ACCOUNTS OF THE PUBLIC SERVICES, 1949-50.

REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER AND AUDITOR GENERAL.

GENERAL.

Out-turn of the Year.

1. The gross estimates for public services for the financial year 1949-50, as shown by the summary on page xxxi, amounted to £78,066,604, and the gross expenditure to £76,759,201 15s. 9d. Appropriations in aid which were estimated at £3,459,140 realized £3,446,630 7s. 6d., and the actual amount applied in aid of expenditure was £3,372,900 17s. 6d., the balance falling to be surrendered.

The total amount to be surrendered is £1,294,892 11s. 9d., which is arrived at as follows:—

Receipts realized £3,446,630 7s. 6d., of which £3,372,900 17s. 6d. was applied in aid of expenditure, leaving surplus receipts for surrender amounting to ... 73,729 10 0 Expenditure was £76,759,201 15s. 9d., falling short of the estimate by £1,307,402 4s. 3d.; the latter figure is reduced by deficiencies of appropriations in aid on certain votes, amounting to £86,239 2s. 6d., leaving a net saving of ... 1,221,163 1 9

The amount to be surrendered, £1,294,892 11s, 9d., represents approximately 1.7 per cent. of the supply grants.

In no case has the provision made by Dáil Éireann been exceeded, nor is an excess vote necessary.

Stock and Store Accounts.

2. The stock and store accounts of the Departments have been examined. The results are satisfactory, with some exceptions which are referred to in the paragraphs relating to the votes of the Departments concerned.

Surrender of Balances on 1948-49 Votes.

3. The balances to be surrendered out of votes for the public services for 1948–49 amounted to £7,074,421 0s. 11d. I hereby certify that these balances have been duly surrendered to the Exchequer.

Foreign Exchange Account.

4. The Foreign Exchange Account established under the provisions of section 49 of the Finance Act, 1941, has been examined for the year ended 31st March, 1950. I certify that, in my opinion, the operations and transactions coming within the purview of such examination have been conducted and effected in accordance with the statutory provisions.

VOTE 6.—OFFICE OF THE REVENUE COMMISSIONERS.

Revenue Account.

5. A test examination of the Revenue Account has been carried out with satisfactory results.

Extra-statutory Repayments of Customs and Excise Duties.

6. Extra-statutory repayments of Customs duties and of Excise duties amounting to £6,327 5s. 5d. and £1,369 11s. 5d., respectively, were made during the year.

Remissions and Amounts Irrecoverable.

7. I have been furnished with schedules of the cases involving a loss of £50 or upwards in which claims for duty under the Revenue Acts were remitted without statutory authority or passed as irrecoverable during the year ended 31st March, 1950. I have made a test examination of the items included in the schedules with satisfactory results.

The schedules show that the total amount remitted or passed as irrecoverable in the year was £170,797 5s. 4d., made up as follows:—

The remission of Customs duty, amounting to £129,298 6s. 10d., related to certain consignments of kerosene (vaporising oil) totalling 2,216,543 gallons imported for use in agricultural tractors. This oil would ordinarily be eligible for rebate of the full amount of the duty, but it was found, on test, to come technically within the statutory specification of mineral hydrocarbon light oil in respect of which there is no rebate provision. In view of the unsuitability of the oil for use as motor spirit and of the vital necessity of maintaining a supply of oil for use in agricultural tractors, the Revenue Commissioners decided, with the concurrence of the Department of Finance, to allow rebate of the full amount of the duty. The Department of Finance sanction also covers future cases of the same kind where the Revenue Commissioners are satisfied that the oil is required for use in agricultural tractors and is necessary for agricultural operations.

VOTE 9.—OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Insurance of Workmen.

8. Reference was made in previous reports to the Commissioners' claim against the Liquidator of the Irish Employers' Mutual Insurance Association, Limited, in respect of payments of compensation, etc., arising out of accident risks which had been covered by policies of insurance with that Association. The Liquidator has submitted for determination by the High Court the question whether the claim is a debt due to the State and entitled to priority. I understand that the hearing of the case had not concluded at the date of my report.

VOTE 10.—PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

Subhead B.—New Works, Alterations and Additions.

9. The charge to this subhead includes expenditure of £11,286 ls. 10d. on the erection of temporary buildings for use

as a central engineering workshop and store to meet the expanding volume of repair work arising from arterial drainage schemes. In addition, a sum of £2,640 was paid for the site and charged in the accounts of previous years. As noted in the statement appended to the account, further expenditure on this work has been deferred, and I understand that negotiations have been entered into for the acquisition of permanent premises.

Subhead J.2.—Arterial Drainage—Construction Works.

10. The expenditure during the year on works on the Brosna and the Glyde and Dee schemes amounted to £151,765 4s. 11d. In addition, the assessed value of the services rendered by the use of plant and machinery amounted to £78,715 2s. 6d.

Including the direct expenditure and the assessed charge for the use of plant and machinery in the previous year the total cost of schemes under the Arterial Drainage Act, 1945, up to 31st March, 1950, was £329,086 3s. 10d. of which £328,078 16s. 1d. relates to the Brosna scheme and £1,007 7s. 9d. to the Glyde and Dee scheme, work on which was begun during the year under review.

Subhead K.1.—Purchase of Engineering Plant and Machinery.

11. Dredging plant was purchased from a local authority in 1948 for £6,000 and expenditure, amounting to £4,306 on 31st March, 1950, was incurred on towage, dry-docking and watching charges, but the plant has not so far been put into service. The sanction of the Department of Finance for the purchase was accorded subject to the condition that a scale of charges which would ensure recovery of the capital cost would be fixed for the use of the plant. I am informed that the plant requires an extensive overhaul, that the purchase of auxiliary plant is necessary to make it an effective working unit, and that the question of its future use has had to be deferred pending satisfactory arrangements for the overhaul and for the purchase of the auxiliary plant.

Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer.

12. These receipts include a sum of £6,516 received from the Department of Posts and Telegraphs out of telephone capital funds in recoupment of expenditure incurred in prior years on part of a building which has been taken over for telephone development purposes. The receipts also include a sum of £500, received in settlement of a High Court action by which it was sought to enforce the specific performance of a contract for the sale of a State property.

VOTE 11.—EMPLOYMENT AND EMERGENCY SCHEMES.

- 13. Provision was made under subhead F. (Urban Employment Schemes), subhead G. (Rural Employment Schemes) and subhead J. (Reconditioning or Repair of Public Roads subject to Heavy Turf Transport) for grants towards expenditure by local authorities on schemes for the provision of employment. The grants were paid in instalments, during the progress of the various works, by the Department of Local Government acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. Accounts of the expenditure are examined by Local Government Auditors whose certificates are furnished to me in support of the charge to the vote.
- 14. The expenditure charged to subhead H. (Minor Employment Schemes) and subhead I. (Development Works in Bogs used by Landholders and other Private Producers) related to schemes administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office. In some counties the schemes were carried out on its behalf by the county engineers who received imprests from the vote which were subsequently accounted for in detail.
- 15. The schemes for which provision was made under subheads K. (Farm Improvements Scheme), L. (Seed Distribution Scheme) and M. (Lime Distribution Scheme) were administered, as in previous years, by the Department of Agriculture acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. Owing to the introduction of the Farm Buildings Scheme (subhead M. 11 Vote 29, Agriculture), and the Land Rehabilitation Project (subhead M. 13, Vote 29, Agriculture), the Farm Improvements Scheme was not operated as such in the 1949–50 season and the charge to subhead K. includes farm improvement grants authorized in prior years only, and expenditure on a field drainage scheme operated in counties Galway and Mayo. The grants paid amounted to £249,388 0s. 11d., made up as follows:—

Expenditure on the field drainage scheme in counties Galway and Mayo amounted to £16,641 18s. 6d., the work being carried out under a system of direct labour by men formerly employed on the production of hand-won turf. Farmers participating in the scheme were required to contribute towards the cost at the rate of £4 per statute acre, and a sum of £988 17s. 0d. is included in the exchequer extra receipts in respect of these contributions. Administrative expenses amounting to £46,665 0s. 3d., on the schemes provided for under subheads K., L. and M., account for the remainder of the charge to subhead K.

- 16. The scheme for which provision was made under subhead N. (Rural Improvements Scheme) was administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office, either directly or through the agency of county engineers. Grants were made towards the cost of works for the joint benefit of groups of two or more farmers, consisting of accommodation roads to houses, farms and bogs, small drainage works (excluding field drains), roads which connect two county roads, and the erection or reconstruction of small bridges. Only works which were estimated to cost not less than £40 were considered. In most cases grants of 75 per cent. of the estimated cost, excluding county engineers' fees, were paid, the balance being contributed by the beneficiaries. Contributions in cash were usually collected, but contributions of either materials or labour were also considered, and the contributors or members of their families were afforded the opportunity of employment on the works. The expenditure during the year on approved works amounted to £103,016 12s. 9d. but cash contributions amounting to £22,516 18s. 6d. reduced the charge to the vote to £80,499 14s. 3d.
- 17. The charge to subhead O. (Miscellaneous Schemes) relates to expenditure on works of an emergency character or for the relief of unemployment and distress. These works were administered either by the Special Employment Schemes Office or by other Departments acting on its behalf.

VOTE 21.—STATIONERY AND PRINTING.

Subhead H.—Printing.

- 18. It was observed in the course of audit of the expenditure on printing that the normal procedure in connection with the placing of contracts was not always followed, and I am in communication with the Accounting Officer on the matter.
- 19. A sum of £448 7s. 5d. was expended on printing and binding 250 copies of a handbook. The sanction of the Department of Finance had been obtained for an estimated expenditure of £160 on this work and I have asked that covering sanction be sought for the additional expenditure incurred.

Stores.

20. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer on certain points arising out of an examination of the records of equipment issued on location to Government Departments.

VOTE 29.—AGRICULTURE.

Subhead F.1.—Agricultural Schools and Farms.

21. Provision was included in a supplementary estimate for the purchase of Grange Farm, Dunsany, Co. Meath, for use as a dairy cattle breeding farm and as a station at which live stock can be kept temporarily pending location under the Live Stock Improvement Schemes. The purchase was completed in December, 1949, and the charge to the subhead includes sums amounting to £41,403 13s. 8d. in connection therewith.

Subhead G.4.—Improvement of Poultry and Egg Production.

22. Apart from remuneration and travelling expenses of staff amounting to £26,574 4s. 1d., and expenditure of £11,944 15s. 9d. on equipment for poultry technicians, advertising, etc., the expenditure on this service consisted of grants towards the cost of providing accommodation and equipment for poultry-keeping and of subsidies on sales of day-old chicks. Grants paid directly amounted to £111,639 11s. 8d., comprising £19,454 17s. 5d. towards the establishment or extension of commercial hatcheries, £58,577 towards the establishment or extension of approved hatching-egg supply farms, poultry stations and pedigree poultry breeding farms, £33,151 16s. 6d. towards the cost incurred by ordinary poultry keepers in providing accommodation for adult birds, and £455 17s. 9d. in sundry grants. Also, £35,416 8s. 2d. was paid to certain County Committees of Agriculture in recoupment of grants made by them to ordinary poultry keepers towards the cost of chicken houses and equipment. Subsidies paid to licensed hatchery owners on sales of day-old chicks totalled £65,422 8s. 0d.

Fees amounting to £2,285 3s. 0d., in respect of poultry hatchery licences, etc., are brought to account as appropriations in aid.

Subhead H.—Grants to County Committees of Agriculture.

23. The charge to this subhead comprises normal grant amounting to £156,430 10s. 0d., payments amounting to £49,235 9s. 6d. for the purpose of supplementing committees' expenditure on the provision of lime for agricultural purposes, and recoupment of £1,397 12s. 7d. expended by eight committees on grants towards the cost of the erection of poultry-houses in Gaeltacht areas.

The normal grant of £156,430 10s. 0d. includes a sum of £73,611, approximately equivalent to the proceeds of the agricultural rate of 2d. in the £ levied under the Agriculture Act, 1931, and extra grants, amounting to £82,819 10s. 0d., equivalent to the amount of the income of committees from rates in excess of the statutory minimum.

Subhead I.3.—Scheme to encourage the commercial production of glasshouse crops in Gaeltacht areas.

24. Reference was made in previous reports to the placing of contracts for the erection of central buildings and glasshouses in Counties Donegal and Galway. Further payments amounting to £6,469 19s. 0d. were made in the year under review bringing the total amount paid on foot of these contracts to £96,234 19s. 0d. on 31st March, 1950. The charge to the subhead also includes £214 4s. 11d. for the purchase of the site for the central buildings in County Galway and expenses in connection therewith, and £4,125 19s. 6d. for remuneration and travelling expenses of staff and general expenses.

Each grower for whom a glasshouse was erected entered into an agreement to repay £150 of the cost, with interest at $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum, by annual instalments of £20 or 10 per cent. of the net proceeds of the crop, whichever was the less, and to bear a proportion of the running expenses of the scheme. In the 1949 season, tomato plants propagated in the central buildings were transferred to 195 glasshouses and approximately 184 tons of tomatoes were marketed, the net proceeds of sale being £12,053 9s. 1d., of which £8,040 4s. 5d. was paid to the growers and the balance of £4,013 4s. 8d. credited to appropriations in aid. Under the terms of the agreements the amount due by the growers for the 1949 season was £4.682 14s. 7d. but, as it was considered that it would be a hardship on growers with abnormally low returns to be required to meet their liabilities in full, it was decided to postpone the collection of sums amounting to £707 0s. 10d. The total liability of the growers in respect of the 1948 and 1949 seasons outstanding at 31st March, 1950, was £1,100 6s. 7d.

Subhead M.M.5.—Special temporary scheme of loans for the purchase of cattle and sheep.

25. The charge to the subhead, £4,928 2s. 2d., represents sums paid to the Agricultural Credit Corporation, Limited, in respect of the cost of administering the special scheme of loans made to assist farmers who suffered serious and abnormal losses of cattle and sheep as a result of severe weather conditions in the early months of the year 1947.

The loans are free of interest and are repayable in four instalments spread over a period of four years. Sums amounting to £83,882 9s. 0d. received during the year in repayment of the loans are included under subhead P.—Appropriations in Aid. The amount outstanding at 31st March, 1950, in respect of these loans was £162,586 1s. 7d. as shown in the statement appended to the account.

Subhead M.6.—Improvement of the Creamery Industry.

26. As will be seen from the account, no expenditure was incurred under this subhead during the year.

Receipts arising from the disposal of creamery properties, which are brought to account as exchequer extra receipts, amounted to £10,654 18s. 4d. The total expenditure from voted moneys to 31st March, 1950, on the improvement of the creamery industry amounted to £1,197,869 5s. 6d. and receipts were £394,873 16s. 11d., leaving a net charge on public funds of £802,995 8s. 7d.

Subhead M.11.—Farm Buildings Scheme.

27. The expenditure charged to this subhead comprised £35,226 9s. 7d. for administrative expenses and £23,068 6s. 10d. for grants for the construction and improvement of farm buildings and for certain allied works. The grants made included £14,094 15s. 6d. paid to rated occupiers towards the cost of newly constructed farm buildings or extensions at rates varying according to the nature of the work undertaken; £2,384 13s. 3d. for improvement, repair or conversion of farm buildings on the basis of 50 per cent. of the approved estimated cost of the labour required, subject to a maximum grant for each building equal to three-fifths of the grant for a new building of the same class; and £6,588 18s. 1d. for other approved works on the basis of 50 per cent. of the approved estimated labour cost.

$Subhead\ M.13.-Land\ Rehabilitation\ Project.$

28. The Land Reclamation Act, 1949, authorized the Minister for Agriculture to carry out land reclamation, field drainage and other works and provided for the payment by the occupiers of a contribution towards the cost, the contribution being payable when the Minister certifies that the work has been completed or, if an occupier has so elected, by means of an annuity.

Under the project an occupier may arrange to have approved work carried out by the Department on agreeing to pay twofifths of the estimated cost plus the cost of fertilisers supplied, subject to a maximum of £12 per acre, or alternatively, he may carry out the work himself and receive a grant amounting to two-thirds of the estimated cost, subject to a maximum of £20 per acre less the cost of fertilisers supplied.

A considerable quantity of machinery was purchased for operation by the Department, and, in addition, arrangements were made to assist individuals, contractors and farmers' organizations to acquire machinery, to enable them to undertake work on the project, by the issue of free grants limited to one-third of the cost.

Subhead M.14.—Prevention of contagious abortion and other diseases in cattle.

29. The charge to the subhead includes £4,779 12s. 11d. for vaccine and £624 12s. 4d. for advertising, publicity and miscellaneous expenses in connection with the scheme for the prevention of contagious abortion in cattle which was initiated in October, 1949. The Department made available, free of charge, the required supplies of vaccine in the first year of operation of the scheme, and by arrangement with the Veterinary Medical Association of Ireland reduced fees were charged to farmers by veterinary surgeons for carrying out the vaccinations.

Subhead O.5.—Agricultural Produce (Cereals) Acts, 1933 to 1939, and Emergency Powers (Cereals) Orders, etc.

30. Reference was made in previous reports to arrangements whereby growers who sold wheat of the 1943 and 1944 harvests were enabled to obtain, in exchange for dockets which they had received from authorized purchasers of the wheat, fertiliser credit vouchers for 2s. 6d. per barrel of wheat sold, and the fertiliser suppliers were recouped the amount of the allowances made by them on submission of monthly claims supported by

the relevant credit vouchers. These arrangements continued in operation during the year under review and were extended to growers of the 1945 crop. Including expenditure of £270,168 15s. 5d. charged to this subhead, the total paid to fertiliser suppliers in connection with the redemption of the 1943, 1944 and 1945 dockets amounted at 31st March, 1950, to £622,382 7s. 8d.

Subhead O.O.—Flour and Wheaten Meal Subsidies.

31. The expenditure charged to this subhead, totalling £7,765,704 3s. 5d., was made up as follows:—

The flour subsidy, paid to Grain Importers (Éire), Limited, was the amount required to control the price of flour and to regulate the earnings of the milling industry, which were limited to a percentage of an agreed figure representing capital employed together with the cost of providing any additional capital in excess of the agreed figure. The expenditure comprised £7,597,517 11s. 3d. in respect of losses incurred in connection with the allocation of imported wheat and flour for periods up to the 28th January, 1950; £58,783 in respect of adjusting payments for the cereal year 1946–47 made by the company to the millers following examination of the millers' accounts by officers of the Department of Industry and Commerce; and £32,699 8s. 9d. for remuneration of importer-distributors for wheat handled on behalf of the company in the calendar years 1946 and 1947.

The subsidy on wheaten meal for the cereal year 1948–49 was paid at varying rates representing the difference between the average cost of production, together with a profit of 2s. 6d. per sack, and the controlled selling price.

$Subhead\ Q.-Losses.$

32. A sum of £160,000 was provided by supplementary estimate to recoup Grain Importers (Éire), Limited, the loss incurred on the disposal of 8,835 tons of oatmeal imported in 1948 at a cost of £442,899 12s. 4d. to meet a probable shortage following the poor harvest of 1947. 3,350 tons was sold to oatmeal millers for home consumption, but owing to the good harvest in 1948 and to deterioration in the condition of the oatmeal the company was unable to dispose of the remaining 5,485 tons to the millers, and 406 tons was ultimately sold for

animal feeding and the balance disposed of to continental buyers. The receipts totalled £282,952 3s. 9d., resulting in a loss of £159,947 8s. 7d., which is charged to the subhead.

Subhead P.—Appropriations in Aid.

Levy on the slaughter of cattle and sheep.

33. As stated in previous reports, the provisions of the Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep Acts relating to the collection of levy in respect of cattle and sheep slaughtered for human consumption ceased to be in force as from 1st August, 1936. The amount received in the year under review in respect of levy due but uncollected on the date mentioned was £221 0s. 10d. and the amount of levy outstanding at 31st March, 1950, was £1,055 2s. 1d. As noted in the account, sums totalling £191 4s. 8d. were written off with the sanction of the Minister for Finance.

VOTE 30.—AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE SUBSIDIES.

Subsidies, Allowances, etc., for Dairy Produce.

34. Allowances on the production of creamery butter were payable at such rates as enabled the price of milk supplied to creameries to be maintained at 1s. 2d. per gallon for the period 1st May to 31st October and at 1s. 4d. per gallon for the period 1st November to 30th April. The sums disbursed on allowances on creamery butter produced on and after 1st April, 1949, amounted to £2,532,011 15s. 0d. of which £2,472,868 6s. 6d. was paid from this vote and £59,143 8s. 6d. from the Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund. In addition to expenditure of £2,184,843 15s. 8d. in the year 1948-49 on allowances on creamery butter produced in that year, payments amounting to £117,999 0s. 1d. were made from the vote during the year under review, bringing the total cost of these allowances for the production of the year 1948-49 to £2,302,842 15s. 9d., as compared with £1,946,171 6s. 2d. for the year 1947–48. The Butter Marketing Committee's trading account for the year ended 31st March, 1949, disclosed a deficiency of £80,128 3s. 8d. in respect of which £40,000 was paid and charged in the account of the previous year, the balance, £40,128 3s. 8d. being included in the charge to this The remainder of the expenditure charged to the vote, £43,999 3s. 9d., related to payments to creameries in connection with the Department's scheme for the cold storage of creamery butter.

Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Acts, 1935 to 1941, Emergency Powers (No. 270) Order, 1943, and Creamery Butter (Prices for Catering Establishments) Orders, 1948.

Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund.

35. The income of the Fund was made up of £18,907 3s. 8d. from levies, mainly on home sales of creamery butter and raw

cheese, and £37,333 6s. 7d. from catering establishments in accordance with the Creamery Butter (Prices for Catering Establishments) Orders, 1948 (Statutory Instruments Nos. 247 and 355 of 1948) in respect of creamery butter purchased under permit. The orders referred to prescribed prices for creamery butter sold to catering establishments by virtue of permits issued under Article 9 of the Emergency Powers (Distribution of Butter) Order, 1944 (Statutory Rules and Orders No. 121 of 1944) and provided that payment, on account, should be made to the Minister for Agriculture at the rate of 6d. per lb. and 9d. per lb., respectively, on the issue of permits for the period 31st July to 29th October, 1948, and the period commencing on 30th October, 1948.

The payments out of the Fund include the sum of £59,143 8s. 6d. mentioned in paragraph 34 for allowances on creamery butter produced in 1949–50 and £6,229 paid to the Butter Marketing Committee to meet administrative expenses.

VOTE 31.—FISHERIES.

Subhead F.5.—Compensation, etc.

36. The sum of £100,000 was provided under this subhead for compensation payable under sections 35 and 67 of the Fisheries Act, 1939, and for miscellaneous expenses. Compensation amounting to £1,333 4s. 3d. was paid to thirteen employees during the year under section 35 of the Act which provides for the restriction of the use of nets in freshwater and for the payment of compensation to the owners of nets and, under certain conditions, to their employees. No payments of compensation were made to owners of nets, or, under section 67 of the Act, in respect of transferable fisheries, the balance of the charge to the subhead, £46 18s. 0d., being for miscellaneous expenses.

Subhead G.2.—Repayable Advances for Boats and Gear.

37. Including the advances of £60,000 charged in this account, the total advances for boats and gear to 31st March, 1950, amounted to £238,500. The half-yearly instalments of the annuities set up to repay these advances falling due to 31st March, 1950, amounted to £155,546 12s. 6d., while the sums collected by the Sea Fisheries Association from borrowers and transferred to the Department in payment of the annuity instalments amounted to £136,698 16s. 4d., including £9,067 1s. 9d. repaid in the year under review and credited to appropriations in aid. The repayments were, therefore, in arrear on 31st March, 1950, to the extent of £18,847 16s. 2d. as compared with £12,990 11s. 8d. on 31st March, 1949.

Subhead G.3.—Repayable Advances for General Development.

38. The total advances for general development in course of redemption by the Sea Fisheries Association, including a sum of £8,350 charged in this account, amounted at 31st March, 1950, to £20,450. These advances are repayable over a period of twenty years by half-yearly instalments covering principal and interest, and sums totalling £725 2s. 1d. were repaid during the year under review and are included in the appropriations in aid.

Fishery Loans.

39. Repayments of fishery loans, which are accounted for as appropriations in aid, amounted to £10 12s. 3d., and the balance outstanding on these loans at 31st March, 1950, was £20,434 18s. 7d. including arrears of £20,397 8s. 3d. There were no remissions during the year under the Fisheries (Revision of Loans) Act, 1931.

VOTE 34.—PRISONS.

40. The statement of the manufacturing and farm accounts appended to the appropriation account has been examined, and local test examinations of the conversion books and other records dealing with manufacturing operations have been carried out with satisfactory results.

VOTE 37.—SUPREME COURT AND HIGH COURT OF JUSTICE.

Extra Receipts payable to Exchequer.

41. A sum of £2,500 was provided by supplementary estimate in the financial year 1940–41 for an advance to make good certain deficiencies in estates of minors, the expenditure against the provision being £2,252 4s. 0d. The deficiencies were caused by defalcations of a General Solicitor for minors, who died in February, 1938, and it was stated in a note to the supplementary estimate that an Order of Court would be sought for recovery of portion of the advance from the estate of the deceased, and that legislation would be introduced to provide for the recoupment of the balance to the Exchequer from other sources. The estate has now been administered and a sum of £482 4s. 6d., received by way of dividend, is brought to account as exchequer extra receipts. I have inquired as to the position regarding the recoupment of the balance of £1,769 19s. 6d. to the Exchequer.

VOTE 41.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

Subhead I.1.—Contributions towards Housing Loan Charges.

42. A supplementary estimate provided £16,000 for the payment of non-statutory contributions towards loan charges on certain loans advanced from the Local Loans Fund to local authorities. The charge to the subhead includes payments amounting to £13,950 in respect of these contributions, being the amount required to recoup local authorities the additional loan charges incurred on subsidy housing schemes by reason of the increase from $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. to $3\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. per annum in the rate of interest on advances from the Local Loans Fund prescribed by the Local Loans Fund (Rate of Interest) Direction, 1948 (Statutory Instrument No. 158 of 1948). Contributions towards loan charges of local authorities under the Housing (Financial and Miscellaneous Provisions) Acts, 1932 to 1949 account for the remainder of the charge to the subhead, £690,163 11s. 2d. In addition, grants totalling £1,848,770 in connection with housing schemes were made to sixty-five local authorities out of moneys provided from the Transition Development Fund.

Subhead I.3.—Grants under the Housing (Amendment) Acts, 1948 and 1949.

43. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding the grants paid under section 16 and the Second Schedule of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1948, to certain persons towards the cost of reconstructing houses in their own occupation.

Subhead JJ.—Grants to Local Authorities for the execution of works under the Local Authorities (Works) Act, 1949.

44. The Local Authorities (Works) Act, 1949, which became law on 20th July, 1949, enables certain local authorities to execute works affording relief or protection from flooding, landslide, subsidence and similar occurrences, and a supplementary estimate for £1,250,000 was taken to provide for grants to the local authorities concerned towards the cost of works undertaken under the Act. The expenditure of £1,227,200 charged to the subhead represents payments on account in respect of work done on schemes approved by the Minister for Local Government.

Motor Tax Account.

45. A test examination has been applied to the Motor Tax Account with generally satisfactory results. The certificates and reports of the Local Government Auditors who examine the

motor tax transactions of local authorities were scrutinised, in so far as they were available, but in five cases this audit had not been completed at the date of my test examination.

The gross proceeds of motor vehicles, etc., duties in 1949–50, including £36,372 19s. 6d. attributable to fines collected by the Department of Justice, amounted to £2,644,197 15s. 8d. as compared with a total of £2,390,203 9s. 9d. in the previous year. Fees amounting to £6,313 17s. 0d. received on behalf of the Commissioner of the Gárda Síochána under the Road Traffic Act (Parts VI and VII) (Fees) Regulations, 1937 (Statutory Rules and Orders, No. 92 of 1937) are also included in the receipts. A statement of the gross and net receipts of the Motor Tax Account, and of the payments thereout to the Exchequer, appears on pages 6 and 7 of the Finance Accounts, 1949–50.

VOTE 44.—NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

Subhead B.—Benefits, Expenses of Administration and Supplements (Grants-in-Aid).

46. In previous reports reference was made to provisional payments to public assistance authorities in respect of their disbursements under the Social Welfare (Substitutive Allowances) Order, 1948 (Statutory Instrument No. 8 of 1948) during the period of suspension by Cumann an Árachais Náisiúnta ar Shláinte of payment of benefits under the National Health Insurance Acts. A sum of £3 4s. 6d. charged to this subhead in the year under review brings the total amount recouped to the public assistance authorities to £57,991 7s. 9d. The Minister for Social Welfare has certified, in accordance with Article 3 (5) of the Order, the expenditure incurred by twenty-six public assistance authorities, and I am informed that the examination of the expenditure of the remaining six authorities has not yet been completed.

VOTE 46.—PRIMARY EDUCATION.

Subhead A.3.—Preparatory Colleges, etc.

47. The average boarding cost per student in the school year 1949–50 ranged from 14s. 2d. to 18s. 8d. per week as compared with 14s. 2d. to 19s. 6d. per week for the previous year. The average fee paid by the students was £18 19s. 1d. as compared with £17 13s. 2d. for the previous year.

Accounts have been furnished to me showing the receipts and expenditure for the school year 1949–50 in connection with the farms and gardens attached to the colleges. Five of the accounts

disclose deficits and one shows an excess of receipts over expenditure. Periodical inspections of the farms are carried out by officers of the Department of Agriculture, and their reports are available to me.

VOTE 49.—SCIENCE AND ART.

- Subhead A.7.—Survey and Reproduction of Irish Historical Records in Foreign Collections (Grant-in-Aid).
- 48. As will be seen from the Statement of Expenditure, etc., out of Grants-in-Aid appended to the account the receipts exceeded the amount transferred from the subhead by £296 8s. 7d. The additional receipt represents the proceeds of the sale of certain equipment which had been purchased out of the Grant-in-Aid account in a prior year.

Subhead B.15.—Special Purchases of Books and Manuscripts.

49. This special subhead was opened with the sanction of the Department of Finance to bring to account unanticipated expenditure, which could not be met from the grant-in-aid provided for the National Library under subhead A.6., on the purchase of manuscripts and on periodicals, etc., the delivery of which had been in arrear for some years owing to disturbed conditions abroad.

VOTE 52.—LANDS.

Subhead I.—Improvement of Estates, etc.

50. The expenditure during the year on the provision of necessary improvements in connection with the scheme for the transfer of allottees from the Gaeltacht to lands in Co. Meath, available for the relief of congestion, amounted to £439 5s. 2d. The total expenditure on the scheme since its inception in 1934–35 to 31st March, 1950, amounts to £104,071 4s. 9d.

Under the scheme for the provision of holdings in certain counties in Leinster for migrants from districts where there is acute congestion, the expenditure charged to the vote amounts to £10,035 11s. 2d., including £2,974 11s. 4d. expended on an extension of the scheme providing for intra-county migration introduced during the year with the approval of the Department of Finance. The total charges in respect of this migration scheme since 1937–38 amount to £150,786 7s. 4d.

VOTE 54.—GAELTACHT SERVICES.

Subhead H.3.—Grants under the Housing (Gaeltacht) Acts, 1929 to 1949.

51. The aggregate amount of the grants and loans which may be made under the Housing (Gaeltacht) Acts 1929 to 1949 is not to exceed £900,000.

At 31st March, 1950, the position regarding such grants and loans was as follows:—

Industrial Loans.

52. I have been furnished with a schedule concerning the industrial leans from which it appears that there were no advances made during the year ended 31st March, 1950. Arrears, including interest accrued, due at that date, amounted to £10,998 9s. 2d., as compared with £10,878 5s. 9d. on 31st March, 1949. Included in the arrears is a sum of £10,943 10s. 2d., due by a company which ceased to exist in 1925. As stated in previous reports, the realization of such security as is held by the State was the subject of negotiations, but owing to certain legal difficulties realization cannot be effected.

VOTE 55.—INDUSTRY AND COMMERCE.

Subhead J.—Food Subsidies.

53. The expenditure charged to this subhead, totalling £2,139,276 7s. 0d., was made up as follows:—

As stated in paragraph 50 of my previous report, subsidy on batch bread ceased to be payable after 1st November, 1947, and the payment of balances due to bakers for periods prior to that date accounts for the charge of £10,497 5s. 3d.

The amount of £1,276 11s. 11d., which was paid during the year as subsidy on oatmeal manufactured from native oats of the 1947 crop and sold by millers in the period 1st September, 1947, to 15th April, 1948, related to two claims the examination of which was not sufficiently advanced for payment to be made in the previous year.

The subsidy on tea was paid to Tea Importers (Éire), Limited, and represented the difference between the cost price of tea plus overhead expenses and the selling price. The audited accounts of the company for the year ended 31st March, 1950, showed a net trading loss of £1,843,045 which, with a balance of £21,320 due from the previous account, made a total deficit of £1,864,365. Amounts paid as subsidy totalled £1,893,520, leaving a balance of £29,155 due by the company at 31st March, 1950.

Subsidy at the rate of 2d. per lb. continued to be payable on sugar sold for domestic consumption. The sum of £233,982 9s. 10d. charged to the subhead was paid to Comhlucht Siúicre Éireann, Teoranta, on the basis of statements certified by the auditors of the company. I understand that, consequent on certain adjustments in respect of the years 1948-49 and 1949-50, a refund of subsidy falls to be made by the company and I have asked for further information on the matter.

Subhead K.—Fuel Subsidy.

54. Only a token sum of £5 was provided under this subhead for fuel subsidy, and no payment in respect of subsidy was made in the year under review.

Subhead L.—Miscellaneous Turf Production Schemes.

55. The amount of £23,560 4s. 5d. charged to this subhead was paid to local authorities in recoupment of losses incurred on the sale of turf otherwise than to Fuel Importers (Éire), Limited, government departments or local institutions. The total amount recouped to 31st March, 1950, including £174,444 8s. 9d. paid in previous years, was £198,004 13s. 2d.

Subhead N.1.—Advances to Mianrai, Teoranta.

56. The charge of £34,955 7s. 11d. to this subhead represents advances made during the year to Mianrai, Teoranta, under section 3 of the Minerals Company Act, 1947, as amended by section 2 of the Minerals Company (Amendment) Act, 1950. The total liability of the company for advances and for interest thereon, amounted at 31st March, 1950, to £134,445 18s. 3d.

In exercise of the powers conferred by sections 11 (2) and 12 (3) of the Minerals Exploration and Development Company Act, 1941, and section 8 (2) of the Minerals Company Act, 1945, the Minister for Industry and Commerce has with the consent of the Minister for Finance agreed to the postponement to 1st April,

1950, of the payment by the company of interest on advances and of the repayment of instalments of advances which fell due on 1st April and 1st October, 1949.

Operations of Bord na Mona.

Subheads O.1., O.2., etc.

57. The issues from the Grants-in-Aid during the year comprised £18,500 for experiment and research (subhead O.1.) and £366,500 to meet the cost of the turf production scheme hitherto undertaken by County Councils (subhead O.2.). Production under the scheme was confined to machine-won turf and receipts from Bord na Móna in respect of sales amounted to £130,000 which is credited to subhead S.—Appropriations in Aid.

Section 52 of the Turf Development Act, 1946, provides for the payment out of voted moneys during 1946-47 and in each of the nine subsequent financial years of grants towards expenses incurred by Bord na Móna on experimental and research work, subject to a limitation of £120,000. The total issues under this head, including £18,500 in the year under review, amounted at 31st March, 1950, to £118,800.

A sum of £1,500, which is included in the appropriations in aid, was realized from the sale to Bord na Móna of the residue of turf produced under the turf camps scheme, which was terminated in 1948. I understand that agreement has been reached on the terms of transfer to Bord na Móna of the turf camps and equipment, and that it is hoped to have the sale completed at an early date.

The exchequer extra receipts include a sum of £9,141 6s. 8d. received from Bord na Móna in respect of interest on advances made for the development of Clonsast bog. At 31st March, 1950, the amounts outstanding, including interest, for advances made from voted moneys for the development of bogs were:—

Subhead R.—Repayment of Advances for Rural Electrification.

58. Section 41 (3) of the Electricity (Supply) (Amendment) Act, 1945, provides that one moiety of the total amount of the

moneys advanced for rural electrification to the Electricity Supply Board out of the Central Fund shall be repaid to the Fund out of moneys provided by the Oireachtas. The sum of £325,000 charged to this subhead relates to the repayment to the Central Fund of one-half of the amount of £650,000 advanced during the calendar year 1948 for rural electrification.

Industrial Development Authority.

Subhead R.R.—Grant towards the Expenses of Administration.

59. A provision of £10,000 was made by supplementary estimate for a grant to defray the remuneration and expenses of the members of the Industrial Development Authority and the amount issued in respect of the grant was £8,000. Expenditure amounting to £2,268 ls. 9d., which is charged to subhead B. Vote 10.—Public Works and Buildings, was incurred on the adaptation of premises and the provision of furniture for the Authority, and furniture to the value of £104 l9s. 6d. was supplied from stock. The Authority was established and the first members appointed by warrants dated 26th May, 1949, made by the Minister for Industry and Commerce, with the approval of the Minister for Finance. The establishment of the Authority was confirmed by the Industrial Development Authority Act, 1950, which became law in December, 1950.

VOTE 56.—AVIATION AND METEOROLOGICAL SERVICES.

Subhead G.—Constructional Works, including furnishing of Buildings—Shannon Airport.

Subhead H.—Constructional Works, including furnishing of Buildings—Dublin Airport.

60. Expenditure during the year on constructional works, including furnishing of buildings, at Dublin, Shannon (Rineanna), and Shannon (Foynes) Airports amounted to £216,607 12s. 7d., £152,531 6s. 7d. and £3,528 14s. 5d., respectively, bringing the total expenditure, as at 31st March, 1950, to £1,078,910 10s. 8d. for Dublin Airport, £1,738,583 5s. 3d. for Shannon Airport (Rineanna), and £166,791 12s. 10d. for Shannon Airport (Foynes), exclusive of expenditure on the acquisition of land.

Subhead M.—Catering Service—Shannon Airport.

61. Reference was made in paragraph 63 of the report for the year 1947-48, to the position regarding completion of agreed inventories of furniture and equipment supplied to the catering service. Copies of inventories of these articles, compiled from departmental records, have been furnished to me and I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding them.

Subhead N.—Management of Dublin Airport.

62. The agreement between the Minister for Industry and Commerce and Aer Rianta, Teoranta, provides, inter alia, that the Minister, with the approval of the Minister for Finance, shall determine the actual loss arising out of the management of Dublin Airport by the company. The loss so determined for the year ended 31st March, 1950, was £10,593, of which £10,000 has been made good from this subhead. The balance of £593 due to the company will be charged in the next account.

Subhead O.—Subsidy in respect of Air Services.

63. It was stated in paragraph 58 of my previous report that as subsidy up to the limit of £750,000 prescribed by section 19 of the Air Navigation and Transport Act, 1946, had been paid to Aer Rianta, Teoranta, no further payments could be made pending the enactment of legislation. The Air Navigation and Transport Act, 1950, became law on 15th March, 1950, and section 25 provides that the Minister for Finance may from time to time by order authorize the payment of subsidies to Aer Rianta, Teoranta, on such terms and conditions as may be specified in the order, but that no such order may be made after the expiration of five years from the passing of the Act.

Under the terms of the Subsidy (Aer Rianta, Teoranta) Order, 1950, made on 28th March, 1950, the sum of £473,162 charged to this subhead was paid to the company. This amount is the aggregate of the balances of subsidy, £163,595, due in respect of losses incurred by the company and its subsidiaries in the years 1946-47 and 1947-48, £205,067, being the amount determined to be the losses incurred in the year 1948-49, and £104,500 in respect of estimated losses for the year 1949-50.

Including the charge in this account, the total subsidy paid to the company amounted to £1,223,162 up to 31st March, 1950.

Subhead W.—Appropriations in Aid.

64. This subhead includes a receipt of £931 2s. 7d. for rent derived from the letting of buildings and a concrete parking

apron which had been constructed at Shannon Airport, at a cost of £20,859, for the purpose of being leased as an aircraft repair depot. The letting conditions provided for a minimum tenancy of two years subject thereafter to yearly renewal, and for an annual rent of £2,650, being the economic charge calculated on a twenty year period of amortisation of the capital cost. The premises were vacated on 7th May, 1949, on the expiry of the first term of two years, the amount of rent received from the tenant for that period being £5,212 5s. 11d. Portion of the site and buildings were subsequently leased to an operating company at an annual rent of £1,375.

VOTE 58.—TRANSPORT AND MARINE SERVICES.

Subhead AA.—Payments to Córas Iompair Éireann.

65. Payments totalling £4,091,000 for capital purposes and to meet operating losses were made to the company, which was incorporated on 1st January, 1945, by section 9 of the Transport Act, 1944. £2,462,369 was advanced in respect of capital expenditure, and will be repayable on such terms and conditions as the Minister for Finance may determine by the Board established by section 5 of the Transport Act, 1950. The Minister has agreed to defer a decision on the conditions of repayment until May, 1952. The balance of £1,628,631 represented a non-repayable grant to cover operating losses up to 31st March, 1950, and included £561,347, being the amount required to enable the company to repay to the Central Fund sums previously advanced under section 18 of the Transport Act, 1944, on foot of interest under the State guarantee of debentures, and £209,000 in respect of interest payable on guaranteed debentures.

Section 18 of the Transport Act, 1944, provides that all moneys required from time to time by the Minister for Finance to meet payments under the State guarantee of debenture stock shall be advanced from the Central Fund, and that sums so advanced shall be repaid to the Central Fund by the company within twelve months from the date of the advance. The · section also provides that where repayment has not been made as prescribed any amount remaining outstanding shall be repaid to the Central Fund out of moneys provided by the Oireachtas and, further, that such repayment from voted moneys shall not exempt the company from the liability to repay to the Central Fund, with interest, the full amount of any advance made from In view of these provisions, I have communicated with the Accounting Officer regarding the payment from the vote of the non-repayable grants of £561,347 and £209,000.

VOTE 61.—POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS.

Subhead H.2.—Losses by Default, Accident, etc.

66. The losses borne on the vote for the year ended 31st March, 1950, amounted to £8,751 10s. 7d. A classified schedule of these losses is set out at page 218. At page 221 particulars are given of 43 cases in which cash shortages or misappropriations of sums amounting to £5,693 16s. 0½d. and \$300 were discovered; the amounts in question were made good and no charge to public funds was necessary.

Stores.

67. A test examination of the store accounts was carried

out with satisfactory results.

In addition to the engineering stores shown in Appendix II as valued at £1,025,693 on the 31st March, 1950, engineering stores to the value of £2,274 were held on behalf of other Government Departments. Stores other than engineering stores were valued at £304,762, including £53,818 in respect of stores held for other Government Departments.

Revenue.

68. A test examination of the accounts of the Postal, Telegraph and Telephone services was carried out with satisfactory results.

Sums due for telephone services amounting in all to £273 ls. 10d. were written off during the year as irrecoverable.

Post Office Savings Bank Accounts.

69. The accounts of the Post Office Savings Bank for the year ended 31st December, 1949, were submitted to a test examination with satisfactory results. In the reports on the accounts for the year 1945-46 and subsequent years it was stated that the total interest credited to depositors had, for various reasons, been estimated, subject to any necessary adjustment in subsequent years. For the year ended 31st December, 1949, however, the exact amount of the interest to be credited has been computed. The interest accrued during the year on securities standing to the credit of the Post Office Savings Bank Fund amounted to £1,583,359 12s. 10d. Of this sum, £1,175,195 18s. 8d. was paid and credited to depositors in respect of interest, management expenses amounted to £126,966 7s. 4d. and £281,197 6s. 10d. was set aside towards provision against depreciation in the value of securities.

Post Office Factory.

70. A test examination was applied to the accounts of the Post Office Factory with satisfactory results.

Including works in progress on 31st March, 1950, the expenditure on manufacturing jobs during the year amounted to £53,795, expenditure on repair work (other than repairs to mechanical transport) amounted to £25,690, and expenditure on mechanical transport repairs to £5,040.

VOTE 63.—DEFENCE.

Subhead C.—Pay of Civilians attached to Units.

Subhead S.—Barrack Maintenance and Minor Works.

71. In 1945 the Department of Finance approved of the expenditure of £8,095 on the construction of a new building and slipway, and the provision of a supply line for electric current, in the naval dockyard at Haulbowline, and the work was completed in May, 1946, at a cost of £6,959. The building was regarded as essential for the effective control of work undertaken in the dockyard, and it was anticipated that a saving of wages of approximately £1,500 per annum would be effected. As it appeared that only a restricted use has been made of the new building I have asked for further information on the matter.

Subhead K.—Provisions and Allowances in lieu.

72. Statements have been furnished to me showing the cost of production of bread at the Curragh Bakery, and of meat at the Dublin and Curragh Abattoirs. The unit costs are as follows:—

The average price of cattle purchased for the Dublin and Curragh areas was £55 6s. 11d. and £54 16s. 9d. per head, respectively, as compared with £53 6s. 1d. and £51 11s. 6d. in the previous year, while the average production of beef per head was 690 lbs. and 679 lbs., respectively, as compared with 664 lbs. and 617 lbs.

73. It was observed that approximately 22,000 gallons of high grade petrol for use in motor torpedo boats was held in stock and appeared to be surplus to requirements as the boats had been sold. In reply to an inquiry I was informed that efforts to dispose of this stock of petrol had not so far been successful, and that its suitability for use by the Air Corps was being tested.

Subhead Y.2.—The Reserve.

74. Regulations relating to army mechanical transport allotted to units of An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil provide that where it is established that loss of or damage to a vehicle is due to negligence on the part of a member of An Fórsa, the cost involved shall be borne on unit funds. It was noted that a number of accidents to vehicles allotted to An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil were attributed to negligence on the part of the drivers, and that the sanction of the Minister for Finance had been sought to reduce the charge against unit funds in such cases to a maximum of 25 per cent. of the cost of repairs. I have asked to be informed of the total cost of repairs and the position regarding recovery from unit funds.

As from 1st July, 1946, the Department of Defence assumed responsibility for the provision of accommodation for An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil and for payment of the rents. It appeared in a number of cases that formal agreements governing the occupation of premises taken over from the former Local Defence Force or acquired by An Fórsa had not been entered into with the owners, and I am in communication with the Accounting Officer on the matter.

In September, 1948, premises for the accommodation of a local unit of An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil were purchased for £886 15s. 10d., including £36 15s. 10d. legal costs. The premises were not occupied, and in October, 1950, the sanction of the Minister for Finance was obtained for their sale. I am informed that the sale has been deferred pending a decision on the suitability of the property for use by another Government Department.

Suspense Account.

75. Reference was made in the reports for the years 1946-47 and 1947-48 to payments in respect of pay, etc., of reservists

which were charged to a suspense account pending the investigation of certain irregularities. Following the investigation, three members of the staff of the Department were prosecuted on charges relating to the fraudulent issue and negotiation of a number of payable orders; they were sentenced to terms of imprisonment and dismissed from the public service. The total amount involved, £1,051 8s. 0d., was recovered, and therefore no loss fell on public funds.

VOTE 65.—EXTERNAL AFFAIRS.

Subhead A.7.—Irish News Agency.

77. The Irish News Agency Act, 1949, provided for the promotion by the Minister for External Affairs of a limited company for the collection, dissemination and publication of news and information inside and outside the State, and the Irish News Agency, a limited company conforming to the conditions laid down in the Act, was formed and registered under the Companies Acts in March, 1950.

A repayable advance of £5,000 charged to this subhead was made for the purposes of the business of the Agency, pursuant to section 11 of the Act.

VOTE 68.—HEALTH.

Subhead H.—Grants to Health Authorities.

78. As indicated in a note to the Estimate, issues in respect of grants under section 4 of the Health Services (Financial Provisions) Act, 1947, are made from time to time on the basis of a percentage of estimated expenditure in advance of the audit of accounts and the amounts so issued are not liable to surrender, any necessary adjustments being made on subsequent grants.

Section 4 of the Act provides that there shall, in respect of the year 1948-49 and each subsequent year, be paid out of moneys provided by the Oireachtas to each health authority a grant equal to the amount by which the health expenditure exceeds the standard expenditure. If, however, in any year the health expenditure of a health authority exceeds twice the standard expenditure the grant otherwise payable in respect of that year shall be reduced by a sum equal to one-half of the excess. The manner in which the standard expenditure of a health authority is to be determined is prescribed by section 3 of the Act.

I recently inquired regarding the number of health authorities for which the standard expenditure had been determined and was informed that determination could not be made until the audited accounts of the authorities for the years 1947-48 and subsequent years had been received and examined, and that it is only in recent months that accounts became available for the first group of authorities. Until the standard expenditure for each of the years 1948-49 and 1949-50 has been determined final adjustment of the grants payable for these years cannot be effected.

VOTE 73.—EUROPEAN CO-OPERATION.

Council of Europe.

Subhead A.1.—Contribution towards the Expenses of the Council.

79. The charge of £4,381 12s. 3d. to this subhead includes contributions towards the expenses of the Council for the year ended 31st December, 1949, and to the working capital fund. The contribution towards the expenses was assessed at 1.9 per cent. of the total budget which for this year covered only the six months period 1st July to 31st December, 1949, and the contribution towards the working capital fund was fixed at 60 per cent. of the budget contribution.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- B.—The volume of travelling found necessary towards the end of the year was greater than was allowed for when the Supplementary Estimate was being framed.
- C.—Excess mainly due to the increased cost of uniforms for Messengers, etc., and to unforeseen expenditure on official entertainment at International Conferences during the year.
- D.—The additional expenditure on telegrams and telephones was due to the increase in the work of the Department.
- E.1.—Incidental expenses of the Seed Propagation Division exceeded the estimate by £2,588 due to the payment this year of a number of claims in respect of the previous year; to additional expenditure on purchases of seed from plotholders owing to higher yields and increased prices; to the purchase of machinery and equipment not provided for in the estimate, and to heavier replacements of sacks, labels, etc. Savings on other items reduced the excess on the subhead to £2,091.
- E.2.—Two posts of Veterinary Inspector were vacant and expenditure on the purchase of livestock for the Veterinary Research Laboratory, Thorndale, and for Brownsbarn Farm did not increase to the extent anticipated. Some of the agricultural machinery provided for Brownsbarn Farm could not be procured. The saving was modified by additional expenditure on the purchase of laboratory equipment required at the Veterinary Research Laboratory, Thorndale, for investigations into outbreaks of animal diseases which occurred during the year.
- E.4.—Investigations into aphosphorosis in cattle ceased shortly after the commencement of the year and only a small part of the provision made was needed.
- E.5.—Trials and experiments were made on a more extensive scale than was allowed for in the estimate.
- F.1.—Excess due to an increase in the wages of agricultural workers granted subsequent to the framing of the estimate; to the necessity for employing additional labour to a greater extent than anticipated and to additional purchases of feeding stuffs, agricultural machinery and other farm requisites required during the year. The excess was partly offset by a saving on the provision made for Grange Farm.
- F.2.—A capital grant of £1,700 provided for one of the Agricultural Colleges was not earned. Changes in the teaching staffs and vacancies in students' places were mainly responsible for the remainder of the saving.
- F.3.—Excess due to additional expenditure on the purchase of chemicals, drugs and laboratory and surgery supplies which were required in greater quantities than was anticipated.
- G.1.—The payment this year of a number of claims in respect of the previous year and an increase in the number of cows entered for test under the Cow Testing Scheme caused additional expenditure of £1,132 on grants to Cow Testing Associations and allowances to Supervisors. An increase in the number of dairy herd inspections necessitated additional expenditure of £987 on travelling. The excess was partly offset by savings on other items of the subhead.
- G.2.—Some claims for fees and expenses in connection with mare show inspections did not come in course of payment until after the close of the year and the full provision made for carriage on premium bulls and boars was not needed. No stock pigs were purchased this year and the number of thoroughbred stallions and Irish Draught colts obtainable was less than expected. The provision made for nominations of Irish Draught mares was not fully availed of by mare owners. Additional expenditure incurred on the purchase of stock rams was due to an increase in the number of animals required. Stock bulls cost a little more than estimated.

G.4.—The number of claims for grants and subsidies under the Poultry Development Scheme which matured for payment before the close of the year was greater than was anticipated when the Supplementary Estimate was being framed. The expenditure under this subhead includes payments amounting to

£18 7s. 2d. in respect of compensation and legal expenses to the owners of property involved in accidents with official vehicles (Department of Finance minutes S. 48/19/48, S. 48/6/49 and S. 48/14/49).

- G.5.—The acreage planted during the year did not reach expectations.
- H.—The Lime Subsidy Scheme was not availed of to the extent anticipated. Additional expenditure was incurred on Normal Grants following the enactment of the Agriculture (Amendment) Act, 1948, and on grants towards the erection of poultry houses in Gaeltacht areas for which only a token provision was made.
- H.2.—The scheme was not proceeded with this year.
- I.1.—The principal excesses were £3,762 on travelling, the expenditure on which increased more than anticipated, and £2,815 and £412, respectively, on the purchase of bulls and rams due to higher prices. Savings on other items reduced the excess on the subhead to £3,919.
- I.3.—Progress towards the completion of building operations was not as rapid as expected and some claims for supplies of heating materials, manures, disinfectants, etc., did not come in course of payment until after the close of the year.
- M.1.—The savings on wages and travelling expenses were due to a shorter period of employment of Lime Subsidy Supervisors. No meeting of the Agricultural Produce (Poultry and Rabbits) Consultative Council was held during the year and no expenditure was incurred in connection with classes in the preparation and marketing of poultry. More labour was required for the examination of consignments of poultry and rabbits for export.
- M.2.—Saving due to vacancies in the staff of Reporters.
- M.3.—Accounts for the printing of a volume of the Register of Dairy Cattle and of the Department's Journal did not come in course of payment during the year and no expenditure was incurred on printing bound volumes of leaflets.
- M.4.—The demand for loans for the purchase of stallions, hand sprayers and poultry equipment and for the erection of poultry houses was smaller than expected. No advances were made for the erection, improvement or repair of corn mills, flax scutch mills, or silos. Additional expenditure of £1,066 was incurred on loans for the purchase of bulls due to higher prices.
- M.5.—The only claims received from the Agricultural Credit Corporation were for two sums of 2s. 9d. and 3s. 4d. in respect of balances due on loans advanced by the Corporation for the purchase of agricultural implements and heifers, respectively, which proved irrecoverable and which were written off with the approval of the Department of Finance and recouped to the Corporation (S. 90/36/41 and S. 91/6/32).
- M.M.5.—The claims of the Agricultural Credit Corporation for administration expenses were smaller than expected. The expenditure under this subhead includes recoupment to the Corporation of sums amounting to £3 14s. 0d. in respect of legal expenses which the Corporation was unable to recover from defaulting borrowers (Department of Finance authority S. 90/10/47).
- M.7.—The Agricultural Production Consultative Council did not meet during the year.
- M.9.—The additional staff provided for were not employed and expenditure on wages, travelling and incidental expenses was correspondingly lower.
- M.11.—Due mainly to the limited supplies of building materials available, only a small number of the works authorised under the farm buildings scheme were completed in time to enable payment of the grants earned to be made before the close of the year.
- M.13.—The Land Rehabilitation Project had to be brought into operation gradually as supplies of the necessary machinery, drainage materials, etc., became available and it was possible to form only an approximate estimate of the expenditure likely to be incurred before the close of the year.

- M.14.—Saving mainly due to the necessity for detaching the Veterinary staff engaged on this scheme for duties in connection with the outbreaks of fowl pest which occurred towards the end of the year.
- N.1.—The provision made for compensation under the Fowl Pest Orders, 1950, could not be estimated closely in the absence of detailed information regarding the numbers and size of infected flocks and the extent of the area of infection. In addition some of the claims did not come in course of payment until after the close of the year. Savings on wages and travelling expenses were due to vacancies in the staff of Ship Inspectors. Additional expenditure was incurred on uniforms and overalls due to increased cost and on miscellaneous expenses owing to the outbreaks of fowl pest.
- N.2.—The number of animals slaughtered under the Bovine Tuberculosis Order was above the average of recent years.
- N.3.—The post of Veterinary Inspector was vacant for part of the year and no meeting of the Consultative Council was held.
- N.4.—Combing operations could not be carried out to the extent anticipated. The services of Referees were not required as frequently as expected and the Consultative Council did not meet during the year.
- O.3.—The employment of additional staff in greater numbers and for longer periods than estimated caused additional expenditure on wages and travelling expenses.

 Unforeseen expenditure on research work caused an excess on the provision made for special experiments. Owing to the expansion of the potato trade seals for potato bags were required in much greater quantities than anticipated.
- O.4.—Additional expenditure was incurred on salaries, etc., as the services of part-time Veterinary Examiners and Temporary Marketing Inspectors were required to a greater extent than expected. The necessity for increased attendances at bacon factories caused an excess on the provisions made for travelling and incidental expenses.
- O.5.—The excess was on wages and travelling expenses and was due to the necessity for employing additional temporary staff for inspection work.
- O.6.—The number of unemployed allotment holders was less than expected and the services of the Allotment Instructors were not required as fully as estimated.
- O.8.—Saving due to vacancies on the staff for the whole or part of the year and to the cost of advertising the Wages Order which came into operation this year being lower than expected.
- O.9.—Expenditure in connection with the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts was restricted by rationing and the number of samples of pasteurised milk for testing under the Milk and Dairies Act was less than anticipated.
- Q.—This provision was made to enable Grain Importers (Eire), Ltd., to be recouped the loss incurred by them on the disposal of oatmeal imported in 1948.

- 1. The increased expenditure at the Seed Propagation Division (Subhead E.1) led to additional receipts from the sale of pure line seed, etc.
- 2. Surplus due to increased demand for vaccines and to additional sales of live stock and farm produce.
- 3. Receipts from sales of live stock and farm produce at the Department's farms are difficult to estimate as the numbers and quantities likely to be available for disposal and the prices obtainable vary considerably from year to year.

 - 9. Surplus due to increased demand for fencing materials.
- 10. The refund in respect of the schemes in North-West Cavan was less than the estimate as the full number of bulls and rams provided for could not be located.
- 11. Growers' repayments were less than estimated as operating costs were lower than anticipated and the average price obtained for the crop was less than expected.
 - 14. Deficiency due to changes in the staff of seconded officers.
 - 16. A closer estimate was not possible.
 - 17. Deficiency was due to the decreased expenditure.
 - 20. Fewer applications than expected were made for licences for stallions.
- 21. Receipts from licences, etc., under the Live Stock Breeding Act, 1925, decreased more than was estimated.
- 22. Additional receipts from registration fees and annual fees were due to an increase in the anticipated number of registrations under the Act. Receipts from acquisition fees were higher than estimated owing to increased production.

- 27. Surplus due to an unexpected increase in the number of applications for licences under the Milk and Dairies Act, 1935.

- 29. The surplus was mainly in respect of fees for agglutination tests (poultry) which were estimated for under Item 4.

Two Assistant Principal Officers received allowances of £175 and £45 11s. ld., respectively, for the performance of higher duties.

An Executive Officer on loan to the Dublin District Milk Board received an allowance of £69 from the Board for acting as Secretary and received £22 in respect of military service pension.

Three Clerical Officers received allowances of £70 7s. 9d., £53 15s. 7d. and £13 16s. 8d., respectively, for acting as Clerks in Waiting at their residences, the last of these officers also received £48 6s. 0d. for overtime; a Clerical Officer received £28 8s. 6d. for overtime and £42 in respect of military service pension, and two other Clerical Officers received £37 8s. 4d. and £33 10s. 5d., respectively, for overtime.

A Messenger received an allowance of £22 15s. 0d. for the performance of higher duties and £46 13s. 4d. in respect of military service pension; two other Messengers received £33 6s. 3d. and £20 14s. 7d., respectively, for overtime, and £16 6s. 10d., and £72, respectively, in respect of military service pension; another Messenger received £33 12s. 10d. for overtime.

A Veterinary Officer at the Veterinary College received a gratuity of £75 for the performance of additional duties.

A Veterinary Inspector, a Temporary Marketing Inspector and a Temporary Lay Inspector received gratuities of £70, £86 and £51 18s. 8d., respectively, for the performance of higher duties.

Five Assistant Agricultural Overseers received gratuities of £60 each and another received £52 10s. 0d. for supervisory duties.

The Literary Teacher at Clonakilty Agricultural Station received £44 for clerical work and £19 15s. 0d. for teaching Irish.

Two Foremen, four Assistant Foremen, three Firemen, four Gardeners and four Garden Labourers at the Botanic Gardens received sums varying from £30 ls. 1ld. to £128 5s. 4d. in respect of overtime, Sunday duty, etc.

Twelve farm hands at Athenry Agricultural Station, ten at Ballyhaise Agricultural Station; one at Chantilly Stud Farm; three at Clonakilty Agricultural Station; two at Johnstown Castle Agricultural College; one at the Munster Institute and one at Brownsbarn Farm, received sums varying from £30 Ss. 10d. to £109 11s. 6d. in respect of overtime, Sunday duty, etc.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A.—The additional staff provided for were not recruited until after the close of the year and some posts were vacant for part of the year.
- C.—Excess due to the cost of advertising orders and bye-laws made during the year in respect of the River Foyle for which no provision was made in the estimate.
- D.—The cost of the telephone service increased as a result of increased work.
- E.1.—Excess due to the payment this year of a claim for scientific apparatus provided for in the previous year and to the necessity for shell fish investigations on a greater scale than was allowed for in the estimate.
- E.3.—The services of the Gárda Siochána for sea fisheries protection work were not required to the extent for which provision was made.

- E.5.—This provision was mainly for the travelling, etc., expenses of members attending meetings of the Advisory Committee on Sea Fisheries. No expenses were claimed during the year.
- F.1.—Increased rates levied after the estimate was framed caused the provision made for payments to local authorities under Section 13 of the Fisheries Act, 1925, to be exceeded, and additional grants not provided for in the estimate became payable under Sections 14 (1) and (2) of the Fisheries (Tidal Waters) Act, 1934.
- F.2.—Increased quantities of ova were required for brown trout hatchery experiments and imported ova cost more than was anticipated. Higher operating costs necessitated increased grants to minor stations.
- F.3.—Excess due to the grant of increased wages to employees at Shean and Lagduff Lodges and on the Owenea Fishery was partly offset by savings on other items of the subhead.
- F.4.—Unfavourable weather conditions hampered salmon-tagging experiments and schemes for the development of brown trout angling centres and the removal of coarse fish from trout waters could not be put into operation as early as expected.
- F.5.—Only a few of the smaller claims for compensation under Sections 35 and 67 of the Fisheries Act, 1939, could be disposed of before the close of the year.
- G.1. and G.3.—Savings due to difficulties in procuring fish processing plant of a suitable design for which provision was made under these subheads.
- G.2.—The full sum provided was not required by the Sea Fisheries Association to finance the purchases of boats and gear found possible during the year.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- B.—Portion of the charge for expenses relating to stocktaking did not fall to be met until the year 1950-51.
- C.—Excess is due to a new arrangement by which the Division operates its own telephone exchange and provides for the pay of a Telephonist. The estimate had been made out, as formerly, on the basis of an apportionment of the expenses of the Land Commission exchange.
- D.1.—One post was suppressed and four vacancies remained unfilled. The post of Toy Designer was not filled until the end of December, 1949.
- D.5.—Machinery to the value of £3,900 did not fall due for payment until the year 1950-51 and the purchase of machinery to the value of £3,830 was deferred pending the completion of arrangements for its accommodation.
- D.6.—As marketing conditions did not show signs of recovery until late in the year the provision made for materials for the tweed and knitwear industries was not utilized to the extent anticipated. The charge to this subhead includes £345 13s. 8d. in respect of expenditure on the making up of garments to facilitate the clearance of old stocks of tweeds and homespuns (Department of Finance minute S.29/2/50).
- D.8.—Materials provided for and ordered in the previous year did not fall due for payment until the year 1949-50. The price of certain materials increased considerably and purchases were extended to meet increased demand for the products of the industry.
- D.9.—Portion of the spinning machinery was not installed until after the end of the year and the purchase of materials was restricted having regard to the state of the market for the products of the tweed industry.
- D.10.—The purchase of homespuns was discontinued during the year in view of the difficulty of finding a market for accumulated stocks.
- D.11.—Dyeing and finishing activities were restricted consequent on the circumstances referred to at D.9. above.
- D.12.—The leaden models industry was discontinued at the end of August, 1949, consequent on the absence of a satisfactory market for its products.
- E.1. and E.2.—Savings due to the death in December, 1949, of one of the staff and consequent reorganisation without addition to remaining staff.
- E.3.—Searods were not obtainable to the extent anticipated, with consequent savings on purchases, transport and other expenses.
- F.1.—Excess due to the creation of an extra post as Higher Executive Officer and the extension to Warehousemen of pay increases previously sanctioned for Civil Servants.
- F.2.—An extensive programme of foreign advertising was deferred pending development in the production capacity of the Spinning Mill to supply yarns to the tweed industry.
- F.3.—Excess due to increase in expenditure on packing materials and extra expenditure on travelling was required on the establishment, closing down and development of the rural industries, including a visit to America to investigate marketing requirements.
- G.—Saving is made up of token provisions.
- H.1. and H.2.—Savings due to two vacancies for Housing Surveyors remaining unfilled and delay in the appointment of three Supervising Gangers.

H.3.—Excess due to greater activity on housing, consequent on the passing of the Housing (Gaeltacht) Act, 1949, than was anticipated.

H.4.—Work on the painting and repairing of teachers' residences was not proceeded with.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

- A .- Saving due to retrenchments and vacancies.
- B.—Saving mainly due to a falling off in the general inspection work necessary under emergency regulations.
- C.1.—Excess mainly due to an increase in the price of uniforms and to a greater number being required than was anticipated.
- C.2.—Saving mainly due to travelling and subsistence expenses not having been incurred.
- D.—Saving due to the cost of the Central Statistics Office telephone service having been charged to the Vote for that Office as from 1st June, 1949, and to an account for telephonists' services not having come in course of payment. Provision for both items had been included under this subhead.
- E.—Saving due to economies effected in the volume and nature of certain press notifications.
- G.—Saving mainly due to the number of apprentices who were required to attend the course of training in the hairdressing trade having been less than was anticipated.
- H.—Due to devaluation, the cost of the contribution in Swiss francs to the Bureau des Poids et Mesures was greater than was anticipated.
- H.H.—Arrangements for participation at the Fair were not sufficiently advanced for any payment to be made before the close of the financial year.
- I.1.—A more favourable rate of exchange was obtained than was anticipated.
- I.2.—A larger number of delegates attended the Conference of the International Labour Organisation than was provided for whilst in addition accommodation and subsistence charges were greater than was anticipated.
- J.—Composed of subsidy savings on (1) tea (approximately £106,500) and (2) sugar (approximately £45,000) modified by excesses on (3) bread (approximately £10,500) and (4) oatmeal (approximately £1,275). The savings on tea and sugar were due to the sales of unrationed tea and sugar having been greater than was anticipated, with consequent relief to subsidy payments on the domestic ration. The excesses on bread and oatmeal were due to a number of claims, which were under examination at the close of the previous year, coming in course of payment in this year.
- L.—Saving due to a number of outstanding claims not having matured for payment at the close of this account.
- M.—Amounts due in connection with property acquired which it was anticipated would have been paid in the previous year came in course of payment in this year.

- N.2.—Savings on administrative expenses and purchase of equipment, due to variation in the original programme, were modified by the payment of wages of additional workers which it was found necessary to employ at Avoca.
- N.3.—It was not possible to make any payments of compensation as the amounts involved are subject to agreement by the Mining Board which did not function during the year.
- N.4.—It was anticipated that the drilling operations would have been completed in time to permit all amounts due for drilling work and analyses of cores to have been paid before 31st March, 1950. Owing, however, to a breakdown in the equipment, this work was not completed until practically the end of the year and certain accounts were still outstanding at the close of this account.
- O.1.—The total amount of grants required by Bord na Móna was less than was anticipated.
- O.2.—Saving due to turf production having been on a more restricted scale than was anticipated largely owing to the difficulty of securing sufficient labour.
- P.1.—Saving due to retrenchments and staff changes.
- P.2. and P.3.—Owing to wages agreements having been reached between employers' representatives and trade unions, sittings of the Labour Court to the extent anticipated were not necessary. In consequence, expenditure on travelling and press notifications was considerably less than the sums provided for these services.
- Q.2.—The Institute was not required to undertake any special investigations which would qualify for a grant.
- Q.3.—Saving mainly due to the difficulty in obtaining equipment required and to claims for the construction of roadways and retention moneys withheld not having matured for payment at the close of this account.
- R.R.—Saving due to a post of member of the Authority being left unfilled.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT.

The salary of the Chief Medical Officer is charged to this subhead. This Officer performs certain duties also for other Government Departments, including the Civil Service Commission. The value of these services is estimated to be one-half of his salary.
