2. Extra receipts payable to the Exchequer as recorded in the appropriation accounts amounted to £679,267.

# Surrender of Balances on 1959-60 Votes

3. The balances due to be surrendered out of votes for the public services for 1959-60 amounted to £2,812,812. I hereby certify that these balances have been duly surrendered. I further certify that the excess of £7,573 on Vote No. 59, External Affairs, referred to in paragraph 2 of my previous report, has been made good by a vote of the Oireachtas for the sum of £6,937, and the application of £636 as an appropriation in aid of the vote.

#### Stock and Store Accounts

4. The stock and store accounts of the Departments have been examined. The results are satisfactory, with some exceptions which are referred to in the paragraphs relating to the votes of the Departments concerned.

# National Development Fund (Winding up) Account

5. As indicated in paragraph 7 of the previous report the balance in the Winding up Account at 31 March 1960 was £1,219,037 (including £23,977 in the hands of agent Departments). Issues to agent Departments in the year amounted to £271,821, viz:—

11. The Finance (No. 2) Act, 1959 provides for the deduction by employers from the current earnings of employees, with certain exceptions, of income tax on emoluments assessable under schedule E. The arrangement, known as Pay as You Earn, was introduced with effect from 6 October 1960. I have made a survey of the procedures and accounting arrangements which I found to be working satisfactorily.

# Extra-statutory Repayments of Customs and Excise Duties and Stamp Duties

12. Extra-statutory repayments of Customs duties, Excise duties and Stamp duties amounting to £6,678, £7,959 and £222, respectively, were made during the year. The Customs duties include £16 in respect of Special Import Levy.

#### Remissions and Amounts Irrecoverable

13. I have been furnished with schedules of the cases in volving a loss of £50 or upwards in which claims for duty under the Revenue Acts were remitted without statutory authority or passed as irrecoverable during the year ended 31 March 1961. I have made a test examination of the items included in the schedules with satisfactory results. The total amount, £146,785, remitted or passed as irrecoverable is made up as follows:—

#### VOTE 9.—PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS

## Subhead B.—New Works, Alterations and Additions

- 14. The charge to the subhead comprises £322,470 expended on general architectural and engineering works and £1,260,088 in respect of grants towards the cost of erection, enlargement or improvement of national schools. Of the latter sum £601,878 was paid to managers who undertook responsibility for carrying out the works and £658,210 was expended directly by the Commissioners. A school grant represents not less than two-thirds of the full cost, the balance being met by the manager from local contributions.
- 15. In paragraph 15 of my report on the accounts for 1959-60 reference was made to the expenditure of £2,733 on continuation of works of improvement and repair after the transfer of the agricultural institutions at Johnstown Castle and Grange Farm to An Foras Talúntais. As shown in a note to the account further expenditure amounting to £19,864 was incurred during the year bringing the total from date of transfer to £22,597.

#### Subhead BB.—Coast Protection

16. The survey and experimental works in connexion with the prevention of coast erosion at Rosslare Strand were continued and £20,147 was expended during the year. The total expenditure to 31 March 1961 on this project amounted to £55,723 towards which the Wexford Co. Council contributed £17,783.

# Subhead J.2.—Arterial Drainage—Construction Works

17. The charge to the subhead in respect of construction works in progress during the year amounted to £617,545. In addition the value of stores issued and charges for the use of plant were assessed at £337,793. The cost of each scheme to 31 March 1961 was:—

Certificates of completion of the Clareen and Nenagh catchment drainage schemes were issued on 5 December 1960 by the Minister for Finance pursuant to section 13 of the Arterial Drainage Act, 1945.

The balance of the charge to the subhead is made up of sums amounting to £2,431 being remanets of expenditure on

completed schemes.

#### Stores

18. Reference was made in paragraph 19 of my previous report to stocks of surplus spare parts held at the Central Engineering Workshops, Inchicore, which had been purchased for the maintenance of machinery used mainly on drainage schemes. These purchases, I am informed, arose from the need to ensure an adequate supply of parts so that no disruption of the drainage programme would be caused by machines awaiting essential spares and the parts were purchased in a period of uncertainty when market conditions were difficult.

The availability of spare parts to the value of £50,600 was brought to the notice of other government departments and public bodies but spares to the value of only £5,400, approximately, were disposed of in this manner. The balance of the spare parts of a book value of £45,200, approximately, realised £5,440 on sale by auction.

19. I inquired as to the position regarding other stocks of spares valued at £45,000 which seemed to be surplus to requirements and I am informed that the lists of stocks are being examined to decide which items may definitely be declared surplus and to determine the manner in which they might best be disposed of.

Management consultants have investigated the whole position and have made certain recommendations which are being put into operation. It is anticipated that the changes will provide for the more effective control of stocks.

20. I referred in paragraph 20 of my previous report to the second complete stocktaking at the Central Engineering Workshops. Investigation of the discrepancies was completed in August 1960 and disclosed surpluses of £11,500 and deficiencies of £10,300,

approximately.

I am informed that the discrepancies were in the main due to confusion in issue of items and loss of issue dockets. Final adjustment of the stock records will not be made until the recommendations made by the consultants on the organisation and methods of material control are implemented. The reorganisation of part of the stores, including the preparation of standard stock lists, has been supervised by them. The report on material control is expected soon but the re-organisation and checking of the remaining stores is not expected to be completed until the end of the financial year 1961-62.

# Suspense Account

21. In paragraph 21 of the report on the accounts for 1959-60 reference was made to the charge to a suspense account of £19,436 expended on the acquisition of a site for a television transmitter and the construction of an approach road. Further expenditure of £624 during the year under review brought the total outlay by the Office of Public Works on this project to £20,060 which has been recovered from Radio Éireann.

## VOTE 10.—EMPLOYMENT AND EMERGENCY SCHEMES

- 22. Provision was made under subhead E (Urban Employment Schemes) and subhead F (Rural Employment Schemes) for grants towards expenditure by local authorities on road and amenity schemes, etc., to provide employment. The grants, amounting in all to £264,836, were paid in instalments, during the progress of the various works, by the Department of Local Government acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. The accounts of the expenditure on the schemes are examined by Local Government auditors whose certificates are available to me. The provision under subhead E was supplemented by moneys made available from the National Development Fund. (See page 28).
- 23. The expenditure charged to subhead G (Minor Employment Schemes) and subhead H (Development Works in Bogs used by Landholders and other Private Producers), amounting to £287,276, relates to schemes administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office. In certain counties these schemes were carried out by the county engineers acting as agents for the Office.
- 24. The scheme for which provision was made under subhead I (Rural Improvements Scheme) was also administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office either directly or through the agency of county engineers. The works carried out included the improvement and construction of accommodation roads to houses, farms and bogs, small drainage works, the erection or reconstruction of small bridges, etc. Only works which are estimated to cost not less than £40 are approved and the grants may vary from 50 per cent. to 100 per cent. of their cost. The gross expenditure amounted to £170,096 and contributions by beneficiaries, which are appropriated in aid of the vote, totalled £29,821.
- 25. The amount charged to subhead J (Miscellaneous Schemes) comprises expenditure on archaeological works and sports fields by the Special Employment Schemes Office, on foreshore and other relief works by the Department of Local Government, and on improvement works on small fishery harbours and piers by the Office of Public Works.

#### VOTE 20.—STATIONERY OFFICE

# Subhead D.—Printing and Binding

26. The 1959 issue of the telephone directory was the first issue under a new contract and in order to increase the number of subscribers listed on each page smaller type was used. The type was not considered satisfactory and it was decided to use a new and heavier type in printing the 1960 issue. This change involved additional expenditure of £2,490 on resetting for which the sanction of the Minister for Finance was obtained.

#### VOTE 32.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT

#### Motor Vehicle Duties, etc.

27. A test examination of the revenue from motor vehicle duties, etc., was carried out with satisfactory results. The certificates and reports of the Local Government auditors who examine the motor tax transactions of local authorities are made available to me.

The gross proceeds in 1960-61 amounted to £6,349,910 compared with £5,974,774 in the previous year. They include fines amounting to £44,303 collected by the Department of Justice, £5,835 in respect of fees received under the Road Traffic Act (Parts VI and VII) (Fees) Regulations, 1937, and £63,793 received from government departments in respect of State-owned vehicles. £6,456,000 was paid into the Exchequer during the year and £8,458 was refunded leaving a balance of £86,323 as compared with £200,871 at the end of the previous financial year.

#### VOTE 34.—PRIMARY EDUCATION

# Subhead A.3.—Preparatory Colleges, etc., including Contributions to Pension Fund

- 28. I have been furnished with a statement of the receipts and expenditure in respect of the six preparatory colleges for the school year ended 31 July 1960. The average cost per student for maintenance and tuition for that year was £210 and the average fee paid by the students was £33.
- 29. Accounts in respect of the farms and gardens attached to the colleges have also been submitted. Four of the accounts show losses varying from £76 to £199 and two show profits of £65 and £86. The farms are inspected by technical officers of the Department of Agriculture and their reports are available to me.

# Suspense Account

30. In paragraph 32 of my previous report I referred to the transfer to a suspense account of a sum of £360,000 from which would be made ex-gratia payments in the nature of lump sums to persons who on 1 January 1950 were entitled to pensions as national school teachers or to the widows of such former teachers. Sums totalling £323,798 were issued during the year under review leaving a balance of £36,202 in the account at 31 March 1961. The payments were made in accordance with the terms of an amendment to the National School Teachers' Superannuation Scheme 1934-58 which has not yet been promulgated.

#### VOTE 35.—SECONDARY EDUCATION

# Subhead E.—Publication of Irish Text Books

31. Reference was made in previous reports to the publication under agreements with a publishing company of certain text books urgently needed by schools conducting courses through the medium of Irish. The agreements provide for the issue of repayable grants towards the cost of production, and require the publishers to pay to the Department any grants made available, from the Science and Art vote, through Bord na Leabhar Gaeilge in respect of these books, and to refund the balance by half-yearly payments equal to 20 per cent. of the amount realised on sales. The issues under fourteen agreements entered into for approved books amounted to £9,147 at 31 March 1961, comprising £7,125 in respect of nine completed works and £2,022 advance payments in respect of five books, publication of which is awaited. No issues were made under these agreements during the year under review. But the grant-in-aid to Comhdháil Náisiúnta na Gaeilge, charged to the vote for Science and Art, included £2,000 issued to provide for advances to the publishing company towards the cost of production of the five text books not yet published. Repayments to 31 March 1961, including £160 in the year under review, amounted to £5,191 of which £3,600 derived from grants by Bord na Leabhar Gaeilge and £1,591 from sales.

#### VOTE 43.—FORESTRY

# Subhead C.2.—Forest Development and Management

32. A mobile workshop valued at £4,600 was transferred from the Department of Agriculture in September 1955 for the purpose of maintaining and servicing the Forestry Division's mechanical fleet. It does not appear to have been used for this purpose and periodical contracts continue to be made for the

inspection and maintenance of the fleet by commercial contractors. I am informed that subsequent to the acquisition of the workshop it was decided not to seek the necessary fitting staff to operate it pending the examination of the whole machinery plan for the Forestry Division by an industrial consultant who is expected to submit his initial recommendations in the near future.

## VOTE 44.—FISHERIES

# Subhead F.5.—Compensation, etc.

33. Under the provisions of section 35 of the Fisheries Act, 1939 £4,320 was paid to the owners of fishing rights as compensation for the restriction of the use of nets in fresh water. Interest amounting to £1,028 and a contribution of £79 towards the cost of proving title to compensation were paid under the provisions of section 3 of the Freshwater Fisheries (Prohibition of Netting) Act, 1951.

# Subhead G.—Grant-in-Aid of Administration and Development of An Bord Iascaigh Mhara

34. With the sanction of the Department of Finance a payment of £38,230 was made to An Bord Iascaigh Mhara in recoupment of expenditure incurred by it on the purchase of a fish meal and fish oil factory at Killybegs, Co. Donegal.

# Exchequer Extra Receipts

35. Reference was made in paragraph 35 of my previous report to expenditure incurred on the provision and equipment of an exploratory fishing vessel. In pursuance of an agreement with the Government of the United States of America the cost of this vessel was recouped from the American Grant Counterpart Special Account. The sum of £59,934 recovered was treated as an Exchequer extra receipt.

# Salmon Conservancy Fund

36. The income of the Fund is derived from levies on exports of salmon, from excess duty on salmon rod licences, and from contributions from the vote. Payments are made from the Fund to Boards of Conservators of such sums as the Minister may think fit to supplement their incomes and towards expenses incurred in connection with any scheme for the improvement of inland fisheries. An account of the receipts and payments is appended to the appropriation account.

- 38. Under the Roads scheme, local authorities are recouped their expenditure on the improvement of certain county roads. The roads are selected after consultation with the local authorities and the Department of Local Government which acts as agent of Roinn na Gaeltachta in administering the scheme.
- 39. The Water and Sewerage scheme is also administered through the agency of the Department of Local Government. Grants for minor schemes are paid to local authorities at the rate of 60 per cent. of the expenditure incurred where the work includes water-piping or power-pumping, and 50 per cent. otherwise. Grants for larger schemes are paid at the rate of 25 per cent. of the cost to supplement the contribution towards these schemes provided from the vote for Local Government.
- 40. The Special Employment Schemes Office is recouped the expenditure on the improvement of selected accommodation roads.
- 41. Under the Marine Works scheme minor improvement works are carried out on an agency basis by the Office of Public Works. The appropriate local authority is required to undertake responsibility for subsequent maintenance.
- 42. The expenditure under the Glasshouse scheme was incurred on the installation of heating plant in a number of the unheated glasshouses erected by the Department of Agriculture in Connemara in previous years and on the erection of new heated glasshouses in Connemara and in South Mayo.

- 43. Grants are paid at the rate of 75 per cent. of the cost, subject to a maximum of £5,000 in any one case, for the building, improvement or extension of secondary schools. In addition, special grants of £200 per annum for three years may be paid towards the running costs of new schools.
- 44. Under the Heat and Light scheme assistance is given towards the provision of bottled gas facilities in islands in the Gaeltacht. Payments were made to suppliers for certain basic equipment provided for each household.
- 45. To encourage pig breeding a grant of £10 is paid towards the cost of each sow purchased by selected applicants, and seed and fertilisers for the growing of suitable fodder are supplied at reduced prices through the agency of the Department of Agriculture or the County Committee of Agriculture.
- 46. Under the Recreation Halls scheme, grants not exceeding 80 per cent. of the cost within a maximum of £5,000 in any one case may be paid towards the building, repair and furnishing of halls.

- 49. An occupier of land who undertakes an approved scheme of reclamation work on his holding is entitled, when the work has been completed to the satisfaction of the Department, to a grant amounting to two-thirds of the estimated cost subject to a maximum of £30 per statute acre. Grants to farmers amounted to £1,616,240 in the year as compared with £1,662,111 in the previous year.
- 50. As mentioned in previous reports it was decided to discontinue section B of the project as from 13 November 1958 but to carry out work under agreements entered into by that date. Payments to contractors in the year amounted to £58,775 as compared with £185,332 in the previous year.

The reports of officers of the Department who inspected the records of the various firms to verify subsidy claims were examined by my officers with satisfactory results.

52. The subsidy paid from the vote to manufacturers of home produced superphosphate enables supplies to be made available on the home market at the world price. The basic rate of subsidy payable is the difference between the economic ex-factory price

of home produced superphosphate as determined by the Department of Industry and Commerce and the landed price of imported superphosphate. In February 1959 the Department of Industry and Commerce determined the economic ex-factory price for the 1958-59 fertiliser season (i.e. 1 July 1958-30 June 1959) and appropriate payments in respect of subsidy were made from the vote for Agriculture in the financial years 1958-59 and 1959-60. After a review of certified financial accounts and final manufacturing costings for the 1958-59 season the Department of Industry and Commerce established in April 1960 that the economic ex-factory price had been overstated to the extent of 9s. 6d. per ton. As a result, overissues of subsidy were calculated to be £90,920 and as shown in the account refunds amounting to £86,519 were obtained by 31 March 1961 and credited to Exchequer extra receipts. I inquired regarding the adoption of more effective measures to safeguard against future overissues of public moneys under this scheme and I was informed that it has been decided to defer the estimation of the economic price for 1960-61 until the accounts of the manufacturers for that season are available.

Receipts from the sale of cattle slaughtered under the scheme amounted to £1,869,526 for the year and were credited to appropriations in aid.

- 54. The gross cost of the scheme from its inception in September 1954 to 31 March 1961 was £19,881,434 and receipts from the disposal of cattle for slaughter were £7,315,169. The net cost was therefore £12,566,265. Allocations towards the cost were provided from the Grant Counterpart Special Account (£700,000) and the National Development Fund (£653,000).
- 55. As indicated above guarantee payments amounting to £198,421 for fat cattle exported and £67,169 for carcase beef exported were made during the year. These payments relate to special export arrangements introduced in July 1960 whereby a market was provided for uncertificated fat cattle which otherwise might have had to be sold at uneconomic prices or might have been retained in this country for an unduly long period thus increasing the risk of the spread of bovine tuberculosis.
- 56. The average loss per cow reactor incurred in each year since the inception of the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme on the purchase and sale of cow reactors was calculated by the Department to be as follows:—

In reply to my inquiry as to the causes for the increase in the rate of loss in the years 1959-60 and 1960-61 as compared with earlier years I was informed that, as clearance measures proceed towards attestation, cow reactors purchased include a higher proportion of good milch cows thus increasing the divergence between market value which takes account of their milk potential and canning value. The Accounting Officer has furnished statements to me showing the prices of cows at the Dublin Cattle Market and has suggested that reactor cows purchased by the Department's officers in each of the years 1959-60 and 1960-61 were not overvalued. Also, supervising agricultural officers have been appointed to all district offices to ensure that valuations for the purchase of reactors are keen and uniform.

57. Reactor cows purchased by the Department under the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme in areas outside the six southern counties are disposed of to canning firms under contracts arranged quarterly at competitive tender prices. In

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the six southern counties the canning firms purchase reactor cows direct from owners and compensation payments, related to the purchase price, are made from the vote to indemnify them against loss in respect of any meat condemned on slaughter. It was noted that the contract prices paid by certain firms to the Department for reactor cows were approximately 3 pence per lb. lower than the average price paid by these firms for cows purchased direct from owners in the same period. In reply to my inquiry I was informed that the Department has not access to any data as to the actual cost of transport which contracting firms, in undertaking to accept delivery of animals at various centres, must take into account in their quotations and consequently is not in a position to prove that the difference between the prices is attributable to transport costs but that it is obvious that transport costs must be a material factor. I was also informed that dairy cows from areas outside the six southern counties are sold by the Department to the processors at comparatively low prices because cows in milk are not really wanted by processors because of their relative unsuitability for the beef trade, whereas farmers in the south can choose their own time to dispose of reactor cows and sell them in the most suitable condition for the meat trade.

# Subhead M.12.—Grants for Pasteurisation of Separated Milk, etc.

- 58. Grants to creameries towards the cost of approved pasteurising plant and can-washing equipment amounted to £38,643 in the year. This amount was recouped to the Department from the American Grant Counterpart Special Account and credited to appropriations in aid. (See paragraph 68).
- 59. I referred in my previous report to certain refunds in respect of grants which are credited to a suspense account. I understand that the matter is still under investigation.

# Subhead M.14.—Payments to Pigs and Bacon Commission

60. The scheme introduced in April 1956 to support the price of Grade A bacon exports is administered through the Pigs and Bacon Commission and is financed out of the proceeds of a levy on bacon pigs purchased by curers together with a State contribution. It was found necessary during the year to increase by a supplementary estimate for £300,000 the original provision of £550,000. Since May 1960 the scheme includes a new grade— "A" Special—for bacon of very high quality.

- 62. Reference was made in previous reports to the arrangement under which An Bord Gráin would purchase and dispose of 230,000 tons approximately of the 1958 wheat harvest which was not millable into flour. The accounts of An Bord showed losses at 31 August 1960 of £383,518, towards which £350,000 had been advanced in previous years.
- 63. In regard to the 1960 wheat crop it was arranged that An Bord Gráin should purchase and dispose of so much wheat as was not utilisable for milling into flour. I understand that 150,000 tons were purchased by 31 March 1961. £800,000 was paid on account to An Bord towards the anticipated losses arising from the disposal of this wheat.

Consequent on an increase in the price of creamery milk as from 13 April 1960 it was decided to make good to manufacturers the increased cost of the milk content in exports of chocolate crumb and certain milk products by subsidy payments. A subsidy towards freight costs was also paid on exports of chocolate crumb to Britain and the Six Counties.
- 66. The loss on butter exports by the Butter Marketing Committee in the year ended 31 March 1960 was £30,727 and one-third of this is met from the Dairy Produce (Price Stabilisation) Fund.
- 67. The loss on butter exports by the Committee in the year ended 31 March 1961 is borne mainly on the vote and partly on the Fund and payments on account amounting to £2,375,000 are charged as follows:—

Additional shares, to the amount of £699,997 were taken up during the year under review before the passing of the Irish Steel Holdings Limited Act, 1960. Section 3 of the Act provides that the Minister for Finance may take up by subscription or purchase, shares of the Company to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate £4,000,000, including sums expended before the passing of the Act on such purchases from moneys provided by the Oireachtas. All moneys required after the passing of the Act by the Minister for Finance to meet payments in respect of shares taken up or otherwise acquired by him shall be advanced out of the Central Fund.

Including £245,533 charged to the subhead the grants issued to the Board under this section amounted to £390,229 at 31 March, 1961. Certificates furnished by the auditors of the Board's accounts of the amount expended on compensation to that date have been made available to me.

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the cost of acquisition of land, amounted to £3,657,011 for Shannon Airport, £1,943,712 for Dublin Airport and £358,639 for Cork Airport. In addition to the sums expended from public moneys at Dublin Airport Aer Rianta Teoranta expended £265,224 on the construction of a bangar for jet aircraft. This work was financed from borrowings from sources other than the Exchequer.

# Operation of Shannon and Dublin Airports

76. I have been furnished with statements giving particulars of the cost of operating Shannon and Dublin Airports. Shannon Airport is managed directly by the Department and Dublin Airport is managed by Aer Rianta, Teoranta, on behalf of the Department.

Section 8 (2) of the Act limits the aggregate amount of grants which may be made to the company to £500,000.

The aggregate amount which the Minister for Finance may subscribe for shares is limited by section 2 of the Act to one and a half million pounds. Under section 3, £1,168,000, including £775,000 in the year under review, was advanced from the Central Fund to enable the Minister to take up shares in the company.

# Subhead Q.—Appropriations in Aid

- 78. A grant of £35,000 was allocated from the American Grant Counterpart Special Account towards the cost of establishing a development and research unit by Córas Iompair Éireann. Expenditure during the year amounting to £9,784 was charged to subhead M—Technical Assistance and recoupment from the Special Account has been brought to credit as an appropriation in aid.
- 79. The account of the management of Dublin Airport by Aer Rianta Teoranta for the year ended 31 March 1960 showed a surplus of £82,318. After charging £32,776 for interest payable to British European Airways, the deficit on the company's General Administration Account amounted to £35,856. Provision had been made in the estimate to set off this deficit against the management surplus. The balance, £46,462, was surrendered to the Department and has been brought to account as an appropriation in aid.

#### VOTE 49.—POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS

# Subhead H.2.—Losses by Default, Accident, etc.

80. The losses borne on the vote for the year ended 31 March 1961 amounted to £27,879. A classified schedule of these losses is set out on page 150. At page 151 particulars are given

of 26 cases in which cash shortages or misappropriations amounting to £1,791 were discovered; the sums in question were made good and no charge to public funds was necessary.

#### Stores

81. A test examination of the store accounts was carried out with satisfactory results.

In addition to the engineering stores shown in Appendix No. II as valued at £1,151,734 on 31 March 1961, engineering stores to the value of £35,463 were held on behalf of other government departments. Stores other than engineering stores were valued at £448,965 including £187,052 in respect of stores held for other government departments.

Including works in progress on 31 March 1961 the expenditure on manufacturing jobs in the factory during the year amounted to £46,208, expenditure on repair work (other than repairs to mechanical transport) to £70,113, and expenditure on mechanical transport repairs to £12,862.

#### Revenue

82. A test examination of the accounts of Postal, Telegraph and Telephone services was carried out with satisfactory results.

The net yield of revenue for the years 1960-61 and 1959-60

£9,700,000 was paid into the Exchequer during the year leaving a balance of £812,769 at 31 March 1961 as compared with £758,930 at the end of the previous financial year.

Sums due for telephone services amounting to £3,950 were written off during the year as irrecoverable, as compared with

£3,824 in the previous year.

# Post Office Savings Bank

83. The accounts of the Post Office Savings Bank for the year ended 31 December 1960 were submitted to a test examination with satisfactory results. The balance due to depositors, inclusive of interest, amounted to £101,557,983 (including £14,872,403 in respect of the liability to Trustee Savings Banks)

on 31 December 1960, as compared with £96,265,590 at the close of the previous year. Interest accrued during the year on securities standing to the credit of the Post Office Savings Bank Fund amounted to £3,717,082. Of this sum £2,483,328 was applied as interest paid and credited to depositors, management expenses absorbed £286,287 and the balance, £947,467, was set aside towards provision against depreciation in the value of securities.

The introduction in January 1961 of a mechanised accounting system enabled precise figures of interest paid and credited to depositors to be ascertained and included in the accounts. Only estimated figures had been available formerly.

84. In the course of a test check of the records of maintenance work on army transport vehicles it was noted that considerable sums were expended on the repair of vehicles which had already given prolonged service. I have asked for the observations of the Accounting Officer on the economy of repairing, at costs varying from £100 to £250, six vehicles, the mileages of which ranged from 100,000 to 150,000. Five of these had been in service for some twenty years.

#### Subhead K .- Provisions and Allowances in lieu

85. Statements have been furnished to me showing the cost of production of bread at the Curragh bakery and of meat at the Dublin and Curragh abattoirs. The unit costs are as follows:—

The average price of cattle purchased for the Dublin and Curragh areas was £74 and £77 per head, respectively, as compared with £79 for each area in the previous year, while the average production of beef per head was 686 lbs. and 703 lbs., respectively, as compared with 676 lbs. and 664 lbs.

#### Subhead P.2.—Naval Service

86. A steel perch which marked the position of a dredged channel used by the Department's vessels in passing from Haulbowline to Spike Island became defective and was replaced by a concrete perch. This work which was entrusted to a contractor was completed in February 1960 at a cost of £1,440. It appears that the new perch was erected in a position some fifty feet from the edge of the dredged channel and that its usefulness in adverse conditions of tide and weather is reduced since it does not mark precisely the line of the channel. I have invited the observations of the Accounting Officer on the matter.

#### Service outside the State

89. In July 1960 the Government acceded to a request from the Secretary-General of the United Nations to supply a battalion of troops to serve with the United Nations Force in the

Republic of the Congo. Under powers granted by the Defence (Amendment) Act, 1960, a battalion of some 700 officers and men was despatched in July, and in August a second battalion was sent in response to a request for further assistance. Both battalions returned in January 1961 and were replaced by a third battalion.

The United Nations has undertaken responsibility for expenditure incurred in making the forces available over and above those costs, including pay, which the Government would have been obliged to meet in any event. Transport to and from the Congo, accommodation, rations, etc., are provided direct by the United Nations together with a daily subsistence allowance. Expenses incurred specially by the Department of Defence consisted principally of overseas allowances varying from 15s. to £2 11s. 3d. per day and were charged to a suspense account. As stated in a note to the appropriation account £252,517 was received from the United Nations in March 1961 in settlement of an initial claim which included the bulk of the extra expenses incurred in sending the first two battalions. £247,568, representing expenses specially incurred, was credited to the suspense account and £4,949, expenses already borne on the vote, was credited to subhead Z.—Appropriations in Aid. (See also paragraph 90).

#### VOTE 52.—ARMY PENSIONS

Subhead P.—Special Compensation—United Nations Force in the Congo

90. Provision was made by supplementary estimate for grants of compensation to dependants of members of the Defence Forces who were killed in action or who died as a result of service with the United Nations Force in the Republic of the Congo (see paragraph 89). Rates of compensation were fixed at £3,500 in the case of a married man and £2,000 in the case of a single man irrespective of military rank, and the charge of £31,000 to the subhead includes six payments of £3,500 and five of £2,000. A recent claim which has been made on the United Nations for recovery of the compensation paid includes also the capitalised value, as actuarially assessed, of allowances payable under the Army Pensions Acts to dependants of the deceased men.

# VOTE 56.—SOCIAL INSURANCE

- Subhead A.—Payment to the Social Insurance Fund under Section 39 (9) of the Social Welfare Act, 1952
- 91. Payments from this subhead to the Social Insurance Fund in the year under review amounted to £4,630,000. These payments are subject to adjustment when the audited accounts of the Fund are available.

#### **Overpayments**

92. Sums recovered in respect of overpayments charged in prior years' accounts were:—£14,951 in cash credited to appropriations in aid, and £4,519 withheld from current entitlements. Overpayments amounting to £3,998 were treated as irrecoverable. The total amount of overpayments not disposed of at 31 March 1961 was £49,857 as compared with £45,358 at 31 March 1960. During the year seventy-five individuals were prosecuted for irregularly obtaining or attempting to obtain social assistance and convictions were secured in sixty-nine cases.

#### CONTINGENCY FUND

93. A vote for Repayments to the Contingency Fund was not necessary as advances from the Fund were made good within the year by votes of the Oireachtas. The Contingency Fund Deposit Account appears at page 191.

- A.—Saving was due mainly to the non-filling of vacancies provided for, death of an officer, retirements, and the secondment of officers to outside bodies with consequent saving of salaries.
- B.—Travelling expenses on housing inspections were greater than expected. Also subsistence allowances were increased during the year.

- C.—Expenditure on all heads of estimate and mainly on uniforms, purchase of samples and testing of commodities, was less than expected.
- E.—The main cause of the excess was the attendance of an officer at Geneva on two occasions during the year in connection with an inquiry into the European housing situation being undertaken by the Housing Committee of the Economic Commission for Europe. E.C.E. requested his attendance after the estimates had been made.
- F.—The number and extent of inquiries held during the year were greater than had been estimated.
- G. 3.—The number of claims received from local authorities for recoupment in respect of grants made by them during the year was less than estimated.
- H.—There was a decrease in the number of allotments tilled by unemployed persons and in the number of local authorities who operated allotment schemes.
- I.—Subsidy did not become payable to the full extent estimated because work on schemes in progress was retarded by prolonged bad weather conditions and, in some cases, owing to the financing of schemes not having reached finality as early as was expected. In a few cases payment of subsidy was deferred pending the outcome of correspondence regarding the satisfactory completion and maintenance of the works concerned.
- LL.—This is the first occasion on which these grants were introduced. The supplementary estimate was taken in the latter part of the financial year and only an approximate estimate could be made of the expenditure likely to arise thereunder.

A .- Saving was due to vacancies remaining unfilled.

C.2.—Saving was mainly due to inclement weather which impeded progress on the construction of new forest roads.

Miscellaneous expenditure under this subhead included the following:-

- A sum of £25 was paid to an adjoining landowner in respect of damage to lands alleged to have been caused by the spread of fire from protective burnings carried out by the Department's employees (S.86/7/56).
- Expenditure of £16 was incurred in repairing the piggery of an adjoining landowner
  which had been damaged by a falling tree in the course of site clearance by
  the Department (S.86/8/38).
- 3. A sum of £5 in respect of legal fees was paid to an adjoining landowner in connection with tree tops and timber chips left on his lands during the removal of trees from State forest property. Expenditure of £7 was incurred in a previous year in removing the debris from the lands (8.86/5/60).
- A sum of £10 was paid ex-gratia to an adjoining landowner in respect of shelter provided for employees of the Department (S.86/7/60).
- A sum of £5 was paid to an adjoining landowner in respect of damage to a gate on his lands caused by a tree, on State forest lands, blown down during a storm (S.86/5/60).
- A sum of £8 was paid to an employee of the Department as compensation for damage to clothing (E.109/41/41).
- C.3.—Some structural alterations at sawmills were not carried out. There were also savings on the purchase of materials and equipment; these savings were in part offset by extra labour cost arising from increases in wages.
- D.—Applications for planting grants were not received to the extent hoped for.
- E.1.—Incidental savings in the running expenses of the Schools were augmented by a substantial saving due to deferment of the purchase of vehicles for the transport of students.
- E.2.—Expenditure under this head is difficult to forecast.
- F.—It was necessary to retain the services of consultants for longer periods than had been anticipated.
- G.—The cost of telephone services was greater than expected. Increased costs were also incurred in the attendance of officers of the Department at instructional courses and in the provision of maps, aerial photographs and items of research equipment.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT B.—The volume of travelling found necessary was less than expected.

Refunds of subsidy on home-produced superphosphate

E.1.—Due to the adverse harvest of 1960 expenditure on the purchase of seed from gowers under the seed propagation and certification schemes was less than anticipated. Fewer live stock were required for Backweston Farm and prices were lower than expected.

The expenditure includes an ex-gratia payment of £49 to a contractor in respect of the cost of insurance cover on a seed cleaning and processing plant from the date of delivery to Backweston Farm until it was installed, tested and taken over (S.9/9/54).

E.2.—There were savings on salaries due to staff vacancies; on the purchase of live stock of which fewer were required than expected; on miscellaneous expenses as certain proposed fencing and land reclamation projects were not proceeded with; on seeds, manures, and feeding stuffs; and on laboratory equipment. The savings were partly offset by additional expenditure on the adaptation of buildings at Abbotstown for which only a token provision had been made.

The expenditure includes £19 in respect of damage to property caused by an official vehicle located at Abbotstown (8.48/1/58).

- E.4.—Certain proposed trials were not commenced or were discontinued. Owing to the unfavourable weather conditions of 1960 no bulbs were available for purchase by the Department under the Aran Flower Bulb Scheme.
- E.5.—There was a saving on the Cattle Progeny Testing Scheme as only 28 of the 36 recorders provided for were actually employed by the artificial insemination stations during the year. The saving was modified by additional expenditure on the purchase of bonhams and feeding stuffs at the Pig Progeny Testing Station due to the availability of suitable litter groups to a greater extent than anticipated.
- F.1.—The expenditure includes £4,829 for goods ordered prior to but delivered subsequent to the date of transfer of Johnstown Castle Agricultural College to An Foras Talúntais (S.90/8/59).

The expenditure also includes £9 compensation and legal expenses arising out of a claim in respect of a bicycle alleged to have been damaged in a collision with an official vehicle located at Athenry Agricultural Station (8.48/1/58).

- F.2.—The payment of an additional capital grant for the erection of new college buildings caused an excess of £13,873 on this item. Variations on other sub-divisions of the subhead reduced the excess to £10,947.
- F.3.—A saving on salaries mainly as a result of vacancies in the laboratory assistant grades was modified by additional expenditure on general expenses due to the purchase of additional equipment and supplies for the veterinary schools.
- F.4.—A saving due to vacancies in the teaching staff for the whole or part of the year was partly offset by expenditure on equipping new teachers. Recoupment was also made in respect of expenses incurred on the faculty prior to 1st April 1960.
- F.5.—Excess was due to the recoupment of expenses incurred on the school prior to 1st April 1960 and on the equipment of new teachers. The excess was partly offset by savings on salaries due to vacancies in the teaching staff for part of the year.
- F.11.—The claims of Parish Agents for recoupment of the net cost of trials, experiments and demonstrations carried out by them were smaller than expected. The resignation of one Parish Agent and the absence of another in the U.S.A. at a course in Agricultural Economics and Farm Management also contributed to the saving.
- G.1.—Due to the foot and mouth disease position in England it was not possible to obtain our full requirements of Friesian bulls and of the number purchased, delivery and payment for three were delayed until after the close of the year. There were also savings on salaries due to staff vacancies and on grants to Cow Testing Associations as certain claims could not be paid within the financial year.
- G.2.—Delivery and payment for one bull and nine pigs were delayed past the close of the year and further proposed purchases were prevented by the outbreaks of foot and mouth disease in England. The saving was modified by the purchase of two additional thoroughbred stallions and by extra nominations of Irish Draught mares due to an increase in the numbers of animals presented for inspection at mare shows.
- G.3.—The excess was mainly due to the purchase of additional equipment and feeding stuffs for the white turkey unit at Athenry Agricultural Station which is being expanded. An increase in the number of applications for grants for chicken houses and chicken rearing equipment caused extra expenditure on this item. Grants to pedigree poultry breeders were not availed of to the extent anticipated,

- I.—Owing to the difficulty in obtaining supplies of seed under the Seed Distribution Scheme, deliveries were late and a greater number than usual of claims from contractors did not come in course of payment until after the close of year. Fewer bulls and rams were located than expected and there was a saving on salaries due to staff vacancies. Additional expenditure was incurred on the Gaeltacht Glasshouse Scheme as the proposed transfer from 1st April 1960 of the glasshouse units in Connemara and Co. Donegal to Co-operative Societies did not take place and the running expenses of these units had to be met.
- K.1.—Due to variations from year to year in the layout, etc., of the exhibits that make up the Department's educational exhibit, which this year included a new marketing stand, it is difficult to estimate closely the probable cost in any year and there was an excess of £1,680 on the exhibit this year. Savings on other items reduced the excess to £1,576.
- K.4.—Expenditure by two of the organisations concerned was less and by the third somewhat more than the estimates submitted by them and on which the provisions under the subhead were based.
- M.1.—Saving mainly due to the fact that certain staff vacancies were not filled, and that advertising and publicity was less extensive than expected.
- M.2.—The number of completed farm record and accounts books submitted in connection with the Farm Management Survey was less than expected and there were vacancies in the staff of reporters who furnish reports on agricultural conditions and crop yields.
- M.3.—The expenditure includes sums amounting to £89 recouped to the Agricultural Credit Corporation in respect of unpaid amounts due to the Corporation in connection with loans for the purchase of agricultural implements, heifers, etc. The sums in question proved irrecoverable and were written off (8.90/36/41, 8.91/1/40 and 8.90/5/54).
- M.9.—Subsequent to the preparation of the 1960-61 estimate, farmers were encouraged to discontinue treatment of adult animals with Strain 19 vaccine except under veterinary advice. This resulted in a decline in demand which could not be foreseen. Advertising was less extensive than anticipated.
- M.10.—The excess was mainly due to the payment of £303 in respect of compensation to 29 herd owners arising out of the interchange of Hereford and Jersey semen in a consignment supplied by one of this Department's artificial insemination stations (S. 90/19/51).
- M.12.—A number of grants for which provision was made did not mature for payment before the end of the year.
- M.13.—This was the first year of the scheme and the estimate of expenditure was necessarily tentative. In the event the scheme took longer to get under way than had been expected. A number of approved works had been completed by the end of the financial year but due to shortage of staff to carry out on-the-site inspections and to lack of familiarity on the part of curers as regards furnishing vouched expenditure the necessary documentation was not available to enable payment of the grants earned to be made before 31st March.
- N.1.—Due to the precautions taken to prevent the spread of foot and mouth disease from England to this country there was additional expenditure on salaries, travelling expenses, uniforms and overalls, miscellaneous expenses and compensation for animals slaughtered on account of the disease. No bulls were removed for slaughter on account of trichomoniasis and vibriosis during the year and provision for compensation under this head was not utilised.
- N.3.—Fee-paid veterinary surgeons had to be employed to carry out the 1960 inspections under the Horse Breeding Act, 1934, due to a shortage of Departmental staff. The payment of £114 charged to this subhead is in respect of the balance of fees and expenses of one of the veterinary surgeons in question,

- N.4.—There was a saving as a result of (1) a number of claims for fees and expenses of part-time and assistant inspectors engaged on the 1961 Spring inspections not being received in time for payment before the end of the year and (2) a decision during the year to reduce "combing" operations in some areas where it was shown from the most recent inspections that the "scrub" bull was not a problem. This saving was reduced by (1) an unusually high number of appeals against refusal of licences, giving rise to an excess on fees and expenses of Referees and (2) the cost of a specially convened meeting of the Livestock Consultative Council.
- O.1.—Savings were due to vacancies in the staff of Agricultural Officers and to a decrease in the quantity of eggs exported.
- 0.2.—The saving was mainly on salaries due to staff vacancies.
- O.7.—There was a decrease in the number of allotments and the average cost per allotment was lower than expected. There were also savings on travelling and incidental expenses.
- Q.—Due mainly to difficulties in releasing staff for training abroad the development of the Grant Counterpart Technical Assistance programme was slower than anticipated.

<sup>1.</sup> Due to failures at the processing stage less seed wheat and barley were available for certification and sale than expected. The number of cattle sold from Backweston Farm was not as great as anticipated and receipts from sales of farm produce also declined.

<sup>2.</sup> Receipts from sales of vaccines and tuberculin were smaller than expected and the number of cattle available for sale was less than had been anticipated.

- 3. As more suitable litter groups than expected became available for progeny testing (see note on Subhead E.5) a greater number of finished pigs became available for sale.
- 4. The increased receipts were mainly from sales of poultry and eggs at the three Agricultural Stations and the Munster Institute, from sales of farm produce and dairy produce at Ballyhaise Agricultural Station, and from sales of live stock and farm produce at Clonakilty Agricultural Station.
- 5. Fewer litters of pigs were available for sale at Chantilly Farm due to a lack of suitable breeding sows. Owing to structural alterations, the number of animals that could be accommodated for treatment was smaller than expected and receipts from this source declined accordingly. There were no receipts in respect of students' fees.
- 7. Due to the foot and mouth disease position in England the full number of stock bulls and pigs could not be imported and receipts from leasing fees were less than expected. Two additional stallions were placed on lease during the year and leasing fees for rams were somewhat higher than allowed for.
- 8. Approximately 850 young turkeys, which would otherwise have been sold, were retained for breeding purposes at the white turkey unit at Athenry Agricultural Station. Receipts from provisional permits, licences, etc., were greater than anticipated.
  - 11. There was very little demand for fencing materials.
- 13. The anticipated take-over by co-operative societies of the Donegal and Connemara glasshouse units did not take place and the additional receipts accrued from the recovery from the growers of the running expenses of the units.
- 14. The market price for seed potatoes at the time orders for seed were being placed by smallholders was lower than expected when the estimate was being prepared.
- 17. Four of the seconded officers resigned during the year and recoupment in respect of their salaries was less than anticipated.
- 20. Recoupment from American Grant Counterpart Special Account is in respect of expenditure under Subheads K.4, M.12 and Q, which fell short of expectations.
- 21. The demand for vaccine for the treatment of cattle against contagious abortion was less than anticipated.
- 22. The receipts include sums totalling approximately  $\pounds 4,400$  due in respect of semen supplied in the previous year.
  - 24. A closer estimate was not possible.
- 25. Applications for licences were more numerous than expected when the estimate was being prepared.
- 26. The deficiency in receipts was due to decreases in the quantities of eggs handled by wholesalers, in the numbers of registered wholesalers and dealers, and in the quantities of eggs forfeited for contravention of the Act.
- 27. It was not possible to collect the full amount of production and export fees due by creamery societies within the financial year.
- 28. An increase in the quantity of potatoes presented for inspection resulted in additional receipts from inspection fees.
  - 29. (a) (1) and (2) Trade conditions resulted in the number of animals presented for examination under the Fresh Meat and Pigs and Bacon Acts being greater than expected.
    - (b) Trade conditions were also responsible for a decline in exports of canned and open-pack meats.
- 31. Due to delay in completing the legal formalities a loan of £40,000 was not advanced. Repayment instalments on this loan were allowed for when the estimate was being framed.
- 36. Receipts from the salvage of animals slaughtered under the Diseases of Animals Acts (Subhead N.1) exceeded the estimate by approximately £1,400. The receipts include a sum of £4 awarded in the Children's Court against three youths as compensation for damage caused to property at the Botanic Cardens,

### EXTRA REMUNERATION (exceeding £50)

Four officers received allowances of £119, £100, £78 and £69, respectively, from the funds of the Dairy Disposal Company, Limited, for services rendered to the company as directors, secretary, etc. One of these officers also received £250 from the Butter Marketing Committee for acting as chairman of the Committee during part of the year.

An Assistant Secretary received an allowance of £250 during the year for acting as a director of Córas Tráchtála.

A Deputy Director of Veterinary Services, a Principal Officer and an Agricultural Inspector received allowances of £235, £105 and £79, respectively, from the Pigs and Bacon Commission for acting as chairman and ordinary members of the Commission during the year.

An Agricultural Inspector received a gratuity of £150 for the performance of special duties.

A Senior Inspector received £675 from the funds of An Foras Talúntais representing the difference between his salary as director of An Foras and his salary as Senior Inspector.

Two Veterinary Inspectors on loan to the Dairy Disposal Company, Limited, for wholetime duty at the cattle artificial insemination stations of the company received allowances of £132 and £51, respectively, from the funds of the company.

A Veterinary Inspector on loan for part of the year to the Dublin District Milk Board for whole-time duty at the Board's cattle artificial insemination station received an allowance of £138 from the funds of the Board.

A Higher Executive Officer received an allowance of £217 from the funds of Bord na gCon for acting as chief officer of the Board during the year.

The Public Relations Officer received £105 and an Assistant Keeper at the Botanic Gardens received £193 in fees from Radio Éireann.

An Assistant Principal Officer received £107 in fees from Vote 37.

Eight officers received sums varying from £93 to £163 in respect of Army Reserve pay.

Eighty-one officers of the Department's Veterinary staff received gratuities of £150 each in respect of additional work performed by them during the year ended 13th January 1961. Seven members and nine former members of the Veterinary staff received gratuities of £133, £97, £96, £96, £96, £95, £94, £90, £90, £88, £82, £68, £57, £55, £53, and £53, in respect of varying periods during the year concerned.

In addition, a Superintending Veterinary Inspector received a gratuity of £150 for higher supervisory and co-ordinating duties in the Clearance Area of the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme during the year.

Two Agricultural Officers in charge of the Gaeltacht glasshouse scheme in the Donegal and Connemara areas received gratuities of £70 each for extra attendance given during the year ended 30th November 1959.

A former Farm Manager at Abbotstown Farm received a gratuity of £150 for extra duties performed by him during the period from October 1955 to July 1958.

Four Clerical Officers received allowances of £60 each for supervisory duties at local offices in connection with the Scheme for Eradication of Bovine Tuberculosis.

A Works Foreman (Land Project) received £130 from Vote 49 for special services.

One hundred and fifty-two employees received sums varying from £51 to £335 in respect of overtime, Sunday duty, etc.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- B.—Saving was due mainly to unavoidable delays in the appointment of two special representatives of the Industrial Development Authority and accordingly travelling by the staff and special representatives was less than anticipated.
- C.—As there were no public hearings by the Fair Trade Commission during 1960-11 no expenditure was incurred on reporting, etc., for which £600 was provided.
- D.—Cost of telephone, etc., services for the Industrial Development Authority was greater than anticipated.
- E.-A claim for £660 in respect of expenditure incurred in 1959-60 in connection with the "Buy Irish Now" campaign was not received until 1960-61,

- H.1.—Owing to delays in the completion of the new laboratory buildings expenditure by the Institute on staffing, etc., was less than anticipated.
- H.2.—Progress on the construction of the new laboratories was considerably slower than anticipated and the buildings were not completed until near the end of the year. Accordingly the bulk of the cost did not mature for payment in 1960-61.
- H.3.—Arrangements for the erection of a caretaker's lodge, for which provision was made, were not completed until near the end of the year and payment will not arise until 1961-62.
- J.2.—Proposals for the development of major tourist resorts did not progress as rapidly as anticipated.
- M.1 and M.2.—These provisions are conjectural. Progress on approved schemes was slower than anticipated and the number reaching the stage where grants became payable was less than anticipated.
- O.—A contract secured in the latter part of the year caused a reduction in the number of redundancies.
- P.—Work on the coalfields exploration schemes did not commence as early nor proceed as rapidly as expected (saving £45,000), while the number of other mineral projects for which grants were payable in the year was considerably less than anticipated (saving £51,000). A number of industrial consultancy schemes were not completed within the year and others were deferred or cancelled (saving £35,000).
- R.—Expenditure was in respect of travelling and incidental expenses for (a) Committee on Industrial, Provident and Friendly Societies (£88) and (b) Nitrogenous Fertiliser Factory Committee (£53).

Additional expenditure of £1,900 was incurred on this service in respect of the remuneration of the Department's staff engaged on the work of these committees and was borne on Subhead A ((a) £500 and (b) £1,400).

The Committee on Industrial, Provident and Friendly Societies was appointed in 1957-58 and the Nitrogenous Fertiliser Factory Committee was appointed in 1960-61. The total expenditure to 31st March, 1961, was £1,848 and £1,453, respectively.

- S.—(1) Expenditure on the re-decoration of the Trade Pavilion at Frankfurt, for which £600 was provided, did not mature for payment within the financial year.
  - (2) Claims in respect of apprenticeship fees of £150 payable to Vocational Education Committees were not received before the close of the financial year.
- S.S.—The unexpended balance was not required as the financing of the Company was transferred to the Central Fund from 15th November 1960 under the Irish Steel Holdings Limited Act, 1960.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- A.—The saving was due mainly to unfilled vacancies in the professional and technical grades.
- B.—Travelling by professional staff in connection with constructional works in progress at Shannon and Cork airports and transfers of staff in the Control and Meteorological services were greater than had been expected.
- D.—The saving was due mainly to the deferment of the establishment of a telephone link between Shannon and Gander (£9,000) and the surrender of a teleprinter line in the Meteorological Service (£2,200). Expenditure on telegrams and calls was also less than anticipated.
- E.—Expenditure on the purchase of additional equipment for the Meteorological Service was less than anticipated.
- F.2.—The excess is due mainly to a greater degree of re-organisation within Córas Iompair Éireann than was envisaged when the estimate was prepared.
- G.—Arrangements were not completed in respect of a number of schemes for which about £26,000 was provided. There was a further saving of £30,000 on another scheme where work proceeded more slowly than had been anticipated. These savings were offset to the extent of about £36,000 on other schemes which developed more rapidly than had been anticipated when the estimate was prepared.
- H.1.—A number of compensation claims for land acquired at Dublin Airport did not mature for payment in 1960-61 owing to legal difficulties in clearing titles.
- H.2.—The provision included £42,000 for additional office, storage and other accommodation which could not be undertaken in 1960-61. There was a saving of £61,000 on a freight terminal, communications service building and a new boiler installation on which progress was slower than anticipated. There were further savings of £20,000 on various minor works. The total savings of £123,000 were offset by excesses amounting to £48,000 on the provisions for major alterations to the Terminal Buildings and the erection of a hangar.
- H.3.—The provision included £44,000 for additional accommodation, electricity and water services, reconstruction of portions of apron, etc., which could not be undertaken in 1960-61.

Savings amounted to £108,000 on the extension of the apron, improved lighting, provision of additional office and other accommodation, alterations and extensions to public and passenger buildings, etc. These works did not progress as rapidly as had been expected.

The total savings of £152,000 were offset by an excess of £25,000 on the extension of Runway 17/35 and the diversion of Collinstown Lane.

- H.4.—Progress on the construction of the runway and other constructional works was greatly retarded by bad weather.
- I.1.—Maintenance work on embankments, runways, etc., was less than anticipated. This service is conjectural.
- I.2.—The payment of a number of electricity claims covering about six months was deferred pending the outcome of discussions with the E.S.B. regarding the rates of charges for electricity at the airport.
- I.4.—The amounts paid in grants towards the establishment of industrial and trading enterprises was less than had been anticipated.
- J.2.—Certain accounts for which provision was made in 1959-60 did not mature for payment until 1960-61.
- L.—A number of international conferences for which £6,000 had been provided did not take place, and the contribution towards the working expenses of the International Civil Aviation Organisation was less than anticipated.
- M.—The provision included £35,000 for a grant towards the cost of a major research and development scheme of which only £9,784 came in course of payment in 1960-61,

- 5. Stores value £191 were stolen from telephone kiosks in the year (421 cases). The cost of labour used in making good the damage was £57. In two cases the offenders were prosecuted. No compensation was received.
- 6. Free facilities were afforded to the Irish Red Cross Society for the display of slogans through the medium of stamp cancelling machines, in support of the World Refugee Appeal during May 1960 and June 1960 (S.41/1/60).
- 7. Stores value £41 and £33 surplus to the requirements of the Departments of Defence and Transport and Power, respectively, were transferred to this Department (S.8/16/45 and S.99/19/50).
- 8. Replacements in respect of drawings, in previous financial years, of uniform materials from the reserve stocks held by this Department for the Department of Defence amounted to £8,460 (S.41/2/58).
- 9. An ex-gratia payment of £103 was made to the Sub-Postmistress of North Strand, Dublin, in respect of (1) expenses incurred by her arising out of a robbery at the Sub-Office and (2) an award in recognition of her bravery on the occasion of the robbery (S.41/11/58).
- 10. Amounts totalling £279 in respect of legal costs due from telephone subscribers were abandoned.

- A.—The saving is due to the average strength having been below that for which provision was made and to troops overseas not having drawn their full pay before the end of the financial year.
- A.1.—The cost of courses abroad was greater than anticipated.
- A.3.—The number of personnel who qualified for extension-of-service bounties was not as great as expected.
- B.—The excess is due to an increase in the rate of marriage allowance during the year.
- C.—The saving is due to casual absences of employees.
- E.—Medical officers who retired were not replaced within the year.
- F.—There was a saving of £2,812 on the purchase of X-ray films and surgical and medical equipment which was partly offset by an excess of £1,590 on drugs and dressings and dental requisites. Expenditure includes the sum of £26 paid to contractors in respect of clerical errors made when tendering (8.9/13/39 and 8.9/4/52).
- G.—The number of officers engaged on F.C.A. duties increased during the year and the rate of allowance for men on duty with the F.C.A. was increased with effect from 1st April, 1960.
- I.—The excess is due to the number of transfers of personnel and consequent removal of furniture being greater than expected.
- J.—The excess is due to the increased number of advances for the purchase of ears to officers on duty with the F.C.A. (£13,969) and to expenditure in respect of maintenance being greater than anticipated.
- K.—There was a saving of £85,174 in respect of purchases of rations which was partly offset by an excess of £3,144 in the payment of ration allowance. The net saving was due to the average strength being below that for which provision was made and to the absence of personnel on duty in the Congo.

A contract was cancelled owing to a clerical error made when tendering and the next lowest tender was accepted. The expenditure includes £89, being the excess cost (8.9/4/52).

- L.—The increased expenditure is due largely to the increased use of motor transport in connection with the training of troops and the movement of troops, stores and equipment prior to departure to the Congo.
- M.—Due to non-delivery of uniforms, etc., within the year, there was a saving of £11,962. There was also a saving of £2,903 on uniform allowance due to the retirements of officers.
- N.—The saving is due to the number of horses purchased being less than anticipated.
- O.—Purchases were not made to the extent provided for. Expenditure includes the sum of £26 paid to contractors in respect of clerical errors made when tendering (S.9/13/39 and S.9/4/52).
- P.—The saving is due to stores ordered not having been delivered within the year.
- P.1.—The saving is due to grants to local authorities having been less than was expected and to deliveries of equipment and stores having been less than anticipated. The purchase of 500 uniforms was deferred as stocks held were sufficient to meet demand.
- R.—There was a saving on purchases of solid fuel due to the absence of troops in the Congo.
- S.—There was a saving of £18,671 on ordinary repairs, renewals and maintenance which was partly offset by an excess of £5,613 on new works.
  Expenditure includes the sum of £43 paid to contractors in respect of clerical errors made when tendering (8.9/13/39).
- S.1.—The excess is due to pay increases.
- T.—The expenditure on maintenance of lands was below the amount estimated by £1,500 approximately. In addition, the proposed purchase of lands at a cost of £1,500 was not proceeded with.
- U.-It is not possible to forecast accurately the expenditure under this heading.
- V.—The saving is due mainly to slow delivery of stores (£2,703) and to public laundry charges being less than anticipated (£3,126).
- X.—The saving is due to reduced expenditure on advertising (£11,390) and on books, periodicals, etc. (£1,960).
- X.2.—It is not possible to forecast accurately the expenditure under this heading.
- X.3.—The saving is due to a reduction of £1,500 in the grant payable to the Irish Red Cross Society in respect of normal activities and of £1,365 in respect of the maintenance of refugees from North China.
- Y.1.—The travelling of office staff was less than anticipated.
- Y.2.—The saving is due to deliveries of uniforms not having been up to expectations (£33,407) and to a decrease in the numbers reporting for annual training (£1,258).

In 1959-60, a Clerical Officer received an overpayment of salary, by way of sick pay, amounting to £58 as a result of the submission by him of forged medical certificates to cover absence from duty. He was suspended while the matter was being investigated. While under suspension he left the country and resigned from the Service. A balance of salary of £8 due was withheld. The net overpayment of £50 was written off as irrecoverable (E.95/5/60).

- B.—An official visit to the United States of America by An Tánaiste and three senior officials of his Department was not foreseen when the estimate was framed.
- C.—This subhead covers a variety of minor expenses, and excesses arose under a number of headings, offset in part by a saving on Departmental advertising.
