies in the inspectorate staff.
- C.—The expenditure on advertisements was less than expected.
- D.—Requirements were less than expected.
- E.—Casual variation.
- F.—This resulted from the fact that the progress of the schemes particularly during the early stages of the financial year was slower than had been expected, due largely to shortage of supplies.

- L.—Because of delay in disposing of seeds, due to bad weather in 1946-47, some accounts which in normal circumstances would have been paid in that year were not presented for payment until 1947-48.
- M.—The demand for lime under the Scheme was less than expected. In some districts difficulties were experienced in regard to transport and fuel.
- O.—The Subhead is mainly intended to provide for proposals of an urgent character, which can seldom be foreseen when the estimate is being framed.

- 5. Seed potatoes and seed oats found short during the operation of the 1947 Seed Distribution Scheme were written off at cost price—£6 9s. 3d. (Department of Finance minute S. 90/36/47).
- 6. A ganger on a Rural Improvements Scheme, by making false entries in the paysheets, procured the issue of wages payments to the amount of £77 10s. 8d. in respect of persons who did not work on the scheme. On being prosecuted he pleaded guilty and was sentenced to six months imprisonment. Restitution sufficient to cover the amount of the fraud was paid by the ganger in Court, and this sum will be brought to credit as an Exchequer Extra Receipt in the Account of the Vote for 1948-49. The total expenditure on the scheme, including the payments obtained by fraud, was £164 approximately, of which £53 10s. 0d. was met by local contribution.
- 7. A ganger on a minor employment scheme procured the issue of wages payments to the amount of £1 16s. 0d. in favour of his son, by falsely returning him as having worked as a carter on certain dates. - A.—Saving due to changes in personnel caused by retirements, resignations, etc., and to vacancies in the staff for the whole or part of the year. The saving was modified by additional expenditure on overtime.
- B.—The excess was due to the increased volume of travelling found necessary and to the grant of increased travelling and subsistence allowances during the year.
- C.—Excess mainly due to unforeseen expenditure in connection with International Conferences.
- D.—Expenditure on telegrams and telephones cannot be forecasted accurately and the provision made proved inadequate.
- E.2.—The requirements of Brownsbarn Farm, which was acquired in December, 1946, could not be accurately gauged when the estimate was being framed and additional expenditure amounting to £2,157 was incurred on the purchase of live stock and farm requisites. The excess was partly offset by savings on other items.
- E.3.—Excess mainly due to payment this year of a subscription to the International Institute of Agriculture for which provision had been made in the estimate for 1946-47.
- E.4.—The research work for which this grant was provided could not be carried out during the early portion of the year.
- E.5.—Trials and experiments had to be made on a more extensive scale than expected.
- F.1.—Excess mainly due to the increased cost of seeds, manures, feeding stuffs and farm requisites generally; to the grant of increases during the year in the wages of farm labourers, etc., and to the necessity for employing additional labour more extensively than was anticipated.
- F.2.—The grant during the year of increased salaries and maintenance allowances in respect of teachers caused additional expenditure amounting to £2,362. The excess was modified by savings on other items of the subhead, mainly due to vacancies in students' places.
- F.3.—Casual excess.
- F.4.—Excess due to the grant during the year of an increase in the maintenance allowance for scholarship holders.
- F.8.—The provision made for Educational Tours for Instructors in Agriculture, etc., could not be utilised.
- F.9.—The provision made proved inadequate.
- G.1.—The principal excesses were £803 on travelling due mainly to the grant of increased travelling and subsistence allowances during the year; £2,774 on the purchase of additional dairy bulls and £215 on bonuses to non-pedigree dairy bulls due to an increase in the anticipated number of animals eligible for bonus. Savings on other items reduced the total excess to £3,344.
- G.2.—The number of stallions and colts obtainable was less than expected. Most of the provision made for the purchase of stock bulls was saved and stock pigs could not be imported.

- G.3.—Freight charges on imports of raw materials and the quantity of compound fertiliser which it was found possible to manufacture were less than expected and the subsidy needed was smaller than estimated. A reduction in the profit allowed on all fertilisers manufactured and sold in the 1946-47 season contributed to the saving.
- G.4.—The course of training in the management of poultry hatcheries commenced later in the year than was anticipated.
- H.—Deliveries of lime were adversely affected by unfavourable weather conditions in the early part of the year and by restricted supplies of fuel for lime burning. No grants were earned under the scheme of grants towards the erection of poultry houses. Normal grants and special temporary grants totalled more than estimated.
- I.2.—Three bulls and two rams allowed for in the estimate were not placed.
- I.4.—The progress made in the erection of the glasshouses was more rapid than was anticipated when the estimate was framed.
- K.1.—A trophy value £301 was purchased with the approval of Department of Finance for presentation to the Royal Dublin Society for competition at the International Jumping Championship Contests (Department of Finance minute S.90/24/34).
- L.—No expenditure was incurred in connection with the arboretum at Kilmacurra as the project was abandoned, and there were small savings on other items. Additional expenditure on salaries and wages modified the saving.
- M.1.—Excess mainly due to payment this year of an account for advertising in connection with food production propaganda for which provision had been made in the estimate for 1946-47. Travelling expenses amounted to £747 more than the estimate due mainly to the grant of increased travelling and subsistence allowances during the year. Savings on other items reduced the total excess to £1,774.
- M.2.—Excess due to the grant of increased fees to the reporters during the year.
- M.3.—An account in respect of bound volumes of leaflets did not come in course of payment before the close of the year. Expenditure in connection with the Department's Journal was lower than expected.
- M.4.—A saving of £13,238 on the provision for loans for the purchase of agricultural implements was due to shortage of supplies. Few loans were advanced for the purchase of stallions and the scarcity of equipment and building materials affected adversely the demand for loans for the purchase of poultry-keeping equipment and for the erection of poultry houses and corn mills. Additional advances were made for the purchase of bulls and hand sprayers.
- M.5.—Recoupments made to the Agricultural Credit Corporation in respect of administrative expenses and irrecoverable sums outstanding on loans advanced by the Corporation under the 1933-34 scheme of loans for the purchase of heifers amounted to more than expected. The following sums were written off with the approval of the Department of Finance, viz.:—

- M.M.5.—A number of applicants for loans for the purchase of cattle and sheep did not proceed with their applications and the full sum provided for advances to the Agricultural Credit Corporation for these loans was not required. The payment to the Corporation for administrative expenses was smaller than expected.
- M.7.—The Agricultual Production Consultative Council did not meet during the year.

- M.9.—Excess due to the payment this year of arrears of increased wages in respect of portion of the previous year and to the grant of increased travelling and subsistence allowances during the year.
- M.10.—A smaller quantity of potatoes was purchased than was anticipated when the estimate was framed.
- M.11.—The services of the architect and photographer employed to prepare plans and specifications and to take photographs of the lay-out of suitable farm buildings were not required to the extent anticipated and claims for their fees and for the travelling expenses incurred by some of the outdoor staff in attending lectures by the architect did not come in course of payment until after the close of the year.
- N.1.—Five vacancies for Ship Inspectors at the smaller ports remained unfilled and temporary assistance and renewals of uniforms were not required to the extent anticipated. Additional expenditure on travelling and on repairs to disinfection huts modified the saving.
- N.2.—The number of animals slaughtered under the Bovine Tuberculosis Order was lower than expected.
- O.3.—The excess expenditure was mainly on travelling and incidentals and was caused by the grant of increased travelling and subsistence allowances during the year and by the expansion in the acreage under seed potatoes and in exports of potatoes as compared with the previous year.
- O.4.—Two posts of Veterinary Examiner were vacant for the whole year and the services of part-time Veterinary Examiners and Temporary Lay Inspectors were not required to the full extent anticipated.
- O.5.—A saving of approximately £190,000 on the provision made for the Fertiliser Credits (Wheat) Scheme was mainly due to the fact that many wheat growers did not utilise their credit vouchers in time to enable merchants to claim recoupment of the value of the vouchers before the close of the year. Additional expenditure on salaries and travelling due to the employment of temporary Cereals Inspectors on barley inspection duties modified the saving.
- O.6.—It was not found necessary to employ Temporary Allotment Instructors to the full extent provided for and some accounts for the supply of free seeds, manures, etc., to unemployed allotment holders did not come in course of payment until after the close of the year.
- O.7.—Casual excess.
- O.8.—The cost of advertising the Wages Order made this year was higher than usual and additional expenditure was incurred on travelling due to the grant of increased travelling and subsistence allowances during the year.
- O.9.—Saving mainly due to the fact that the provision made for expenses in connection with the administration of the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts could not be utilised. The cost of equipment required for the purposes of the Agricultural Seeds Act was less than expected. Additional expenditure was incurred in connection with a meeting of the Tobacco Consultative Council and the cost of labour for the ear-punching of cattle exported from Greenore exceeded the estimate owing to the grant of increased wages during the year.
- 0.10.—The estimate was as close as was practicable.

The expenditure under this subhead includes sums of £4 10s. 0d. and £4, respectively, paid to two contractors in respect of their estimated earnings for a day wasted in an abortive attempt to cultivate a holding entered on under the Emergency Powers (Tillage) Order, 1946 (Department of Finance authority S.90/34/47).

- 1. The number of seed samples received for testing increased and sales of pure line seed realised more than expected.
- 2. Additional expenditure on the purchase of live stock for Brownsbarn Farm resulted in additional receipts from the sale thereof.
- 3. Receipts are difficult to forecast as they depend upon the numbers of live stock and quantities of farm produce available for disposal at the Department's farms and the prices received.
- 5. The estimate of receipts from fees for the registration of dairy cows was not fully realised owing to a decrease in the number of animals presented for inspection. Some of the dairy bulls purchased for leasing or resale were not disposed of until after the close of the year.

- (3) Exports of canned meat were lower than anticipated and receipts from inspection fees decreased accordingly.
- (b) Efforts to collect outstanding levies were more successful than expected.
- 25. Miscellaneous receipts are variable and cannot be closely estimated.
- 29. Surplus due to the receipt of more fees for licences under the Milk and Dairies Act, 1935, than was allowed for in the estimate.
- Prepayments on foot of loans advanced for the purchase of cattle and sheep could not be foreseen (Subhead M.M.5.).

Two Clerical Officers received £74 8s. 2d. and £73 13s. 5d., respectively, for acting as Clerks in Waiting at their residences; a Clerical Officer received an allowance of £24 17s. 3d. for the performance of higher duties during part of the year, and he also received 13s. 7d. for overtime and £38 17s. 10d. in respect of military service pension; two Clerical Officers received £35 5s. 7d. and £25 8s. 2d. for overtime and £45 and £14 16s. 9d., respectively, in respect of military service pensions; eight Clerical Officers and four Writing Assistants received sums varying from £30 15s. 7d. to £42 15s. 5d. in respect of overtime.

Three Messengers received £27 15s. 4d., £13 14s. 8d., and £3 18s. 9d. for overtime, and £21 8s. 6d., £46 13s. 4d. and £27 10s. 0d., respectively, in respect of military service pensions.

The Director of Veterinary Services received an allowance at the rate of £100 per annum from the Pigs and Bacon Commission for acting as a member of the Commission.

The Chief Inspector received an allowance at the rate of £100 per annum from the Flax Development Board, Limited, for acting as Director of the Board.

A Senior Inspector received an allowance of £98 17s. 2d. for acting as a member of the Departmental Agricultural Advisory Committee during part of the year.

Six Assistant Agricultural Overseers received gratuities of £60 each for supervisory duties.

The Literary Teacher at Clonakilty Agricultural Station received £49 16s. 5d. for clerical work and £11 15s. 0d. for teaching Irish.

A Seed Analyst at the Seed Testing Station received £30 6s. 11d. in respect of overtime.

Three Foremen, three Assistant Foremen, three Firemen, three Gardeners, a Messenger and two Garden Labourers at the Botanic Gardens received sums varying from £30 6s. 11d. to £121 17s. 10d. in respect of overtime, Sunday duty, etc.

Seven farm hands at Athenry Agricultural Station, six at Ballyhaise Agricultural Station and two at Clonakilty Agricultural Station received sums varying from £30 13s. 10d. to £78 4s. 6d. in respect of overtime, Sunday duty, etc.

- B.—Expenditure on benefits and cash supplements was less than anticipated and was further reduced owing to a strike by members of the staff of Cumann an Árachais Náisiúnta ar Shláinte in the latter part of the year.
- C.—Owing to the strike referred to above expenditure was less than estimated.
- D.—Claims in respect of food vouchers issued in prior years were less than anticipated.
- E.—Issues to public assistance authorities in respect of allowances paid in prior years were less than anticipated. The expenditure includes a sum of £239 0s. 9d. which is the proportion estimated to be proper to this Vote of certain final payments on foot of allowances paid in prior years by public assistance authorities to the classes covered by this Subhead and by Subhead C. of the Vote for Old Age Pensions. Exact apportionment of these final payments between the two Votes was not feasible.
- F.—The amounts claimed by public assistance authorities in recoupment of expenditure on allowances were less than expected.
- G.—To this Subhead are charged supplementary allowances paid in error and subsequently treated as irrecoverable. In one case supplementary allowance was paid to a beneficiary under the Widows' and Orphans' Pensions Acts who should have received food allowance instead and in another case the overpayment arose as a result of concealment of means by a recipient of a widow's pension. In other cases supplementary allowances were continued in error after title to widows' or orphans' pensions had ceased mainly because widows had attained 70 years of age or because children or orphans aged between 14 and 16 years had ceased to attend school. Recovery of the overpayments was not practicable mainly because of the poverty of the former recipients. In a number of cases there was a saving otherwise of public funds because the persons concerned, during the period while they were in receipt of supplementary allowances, did not receive food allowances or old age pensions. In all cases the authority of the Department of Finance was obtained before the amounts were written off as irrecoverable (Department of Finance minutes F. 64/1/45).

NOTE.

Supplementary payments amounting to £2 17s. 0d. made in 1945-46 under Subhead I. to two beneficiaries under the Widows' and Orphans' Pensions Acts, which were subsequently found to have been paid irregularly, have been written off as irrecoverable with the sanction of the Department of Finance. In one case the recipient should have received food allowance instead of supplementary allowance and in the other case the overpayment arose because the supplementary allowance was continued after title to widow's pension had ceased on the recipient attaining the age of 70 years. In both cases there was a saving otherwise of public funds (Department of Finance minutes F. 64/1/45).

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—Saving caused by deaths, retirements, resignations, transfers and delay in filling vacancies.
- B.—Excess due to increase in the amount of travelling and in the rates of travelling and subsistence.
- C.2.—Apart from materials, considerable savings were made, especially in maintenance labour and the costs of portable cross-cut saws. The amount of these savings was exceeded by over-expenditure on materials, particularly for fencing. These had been virtually unobtainable for several years, but it was found possible to make large contracts, supplies under which were unexpectedly received during the last weeks of the financial year, and under the terms of contract had to be paid for on delivery.
- C.3.—Saving due to temporary breakdown at one sawmill.
- D.—There was a falling off in the number of applications for grants and failure to complete planting in accordance with the regulations.
- F.1.—Token provision.
- F.2.—Excess due to increase in contribution required by the Commonwealth Forestry Bureau (Department of Finance minute S. 75/3/37).
- F.3.—Estimate provided for third instalment of a three year grant for research work payable to University College, Dublin, who later advised that only £100 would be required as the final instalment.

- G.—Excess mainly in costs of advertising, owing to unexpected volume of sales of thinnings.
 - Losses.—The charges under this subhead were sanctioned by minutes of the Department of Finance as follows:—
 - £265 10s. 2d. Subsequent to the purchase for forestry purposes of 1,360 acres in Co. EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—Saving due to vacancies remaining unfilled.
- B.—Excess mainly due to the expenses incurred by delegates to Trade Conferences abroad which could not have been foreseen when this estimate was prepared. In addition subsistence rates were increased as from 1st April, 1947.
- C.1.—Excess mainly due to the expenditure of (1) approximately £280 on the purchase of certain of the transcripts of evidence of the Locke's Distillery Tribunal of Inquiry, (2) approximately £146 on office expenses at a Trade Conference abroad, and (3) approximately £124 in connection with the hold up of normal milk supplies in Galway Borough (see Subhead T(5)).
- C.2.—Saving due to the charge for telephone services being less than was anticipated.

- D.—Excess due to increase in the cost of telephonists' services.
- E.—Excess due to the abnormal number of press insertions necessary in consequence of (1) alterations in the supplies position, and (2) revisions of the prices of certain commodities mainly arising out of the Supplementary Budget of 1947.
- G.—In consequence of the transfer to the Minister for Social Welfare on 6th May, 1947, of functions under Section 10 (3) of the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1934 (S. R. and O. No. 161 of 1947), fees and expenses of Medical Referees after that date were charged to Subhead A.1. Vote 66, no expenses having been incurred prior to the transfer.
- H.—Excess due to outstanding claims from the Vocational Education Committees for 1946-47 coming in course of payment within the year of this Account.
- I.—Excess caused by the payment of £40 for which provision had not been made, to the Imperial Shipping Committee and by an increase in the contribution payable to the Bureau International des Poids et Mesures.
- J.1.—Saving due to fluctuation in the rate of exchange between the date of preparation of the estimate and the date of payment.
- J.2.—Excess due to the payment in 1947-48 of claims from certain delegates to the 1946 International Labour Organisation Conference at Montreal which were under examination at the close of the 1946-47 Account.
- K.—Excess due to increases in salaries and wages of staff employed on the Health Embarkation Certificates scheme, modified by reductions effected in the number of staff serving.
- L.—Mainly composed of savings on flour subsidy (approximately £19,000), batch bread subsidy (approximately £43,000), tea subsidy (approximately £31,000), oatmeal subsidy (approximately £15,000) and sugar subsidy (approximately £5,000). In regard to flour, closer estimation was not practicable owing to fluctuations in the wheat price position, whilst the saving on batch bread was due to certain accounts being either not received or under examination at the close of the financial year. The amount charged as tea subsidy represented a payment on account as the actual losses incurred, although greater, could not be ascertained by 31st March, 1948. No payment of subsidy was made on oatmeal, the rate proposed not being accepted by the millers and, consequently, was under further consideration on 31st March, 1948. The saving on sugar was due to the quantity of sugar required being less than was anticipated.
- M.—Saving due to decline in sales of subsidised fuel consequent on the improvement of the coal supply position.
- N.—The accounts from local authorities were still under examination at the close of the financial year.
- O.—Owing to reduced production of turf the amount of compensation payable to owners of lands acquired was less than was anticipated.
- P.1.—Expenditure in connection with Slieveardagh coalfield was less than was anticipated. Closer estimation was not practicable.
- P.2.—A sum of £84,995 was provided by way of Supplementary Estimate to meet the payment to Mianrai, Teo., under Section 5 (2) of the Minerals Company Act, 1947, which became law on 10th December, 1947. It was subsequently decided that the minerals exploration and development programme of Mianrai, Teo., should be postponed and payment of the sum of £7,726 3s. 7d. to meet commitments up to 31st March, 1948, was made to the Company.
- P.3.—Certain compensation claims were under consideration at the close of this Account.
- P.4.—It was not found possible to make the anticipated progress in drilling owing to difficulties in obtaining suitable equipment.

- Q.1.—Saving due to reduced production during the 1947 season owing to unfavourable weather conditions and due also to the decision to discontinue the scheme, taken in February, 1948.
- Q.2.—Closer estimation was not practicable.
- Q.5.—Saving due to reduced expenditure on the purchase of equipment and on development works in connection with turf production in the 1948 season. The improved fuel supply position did not warrant turf production under this scheme on the scale originally intended.
- R.1.—Owing to the large number of cases referred to the Labour Court it was found necessary for the Second Division thereof to sit over protracted periods with consequent greater payment of fees than was anticipated.
- R.2. and R.3.—Excess due to increased travelling and advertising expenses in consequence of the number of sittings of the Court being much greater than was anticipated.
- S.2.—No special investigations were undertaken in the course of the year.
- S.3.—As it was not found possible to start on the erection of a new laboratory the provision made for the preliminary expenses thereon was not utilised.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.1.—No closer estimate was practicable.
- A.2.—No expenditure was necessary.
- A.3.—The saving is mainly due to the fact that lack of equipment and difficulty in securing materials caused postponement of dredging operations and improvement works at certain harbours. In addition, it was not found possible to have the preliminary work in relation to some of the works carried out as early as was anticipated.
- B.—Saving was due to vacancies in staff and to the fact that the provision for additional staff was not used.
- C.—Travelling was less than anticipated, due mainly to delay in the appointment of an Engineer Surveyor.
- D.—The excess is mainly attributable to expenditure in connection with presentations to the Captain and Crew of a French vessel which rescued the captain and part of the crew of the Irish vessel s.s. "Luinneach" after it was sunk by belligerent action in 1940 (Department of Finance minute S. 99/46/46). Expenditure on other miscellaneous items was somewhat greater than anticipated.
- E.—The estimate was a token figure only, no inquiries being then in view. The expenditure relates to an inquiry into the stranding of s.s. "IRISH PLANE."
- G.—The estimate is normally of a conjectural nature, and since the cessation of hostilities it has been even more difficult to form an accurate estimate under this heading. The quantity of wreck dealt with in the year to which this account relates was abnormally low by comparison with the war years. The costs incurred were less than the relevant receipts under Subhead M. (Appropriations in Aid).
- H.—The estimate was a token figure only.
- I.—No acquisitions were made.
- J.1.—No claims to compensation were received.
- J.2.—The provision made for contingencies was in excess of requirements. The expenditure includes an item of £2 4s. 3d. in respect of an irrecoverable overpayment of pension (Department of Finance minute P. 8/45/41).
- J.3.—Cases arising were fewer and less expensive than anticipated.
- J.4.—No claim was received.
- K.—The saving is due to delay on the part of shipowners in having the protective equipment removed and in rendering their claims. In addition, experience has shown that the amount necessary in connection with this service will not be as great as was anticipated.
- L.1.—The excess is due to increased expenditure on exercise allowances consequent on improved attendances.
- L.2.—The excess is due to an increase in the rates of subsistence and to the fact that the expenditure includes items relating to the previous year.
- L.3.—The rentals were in course of revision when the estimate was prepared.
- L.4.—The excess is due to increased charges for transport and to expenditure on miscellaneous items being greater than anticipated.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

A.1.—A closer estimate was not possible.

The salary of the Chief Medical Officer is charged to this subhead. This Officer performs certain duties also for other Government Departments, including the Civil Service Commission. The value of these services is estimated to be one-half of his salary.

- A.2.—The excess was due to unforeseen expenditure in connection with the General Election (£2,000) and to increases in parcel post traffic (foreign (£5,000), inland (£3,000)); offset by savings on Sunday duty and overtime requirements due to improved arrangements for Cross-Channel telegraph services (£4,500).
- A.3.—The excess was due to unforeseen expenditure in connection with the General Election (£7,000), to honoraria to Postmasters for additional work performed during Emergency period (£5,000), to wages rate adjustments arising from consolidation and arrears from previous year (£26,000), to increased staff due to telephone development (£8,000) and to the gradual resumption of normal services.
- A.4.—The relief to this subhead in respect of the amount chargeable to telephone capital funds for handling of stores was lower than anticipated (£5,520), and wages rates for labour were increased.
- AA.—The excess was due to the number of money orders and postal orders issued for payment in Great Britain being greater than anticipated.
- B.—The excess was due to the headquarters staff travelling more than was anticipated and to higher rates of subsistence and conveyance.
- BB.—The excess was due to the expenses in connection with a telecommunications conference in Atlantic City being greater than anticipated.
- C.—The excess was due to increased charges for fuel and gas and to expenditure on electricity being greater than anticipated.
- D.—The saving was due to expenditure on certain sites not materializing.
- E.1.—The excess was due to payments for increased parcel post traffic; offset by a reduction in the subsidy payable to Córas Iompair Éireann for the conveyance of letter mails (Department of Finance letter S. 39/1/43).
- E.2.—The excess was due to the increased cost of mail car contracts and to the introduction of new road services (£6,950), to increased payments to Córas Iompair Éireann for Dublin City mail car services (£11,650) (Department of Finance letter S. 39/3/39) and to increased parcel post traffic.
- E.3.—A casual variation.
- E.4.—The saving was mainly due to anticipated increased frequency of the Cross-Channel packet services not having materialized.
- E.5.—The excess was due to an unanticipated increase in the volume of air mail traffic.
- F.—The excess was due to increased telegraphic traffic.
- G.1.—The excess was due to unanticipated additional expenditure in the provision and maintenance of bicycles. The expenditure includes an ex-gratia payment of £30 13s. 9d. in respect of increased prices of goods supplied (Department of Finance letter S. 9/13/39), and a payment of 19s. 2d., being half the cost of twenty bicycle freewheels lost in transit (Department of Finance letter S. 33/3/28).
- G.2.—The saving was due to delay in delivery by contractors of goods ordered and to claims not materializing.
- G.3.—The saving was due to inability to obtain supplies.
- H.1.—The excess was due to the number and expense of prosecutions being greater than anticipated.

- H.2.—Expenditure under this subhead cannot be accurately estimated. A classified schedule of losses is shewn on page 220. The loss to public funds is reduced by £57 ls. 2d. on account of unpaid wages, etc., due to dismissed, etc., officers.
- H.3.—Expenditure under this subhead, which cannot be accurately estimated, includes costs, witnesses' expenses, etc., in workmen's compensation, etc., cases (Department of Finance letters P. 7/20/47, S. 48/2/48 and S. 48/5/48); cost of brochures for sets of postage stamps for presentation to delegates at the International Postal Union Congress, Paris, etc. (£13) (Department of Finance letter S. 41/18/32); cost of two hundred and fifty official Christmas greetings cards for distribution to members of the Universal Postal Union (£5 10s. 0d.) (Department of Finance letter S. 41/2/25); photographing two designs for stamps and supplying assorted prints (12s.) (Department of Finance letter S. 41/16/34); recoupment to Postman, Grade B, in respect of legal expenses incurred by him in defending a charge of dangerous driving of an official motor van involved in an accident (£3 3s. 0d.) (Department of Finance letter S. 41/19/47); doctor's fee in an accident on duty case (£3 3s. 0d.) (Department of Finance letter P. 7/23/47), and payments amounting to £3 3s. 0d. in respect of special medical fees and examinations (Department of Finance letters E. 104/16/37 and P. 7/36/47). In addition, an ex-gratia payment of £2 was made to a member of the public for his services in furnishing evidence which led to the detection and conviction of a person responsible for the larceny of £9 from a counter clerk at the General Post Office, Dublin.
- I.1.—The saving was due to inability to recruit suitable labour force (£15,800) and to the relief in respect of telephone capital and repayment works being greater than anticipated (£50,600).
- I.2.—The excess was due to increased cost of travelling and to higher rates of subsistence (£5,400); offset by the relief in respect of telephone capital being greater than anticipated (£1,800).
- K.—The excess was due to the relief from telephone capital funds being less than anticipated (£30,000) and to the payment for stores delivered earlier than was anticipated (£10,000). The expenditure includes a payment of £2,700, on account, and without prejudice towards the Department's ultimate contribution in respect of the salvage of Post Office engineering equipment which was part of the cargo carried by the S.S. Ayrshire Coast when the ship was disabled in heavy seas (Department of Finance letter S. 41/1/47). The expenditure also includes an ex-gratia payment of £1 15s. 1d. in respect of increased prices of goods supplied (Department of Finance letter S. 9/3/40). The value of stores used in making good malicious damage was £4 15s. 6d.
- L.1.—This subhead provides for this Government's share of the cost of repairs to Anglo-Irish submarine cables, the extent of which cannot be accurately foreseen.
- L.2.—A casual variation.
- L.3.—The saving was due to contract work on common service construction (£3,300) and on telegraph construction (£1,100) being less than anticipated, and to accounts which did not come in course of payment in the year (£7,000).
- L.4.—The excess was due to increased consumption of light and power (£1,440) and to increased rates on wires (£420).
- L.5.—The excess was due to payments in respect of accidents and damage to property by Post Office plant being greater than anticipated. Expenditure under this head includes ex-gratia payments of £75 (Department of Finance letter S. 41/8/47), £17 6s. 9d., £6 5s. 0d., £5, £5, £5, £4 10s. 0d. and 10s. 6d. made to members of the public as compensation for injuries, etc., resulting from accidents arising out of engineering works; and £57 18s. 0d. in respect of damages and costs awarded to the owner of a motor lorry which was in collision with an official motor truck (Department of Finance letter S. 48/1/48).

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—The saving was due to posts for actors (£4,460), members of orchestra (£14,440), conductor, etc. (£5,390) remaining unfilled and to non-recruitment of engineering staff for the shortwave station (£5,620).
- B.—The excess was due to an increase in the general level of artistes' fees.
- C.—The excess was due to larger and more expensive music requirements for enlarged orchestras and to the unanticipated purchase of a piano.
- D.—The saving was due to travelling in connection with the shortwave station being less than anticipated.
- E.—The saving was due to the shortwave station not being operated and to a curtailment of the daily programme.
- F.—The saving was due to non-delivery of equipment for the shortwave station and for maintenance and renewals.
- G.—The saving was due to anticipated expenditure at a broadcasting conference at Lausanne not being incurred.
- H.—The excess was due to unanticipated expenditure in recruiting members of orchestras and to increased contacts with foreign conductors and artistes.
- I.—The excess was due to advertising, etc., expenses in connection with recruitment of additional programme staff being greater than anticipated.

EXTRA REMUNERATION (exceeding £30).

Two Clerical Officers, one Shorthand Typist, two Writing Assistants, twenty-three Skilled Workmen and six Doorkeepers received extra remuneration varying between £30 3s. 1d. and £89 11s. 4d. in respect of extra attendance.

One Clerical Officer and one Actor received £32 15s. 0d. and £35, respectively, for professional services rendered.

- A.1.—The number of Officers sent on Courses was greater than anticipated.
- A.2.—The number of gratuities maturing for payment was greater than anticipated.
- A.3.—The number of Horse Shows attended was less than anticipated.
- A.4.—A large number of gratuities for which provision was made was not claimed.
- B.—The average strength of the Married Establishment was below that provided for.
- C.—The number of civilians employed was greater than anticipated owing to the reduced strength of the Army, particularly as affecting soldier-tradesmen and storemen and wages were increased.
- D.—Mainly due to a reduction in the number of Chaplains.
- E.—The strength of the Medical Corps (Officers) and Army Nursing Service was less than that provided for.
- F.—Dental requisites and equipment, and X-ray films and equipment were not purchased to the extent anticipated.
- G .- A casual variation.

- H.—Consequent on the reduced strength of the Army the number of personnel travelling on duty, leave and discharge was less than that provided for, and movement of units did not take place to the extent anticipated.
- I.—Stores were not conveyed to the extent anticipated.
- J.—The number of vehicles delivered during the year was greater than anticipated and prices were increased; the cost of maintenance was also greater than anticipated.
- K.—Saving due to the strength of the Army being less than that provided for; partly offset by increased purchases of provisions for issue on repayment and increases in ration allowances.
- L.—Aviation spirit and lubricating oils were not required to the extent anticipated; partly offset by increased purchases and increased cost of petrol for vehicles.
- M.—Uniform clothing was not required to the extent anticipated, due mainly to the strength of the Army being less than that provided for.
- N.—The number of horses maintained was less than anticipated.
- O.—Deliveries of aircraft and associated stores were greater than anticipated; partly offset by reduced purchases of camp equipment, workshop equipment and miscelaneous stores.
- O.1.—Expenditure was less than anticipated.
- P.—Stores to the extent provided for were not procurable.
- P.1.—Mainly due to the fact that the amount of the grants payable to Local Authorities,
 Essential Undertakers, etc., the claims for which mature for payment at irregular
 intervals, was greater than anticipated.
- P.2.—Mainly due to the non-purchase of vessels for which provision had been made, and consequent saving on cost of maintenance.
- Q.—Purchases of technical and instructional stores and firefighting equipment were in excess of the amounts anticipated; partly offset by a saving on renewals and maintenance of plant, etc., and equipment for the Construction Corps.
- R.—Owing to the critical fuel position in the early part of the year it was necessary to make special arrangements for the provision of supplies. These arrangements involved greatly increased costs.
- S.—Mainly due to the fact that new works were not executed to the extent anticipated; maintenance costs were reduced by the evacuation of certain barracks and posts.
- S.1.—Due to the increased pay of crews.
- S.2.—The strength of the corps was below that provided for.
- T.—Mainly due to the purchase of premises for married officers' quarters for which to provision had been made.
- U.—Mainly due to the fact that compensation paid in respect of damage to premises occupied by military during the Emergency was greater than anticipated; compensation for damage or injury in cases of accidents in which Army vehicles were involved was also greater than anticipated; partly offset by a saving on provision for personnel killed or injured during training.
- V.—Barrack service equipment was not purchased to the extent provided for and the cost of laundry was lower than anticipated.
- V.1.—Claims maturing for payment were less than anticipated.
- W.—The strength of the Army was less than that provided for; partly offset by insurance for a greater number of civilian employees.

- X.—Mainly due to increased advertising in connection with recruiting drives.
- X.1.—A casual variation.
- X.2.—Treatment was not availed of to the extent anticipated.
- Y.—Due to a reduction in staff.
- Y.1.—Inspections were carried out to a greater extent than anticipated, and travelling expenses and subsistence allowances were increased.
- Y.2.—Mainly due to the fact that members of the Reserve—Second Line did not attend for annual training to the extent anticipated and the strength of the Force did not reach the figure provided for; there was also a saving for similar reasons on the Reserve of Men—First Line; partly offset by payment of a special uniform allowance to certain members of the Reserve of Officers—First Line.
- Y.3.—The grant-in-aid was reduced to 10s. per effective member (boots being at the same time made a free issue) and the number of members in respect of whom grants were payable was less than anticipated.

- B.—The extent of the travelling in connection with inspection work was less than had been anticipated.
- C.—The provision for expenditure on newspapers and advertisements in the press proved to be greater than was required.
- D.—Provision was made for the cost of a full year's telephone service, but only three quarterly accounts came in course of payment.
- F.—The provision under this Subhead is necessarily conjectural. Only one Inquiry was found to be necessary in the year.
- G.2.—It was not found necessary either to incur travelling expenses or to purchase apparatus.

- J.4.—This token provision was intended to meet the possibility of charges arising in connection with the formation of a body to administer a blood-transfusion service, but no claim matured within the year.
- K.—The expenditure by local authorities on which the grants are based was less than had been estimated by them. Moreover, new schemes for which provision had been made were not put into operation in certain areas.
- L.—Issues from this grant-in-aid ceased during the year as the Hospital became eligible to receive fees as a treatment centre under Local Authority Venereal Diseases Schemes.
- M.—As a revision of the scheme had to be undertaken due to changes in the conditions of employment of probationers no candidates were recruited during the year. In addition, payment of accounts relating to girls already in training had to be delayed pending the settlement of questions arising from the changes in the terms of their employment.

Transport difficulties precluded the despatch of certain livestock allocated under the relief programme for the year and, owing to continued shortage of packing materials, it was found possible to ship only about one-sixth of the quantity of canned meat for which provision had been made. Payments to relief organisations were less than had been expected.

Notes,

- (1) By direction of the Minister for Finance an amount of £49 4s. 7d., being the cost (charged to this Account for the year 1946-47) of a quantity of tinned meat stolen from a transit shed at Waterford while awaiting shipment to the Iberian Peninsula, was written off as irrecoverable (S. 200/2/47).
- (2) This Account includes expenditure of £1,701 3s. 8d., being the "dead" freight charge in respect of quantities of bacon and sugar arranged to be despatched to Italy, but subsequently withdrawn from shipment owing to the serious supply position at home in respect of those commodities (S. 200/4/46).

- (3) The cost of the purchase and storage of a quantity of bacon acquired for export to Europe but subsequently sold on the home market to relieve the difficult supply position there exceeded the proceeds of sale (See above under Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer) by £3,269 19s. 3d.
