Vote 7.—Office of the Revenue Commissioners

Subhead A.—Salaries, Wages and Allowances, etc.

8. The extent to which staff was engaged for lengthy periods on overtime in connection with Income Tax work came under notice in the course of audit. In two cases officers were employed on overtime for up to 30 hours a week and totalling more than 1,300 hours in the year. Their overtime earnings almost equalled their normal salaries. I invited the observations of the Accounting Officer on the economy of employing staff for such protracted spells of overtime having regard to the high rate payable for overtime in excess of 12 hours a week and the impairment of efficiency usually associated with prolonged working hours. I was informed that the abnormal circumstances arising out of the introduction of P.A.Y.E. and the urgent need to dispose of the large number of cases of Schedule E. arrears necessitated the employment of all available officers on overtime. and that it was essential in order to maintain continuity to have a nucleus of experienced officers on more or less continuous overtime.

Revenue Account

- 9. A test examination of the Revenue Account has been carried out with satisfactory results.
- 10. The net yield of revenue for the years 1961-62 and 1960-61, under its main heads, is shown in the following statement:—

Extra-statutory Repayments of Customs and other Duties

12. Extra-statutory repayments of Customs duties (including Special Import Levy), £10,269, Excise duties, £8,460 and Stamp duties, £67, were made during the year.

Remissions and Amounts Irrecoverable

13. I have been furnished with schedules of the cases involving a loss of £50 or upwards in which claims for duty under the Revenue Acts were remitted without statutory authority or passed as irrecoverable during the year ended 31 March 1962. I have made a test examination of the items included in the

Vote 9.—Public Works and Buildings Subhead B.—New Works, Alterations and Additions

- 14. The charge to the subhead comprises £509,019 expended on general architectural and engineering works and £1,698,476 in respect of grants towards the cost of erection, enlargement or improvement of national schools. Of the latter sum £949,790 was paid to managers who undertook responsibility for carrying out the works and £748,686 was expended directly by the Commissioners. A school grant represents not less than two-thirds of the full cost, the balance being met by the manager from local contributions.
- 15. Reference was made in paragraph 15 of my previous report to expenditure on continuation of works of improvement and repair after the transfer of the agricultural institutions at Johnstown Castle and Grange Farm to An Foras Talúntais. As shown in a note to the account, further expenditure amounting to £6,283 was incurred during the year bringing the total from date of transfer to £28,880.
- 16. Following a Government decision to have Templemore Military Barracks converted to a training centre for Garda recruits the Department of Finance sanctioned expenditure estimated at £435,000, including £35,000 (approximately) for Architect's and Quantity Surveyor's fees, for the erection of new buildings and the renovation and adaptation of existing accommodation.

Because the Commissioners of Public Works were unable to undertake the planning and supervision of the project the Minister for Justice with the sanction of the Minister for Finance engaged an Architect and a Quantity Surveyor on a fee basis and entered into a contract for the execution of the work. The contractor was selected from 11 builders who were invited to tender on the basis of a schedule of rates for new works and adaptations to be measured and valued during the progress of the works in accordance with approximate Bills of Quantities.

The contract was placed on 12 July 1961 and expenditure to 31 March 1962 amounting to £93,506 has been charged to this

subhead.

Subhead BB.—Coast Protection

17. The survey and experimental works in connexion with the prevention of coast erosion at Rosslare Strand were continued and £19,865 was expended during the year. The total expenditure to 31 March 1962 on this project amounted to £75,588 towards which the Wexford Co. Council contributed £25,217.

Subhead J.2.—Arterial Drainage—Construction Works

18. The charge to the subhead in respect of construction works in progress during the year amounted to £761,654. In addition, the value of stores issued and charges for the use of plant were assessed at £428,855. The cost of each scheme to 31 March 1962 was:—

The balance of the charge to the subhead is made up of sums amounting to £3,470 being remanets of expenditure on completed schemes.

Stores

19. Reference was made in paragraph 19 of my previous report to surplus stocks of spare parts of an estimated value of £45,000 held at the Central Engineering Workshop. Following

my inquiries the Commissioners appointed a Board of Survey who examined the items in question and made recommendations for their disposal.

- 20. I also mentioned in paragraph 20 of my previous report that following the recommendations made by a firm of consultants the stores were being reorganised and a system of material control introduced. Progress has been made in this direction but it is not expected that the recommendations of the consultants will be fully implemented before 31 March 1963.
- 21. The Committee of Public Accounts in its report on the accounts for 1955-56 referred to the existence of two sets of store records and it was promised that this matter would be investigated. Since 1 November 1961, on the recommendation of the consultants, only one set of records is being kept. A system of continuous stocktaking has also been introduced.

VOTE 10.—EMPLOYMENT AND EMERGENCY SCHEMES

- 22. Provision was made under subhead C (Urban Employment Schemes) and subhead D (Rural Employment Schemes) for grants towards expenditure by local authorities on road and amenity schemes, etc., to provide employment. The grants, amounting in all to £263,852, were paid in instalments, during the progress of the various works, by the Department of Local Government acting on behalf of the Special Employment Schemes Office. The accounts of the expenditure on the schemes are examined by Local Government auditors whose certificates are available to me.
- 23. The expenditure charged to subhead E (Minor Employment Schemes) and subhead F (Development Works in Bogs used by Landholders and other Private Producers), amounting to £285,322, relates to schemes administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office. In certain counties these schemes were carried out by the county engineers acting as agents for the Office.
- 24. The scheme for which provision was made under subhead G (Rural Improvements Scheme) was also administered by the Special Employment Schemes Office either directly or through the agency of county engineers. The works carried out included the improvement and construction of accommodation roads to houses, farms and bogs, small drainage works, the erection or reconstruction of small bridges, etc. Only works which are estimated to cost not less than £40 are approved and the grants may vary from 50 per cent. to 100 per cent. of their cost. The gross expenditure amounted to £190,379 and contributions by beneficiaries, which are appropriated in aid of the vote, totalled £34,368.
 - 25. The amount charged to subhead H (Miscellaneous

Schemes) comprises expenditure on accommodation roads on islands, archaeological works and sports fields by the Special Employment Schemes Office, on foreshore and other relief works by the Department of Local Government, and on improvement works on small fishery harbours and piers by the Office of Public Works.

Vote 24.—Garda Síochána Subhead C.—Subsistence Allowances

26. The Garda Síochána Allowances Order, 1958, provides inter alia for the payment of allowances at specified rates to members of the Force employed on duty away from their permanent stations. I observed instances in which nightly subsistence allowances under this order were paid to members for periods they would appear to have spent in their homes. Although these payments are permissible under the order, I considered them to be contrary to the general intention that subsistence allowances should cover only extra expenses necessarily incurred on the public service. The Accounting Officer has informed me that he agrees with my contention and that as soon as a suitable opportunity presents itself he proposes to give consideration to an appropriate amendment of the Allowances Order with a view to preventing such payments in future. He also informed me that in the meantime claims in similar circumstances would be resisted.

VOTE 29.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT Motor Vehicle Duties, etc.

27. A test examination of the revenue from motor vehicle duties, etc., was carried out with satisfactory results. The certificates and reports of the Local Government auditors who examine the motor tax transactions of local authorities are made available to me.

The gross proceeds in 1961–62 amounted to £6,998,657 compared with £6,349,910 in the previous year. They include fines amounting to £58,167 collected by the Department of Justice, £5,864 in respect of fees received under the Road Traffic Act (Parts VI and VII) (Fees) Regulations, 1937, and £63,507 received from government departments in respect of State-owned vehicles. £6,927,000 was paid into the Exchequer during the year and £16,006 was refunded leaving a balance of £141,974 as compared with £86,323 at the end of the previous financial year.

Vote 31.—Primary Education Subhead A.3.—Preparatory Colleges, etc., including Contributions to Pension Fund

28. Five of the six residential colleges used to provide secondary education for selected candidates for the teaching profession were discontinued at the close of the school year

- on 31 July 1961. Four of the college premises were transferred to their former conductors under agreements for sale which restricted their use to that of Class A secondary schools for a period of at least twenty years. The premises and lands of the fifth college were transferred to the Office of Public Works pending a decision as to their future use.
- 29. The Department accepted liability for the school fees of 349 former preparatory college pupils who continued their studies to complete the secondary course. The charge to the subhead includes £24,672 in respect of school fees; and contributions by parents or guardians amounting to £5,991 have been appropriated in aid of the vote.
- 30. Former preparatory college teachers were permitted to retain their old salary scales if they continued teaching in either secondary or national schools. Compensation for loss of employment was paid to certain teachers and subordinate staff on an *ex-gratia* basis and amounted to £11,745.

Subhead D.—Superannuation, etc., of Teachers

31. The charge to the subhead includes sums amounting to £15,000, approximately, in respect of improvements in pension granted with the approval of the Minister for Finance to certain classes of teachers with pensionable service prior to 1934. The necessary amendment to the Superannuation Scheme has not yet been promulgated.

Suspense Account

32. Reference was made in previous reports to the transfer to a Suspense Account of a sum of £360,000 which was voted for the purpose of making ex-gratia payments in the nature of lump sums to former national school teachers who were on pension on 1 January 1950 or to the widows of such pensioners. Including sums totalling £946 which were issued during the year under review the total payments from the account to 31 March 1962 was £324,744 leaving a balance of £35,256 in the account. The payments were made in accordance with the terms of an amendment to the National School Teachers' Superannuation Scheme 1934–58 which has yet to be promulgated.

Vote 32.—Secondary Education Subhead E.—Publication of Irish Text Books

33. Reference was made in previous reports to the publication under agreements with a publishing company of certain text books needed by schools conducting courses through the medium of Irish. The agreements provide for the issue of repayable grants towards the cost of production and require the publishing company to pay to the Department any grants made available from the Science and Art Vote through Bord na Leabhar Gaeilge in respect of these books and to refund the

balance by half yearly instalments equal to 20 per cent. of the amount realised on sales. Including a sum of £235 issued during the year the total issues under fourteen agreements entered into for approved books amounted to £9,382 at 31 March 1962, comprising £7,595 in respect of ten completed works and £1,787 advance payments in respect of four books publication of which is awaited.

Repayments to 31 March 1962, including £339 received in the year under review, amounted to £5,530 of which £3,600 derived from grants by Bord na Leabhar Gaeilge and £1,930 from sales.

I am in communication with the Accounting Officer regarding the recovery from the publishers of sums due in respect of sales after 31 December 1960 and the refund by them of grants amounting to £549 issued by Bord na Leabhar Gaeilge.

VOTE 39.—LANDS

Subhead I.—Improvement of Estates, etc.

- 34. A tender received in April 1959 for the erection of six dwellinghouses and twelve outoffices for the sum of £9,120 was not accepted because it was considered by the Land Commission that the tenderer would not be able to undertake the job immediately. It was decided to carry out the work by direct labour and the buildings were completed in February 1962 at a cost of £11,971. I have invited the observations of the Accounting Officer on the economy of the procedure adopted.
- 35. Formal agreements are not entered into with contractors who hire machinery to the Land Commission for improvement works. In reply to my inquiry I was informed that the Land Commission had found that the simple procedure which it followed led to no legal or other difficulty in practice over many years but that the question of adopting more formal procedure had been receiving attention and that further consideration would be expedited.

VOTE 41.—FISHERIES

Subhead D.5.—Compensation, etc.

36. There were no payments of compensation during the year but £1,129 was paid as interest under section 3 of the Freshwater Fisheries (Prohibition of Netting) Act, 1951 on compensation paid in previous years.

Subhead E.2.—Deficit

37. The Committee of Public Accounts in its report on the accounts for 1959–60 referred to a deficiency of £186,000 in respect of repayable advances made to the former Sea Fisheries Association for which An Bord Iascaigh Mhara was made liable under section 27 of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1952. As will be noted from the account this deficiency has been written off with the sanction of Dáil Éireann.

Salmon Conservancy Fund

38. The income of the Fund is derived from levies on exports of salmon, from excess duty on salmon rod licences and from contributions from the vote. Payments are made from the Fund to Boards of Conservators of such sums as the Minister may think fit to supplement their incomes and towards expenses incurred in connection with any scheme for the improvement of inland fisheries. An account of the receipts and payments is appended to the appropriation account.

- 40. A number of new glasshouses under construction in Connemara and in South Mayo under the Glasshouse scheme sustained considerable damage as a result of a severe storm in September 1961. I understand that the question of their rehabilitation and completion is the subject of discussion between the Office of Public Works and the contractors.
- 41. The expenditure on secondary schools included grants totalling £2,411 towards the travelling expenses of day pupils attending secondary schools in the Gaeltacht.

An occupier of land who undertakes an approved scheme of reclamation work on his holding is entitled, when the work has been completed to the satisfaction of the Department, to a grant amounting to two-thirds of the estimated cost subject to a maximum of £30 per statute acre. Receipts from the sale of cattle slaughtered under the scheme amounted to £1,787,664 for the year and were credited to appropriations in aid.

47. The gross cost of the scheme from its inception in September 1954 to 31 March 1962, including expenditure charged in this year to subhead K.K.11, was £30,605,891 and receipts from the disposal of cattle for slaughter were £9,102,833. The net cost was therefore £21,503,058.

48. Under the headage grant scheme in operation in the Six Southern Counties the Department pays a grant of £15 on each cow reactor sold by a herd owner to a licensed cannery or to a canner's agent. The Department's officers at the licensed canneries were unable to confirm the receipt and slaughter at the canneries of 850 of the cow reactors disposed of to canners' agents. In view of the terms of the scheme it was decided, with the approval of the Department of Finance, to pay headage grant in respect of these cows on condition that they are not in the herds of origin and that documentary evidence of their sale to canners' agents is available. The consequential charge (£12,750 approximately) is included in the subhead.

Subhead K.K.11.—Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme— Guarantee Payments in respect of Export of Fat Cattle and Carcase Beef

49. The guarantee payments made in the year are as follows :-£

As mentioned in paragraph 55 of my previous report guarantee payments relate to special export arrangements introduced in July 1960 whereby a market was provided for uncertificated fat cattle which otherwise might have had to be sold at uneconomic prices or might have been retained in this country for an unduly long period thus increasing the risk of the spread of bovine tuberculosis. Payments to exporters varied weekly in relation to the level of guarantee payments in Britain. A rate of 13s. 6d. per live cwt. on eligible fat cattle in early April 1961 increased to 44 shillings per live cwt. towards mid July. But from 31 July 1961 it was decided to limit the guarantee to a maximum of 20s. per live cwt. and from the end of September the rate payable was below this maximum.

- 50. In reply to my inquiry concerning irregularities in regard to guarantee payments I was informed that overpayments arising from irregular claims by certain exporters under the scheme amounted to £7,287 and that unpaid claims to a face value of £30,000, approximately, are retained by the Department pending investigation of all doubtful claims.
- 51. The scheme requires that documentary evidence of export should be furnished in support of claims for exports of processed meat. It was noted that some payments were made in respect of such meat prior to export and I have inquired whether proof of export is now available.

Subhead K.12.—Grants for Pasteurisation of Separated Milk, etc.

52. Grants to creameries towards the cost of approved pasteurising plant and can-washing equipment amounted to £38,922 in the year. This amount was recouped to the Department from the American Grant Counterpart Special Account and credited to appropriations in aid (See paragraph 61).

Subhead K.14.—Payments to Pigs and Bacon Commission

53. The scheme introduced in April 1956 to support the price of Grade A bacon exports is administered through the Pigs and Bacon Commission and is financed out of the proceeds of a levy on bacon pigs purchased by curers together with a State contribution. The original provision of £550,000 was revised in a supplementary estimate to £1,550,000. But it was found necessary to pay a contribution of £1,850,000 in the year. The Pigs and Bacon Commission was reorganised under the Pigs and Bacon (Amendment) Act, 1961.

Subhead K.15.—Losses on Disposal of Wheat

54. The expenditure under the subhead is made up as follows:—

Reference was made in paragraph 63 of my previous report to the arrangement under which An Bord Gráin would purchase and dispose of so much of the 1960 wheat crop as was not utilisable for milling into flour. I understand that the total quantity purchased was 243,628 tons. The accounts of An Bord showed net losses at 31 August 1961 of £1,953,304 towards which £1,950,000 has been advanced.

- 57. Reference was made in paragraph 65 of my previous report to an increase in the price of creamery milk as from 13 April 1960 and to the decision to make good by subsidy payments to manufacturers the increased cost of the milk content in exports of certain milk products. A subsidy towards freight costs was also paid on exports of chocolate crumb to Britain and the Six Counties. The payments made refer to milk products exported prior to the establishment of An Bord Bainne.
- 58. An Bord Bainne was established under the Dairy Produce Marketing Act, 1961 on 17 May 1961 to develop and improve export marketing of Irish dairy products and to ensure that milk for manufacturing purposes is put to the most profitable uses. The Act also provides for the dissolution of the Butter Marketing Committee and for the transfer of all assets and liabilities of the Committee to An Bord. The dissolution and transfer were effected on 1 August 1961.
- 59. It was decided to meet from the Exchequer the full estimated export loss on the butter stocks held by the Butter Marketing Committee and the creameries on 1 August 1961, subject to a reduction in respect of any excess of home consumption of butter over production in the period 1 August 1961 to 31 March 1962. The total stocks held were ascertained to be 220,560 cwts. and the calculated loss was £2,502,031 of which £2,430,000 was paid on account in the year to An Bord.
- 60. A grant may be paid to the Board in each financial year under section 32 of the Act out of moneys provided by the Oireachtas but a grant shall not be used to defray more than two thirds of
 - (a) any loss incurred by the Board in relation to the export of milk products by the Board, or
 - (b) any subsidy, grant or other like payment made by the Board in relation to the export of milk products.

The grant paid under this section amounted to £475,000 in the year.

Subhead P.—Appropriations in Aid

68. Section 15 of the Transport Act, 1958 authorises the payment of grants from voted moneys to the Board of Cóns Iompair Éireann to meet the cost of compensation paid by the Board to employees, including those of the former Great Northen Railway Board, whose services are dispensed with or conditions worsened under certain circumstances in the five-year period from 16 July 1958. Including £273,523 charged to the subhead

the grants issued to the Board under this section amounted to £663,752 at 31 March 1962. Certificates furnished by the auditors of the Board's accounts of the amount expended on compensation to that date have been made available to me.

Airports

69. Expenditure during the year on constructional works, including furnishing of buildings at Shannon, Dublin and Cork Airports amounted to £198,864, £323,404 and £605,995, respectively. The total expenditure to 31 March 1962 excluding the cost of acquisition of land, amounted to £3,855,875 for Shannon Airport, £2,267,116 for Dublin Airport and £964,634 for Cork Airport. In addition to the sums expended from public moneys at Dublin Airport, Aer Rianta Teoranta incurred further expenditure amounting to £52,003 on the construction of the hangar for jet aircraft mentioned in paragraph 75 of the previous report bringing its total expenditure to £317,227 at 31 March 1962.

Operation of Shannon, Dublin and Cork Airports

70. I have been furnished with statements giving particulars of the cost of operating Shannon, Dublin and Cork Airports. Shannon and Cork Airports are managed directly by the Department and Dublin Airport is managed by Aer Rianta, Teoranta, on behalf of the Department.

Subhead G.4.—Shannon Free Airport Development Company, Limited (Grant-in-Aid)

71. Grants under section 8 (1) of the Shannon Free Airport Development Company Limited Act, 1959 to the company, including £247,000 charged to the subhead amounted to £614,500 at 31 March 1962. Section 3 of the Shannon Free Airport Development Company Limited (Amendment) Act, 1961 increased the aggregate amount of grants which may be made to the company from £500,000 to £1,250,000.

The aggregate amount which the Minister for Finance may subscribe for shares was increased by section 2 of the 1961 Act from one and a half to three million pounds. £1,578,000, including £410,000 in the year under review, was advanced from the Central Fund to enable the Minister to take up shares in the company.

72. Section 4 (1) of the 1961 Act provides that the Minister for Finance may make advances to the company towards the cost of providing dwellings for workers employed on the industrial estate to an aggregate amount of £400,000. Sums amounting to £310,000 were advanced from the Central Fund in the year under review. By direction of the Minister for Finance these advances are subject to interest at the Exchequer lending rates operative on the several dates of issue and the advances made in any financial year will be funded on 1 April following and be repayable by means of an annuity over a period of 35 years.

Tourism

Subhead M.M.1.—Grant under Section 2 of the Tourist Traffic Act, 1961 (Grant-in-Aid)

Subhead M.M.2.—Development of Holiday Accommodation (Grant-in-Aid)

73. The functions vested in the Minister for Industry and Commerce by or under the Tourist Traffic (Development) Act, 1931 and the Tourist Traffic Acts 1939 to 1961 were transferred to the Minister for Transport and Power by the Transport, Fuel and Power (Transfer of Departmental Administration and Ministerial Functions) (No. 2) Order, 1961 on 31 October 1961. The amounts provided under these subheads are in addition to the amounts provided for Tourism in subheads H.1., H.2. and H.3. of the Vote for Industry and Commerce (No. 44). Grants paid to Bord Fáilte Éireann under the Tourist Traffic Acts of 1959 and 1961 were as follows:—

Subhead N.—Appropriations in Aid

- 74. As explained in paragraph 78 of the previous report a grant of £35,000 was allocated from the American Grant Counterpart Special Account towards the cost of establishing a development and research unit by Córas Iompair Éireann. £25,216, the balance of the grant, was issued during the year, charged to subhead K, and recouped from the Special Account.
- 75. As stated in paragraph 70 Dublin Airport is managed by Aer Rianta Teoranta on behalf of the Department. The company undertakes catering at the Airport, the collection of landing fees, rents, etc., and meets the cost of maintenance and other services not provided for in the vote. The management account of the company for the year ended 31 March 1961 showed a surplus of £128,837. The deficit on the company's other operations amounted to £37,462 including £31,384 for interest payable to British European Airways. Provision has been made in the estimate to set off this deficit against the surplus on the management account leaving £91,375 available for surrender to the Department.

VOTE 46.—POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS

Subhead I.—Losses

76. The losses borne on the vote for the year ended 31 March 1962 amounted to £7,469. A classified schedule of these losses is set out on page 143. At page 144 particulars are given of 17 cases in which misappropriations, thefts, etc., amounting to £428 were discovered; the sums in question were made good and no charge to public funds was necessary.

Stores

77. A test examination of the store accounts was carried

out with satisfactory results.

In addition to the engineering stores shown in Appendix No. II as valued at £1,404,744 on 31 March 1962, engineering stores to the value of £41,227 were held on behalf of other government departments. Stores other than engineering stores were valued at £488,415 including £210,090 in respect of stores held for other government departments.

Including works in progress on 31 March 1962 the expenditure on manufacturing jobs in the factory during the year amounted

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to £48,732, expenditure on repair work (other than repairs to mechanical transport) to £73,358, and expenditure on mechanical transport repairs to £15,672.

Revenue

78. A test examination of the accounts of Postal, Telegraph and Telephone services was carried out with satisfactory results.

The net yield of revenue for the years 1961-62 and 1960-61 is shown in the following statement :-

Sums due for telephone services amounting to £3,009 were written off during the year as irrecoverable, as compared with £3,950 for the previous year.

Post Office Savings Bank

79. The accounts of the Post Office Savings Bank for the vear ended 31 December 1961 were submitted to a test examination with satisfactory results. The balance due to depositors, inclusive of interest, amounted to £107,484,344 (including £16,007,051 in respect of the liability to Trustee Savings Banks) on 31 December 1961, as compared with £101,557,983 at the close of the previous year. Interest accrued during the year on securities standing to the credit of the Post Office Savings Bank Fund amounted to £4,062,103. Of this sum £2,651,819 was applied as interest paid and credited to depositors, management expenses absorbed £306,936 and the balance £1,103,348 was set aside towards provision against depreciation in the value of securities.

80. I had a survey made of the procedures of the mechanised accounting system which was introduced at the commencement of the year under review and found them to be working satisfactorily.

VOTE 47.—DEFENCE

Subhead K .- Provisions and Allowances in lieu

81. Statements have been furnished to me showing the cost of production of bread at the Curragh bakery and of meat at the Dublin and Curragh abattoirs. The unit costs are as follows:—

The average price of cattle purchased for both the Dublin and Curragh areas was £74 per head as compared with £74 and £77, respectively, in the previous year, while the average production of beef per head was 702 lbs. and 686 lbs., respectively, as compared with 686 lbs. and 703 lbs.

Subhead M.—Clothing and Equipment

82. In September 1960 deficiencies were discovered in the clothing account of a Unit of an Fórsa Cosanta Áitúil. A noncommissioned officer was subsequently convicted in a civil court on a charge of stealing clothing valued at £663 and sentenced to a term of twelve months' imprisonment, the warrant not to issue if he repaid £200 at once and the balance within six months. £200 was paid into court in April 1961 and I have inquired whether the balance of £463 has yet been received. I have also inquired regarding the security checks in force at the barracks from which the clothing was taken.

Subhead S.—Barrack Maintenance and New Works

83. The sanction of the Department of Finance was obtained in November 1961 for the reconstruction, at an estimated cost of £2,674, of the roof of a workshop built in 1956 by direct labour under the supervision of the Corps of Engineers. I inquired how the roof became defective so rapidly and I vas informed that the corrugated asbestos sheets had developed cracks in many places; investigation showed this had occurred because the sheets had been incorrectly fitted due to inexperience on the part of the tradesmen and of the engineer officer in charge of the work.

Subhead Z .- Appropriations in Aid

85. Four military hospitals were approved by the Minister for Health for the purposes of section 25 of the Health Act, 1953, with effect from August 1960. This approval enabled claims to be made on the appropriate health authorities for payment of a daily capitation rate in respect of all patients eligible for institutional services under the Health Acts. As a considerable number of these claims remained unpaid at 31 March 1962 I inquired regarding the steps being taken to recover the amounts due. I was informed that of the total amount outstanding at 31 March 1962 £12,743 was due from one health authority who had agreed to accept liability for £2,441 but had made proposals, that are under consideration, for discharging the remainder on a modified basis acceptance of which would involve a substantial reduction in the claims.

87. A contract was placed in May 1960 for a supply of beef liver to a military camp for a period of six months the estimated weekly requirement being 270 lbs. Because no liver was ordered during the first two weeks of the currency of the contract the contractor gave notice of termination, and a claim for losses arising from the failure to order was settled by his acceptance of £31 lodged in court and a payment of £11 for legal costs.

In reply to my inquiry I was informed that it had always been considered that in the case of running contracts for food-stuffs a clause in the standard form used which permitted variations from the estimated requirements also protected the Minister even in the unlikely event that no order at all was placed. Legal opinion obtained in this case was that under the existing conditions some quantity must be ordered; amendments which would protect the Minister would be incorporated in future contracts for foodstuffs.

VOTE 52.—SOCIAL INSURANCE

Subhead A.—Payment to the Social Insurance Fund under Section 39 (9) of the Social Welfare Act, 1952

88. Payments from this subhead to the Social Insurance Fund in the year under review amounted to £6,310,000. These payments are subject to adjustment when the audited accounts of the Fund are available.

VOTE 53.—SOCIAL ASSISTANCE

89. Sums recovered in respect of overpayments charged in prior years' accounts were:—£23,763 in cash credited to appropriations in aid and £4,086 withheld from current entitlements. Overpayments amounting to £2,606 were treated as irrecoverable. The total amount of overpayments not disposed of at 31 March 1962 was £57,043 as compared with £49,857 at 31 March 1961. During the year 57 individuals were prosecuted for irregularly obtaining or attempting to obtain social assistance and convictions were secured in 52 cases.

- A.—Excess due to the revision of salary scales, payment of incentive bonus to Housing Inspectors and the appointment of additional staff for housing grant inspections and the administration of the Road Traffic Act enacted during the year.
- B.—The travelling expenses of Inspectorate, particularly on housing grant inspecton duties and the cost of telephone services were greater than expected. - D.—The number and extent of inquiries held during the year were greater than had ben estimated.
- E.2.—The main factors contributing to the saving were (a) a shortage of cement supplies due to strike action during April–June, 1961, retarded building work in general at a period when output would normally be at its maximum (b) a shortage of inspectoial

staff created a considerable volume of arrears of inspection work which slowed down the rate at which applications could be cleared for payment and (c) abnormally severe weather conditions during the latter part of the year.

E.3.—The number of claims received from local authorities for recoupment in respect of grants made by them during the year was less than estimated.

F.—There was a further decrease in the number of allotments tilled by unemployed porsons and in the number of local authorities who operated allotment schemes.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- C.1.—Owing to crop rejections in the course of the 1961 harvest less wheat was available for purchase from growers and contracts were for a smaller acreage of seed oats than anticipated. It was found necessary to increase the acreage under cereals at Backweston farm and as a result there was a considerable saving on the provision for livestock.
- C.2.—There were savings on salaries, travelling expenses and purchase of laboratory equipment due to staff vacancies and on the purchase of livestock owing to the discontinuance of the heifer replacement scheme. The savings were partly offset by excess expenditure incurred on a land reclamation scheme on the farm.
- C.5.—The main savings were on the Cattle Progeny Testing Scheme as only 28 of the 33 recorders provided for were employed by the artificial insemination stations during the year and equipment was not required to the extent anticipated. There were also savings at the Pig Progeny Testing Station on the purchase of feeding stuffs and equipment and no meeting of the Advisory Committee was held.
- D.2.—There were savings of £4,371 on capital grants, as certain proposed works were not proceeded with, and £2,378 on capitation grants owing to an unexpected decrease in the number of eligible students. The savings were partly offset by excess expenditure of £1,283 on management grants, etc., due to the recoupment during the year to one of the agricultural colleges in respect of the salary of a manual instructor for a period of over four years.
- D.4.—Savings were due to staff vacancies, to equipment not being required to the extent anticipated and to the fact that more students' fees than expected were collected by the University during the year.
- D.5.—The excess was on salaries, family allowances and pension contributions and on equipment for teachers. Students' fees were also less than estimated.
- D.9.—A sum of £5,000 included in the estimate for the expansion of the Dairy Science Faculty at University College, Cork, was not utilised. The expenses of the Forestry Department of the Faculty of General Agriculture at University College, Dublin, were less than expected.
- D.11.—The claims of Parish Agents for recoupment of the net cost of trials, experiments and demonstrations carried out by them were smaller than expected. The absence of a Parish Agent in the U.S.A. at a course in Agricultural Economics and Farm Management also contributed to the saving.
- E.1.—Friesian bulls cost much less than expected; ten cow-testing associations lapsed during the year; and there was a saving on salaries due to vacancies.
- E.2.—Due to a decline in demand no stock bulls of the Aberdeen Angus breed were purchased. On the other hand the average prices paid for thoroughbred stallions, Irish draught colts, stock pigs and rams were somewhat higher than expected. There was also an increased demand for nominations for Irish draught mares.
- E.3.—Certain equipment for the white turkey unit for which provision had been made was actually paid for in 1960–61 and the importation of a quantity of turkey hatching eggs from the U.S.A. was postponed until 1962–63. The scheme of grants for turkey supply farms and turkey breeder-hatcheries was only availed of to half the extent anticipated. Applications for grants for chicken houses were fewer than in the previous year and there were savings on salaries due to vacancies. Excess expenditure was incurred on grants for stock cockerels and on the Gaeltacht Chick Scheme.

The expenditure includes £19 compensation for the loss of hatching eggs arising out of a suspected outbreak of disease (8.90/16/56).

G.—The savings were mainly on salaries due to vacancies; on the purchase of bulls and rams, the demand for which was less than expected; and on the Gaeltacht Glasshouse Scheme as the transfer of the scheme to co-operative societies as from 1st November, 1961, did not take place and the proposed grants to the societies were saved but this saving was modified by the expense of running the units for the period 1st November, 1961, to 31st March, 1962.

- I.1.—Due to variations from year to year in the layout, etc., of the exhibits that make up the Department's educational exhibit it is difficult to estimate closely the probable cost in any year and there was an excess of £1,434 on the exhibit this year. Savings on other items reduced the excess to £1,414.
- I.4.—Expenditure during the year by the organisations concerned was less than the estimates submitted by them on which the provisions under the subhead were based.
- K.1.—A smaller amount of advertising than was anticipated when the estimate was being framed, was sufficient.
- K.2.—The number of completed farm record and accounts books submitted in connection with the Farm Management Survey was less than expected and there were vacancies in the staff of reporters who furnished reports on agricultural conditions and crop yields.
- K.3.—The expenditure includes sums amounting to £104 recouped to the Agricultural Credit Corporation in respect of unpaid amounts due to the Corporation in connection with loans for the purchase of agricultural implements, heifers, etc. The sums in question proved irrecoverable and were written off (8.90/36/41, 8.91/1/40 and 8.90/5/54).
- K.7.—There was a saving of £221,885 on grants to farmers as the rising trend in expenditure on such grants in the previous year was not maintained, due chiefly to the prolonged spells of bad weather which hampered reclamation work. Variations on other items of the subhead reduced the saving to £213,461.
- K.9.—Demands for vaccines for the treatment of cattle against contagious abortion and other diseases did not reach expectations. Advertising was less extensive than anticipated.
- K.10.—The main saving was on salaries due to a vacancy. Less laboratory equipment was purchased than provided for and there were no purchases of semen.
- K.K.!1.—The rates of guarantee payments on exports of cattle and carcase beef during the period December, 1961, to March, 1962, were very much lower than anticipated when the supplementary estimate was being framed. The number of animals exported during the same period was slightly lower than estimated.
- K.12.—A greater number of grants than expected matured for payment in the year.
- K.13.—Some of the projects on which the estimate was based were not completed as expected by the factories concerned before the end of the financial year.
- K.14.—Pig deliveries to bacon factories continued at a high rate and unduly low prices persisted on the British bacon market despite an expected improvement when the supplementary estimate was being prepared.
- I..2.—The number of animals reported under the Bovine Tuberculosis Order of 1926 is declining because of the extension of the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme.
- L.3.—A fee-paid veterinary surgeon had to be employed to carry out inspections under the Act due to a shortage of departmental veterinary staff.
- M.1.—Savings on salaries and on the expenses of the Central Egg Store were due to staff vacancies. Casual labour at ports was not required to the extent anticipated.
- M.5.—Tests carried out abroad to ascertain the maximum extent to which wheat of the 1960 crop could be used for flour milling cost £2,825 and was the main cause of an excess of £2,887 on incidental expenses. Variations on other items of the subhead made the net excess £2,337.
- M.6.—The loan, for which this provision was made, was not issued as the prospective borrower withdrew his application.
- M.7.—There was a decrease of approximately 1,000 in the number of allotments. There were also savings on travelling and incidental expenses.
 The expenditure includes £33 paid on behalf of an association for requisites not used in accordance with the terms of the allotments scheme (S.90/51/31).
- O.—It was not possible to develop the Grant Counterpart Technical Assistance programme to the extent envisaged due mainly to difficulties in releasing staff.

- 1. There was a big demand for foundation seed wheat and cats and greater quantities of seed were sold than expected.
- Sales of vaccines and tuberculin were smaller than expected but there were increased receipts from sales of live stock.
- 3. Mere been pigs were available for sale than anticipated when the estimate was being prepared and the grading of the careases was somewhat higher than expected.
- 4. The increased receipts were mainly from sales of poultry at Ballyhaise and Clonakilty Agricultural Stations and the Munster Institute and from sales of live stock and farm produce at Clonakilty Agricultural Station.
- 5. Fewer litters of pigs were available for sale from the field station at Chantilly and clinique receipts were much lower than anticipated. There were no receipts in respect of students' fees.
- 6. More dairy bulls than expected were sold for slaughter and receipts from registration fees for dairy cattle were greater than anticipated.
- 8. Production of turkey poults at Athenry was reduced due to incubation, etc., difficulties and a number of growing birds which would normally have been sold were retained for breeding purposes.
- 9. The number of bulls located in congested districts was less than expected and the deposit for bulls of the Aberdeen Angus breed was reduced during the year. In view of the introduction of the Gaeltacht Grassland Improvement Scheme there were fewer demonstration plots with a corresponding reduction in receipts.
 - 10. There was only a very limited demand for fencing.
- 11. Refund was made by the Co. Cavan Committee of Agriculture covering a period of 15 menths as compared with the 12 months estimated for.
- 15. The receipts were in respect of the sale of a consignment of Irish turkeys exhibited at a show in London.
- 16. Two officers were seconded to outside bodies subsequent to the preparation of the estimate. Increases in Civil Service remuneration during the year also contributed to the surplus,

- 18. The society were unable to meet the principal portion (£992) of their repayment to the Department. Payment was deferred with the sanction of the Minister for Finance (F.55/6/51). The interest portion (£417) was paid after the close of the year.
- 19. Recoupment is in respect of Subheads I.4, K.12 and O. Expenditure on Subheads I.4 and O fell short of expectations but there was an excess on Subhead K.12.
- 20. The demand for vaccine for the treatment of cattle against contagious abortion was less than anticipated.
- 21. It was expected that the artificial insemination service in the Ballyhaise area would be taken over by the North-Eastern Cattle Breeding Society as from 1st December, 1961, and receipts were estimated on this basis. The service was however taken over by the Society as from 1st June, 1961.
- 22. 58,980 reactors were sold as compared with the 56,300 on which the supplementary estimate was based. The average price was approximately £30 a head.
 - 23. There was an unexpected increase in applications for stallion licences.
- 26. The receipts include approximately £3,700 in respect of production fees due but not collected in 1960-61. The remainder of the surplus is the result of increased butter production in 1961.
- 28. (a) (1) and (2) Trade conditions resulted in the number of animals presented for examination under the Fresh Meat and Pigs and Bacon Acts being greater than expected.
- (b) It was not possible to collect all the fees due before the end of the financial year.
- 30. A loan of £40,000 provided for under Subhead M.6 was not issued. Repayment instalments on this loan were taken into account when the estimate was being prepared.
 - 35. Miscellaneous receipts are variable and a close estimate is not possible.

EXTEA REMUNERATION (exceeding £50)

A Principal Officer and a Higher Executive Officer received allowances of £327 and £151 respectively from the funds of the Dairy Disposal Company, Limited, for acting as director/chairman and secretary of the company during the year.

A Senior Inspector received an allowance of £218 from An Bord Bainne for services rendered to the board during part of the year.

An Assistant Secretary received an allowance of £250 during the year for acting as a member of the board of Córas Tráchtála.

A Deputy Director of Veterinary Services and a Principal Officer received allowances of £260 and £202 respectively from the Pigs and Bacon Commission for acting as chairman and ordinary member of the Commission during the year.

A Senior Inspector received £675 from the funds or An Foras Talúntais in respect of the difference between his salary as director of An Foras and his salary as Senior Inspector.

A Veterinary Inspector on loan to the Dairy Disposal Company, Limited, for wholetime duty at one of the cattle artificial insemination stations of the company received an allowance of £71 from the funds of the company.

A Veterinary Inspector on loan for part of the year to the Dublin District Milk Board for whole-time duty at the Board's cattle artificial insemination station received an allowance of £70 from the funds of the Board.

A Higher Executive Officer received an allowance of £250 from the funds of Bord na gCon for acting as chief officer of the board during the year.

An Assistant Principal Officer received a gratuity of £100 from the Marketing of Agricultural Produce Account for acting as secretary to the Advisory Committee on the Marketing of Agricultural Produce during the period 13th December, 1957, to 30th September, 1959,

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Eight officers received sums varying from £65 to £170 in respect of Army Reserve pay.

Eighty-seven officers of the Department's Veterinary staff received gratuities of £150 each in respect of additional work performed by them during the year ended 13th January, 1962. Three members and three former members of the Veterinary staff received gratuities ranging from £60 to £138 in respect of varying periods during the year concerned.

In addition a Superintending Veterinary Inspector received a gratuity of £150 for higher supervisory and co-ordinating duties in the Clearence Area of the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme during the year.

An Agricultural Officer in charge of the Gaeltacht Glasshouse Scheme in the Connemara area received a gratuity of £60 for extra attendance given during the year ended 30th November, 1960.

A Works Foreman (Land Project) received £130 from Vote 46 for special services.

One hundred and seventy-six employees received sums varying from £51 to £330 in respect of overtime, Sunday duty, etc.

NOTES

This Account includes expenditure of approximately £1,870 in respect of the remuneration of officers temporarily on loan, without repayment, to other Departments.

Fencing posts, to the estimated value of £108, were supplied to this Department, without repayment, by the Department of Lands (Forestry Division) (8.90/2/56).

The Account includes the following ex-gratia payments:-

- £10 and £6 to two members of the Veterinary staff in respect of medical expenses incurred as a result of accidents sustained while on duty. Subhead B (E.109/3/43).

- £292 in respect of the cost of replacing by bridges three culverts constructed by applicants under the Land Project in the course of reclamation work. The culverts were extensively damaged by floods following heavy rain. Subhead K.7 (8.90/10/57).

Subhead L.1 of this Account includes £203 paid to the Dublin Corporation in recoupment of half the cost of precautionary measures taken by that body, at the Cattle Market, against foot and mouth disease in the period 1st April, to 13th May, 1961 (D, 306/14/61).

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT A.—Excess due to increases in remuneration.

B.—A saving of about £8,000 on travelling expenses was offset by an increase of over £3,000 on incidental expenses.

- F.2.—The purchase of certain items of equipment was deferred pending the re-organisation of the Institute consequent on the coming into operation of the Industrial Research and Standards Act, 1961.
- G.—The excess was due mainly to the payment of a contribution of £5,350 to the Endowment Fund of the International Institute for Labour Studies which had not been anticipated when the estimate was prepared.
- H.2.—Proposals for the development of major tourist resorts did not progress as rapidly as anticipated.
- I.2.—The scheme for the purpose of which the Grant-in-Aid was provided was abandoned during the year.
- K.1.—This provision is conjectural. The number of projects reaching the stage where grants become payable was less then expected.
- N.—There was a saving of £31,000 on coal exploration schemes (provision £85,000), which did not progress as rapidly as expected, and a further saving of £32,000 on other mineral projects (provision £41,000), expenditure on which did not mature for payment within the year. The number of industrial consultancy schemes (provision £74,000) which were completed and matured for payment within the year fell short of expectations and resulted in a saving of £38,000.
- O.—The employment of technical advisers from the European Productivity Agency was deferred.
- P.—Expenditure was in respect of travelling and incidental expenses for (a) the Committee on Industrial, Provident and Friendly Societies (£66), (b) the Nitrogenous Fertiliser Factory Committee (£48), (c) the Committee on Industrial Organisation (£19) and (d) the Electricity Supply Board Commission of Inquiry (£53).

Additional expenditure of £3,859 was incurred on this service in respect of the remuneration of the Department's staff engaged on the work of these committees and was borne on Subhead A. (a) £316 (b) £495 (c) £2,789 and (d) £259.

The Committee on Industrial, Provident and Friendly Societies was appointed in 1957–58; the Nitrogeneus Fertiliser Factory Committee in 1960–61; and the Committee on Industrial Organisation and the Electricity Supply Board Commission of Inquiry in 1961–62. The total expenditure to 31st March, 1962, was (a) £2,230; (b) £1,996; (c) £2,808 and (d) £312.

- Q.—Claims in respect of the re-decoration of the Trade Pavilion at Frankfurt, for which £660 had been provided in 1960–61, were not received until 1961–62.
- R.R.1.—The saving was due to the fact that provision made for the purchase of certain materials was not, in fact, utilised and the preliminary expenses of the Company prior to 31st March, 1962, were less than had been anticipated.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- A.—The excess is due to increases in remuneration offset to some extent by savings on unfilled vacancies.
- C.—Certain items of equipment for the Meteorological Service for which provision had been made were not delivered and claims for material purchased were not received in time for payment in 1961–62.
- D.2.—The redundancy compensation payments arising within the year were less than had been anticipated.
- E.—Work at one harbour proceeded more slowly than was anticipated resulting h a saving of £59,000. Claims in respect of works at another harbour for which a provision of £23,000 had been made did not mature for payment within the year.

- F.1.—Claims for compensation in respect of land acquired at Dublin Airport provided for in 1960-61 did not mature for payment until 1961-62 owing to legal difficulties. There was a corresponding saving on the year 1960-61.
- F.2.— The provision included £130,000 in respect of works which it was not found possible to undertake in 1961-62. Other works did not progress as rapidly as was anticipated resulting in further savings of £150,000. These savings were offset by expenditure of £20,000 in excess of the provisions for other works. The variations arose as the result of the precedence necessarily given to the completion of Cork Airport.
- F.3.—The provision included £123,000 in respect of works which could not be undertaken in 1961–62. There were savings of £120,000 on works which did not progress as rapidly as was anticipated. These savings were offset by expenditure of £63,000 on certain works in excess of the provisions and £113,000 on works of an urgent nature mainly in connection with passenger handling facilities which were not anticipated when the estimate was prepared.
- G.1.—The excess was due mainly to increases in wages which were not anticipated when the estimate was framed.
- G.4.—Grants towards industrial and trading enterprises were less than had been anticipated.
- G.5.—The airport was not in service until late in the year and consequently expenditure on maintenance and supplies was considerably less than had been anticipated.
- H.2.—The saving is due to the fact that certain ships for which provision to purchase equipment was made, were sold since the estimate was prepared.
- I.—Increases in pensions were granted subsequent to the preparation of the estimate.
- J.—The contributions towards the financing of the International Joint Support of the Danish/Icelandic Aeronautical Services and the working expenses of the International Civil Aviation Organisation were less than anticipated by £6,000 and £1,500 respectively. There was a further saving of £3,000 on the provision for travelling expenses in connection with international conferences.

- A.—The saving is due to the average strength having been below that for which provision was made.
- A.1.—Vacancies on some of the courses, for which provision was made, were not obtained.
- A.2.—The cost of attendance at shows was less than expected.
- A.3.—The amount of gratuity payable for extension of service was increased from £10 to £25 with effect from 1st November, 1961.
- I.—The saving is due mainly to the number of transfers of personnel and consequent removal of furniture being less than anticipated.

- J.—A saving of £7,005 due mainly to non-delivery of capital items was partly offset by an excess of £2,670 on maintenance. Expenditure includes the sum of £6 paid to a contractor in respect of a clerical error made when tendering (S.9/13/39).
- K.—A saving of £116,071 on the purchase of rations due to the average strength having been below that for which provision was made and to the absence of personnel on duty in the Congo was partly offset by an excess of £49,789 due to an increase in the daily rate of ration allowance with effect from the 1st July, 1961.
- L.—The saving is due to consumption of petrol and aviation spirit being lower than expected.
- M.—The saving is due to non-delivery of uniforms, etc., within the year and also to the expenditure on officers' uniform allowances having been less than provided for.
- N.—The saving is due to the number of horses purchased having been less than anticipated.
- O.—The saving is due to deliveries of stores having been less than expected. Expenditure includes the sum of £10 paid to contractors in respect of clerical errors made when tendering (8.9/13/39 and 8.9/4/52).
- P.—Expenditure includes the sum of £22 paid to a contractor in respect of a clerical error made when tendering (8.9/7/53).
- P.1.—Grants to local authorities were less than expected and some of the equipment and stores ordered were not delivered within the year. In addition, the erection of a training set was deferred and progress towards the establishment of regional headquarters was slower than anticipated.
- P.2.—A saving of £11,290 on pay of N.C.O's and seamen due to the average strength having been below that for which provision was made, and a saving of £11,445 due to non-delivery of stores were partly offset by an excess of £6,056 on pay of officers due to pay increases.
- Q.—Stores ordered were not delivered within the year.
- R.—The excess is due to increases in fuel prices and to higher consumption of fuels because of the undue severity of the weather.
- S.—The saving is due to new works not having been proceeded withto the extentanticipated and materials ordered not having been delivered within the year. Expenditure includes the sum of £142 paid to contractors in respect of clerical errors made when tendering (S.9/13/39, S.4/45/42 and S.9/4/52).
- T.—The saving is due mainly to expenditure on the maintenance of lands having been less than estimated.
- U.—It is not possible to forecast accurately the expenditure under this heading.
- V.—The saving is due to slow delivery of stores (£5,082) and to public laundry charges being less than anticipated (£3,351).
- W.—The average strength was below that for which provision was made.
- X.—The saving is due mainly to the publicity arranged in connection with recruiting not having been as extensive as anticipated.
- X.1.—Accurate estimation of expenditure under this heading is not possible.
- Y.2.—There was a saving on the provision for An Cór Breathnadóirí which is still in process of formation.
