- 6. In addition to those shown in the previous paragraph, issues of £375,000 and £35,000 were made from the Capital Fund to Gaeltarra Éireann and the National Building Agency, Ltd., respectively.
- 7. In paragraph 95 of my previous report I referred to the sale of the assets of the Industrial Engineering Company Ltd., Dundalk and to the receipt of £200,000 from receivership funds. A further sum of £25,000 was received in the year under review and is accounted for in Sundry Receipts of the Central Fund. I understand that the sale of the company's assets is not yet completed.
- 8. Pending the enactment of the Shipping Investment Grants Act, 1969 (see paragraph 81) a sum of £339,000 was advanced from the Central Fund to the Industrial Credit Company Ltd. in 1968–69 to provide temporary finance towards the cost of a vessel being built for the B. and I. Steampacket Company Ltd. The amount advanced was repaid to the Central Fund in 1969–70.
- 9. The Turf Development Act, 1968 enables the Minister for Finance, by Order, to defer the repayment of advances issued to Bord na Móna under Section 53 of the Turf Development Act, 1946 and to waive the interest due on such advances. The sum of £1,359,724 repaid to the Central Fund during the year includes £1,350,633, deferred repayments which fell due in the period April 1967 to October 1969. The interest waived for the same period amounted to £2,915,552. Repayments totalling £110,030 due to the Capital Fund which had been similarly deferred were also brought to account during the year and interest amounting to £744,062 was waived.
- 10. The proceeds of the 100 million Deutschemark Bearer Bonds Loan raised abroad in the year were placed on deposit in a German Bank from 15 September to 20 November 1969 and then converted and transferred to the Central Fund together with interest amounting to £114,542 which is accounted for in Sundry Receipts. I expressed the view that the terms of section 4 of the Appropriation Act 1965 which then governed the borrowing required that conversion into Irish currency should have been effected immediately. Section 2 of the Appropriation Act 1969 (enacted in December 1969) amended the 1965 Act with retrospective effect and enabled the Minister for Finance to effect the conversion of any borrowing forthwith, or at any time within one year, and, pending conversion, to place the sum borrowed on deposit outside the State. I have noted that a further loan of 15 million dollars was raised on the Eurobond market in March 1970. The proceeds were placed on deposit in a New York bank from 11 March to 14 April 1970 and then converted and transferred, with interest of £53,482, to the Central Fund.

11. When Irish Steel Holdings Limited was established in 1947, it was agreed with the Minister for Finance at the time that the Comptroller and Auditor General should be the auditor of the Company. This arrangement continued until the annual general meeting of November 1969 when a resolution was passed appointing, with the prior consent of the Minister for Finance, another auditor. As I was concerned with my responsibility under Article 33 of the Constitution, "to audit all accounts of moneys administered by or under the authority of the Oireachtas," I sought independent legal opinion and I have been advised that the company acted within its rights and that I have no duty to audit its accounts.

I have also sought legal opinion regarding my constitutional position in relation to certain State sponsored bodies that are not limited liability companies.

#### Vote 6.—Office of the Minister for Finance

Subhead M.—Payment to Special Regional Development Fund (Grant-in-Aid)

12. Reference was made in previous reports to payments into the above Fund from which grants or advances could be issued to assist economic projects in western counties. A further £100,000 was provided in the year and, as indicated in the account of the fund appended to the appropriation account, grants totalling £166,972 and repayable advances amounting to £150,150 were issued.

The terms and conditions of repayment are covered by agreements between the Minister and the borrowers but in one case in which an advance of £10,000 was made from the fund a receiver was appointed over the assets of the company before the agreement was executed. I have inquired as to the present position in this case.

#### Vote 7.—Office of the Revenue Commissioners

#### Revenue Account

- 13. A test examination of the Revenue Account has been carried out with satisfactory results.

#### Extra-statutory Repayments of Customs and other Duties

16. Extra-statutory repayments of Customs duties, £20,717, Excise duties, £14,651, Turnover tax, £15 and Stamp duties, £127, were made during the year.

#### Remissions and Amounts Irrecoverable

17. I have been furnished with schedules of the cases involving a loss of £50 or upwards in which claims for duty under the Revenue Acts were remitted without statutory authority or passed as irrecoverable during the year ended 31 March 1970.

## Vote 8.—Public Works and Buildings

Subhead E.—New Works, Alterations and Additions

18. The charge to the subhead comprises £1,584,494 expended on general architectural and engineering works and £3,761,809 in respect of grants towards the erection, enlargement or improvement of national schools, as compared with £1,618,256 and £3,510,154, respectively, in the previous year.

- 19. School grants amounting to £2,964,862 were paid to managers who undertook responsibility for having the works carried out and £796,947 was expended directly by the Commissioners. A school grant represents not less than two-thirds of the full cost, the balance being met by the manager from local contributions.
- 20. A contract in the sum of £296,311 placed in July 1964 for an extension to the National Gallery was virtually completed in May 1968. The final cost of the work, exclusive of professional fees, is expected to be in the region of £420,000. The increase over the contract sum, apart from normal price variations of £23,000 is mainly attributed to inadequate estimates of cost for mechanical and electrical services (estimate £87,000: expenditure £124,500), the provision of restaurant and kitchen facilities earlier excluded from the plans (£16,000), alterations to entrance hall not included in the original specification (£15,000) and other measured variations (£20,000).

I have inquired regarding the inadequate estimates in the case of the mechanical and electrical services and the circumstances in which the restaurant and entrance hall works were not included

in the specification prepared for tender purposes.

### Subhead F.1.-Maintenance and Supplies

21. A management consultant was engaged by the Commissioners in 1961 to advise on the reorganisation of the Dublin district architectural workshops which were then located in thirteen sub-districts over the city area, each being responsible for its own stores, workshop and labour pool. The consultant recommended, inter alia, the establishment of a centralised maintenance workshop and envisaged savings of the order of £26,000 per annum from improved efficiency on maintenance of buildings and from economies. Premises were acquired in 1964 at a cost of £54,000 and major adaptation works, not yet undertaken, are expected to cost £30,000. Meanwhile six of the sub-district workshops have been centralised.

I have been informed that it is not intended to centralise the remaining sub-districts in the premises referred to and that there will be a continuing need for review of the operation of the workshops in the light of experience, management development and new techniques. I was also informed that there would be a net saving of £50,000 a year as a result of the reorganisation.

22. It was noted that quantities of salvaged and scrap materials recovered from buildings in the Dublin districts had not been fully recorded nor checked since 1965. I have been informed that it had not been possible to adhere to a programme of systematic stocktaking because of staffing difficulties and that stocks on hands would be examined shortly by a board of survey with a view to holding an auction of surplus materials.

#### Subhead F.2.—Furniture, Fittings and Utensils

23. In the course of an audit at the central furniture stores it was noted that a stocktaking had not taken place since 1967 and I communicated with the Accounting Officer.

### Subhead G.2.—Arterial Drainage—Construction Works

24. The charge to the subhead in respect of major construction works in progress during the year amounted to £879,428. In addition, the value of stores issued, charges for the use of plant and certain engineers' salaries and travelling expenses in respect of these works were assessed at £367,576. The balance of the charge to the subhead is made up of sums amounting to £172,769 in respect of intermediate or minor schemes and £25,225 being remanets of expenditure on completed schemes.

## Subhead KK.—Expense of Survey of Provincial Museums, Great Gardens and Historic Houses (Grant-in-Aid)

25. Issues from the grant-in-aid provided under this subhead were made to An Taisce by whom the survey is being carried out. Further provision for this service has been made in the year 1970–71.

## Vote 12.—Superannuation and Retired Allowances

Subhead A.I.—Pensions for Widows and Children of certain Officers

## Subhead 1.—Appropriations in Aid

26. In paragraph 26 of my previous report I referred to the scheme for the payment of pensions to widows and eligible children of civil servants who died on or after 23 July 1968 including those who retired after that date, and to the arrangements for deducting contributions from pay and lump sums.

It is intended to seek legislative authority for the scheme. Payment of pensions commenced in the year under review and the charge to this vote to 31 March 1970 amounted to £31,744. Contributions to that date amounted to £414.822.

The Department of Posts and Telegraphs provides for the pensions relating to its own officers. In 1969-70, £8,038 was charged to Vote 42 in respect of widows' and orphans' pensions and total contributions received to 31 March 1970 amounted to £159,757.

#### Vote 16.—Miscellaneous Expenses

Subhead F.—The Racing Board—Grant-in-Aid for Capital Purposes

27. To assist the Racing Board in carrying out improvements at racecourses it was decided that funds would be made available to it over a number of years. The grant of £100,000 represents a first contribution to the Board towards the cost of improving amenities at Leopardstown Racecourse.

## Subhead G.—British Special Import Deposit Scheme

28. In paragraph 27 of my previous report I referred to the arrangements made to assist exporters following the introduction of the British Special Import Deposit Scheme. These arrangements continued in the year under review and the charge to the subhead in respect of interest paid to banks amounted to £1,435,101.

## Subhead J.—Northern Ireland Relief Expenditure (Grant-in-Aid)

29. During the year under review sums amounting to £89,733 were issued to the Irish Red Cross Society and sums amounting to £10,267 were issued to other persons. These payments were charged to a suspense account. In March 1970 the account was cleared when a supplementary estimate for a grant-in-aid of £100,000 was passed by Dáil Éireann.

Grants-in-aid are generally voted to specified grantees but in this instance the grantees were not named. As indicated in the Book of Estimates for the Public Services expenditure of sums issued out of this grant-in-aid was not liable to be accounted

for in detail to me.

## Vote 19.—Rates on Government Property

Subhead A.—Rates and contributions in lieu of rates, etc.

30. In paragraph 78 of my Report on the accounts for 1964-65 I referred to the delay in having property records compiled by the Department of Defence, and the Committee of Public Accounts was subsequently informed that this work was proceeding but would take some time to complete. For the purpose of calculating contributions in lieu of rates the Valuation Office depends on periodic returns being made by Departments of properties under occupation. In 1967 some doubts were expressed as to the accuracy of the Valuation Office records of Department of Defence properties and it was then agreed to check these records by reference to the property records held in that Department. In view of my earlier concern about the records available I inquired recently as to the progress of this check.

I was informed by the Valuation Office that in March 1969 the Department of Defence sought from the Military Authorities particulars which would enable it to compile property records, but that due to other commitments and the extensive nature of the work involved, these particulars have not yet been furnished.

#### Vote 26.-Local Government

#### Subhead N.-Miscellaneous Services

31. The Nelson Pillar Act, 1969 imposed a liability on the Dublin Corporation to pay to the trustees of the Pillar compensation for damage caused to the Pillar and for its subsequent removal, and also for losses and other expenses incurred. Provision was made under this subhead for recoupment to the Corporation of its outlay under the Act which amounted to £26,939.

Expenditure of £10,321 was incurred in previous years on the demolition of the Pillar and on meeting consequential claims for

compensation for damage to property in the vicinity.

32. The 1969 Congress of the International Federation for Housing and Planning was held in Dublin in May 1969. The local arrangements were made by An Foras Forbartha which was recouped expenditure of £14,806 from this subhead.

#### Motor Vehicle Duties

33. A test examination of the revenue from motor vehicle duties, etc., was carried out with satisfactory results. The reports of the Local Government auditors who examine the motor tax transactions of local authorities are made available to me.

The gross proceeds in 1969–70 amounted to £13,768,029 compared with £12,754,362 in the previous year. They include fines amounting to £323,556 collected by the Department of Justice; £9,205 in respect of fees received under the Road Traffic Act, 1961, Road Traffic (Public Service Vehicles) Regulations, 1963; £11,736 fees collected by planning authorities in respect of appliances and structures for servicing vehicles; £63,420 fees received by the Department of Local Government pursuant to the Road Traffic (Licensing of Drivers) Regulations, 1964, and £122,088 received from government departments in respect of State owned vehicles.

£13,416,121 was paid into the Exchequer and £19,506 was refunded leaving a balance of £483,398 compared with £150,996 at the end of the previous financial year.

34. In the course of audit I noticed that for the year 1967-68 the average cost of collection per transaction, varied between local authorities from £0.13 in Mayo to £0.27 in Carlow, and that the average cost in Dublin, which accounts for 35 per cent. of duty and 29 per cent. of transactions was £0.24 compared with a national average of £0.20. At my suggestion the Accounting Officer carried out an examination of the costs of collection with a view to assessing the efficiency of local taxation offices. He has recently informed me that this examination has shown that the cost relationship between counties does not vary very much from year to year but that special circumstances exist in the counties in which the cost appears to be consistently high. He has also informed me that more frequent inspections of local offices should help to improve efficiency but he does not anticipate that significant reductions in cost can be achieved. He feels however that the centralisation and computerisation of motor taxation work which has been recommended as a result of a recent study would offer the best prospect of a long term solution of this problem.

#### Education

#### Free Post-Primary Education Scheme

35. Reference was made in previous reports to the operation of the free post-primary education scheme including tuition, transport services, and free school books and accessories for necessitous pupils. The principal costs of the scheme in the year under review were as follows:—

As stated in previous reports the payments to Córas Iompair Éireann in respect of school transport services were made on a provisional basis pending the finalisation of arrangements regarding financial control and procedures with the company. These arrangements have recently been completed and it is expected that the adjustment of the provisional payments will be effected during the current financial year.

#### Vote 27.—Office of the Minister for Education

#### Subhead A.4.—Higher Education Authority

36. The charge to the subhead includes ex-gratia payments, amounting to £6,700, made to members of the Higher Education Authority in respect of services rendered in the period 1 September 1968 to 31 March 1970. The sanction of the Minister for Finance was obtained for the payments.

### Subhead C.5.—Higher Education Grants

37. The Local Authorities (Higher Education Grants) Act, 1968 authorises the making of grants by a local authority to persons ordinarily resident in its functional area to enable them to attend university colleges or other approved institutions of higher education. Section 4 of the Act provides for the refund from voted moneys to local authorities of the annual cost of such grants over and above the total amount £371,953 paid by them in the year 1967–68 by way of assistance and scholarships under the Irish Universities Act, 1908 and the Local Authorities (Education Scholarships) Acts, 1944 and 1961. The charge to the subhead £198,351 represents refunds made during the year to local authorities.

### Subhead D.4.—Physical Education

38. The charge to the subhead represents costs incurred during the year on the training in England of twenty male students as teachers of physical education, five on a specialised one year course and fifteen on a four year course. The heads of charge were:—

## Subhead H.11.—Voluntary Youth Organisations (Grants-in-Aid)

39. The original provision of £7,500 was voted as grants-in-aid for voluntary youth organisations and a further sum of £100,000 was provided by way of supplementary estimate in February 1970 being the additional sum required towards the provision of sporting and recreational facilities for young people. The charge to the subhead represents the total of grants made to fifty-eight organisations and I have inquired from the Accounting Officer whether these grants were made in accordance with regulations approved by the Minister for Finance.

## Subhead H.13.—Chester Beatty Library (Grant-in-Aid)

40. The grant-in-aid was paid to the trustees of the Library towards administration costs and the purchase and maintenance of books.

Subhead H. 14.—Irish Countrywomen's Association (Grant-in-Aid)

41. The grant-in-aid of £5,000 to the Irish Countrywomen's Association was paid towards the costs of adult education courses and the general administration and maintenance costs of the premises at An Grianán, County Louth. The association also receives a grant-in-aid towards its general expenses from the Vote for Agriculture (No. 37 subhead I.3) which amounted to £9,500 in the year under review.

Subhead H.15.—Union of Students in Ireland (Grant-in-Aid)

42. The grant-in-aid of £5,000 was paid towards the cost of reconstruction of the Union's premises in Dublin.

### Vote 28.—Primary Education

Subhead C.8.—Special Educational Project

43. The charge to the subhead represents expenditure in the year under review on a special educational project of the Department of Education in association with the Van Leer Foundation of the Netherlands. The project is aimed at offsetting the educational disadvantages of children in the Rutland Street schools area of Dublin and is being financed broadly on the basis that the Department will meet such educational expenditure as would normally fall to be met from voted moneys and one half of any abnormal expenditure, the balance being met by the Van Leer Foundation. It is expected that the project will continue for an initial period of five years at an estimated cost of £180,000. During the year under review a contribution of £15,776 was received from the Van Leer Foundation towards the expenditure on the project and credited to appropriations in aid (subhead E.3).

## Vote 29.—Secondary Education

Subhead J.1.—Secondary Schools—Annual Repayment of Building Loans

44. Reference was made in paragraph 37 of my report for 1968-69 and in previous reports to a scheme whereby secondary schools which could not meet from their own resources the cost of new buildings or major extensions could be paid annual grants not exceeding 70 per cent. of the repayment charges on loans obtained by them towards such cost. Grants totalling £298,820 were made during the year in respect of twenty schools. In addition a sum of £72,350 was paid to the Dublin Vocational Education Committee being 70 per cent. of the cost of pre-fabricated classroom units to be made available to secondary schools.

### Subhead J. 2.—Secondary Schools—Building Grants

45. I referred also in previous reports to the extended scheme introduced to enable the Department of Education to make funds available for building or extending secondary schools on the basis of 70 per cent. free grants and 30 per cent. loans repayable over fifteen years. The charge of £2,763,991 to the subhead comprises £2,264,029 in grants and £499,962 in loans. Repayments of loans under the scheme amounting to £20,124 were received during the year and credited to appropriations in aid (subhead M.4).

## Subhead K.1.—Comprehensive Schools—Running Costs Subhead K.2.—Comprehensive Schools—Capital Costs

46. I referred in previous reports to the erection of comprehensive schools at Cootehill, Carraroe, Shannon Airport, Glenties, Raphoe and Ballymun. The schools at Cootehill, Carraroe, Shannon Airport and Glenties were in operation during the year under review and the charge to subhead K.1 represents their running costs including the salaries of the teaching staffs. Expenditure on the building of the six schools including site costs is charged to subhead K.2 and totalled £1,206,346 at 31 March 1970 including £155,745 for professional fees. Expenditure on furniture and equipment totalled £49,349 at that date. During the year site costs of £23,354 were incurred in connection with a comprehensive school to be built in Limerick.

#### Vote 30.—Vocational Education

Subhead I.1.—Regional Technical Colleges—Running Costs
Subhead I.2.—Regional Technical Colleges—Capital Costs

47. Reference was made in previous reports to the building of Regional Technical Colleges at eight centres—Athlone, Carlow, Cork, Dundalk, Galway, Letterkenny, Sligo and Waterford. The colleges at Athlone, Carlow, Dundalk, Sligo and Waterford were in partial operation during the year under review.

The research project which is being carried out by a London consultancy group at an estimated cost of £58,000 was originally designed to cover manpower forecasting in relation to scientific and technical personnel and was later extended to include the forecasting of the supply of and the demand for university

graduates.

Reference was also made in previous reports to the appointment of a consortium of architects, engineers and quantity surveyors at a specially negotiated fee to provide for five of the colleges the services normally rendered by these professions. With the sanction of the Minister for Finance the fee payable to the consortium has been increased from 9 per cent. to 11 per cent. The capital expenditure on the Regional Technical Colleges to 31 March 1970 was as follows:—

49. The charge to the subhead includes a payment of £40,250 towards the purchase price (£70,000) of a site for the Institute at Limerick. The payable order in favour of the vendor's solicitor was

retained on behalf of the Department by the Chief State Solicitor pending clearance of title which was not effected by 31 March 1970. As the subhead was charged before the liability for payment had matured I have deemed it desirable to draw attention to the departure from regular procedure.

## Vote 35.—Forestry

## Subhead G.—John Fitzgerald Kennedy Memorial Park

51. Expenditure of £33,000 during the year brings to £297,000 the total capital expenditure incurred at 31 March 1970 in establishing the John Fitzgerald Kennedy Memorial Park. Receipt of a further sum of £19,000 from Irish organisations in the United States brings to £56,000 the total amount of voluntary contributions received towards the cost of the project.

#### Vote 36.—Roinn na Gaeltachta

#### Subhead E.—Scéimeanna Feabhsúcháin sa Ghaeltacht

52. The charge to this subhead includes a grant of £15,400 based on two-thirds of the cost of an air strip at Inis Mór in the Aran Islands. The grant was paid to a company which intends to operate an air taxi service between the mainland and the island.

#### Vote 37.—Agriculture

### Subhead C.4.—World Food Programme (Grant-in-Aid)

53. Including the £200,000 grant in the year under review £1,100,000 has been made available for the World Food Programme. From these moneys a total of £1,086,103 has been paid to 31 March 1970, comprising £302,661 in cash and £783,442 for food supplied. An account of receipts and payments in the year is appended to the appropriation account.

#### Subhead D.9.—Additional Grants to University Colleges

54. The charge to the subhead includes a payment of £48,000 to University College, Dublin towards capital works arising out of the purchase and development of lands and premises at Celbridge, Co. Kildare for the Faculty of General Agriculture.

## Subhead H.—Small Farm (Incentive Bonus) Scheme

55. This new scheme aims at encouraging farmers with small holdings to improve the level of farm income by planned development. It provides annual incentive bonuses over a period of four years of £50, £75, £75, and £100, successively, to farmers who achieve approved stages of development leading to a specified final target of production. The scheme is operated by the County Committees of Agriculture on behalf of the Department.

#### Subhead K.3.—Payments to the Agricultural Credit Corporation, Limited, in respect of loans

56. It was decided to revive the scheme of loans for the provision of additional drying and storage facilities for grain in accordance with the provisions of the Grain Storage (Loans) Act, 1951. The new loans are administered by the Agricultural Credit Corporation, Limited, and advances from the subhead for this purpose amounted to £439,455 including a sum of £130,000 for anticipated loans which were in course of negotiation at 31 March 1970. In reply to my inquiry I have been recently informed that, of the £130,000—£32,200 had been lent, £15,350 refunded to the Department and £82,450 held for loans which were in the process of finalisation by the Corporation. Difficulties in regard to title, etc., have been responsible for much of the delay.

Loans under the Grain Storage (Loans) Act, 1951 issued in the years 1954-55 to 1958-59, inclusive, amounted to £596,200.

## Subhead K.9.—Land Project

57. The payments made in the year under this head are as follows:—

An occupier of land who undertakes an approved scheme of reclamation work on his holding is entitled, when the work has been completed to the satisfaction of the Department, to a grant amounting to two-thirds (in Gaeltacht and certain pilot development areas three-quarters) of the estimated cost subject to a maximum of £50 per statute acre in western and north western counties and £45 per acre elsewhere. Grants to farmers amounted to £2,877,828 in the year as compared with £2,609,963 in the previous year.

#### Subhead K.10.—Lime and Fertilisers Subsidies

58. The expenditure under this subhead is made up as follows:—

Receipts amounting to £1,834,639 were credited to appropriations in aid in the year on account of the sale of cattle slaughtered under the scheme.

The gross cost of the scheme from its inception in September 1954 to 31 March 1970 was £69,080,668 and receipts from the disposal of cattle for slaughter were £22,255,013. The net cost was, therefore, £46,825,655.

Receipts amounting to £83,667 were credited to appropriations in aid in the year on account of the sale of cattle slaughtered under the scheme.

The gross cost of the scheme from its introduction in 1964–65 to 31 March 1970 was £1,665,241 and receipts from the disposal of cattle for slaughter were £371,377. The net cost was, therefore, £1,293,864.

## Subhead K.16.—Scheme of Grants for Calved Heifers

61. The total cost of the scheme from its introduction on 1 January 1964 to 31 March 1970 was £11,346,148 comprising £10,795,185 grants for 719,679 calved heifers and £550,963 for travelling and incidental expenses. The scheme was discontinued as from 30 June 1969, but remanets of expenditure will fall to be made in 1970–71.

## Subhead K.20.—Payments to Pigs and Bacon Commission

62. The payments of £3,600,000 to the Pigs and Bacon Commission are accounted for in the accounts of the Commission which are audited by me.

## Subhead K.21.—Losses on Disposal of Wheat, etc.

63. The total loss incurred by An Bord Gráin on the disposal as animal feed of approximately 90,000 tons of wheat of the 1968 crop which was surplus to milling requirements has not yet been determined. Payments on account of the loss on this grain amounted to £1,400,000 including £500,000 paid in the year under review.

## Subhead K.22.—Beef, Mutton and Lamb Export Guarantee Schemes

64. The cost of supporting export prices of beef, mutton and lamb amounted to £2,051,498 in the year under review.

Under the terms of the Anglo-Irish Free Trade Agreement the provisions of the United Kingdom fatstock guarantee payments scheme are applied annually to limited quantities of Irish carcase beef, mutton and lamb imported into the United Kingdom. In accordance with this agreement sums totalling £1,050,000 were received from the United Kingdom Government during the year, being £150,000 as a further payment on account for 1968–69 and £900,000 on account for 1969–70.

## Subhead K.23.—Córas Beostoic agus Feola—Contribution towards expenses

65. In paragraph 46 of my previous report I referred to Córas Beostoic agus Feola, Teoranta whose primary object is to undertake promotional work for the development of exports of livestock, carcase meat and meat products. A sum of £115,000 was contributed in the year towards its expenses. The accounts of the company will be audited by me.

### Subhead K.28.—Marketing of Oats

66. Paragraph 59 of my previous report referred to the scheme to encourage the production in certain western counties of good feeding quality oats. The total loss incurred by An Bord Gráin on the disposal of 2,700 tons of the 1968 crop acquired by An Bord amounted to £20,395 towards which it received £15,000 in the year 1968–69 and £5,395 in the year under review. The balance of the charge to the subhead, £8,000, was paid to An Bord towards the estimated loss on resale of 2,300 tons of the 1969 oat crop.

## Subhead K.29.—Beef Cattle Incentive Scheme

67. The expenditure from this subhead is made up as follows:—

The scheme was introduced in February 1969 to encourage an expansion in the output of good quality beef cattle. A grant of £12 is paid for each qualifying cow-calf unit to owners of approved breeding herds who are not engaged in commercial milk production.

The creamery milk price allowance continued until the 31 August 1969 at a rate of 7d. per gallon supplemented by an additional allowance of 1d. per gallon on suppliers' deliveries up to a limit of 7,000 gallons per year. A retrospective increase of 1d. per gallon was granted in respect of deliveries of up to 1,000 gallons per supplier for each of the months May to August 1969. From 1 September 1969 creamery milk price allowances at rates on a tier or differential scale were introduced. The additional allowance of 1d. per gallon was also increased to 2d. per gallon and will accrue for payment as a lump sum at the close of the milk year ending 31 August 1970.

The special allowance for high quality creamery milk continued at a rate of 2d. per gallon. I understand that 70 per cent. of the milk

supplied to creameries qualified for this allowance.

#### Vote 39.—Labour

Subhead M.—Grants towards the provision of information and advice for intending emigrants

69. This subhead was introduced to enable the Minister for Labour to provide financial assistance to voluntary emigration bureaux within the State and a committee was set up to advise, inter alia, on the allocation of grants. The committee recommended token grants only in the year under review.

## Vote 40.—Industry and Commerce

Subhead H.—Córas Tráchtála (Grant-in-Aid)

70. The total amount of grants which may be made to Córas Tráchtála was raised to £9,000,000 by the Export Promotion (Amendment) Act, 1969. The aggregate amount of grants issued to 31 March 1970 was £6,031,885 including £1,384,000 in the year under review.

#### Subhead J.—An Foras Tionscal (Grant-in-Aid)

71. The total amount of grants which may be made to An Foras Tionscal to enable it to carry out its functions was increased to £100,000,000 by the Industrial Development Act, 1969. The aggregate amount issued to 31 March 1970 was £51,725,446 of which expenditure of £3,412,240 was incurred on the establishment and management of industrial estates at Galway and Waterford.

#### Shannon Free Airport Development Company Limited

- 72. Grants to the company for its general purposes, and for industrialists, are limited to £6,000,000. The total of such grants amounted at 31 March 1970 to £4,493,500.
- 73. £77,073 was paid to the company to subsidise the letting of houses at reduced rents and £46,475 as grants for new houses, equivalent to the grants normally payable under the Housing Acts.
- 74. The accounts of the company show a balance of cash on hand of over £400,000 at 31 March 1970. In view of the necessity to ensure economy of cash balances I have inquired regarding the control exercised over the issue of moneys to the company.

#### Subhead N.2.—National Productivity Year (Grant-in-Aid)

75. As stated in paragraph 66 of my previous report a grant of £28,000 towards promotional costs was paid to the Irish National Productivity Committee which was involved in running the National Productivity Year project. A further grant of £64,000 was paid in the year under review. The expenditure will be audited by me.

## Subhead P.1.—Shipbuilding Subsidy

76. Subsidy payments to Verolme Cork Dockyard Co. Ltd. have been referred to in previous reports. The charge of £70,000 to the subhead is a payment on account in respect of the sixth, seventh and eighth ships. In addition to the shipbuilding subsidy the company has received from an Foras Tionscal £676,062 in grants under Industrial Grants legislation.

Shares in the company amounting to £343,000 and debenture loans amounting to £1,897,614 were held by Taiscí Stáit at

31 March 1970.

## Subhead P.2.—Interest Subsidy to Shipping Finance Corporation

77. The Shipping Finance Corporation, incorporated in 1961 as a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Industrial Credit Company, has been providing loan finance on a commercial basis to shipowners.

In 1966 the Government decided that the Corporation could make loans to foreign shipowners at a preferential rate of interest to encourage them to have their ships built in Irish yards and this concession was extended in 1967 to Irish shipowners. To compensate the Corporation for loss of income, a subsidy equal to the difference between the interest paid on its borrowings and the interest received on these preferential loans plus a margin of 1 per cent. to cover out of pocket expenses and to allow a reasonable reserve to be built up was also approved.

The charge to the subhead, £81,219, represents subsidy pay-

ments up to 31 March 1969 in respect of loans for two ships.

#### Vote 41.—Transport and Power

Subhead D.2.—Córas Iompair Éireann Redundancy Compensation

78. Section 15 of the Transport Act, 1958, authorises the payment of grants from voted moneys to Córas Iompair Éireann to meet the cost of compensation paid to employees, including those of the former Great Northern Railway Board, whose services were dispensed with or conditions worsened in the period from 16 July 1958 to 31 March 1964. Including £341,149 charged to this subhead, grants issued amounted to £4,224,147 at 31 March 1970. Grants are supported by auditors' certificates of the amounts expended on compensation.

Subhead F.1.—Grants under Section 2 of the Tourist Traffic Act, 1961 (Grants-in-Aid)

Payments towards the cost of the new terminal buildings at Dublin and Shannon amounted to £886,218 and £713,192 respectively. The detailed specification for the Dublin contract includes a sum of £22,437 for demolition of existing structures to be carried out in the course of the contract.

### Subhead S.—Investment Grants for Ships

81. The Minister for Transport and Power was empowered by the Shipping Investment Grants Act, 1969, to make grants to Irish shipowners towards capital expenditure incurred by them in acquiring, for the purpose of their business, a new ship or a new part for a ship or in converting a ship. The rate of grant shall not exceed 25 per cent. of approved capital expenditure and is subject to the review of the Minister for Finance. Grant payments in respect of nine ships were made in the year under review and amounted to £2,249,917.

## Vote 42.—Posts and Telegraphs

## Subhead L.—Commissions and Special Inquiries

82. The charge to the subhead (£3,715) is for expenses incurred in the year arising out of the judicial tribunal set up to inquire into the R.T.E. programme on moneylending.

#### Stores

83. A test examination of the store accounts was carried out with satisfactory results.

In addition to the engineering stores shown in Appendix II as valued at £3,057,907 on 31 March 1970 engineering stores to the value of £47,884 were held on behalf of other government departments. Stores other than engineering stores were valued at £425,446 including £78,265 in respect of stores held for other

government departments.

Including works in progress on 31 March 1970, the expenditure on manufacturing jobs in the factory during the year amounted to £60,693, expenditure on repair work (other than repairs to mechanical transport) to £146,178 and expenditure on mechanical transport repairs to £24,415.

#### Revenue

84. A test examination of the accounts of postal, telegraph and telephone services was carried out with generally satisfactory results.

£27,350,000 was paid into the Exchequer during the year leaving a balance of £814,710 at 31 March 1970 as compared with £582,593 at the end of the previous financial year.

Sums amounting to £6,552 due for telephone services provided in previous years were written off during the year as irrecoverable.

The increase in telephone service revenue is due to increased charges (£2 million) which were introduced on 1 January 1969, the receipt of a shortfall (£1·1 million) from the year 1968–69 due to delay in issuing accounts in the last quarter of that year consequent on the increases, and the buoyancy of business (£1·6 million).

## Post Office Savings Bank

85. The accounts of the Post Office Savings Bank for the year ended 31 December 1969 were submitted to a test examination with satisfactory results. The balance due to depositors, inclusive of interest, amounted to £147,761,301 (including £26,933,766 in respect of liability to Trustee Savings Banks) on 31 December 1969 as compared with £140,802,036 at the close of the previous year. Interest accrued during the year on securities standing to the credit of the Post Office Savings Bank Fund amounted to £10,515,621. Of this sum £5,865,280 was applied as interest paid and credited to depositors, management expenses absorbed £482,867 and the balance, £4,167,474 remained as a provision against depreciation in the value of securities.

#### Suspense Accounts

86. Suspense Accounts are normally used for recording payments or receipts which will later be recovered or paid out and will not become charges or credits to an appropriation account. It is also the practice to put temporarily to a suspense account items which need further investigation before a final allocation can be made. Departmental instructions provide for frequent review of these accounts to ensure prompt clearance.

In the course of audit it was noted that the clearance of certain suspense accounts was unsatisfactory. I have been furnished with explanations in relation to some accounts and the Accounting Officer states that a recent staff reorganisation should improve the position.

#### Vote 43.—Defence

#### Subhead K.—Provisions

87. Statements have been furnished to me showing the cost of production of bread at the Curragh bakery and of meat at the Dublin and Curragh abattoirs. The unit costs are as follows:—

The average price of cattle purchased for the Dublin and Curragh areas was £105 and £106 per head, respectively, as compared with £99 per head in the previous year, while the average production of beef per head was 684 lbs. and 660 lbs., respectively, as compared with 676 lbs. and 655 lbs.

## Subhead O.2.—Helicopters

88. It was noted in the course of audit that two helicopter rotor blades had been repaired during the year at a cost of £975. Earlier three other blades found unserviceable had been replaced at a cost of £3,400. It appeared that the need for replacing or repairing these blades was caused by corrosion of the spars due to moisture penetration, and that this had been discovered at a stage when the blades had been in service for less than three-fourths of their then current flying life of 1,200 hours. Since these defects were dis-

covered the supplier's instruction manual has been amended to include a process to improve sealing against damage by moisture. I am in communication with the Accounting Officer and I have inquired whether any warranty was given by the supplier when the blades were purchased.

### Subhead X.—Travelling and Incidental Expenses

89. Following consideration of a recommendation by the Commission on Higher Education that the training of military cadets should be associated with university studies it was decided that suitably qualified members of the cadet class appointed in 1968 should be given an opportunity of pursuing studies at University College, Galway. A total of fourteen cadets commenced courses in Arts, Commerce, Science and Engineering in October 1969. The charge to this subhead includes expenditure amounting to £1,028 on college, registration and examination fees and text books.

### Subhead AA.—Military Educational Courses and Visits

90. A scheme was introduced for the attendance of men of the Permanent Defence Force at courses of one year's duration at vocational schools with a view to their obtaining the Day Group Certificate. In September 1969, one hundred and fifty-two men commenced courses in eight schools, ninety-seven taking the full day course and fifty-five a shorter night course. The cost, consisting of tuition fees and text books, amounted to £618.

## Vote 46.—International Co-operation

## Subhead C.3.—Contribution to the United Nations Children's Fund

92. Special contributions amounting to £45,433 which were paid out of this subhead to UNICEF to assist in relief work in Nigeria included £25,000 towards the cost of chartering a relief ship.

## Vote 47.—Social Welfare

Subhead E.—Payment to the Social Insurance Fund under section 39 (9) of the Social Welfare Act, 1952

93. Payments from this subhead to the Social Insurance Fund in the year under review amounted to £15,562,000. These payments are subject to adjustment when the audited accounts of the Fund are available.

Overpayments of Social Assistance and Social Insurance benefits 94. Sums recovered in respect of overpayments of social assistance charged in prior years' accounts were: £21,498 in cash credited to appropriations in aid and £22,538 withheld from current entitlements. Overpayments amounting to £17,912 were treated as irrecoverable. Assistanca overpayments not disposed of at 31 March 1970 amounted to £85,358 as compared with £77,616 at 31 March 1969. Overpayments of benefits from the Social Insurance Fund outstanding at 31 March 1970 were of the order of £81,000. Sums recovered during the year amounted to £20,458. Sixty-two individuals were prosecuted during the year for irregularly obtaining or attempting to obtain assistance or benefits. Convictions were secured in fifty-nine cases.

## Vote 48.—Health

## Subhead G.—Grants to Health Authorities

95. As stated in paragraph 92 of my previous report the supplementary grants payable to health authorities were increased in 1968-69 to provide an average overall recoupment for that year of about 55.7 per cent. of net health expenditure. In the year under review provision was made for grants to achieve a similar overall recoupment.

The charge to the subhead also includes payments to recoup health authorities their expenditure under a scheme for the supply of drugs, etc., free of charge to persons suffering from diabetes who are not covered under the general medical services scheme.

## Vote 50.—Increases in Pensions and Ex-Gratia Pensions for Widows and Children

96. In paragraph 26 of this report reference is made to a contributory pension scheme for widows and children of certain public servants who died on or after 23 July 1968. As from 1 October 1969 ex-gratia pensions became payable to the widows and orphans of public servants who died or retired prior to 23 July 1968. Ex-gratia payments in the year under review from this Vote amounted to £80,619, and further sums amounting to £25,437 were paid from Vote 42—Posts and Telegraphs. It is intended to seek legislative authority for these pensions.

## EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- A.3.—Expenditure on telephones was greater than anticipated.
- A.4.—Fees paid to members of the Authority were less than expected and there was also a saving on other miscellaneous items.
- B.3.—The excess is due to increase in costs after preparation of the estimate.
- B.5.—Expenditure on publications and audio-visual aids was greater than anticipated.
- B.6.—The number of applications for assistance was less than anticipated.
- C.1.—The provision for scholarships was not fully utilised and claims by County Councils for recoupment of expenditure on scholarships was less than expected.
- C.2.—The saving is due mainly to the fact that some students did not continue for a full year. There was also a fall in the number of applications for renewal of grants.
- C.3.—Two scholarships were not availed of and expenditure on some others was less than anticipated.
- C.4.—Two fellowships were not accepted and there was a fall in the number of renewals.
- C.5.—Most local authorities did not pay the final instalment of the grant for the academic year 1968-69 until after 31st March, 1969, which resulted in a reduction of the amount to be recouped to them in the financial year 1969-70.
- D.1.—Claims for grants in respect of the publication of books were less than anticipated.
- D.2.—A number of colleges did not qualify for the full grant and a few colleges did not conduct approved courses.
- E.3.—Fees and expenses paid were less than expected.
- F.2.—Expenditure on fittings and materials which is difficult to estimate accurately was less than anticipated.
- G.2.—The provision for scholarships was not fully utilised.
- H.3.—Work on the dictionary of Old Irish did not progress as rapidly as expected and proposals for the initiation of an exchange of scientific personnel did not materialise in 1969-70.

### EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- B.1.—Subsistence and motor mileage rates were increased during the year resulting in an excess on the provision for travelling, etc., expenses. It is difficult to estimate accurately for publications and miscellaneous expenses and the sum provided proved inadequate.
- B.2.—The excess was mainly on telephones due to increased traffic, increased rental and call charges and the provision of an additional switchboard and telephonist at the central offices.
- C.1.—The main saving was on the cereal station because of the postponement of the construction of new buildings at the station and because a provision for machinery and stock was not needed as the negotiations for the take over of extra land were not completed. Further savings arose on the cereal seed certification schemes as contracts were placed for a smaller acreage than expected due to the carry-over from the previous year of a substantial quantity of seed. These savings and a saving on the provision for the grass seed certification scheme which arose because accounts for seals, labels, etc., were not received before the end of the financial year, were partly offset by an excess on salaries due to the employment of more seasonal staff than expected.
- C.2.—A saving on the provision for salaries due to staff vacancies was partly offset by excess expenditure on other items of the subhead.
- C.3.—Savings on some items relating to the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations (because the World Food Congress arranged for 1969 was postponed, and because a provision towards maintenance of trainees from developing countries was not taken up by that Organisation) were partly offset by an increase in the annual contribution. Savings arose on the European and Mediterranean Plant Protection Organisation as the annual contribution fell to be paid at a lesser rate than expected and because a contribution towards the cost of purchasing office accommodation for the Organisation was not required. There were further savings on other items of the subhead as the cost of attendance at meetings was less than provided. The savings were partly offset by some excesses, the principal one being on the provision for the International Sugar Council due to an increase in the annual contribution.
- C.5.—This was a token provision in case an agreement was reached under which Ireland would make a contribution under the Food Aid Convention of the International Wheat Agreement. An agreement was not reached during the year so no expenditure arose.
- C.6.—Expenditure on commissions and special enquiries was less than estimated mainly because the National Codex Committee was not set up until late in the year. There was also a saving on the provision for incidental expenses.
- C.7.—Savings arose on the operating costs of the pig progeny testing stations due to a smaller throughput of pigs. The full number of recorders was not employed at the artificial insemination stations resulting in a further saving. These savings were partly offset by excesses on other items of the subhead.

### Vote 37

- D.1.—The savings arose mainly on salaries because of staff vacancies, on feeding stuffs at Ballyhaise Agricultural Station due to good hay and silage crops and less cattle to be wintered, on poultry at the Munster Institute as turkey and duck rearing units and a poultry plant, which were provided for, were not set up and on new buildings at Mellowes Agricultural College, which were not completed by the end of the year.
- D.3.—The saving was mainly on the provision for laboratory equipment for the new X-ray unit as it was found possible to pay for the bulk of the equipment towards the end of the previous financial year. Smaller savings arose on salaries, because of staff vacancies, and on fodder and feeding stuffs. The savings were partly offset by excess expenditure on miscellaneous expenses.
- D.5.—Salaries were increased during the year.
- D.6.—Maintenance allowances of students were increased during the year.
- D.9.—There was a saving on the provision for University College, Dublin as capital works did not get under way until late in the year. The saving was partly offset by an excess on the provision for University College, Cork.
- D.10.—Two more apprentices than estimated for qualified for awards under the scheme.
- E.1.—The number of bulls purchased for leasing to artificial insemination stations was much lower than provided for as the stations to a large extent made their own purchases of bulls. Fewer thoroughbred stallions for hunter breeding were bought than expected as it was difficult to acquire suitable sires. The savings that resulted and some other smaller savings were partly offset by an excess on salaries due to recruitment of extra staff.
- E.2.—Some equipment that had been provided for was not delivered by the end of the year. There was a reduced demand by ordinary poultry keepers for grants for poultry houses due to the tendency towards large scale production. Savings on these and some other items of the subhead were partly offset by excess expenditure on the Gaeltacht Pullet Chick Scheme.
- E.3.—Savings on salaries and travelling expenses due to staff vacancies.
- I.1.—There was no expenditure from the provision for Bord na gCapall as the board was not set up during the year. The saving of £20,000 was partly offset by a small excess on the provision for the Department's Educational Exhibit at the Royal Dublin Society's and Provincial Shows.
- I.7.—The only claim received from the Society was one for payment of subsidy on feeding (beet pulp) for sheep.
- K.1.—The saving was mainly on a provision to meet possible losses incurred by the Dairy Disposal Company Ltd. on the sale of milk powder stocks held over the winters of 1967–68 and 1968–69 against possible shortages of liquid milk in the Dublin area. No expenditure was incurred during 1969–70.
- K.2.—Fewer reports and returns than expected were received.
- K.5.—There was no meeting of the National Agricultural Council during the year.
- K.12.—There was an excess on salaries due to the employment of a laboratory attendant who was not provided for and to the payment of gratuities to three veterinary inspectors. In addition the provision for laboratory equipment proved inadequate.
- K.14.—The excess was due mainly to the payment of an outstanding balance of £7,800 to the Dairy Disposal Company Ltd. for grants under the scheme.
- K.15.—Due to satisfactory disease position in the counties in which the scheme was in operation the amounts paid for veterinary fees, purchase of reactors and travelling expenses were all less than had been anticipated.
- K.18.—No new applications under the scheme were received during the year. The expenditure incurred related to work done in respect of applications approved in preceding years.

- K.23.—The estimate was prepared very shortly after the setting up of the Company and it was not possible at that stage to anticipate accurately the outlay on accommodation, staffing and promotional activities.
- K.27.—The number of applications received was much less than expected. In addition most applications were in respect of the cheaper in-can cooler.
- K.28.—The quantity of oats which was offered to An Bord Gráin was less than expected. In addition, only a payment on account was made to the board in respect of the 1969 crop and final settlement yet remains to be made.
- L.1.—The excess was mainly on salaries due to a retrospective increase in overtime and Sunday and bank holiday duty rates of pay. In addition, the provision for travelling expenses proved inadequate.
- L.2.—Fewer appeals against rejection of stallions for licensing were received than expected.
- L.3.—An additional search for unlicensed bulls was carried out in the Autumn of 1969. In addition the rates of remuneration of the inspectors were increased during the year.
- M.1.—Savings, which arose mainly on salaries due to staff vacancies, were partly offset by extra expenditure on travelling caused partly by increased subsistence and motor mileage rates.
- M.2.—Due to unexpectedly prolonged negotiations of a legal nature about the purchase of a site for the proposed Dairy Science Laboratory at Limerick, work on the building of the laboratory was not commenced during the year. As a result there was a saving of £7,000 which had been provided for equipment for the laboratory. There was also a saving on salaries due to staff vacancies.
- M.3.—The purchase of an experimental farm was not made during the year.
- M.7.—Only four of the six centres provided for participated in the scheme.
- M.8.—Savings due to staff vacancies.
- M.9.—The saving arose mainly because some accounts for equipment supplied during the year were not received for payment before the 31st March, 1970.
- N.2.—In this, the first year of operation of An Chomhairle Olla, general expenses were not as heavy as anticipated. In addition there was a saving on salaries due to an unfilled vacancy.
- O.—The number of grants maturing for payment was less than expected.

A .- Saving due to unfilled vacancies.

B.1.—Subsistence and motor mileage rates were increased during the year.

C.—The two exploratory fishing vessels were laid up for long periods while undergoing repairs and overhaul and consequently the scientific programme had to be reduced. The number of boys who were selected as suitable for training as fishermen was much less than expected. No expenditure arose in connection with the new fishery school due to the fact that the planning arrangements were more protracted than anticipated. The resultant and some other smaller savings were partly offset by the additional expenditure on the repair and overhaul of the exploratory fishing vessels.

D.2.—Expenditure by An Bord Iascaigh Mhara on grants for boats was less than estimated because of the failure of foreign boat-yards to deliver on time vessels under construction. A provision for grants for private ice-plants was very little utilised and the actual cost of an ice-plant erected by An Bord was less than expected.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- A.—Saving arose because salary claims on behalf of a number of grades were not finalised during the financial year. In addition to the expenditure shown, a further sum of £80,100 was charged to the Vote for Remuneration (No. 51).
- B.1.—Excess due to unanticipated increases in incidental expenses (£6,000) partly offset by a saving on travelling. Incidental expenses are variable and accurate estimation is not possible.
- B.2.—Saving due to delays in providing certain cross-channel lines and other circuits for which provision had been made while some accounts did not mature for payment as expected.
- C.—For technical reasons no action was taken during the year on the proposal to instal weather radar at Cork Airport and in consequence there was a saving of £20,000. Accounts amounting to £1,010 proper to 1968-69 were paid in 1969-70. Rockets estimated to cost approximately £1,500 were not delivered until April, 1970.
- D.2.—The estimate was based on a C.I.E. estimate prepared in October, 1968 of the total cost of redundancy compensation repayable to the Board by the Exchequer in 1969-70. In the event, compensation paid was less than anticipated.
- E.—Works involving grant expenditure did not proceed at one harbour and grant expenditure at six other harbours was less than expected.
- G.1.—Land acquisition did not proceed as quickly as expected.

- G.2.—Work on certain contracts proceeded more rapidly than was anticipated.
- H.—An expected reduction in the use of public transport, the cost of which is borne on this subhead, did not materialise.
- I.—Saving due to unexpected delays in the delivery and installation of certain radio navigational equipment at Dublin and Shannon Airports.
- K.1.—The pattern of expenditure on this subhead is irregular and accurate estimation is not possible.
- L.—Ireland's contributions to the International Civil Aviation Organisation and the Eurocontrol Organisation were greater than expected. These excesses were partly offset by a reduction in our contribution to the World Meteorological Organisation and savings on international travel.
- M.—Saving due mainly to a smaller number of approved grants coming in course of payment in the year than had been anticipated.
- O.—The number of grant applications received proved smaller than anticipated.
- Q.—Certain approved works were not completed before the end of the financial year.
- R.—Acquisition of sites and wayleaves did not proceed as quickly as expected and lump sum payments in lieu of rent which were provided for did not materialise.

- The surplus was due to an overall unforeseen increase in receipts from personnel licences and certificates of registration and airworthiness.
- 2. The surplus was due to the receipt of survey fees of approximately £12,000 for two large foreign tankers.
- The sum realised represented receipts for eleven months only. A payment of £16,282
  was not received until 1st April, 1970.
- The surplus was due to a change in the accounting procedure of Eurocontrol for the payment of reimbursements to member States.
- Receipts under the Road Transport Acts and from foreshore rents and other marine services were higher than expected.
- 7. Surplus arose because of exceptional buoyancy in traffic throughout the year.
- 8. Prior to 1969-70 the subhead comprised the gross receipts from earnings, leases, concessions, etc., with expenditure being met from other subheads of the Vote. On the transfer to Aer Rianta Teoranta new accounting procedures were introduced and it was not possible to forecast accurately the final outturn.

### EXTRA REMUNERATION (exceeding £100)

An Assistant Secretary received a fee of £325 as a director of Shannon Free Airport Development Company Ltd.

A Staff Officer in the Mercantile Marine Office, Cork, received an allowance of £125 for extra attendance and responsibilities.

Eight Engineers received gratuities totalling £2,110 for extra attendance.

Three hundred and ninety-nine employees received sums varying from £101 to £1,537 in respect of extra attendance and night duty allowances. The total amount paid in respect of overtime was £105,917.

### Notes

Subhead H includes expenditure on subsidised transport of immigration officials (£242), Customs and Excise Staff (£967), Post Office Staff (£1,255) and Department of Agriculture and Fisheries Staff (£149) (S.99/63/42).

Assistance was rendered by the Department of Defence in the search for a crashed Aer Lingus Viscount (S.4/4/62).

A sum of £16 in respect of excess annual leave taken by an officer who resigned was written off as irrecoverable (8.99/11/59).

An ex-gratia payment of £80 was made to an officer in respect of medical expenses incurred as a result of an accident in the course of official duties. Subhead B.1 (E.109/83/67).

 $\pm 43$  was paid to the Department of Social Welfare in respect of an employee's insurance contributions which were under-collected. Subhead A (S.98/18/69).

Expenditure amounting to £1,918 was incurred on remuneration of staff on loan without repayment to another Department. The accounts of another Department include expenditure of £770 in respect of staff on loan to this Department without repayment.

Expenditure under Subhead P related to the travelling, subsistence and other expenses of the Inter-Departmental Working Group on Oil Pollution. The total expenditure on this Working Group to 31st March, 1970 amounted to £437.

Transactions during the year included 944,000 money orders, amounting to £37,667,000; 7,844,000 postal orders amounting to £9,736,000; 2,881,000 Savings Bank deposits and withdrawals amounting to £52,599,000; Postmasters' and other remittances amounting to £217,104,000. A total of 10,126,000 parcels were dealt with and engineering stores to the value of £6,841,000 were handled. (Figures are approximate).

### EXTRA REMUNERATION (exceeding £100)

Six thousand two hundred and thirteen officers received sums ranging between £101 and £1,550 in respect of extra attendance and other duties. The total amount paid in respect of overtime was £2,161,203.

### Vote 42

An ex-gratia payment of £100 was made to an Assistant Staff Engineer for extra attendance and other duties over a period of five years (E.109/19/66).

An ex-gratia payment of £150 was made to an Executive Officer for the performance of Higher Executive Officer duties during the year (E.1/5/68).

### NOTES

Seventy-four claims totalling £2,841 and twenty-seven claims totalling £787, in respect of damage to vehicles, were abandoned on a mutual forbearance basis and on a halving basis, respectively.

In forty-five cases of damage to official vehicles in which no claim against members of the public arose, the drivers were held to be guilty of negligence. The cost of making good the damage was £2,278.

Thirty-five claims for repayment services amounting to £786 were abandoned as irrecoverable. Reductions amounting to £87 were made in five other claims.

Claims totalling  $\pounds 79$  in respect of legal expenses, due mainly from telephone subscribers, were abandoned.

Eight amounts totalling £52 in respect of excess annual leave taken by officers who were dismissed or left the service, and of unexpired value of uniforms, etc., were abandoned as irrecoverable.

Stores value £5,073 were stolen from telephone kiosks (1,092 cases) and the cost of labour in making good damage was £570. Compensation totalling £135 was received in 17 cases.

Commemoration, etc., stamps of the nominal value of £4,202 were presented to the Universal Postal Union, the Conference of European Postal and Telecommunications Administrations, etc. (F.101/6/61).

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- A.—The saving is due principally to vacancies remaining unfilled. The sum of £33,000 was received from Vote 51 to meet increases in remuneration.
- F.—The sum of £180,000 was received from Vote 51 to meet increases in remuneration.
- G.—The saving is due mainly to construction of County Control centres not proceeding to the extent anticipated; to grant expenditure in general being less than envisaged and to a Civil Defence educational and publicity film not having been completed as quickly as anticipated.
- H.—The saving is due mainly to unanticipated delays in the delivery of certain stores.
- I.—The excess is due to the purchase of greater quantities of medical supplies than had been anticipated.
- J.—The saving is due to the deferment of purchase of some vehicles and to delay in the delivery of others, partly offset by an excess on advances to officers for the purchase of motor cars.
- K.—The cost of feeding refugees and the numbers in receipt of rations were greater than anticipated.
- M.—The excess is due to additional purchases and increased prices.
- O.1.—The saving is due to the deferment of purchase of certain equipment and to purchasing difficulties in other cases.
- O.2.—Purchase of certain equipment could not be completed within the year.

EXPLANATION OF THE CAUSES OF VARIATION BETWEEN EXPENDITURE AND GRANT

- A.—In addition to the amount expended under Subhead A, a further sum of £18,000 was charged to the Vote for Remuneration (No. 51).
- B.1.—Travelling expenses amounted to £10,700 or £2,200 more than provided as a result of a greater volume of travelling on the part of both the inspectorial and administrative staffs. This was in part due to activities of study groups established in connection with the development of the health services. In addition, items of a miscellaneous nature were greater by £1,300 than the sum provided.
- B.2.—Following the installation of a P.A.B.X. telephone system, the charges for the service were revised, effective from June, 1968.
- E.—No inquiry was necessary in the year.
- I.—The grants payable are related to the expenditure of the participating bodies which reflected the general upward trend, particularly as regards remuneration.
- J.—No grant was required by An Bord Altranais during the year.

- L.—A projected anti-smoking campaign did not get under way and a saving of £4,000 resulted. In addition, circumstances did not require advertising to the extent anticipated.
- N.—The saving arose mainly as a result of deaths amongst pensioners participating in the scheme.
- O.—The scale of allowances was revised and three students more than provided for were recruited to the course commencing in the year.
- P.—Due to difficulties in devising satisfactory schemes in some cases and to delays in the delivery of equipment progress was slower than was anticipated.
